BARBADOS

The U.S.-based international rating agency Standard & Poors recently said it had lowered its long-term foreign-and-local-currency sovereign credit ratings on Barbados to "BB+" from "BBB-."

"The downgrade reflects our opinion that Barbados' economic fundamental continue to weaken," said Standard & Poors' credit analyst Olga Kalamina.

Standard and Poors said it had also lowered the short-term ratings from "B"



from "A-3 and that the outlook is stable. In addition, Standard &Poors assigned to Barbados' foreign-currency debt recovery rating of "3" and it has advised the transfer and convertibility assessment to "BBB-" from "BBB".

The US-Based rating agency said that in the short to medium terms, the difficult external environment will hamper the economic and investment outlooks.

"The resulting lower economic growth will hurt Barbados' fiscal and external accounts and will likely lead to further debt accumulation.

Recently, another U.S.-based Washington international agency, Moody Investors Service, gave Barbados a negative rating outlook including that the island's fiscal deficits would remain high for the next few years.

Unemployment in Barbados has jumped to nearly 12 percent in

the first quarter of 2012, the Ministry of Finance Economic Affairs said,



pushing past the 10 percent mark recorded in the previous quarter last year.

istry of Finance and Economic Affairs said unemployment from January to March reached 11.8 percent.

The jobless rate had reached 10.2 percent for the fourth quarter of last year, according to the Barbados Statistical Service.

'Statistics derived from the Continuous Household Survey indicated that the rate of unemployment for the first quarter (January to March 2012) stood at a provisional 11.8 percent," the statement said. "The unemployment rate among males stood at 10.5 percent and 13.1 among females.

DOMINICA

Retired public servant Eulid

Williams is tipped to be Dominica's next president. If confirmed, Williams will take over from ailing President Nicholas Liverpool

who is expected to step down in August.

Leader of the Opposition Hec-

tor John said he has not been consulted on the new appointment.

Williams, a trained accountant, served as a permanent secretary between 1987 and 2004. From 2004-2008 he served as managing director of the Eastern Caribbean Telecommunications Authority based in St. Lucia. In 2009, he was awarded Dominica's second highest national award the Sisserou Award during the annual National Day parade.

HAITI

Former United States President Bill Clinton recently visited Haiti to promote the impoverished Caribbean nation's long-defunct tourism economy.

Clinton visited an island resort and a cinema school along the



southern coast. He also took a walk through the French Quarterlike seaside city of Jacmel.

He later traveled to the north and visited a historic fortress, an international airport and a port for cruise ship passengers.

Haiti is still trying to recover from the 2010 earthquake and the government of President Michel Martelly hopes it can revive the economy by wooing first-time visi-

Traditional tourists have avoided Haiti for several decades because of political instability and almost unmatched levels of poverty.

JAMAICA

Two elected Jamaican officials have been accused of participating in a multi-million dollar lottery scam that has targeted elderly Americans.

Police Superintendent Leon Clunis said officarrested

Clunis said that Troupe's two sons also were arrested recently in a raid at the men's homes where police seized more than US\$13,000 and two guns.

The men have not yet been charged. Officials estimated that the lottery scam generate about US\$300 million year, up from about US\$30 million three years ago.

ST. KITTS

Prime Minister Dr. Denzil Douglas said he has been informed by the British government that his request for debt restructuring

for St. Kitts and Nevis has been granted.



It comes less than two months

after going to the Paris Club seeking support for his government's bold economic transformation through the restructuring of debts owed by the government to the UK.

Great Britain. That was half a century ago. From that historic precedence, Jamaica has distinguished itself as a significant, Caribbean location. Whether named as a contender in tourism, sports, finance, music, culture, fashion, cuisine, politics, etc the nation represented by a banner marked by its golden X bounded between green and black, Jamaica and Jamaicans have never been known as an island/people to merely bear witness. Instead its brand is associated with exemplary contribution and more often than not leaders, trendsetters and an envied

destination for travel. 1962: On Aug 6, Jamaica becomes the first British colony in the Caribbean to win Independence from Britain. Sir Alexander Bustamante is named the first prime minister of the nation. Princess Margaret represents her sister HRH Queen Elizabeth II at gala celebrations at the National Stadium in Kingston. The island establishes the National Dance Theat-

1964: The remains of Jamaican Pan-African spokesman Marcus Garvey was brought back to Jamaica and buried at Kingston's National Heroes Park.

1965: Deputy Prime Minister Donald Sangster becomes leader after Bustamante withdraws from public duty. Dr. Martin Luther King delivers valedictory speech at University of the West Indies.

1966: Emperor Haile Selassie I visits the nation to tumultuous greeting and outpouring from members of the Rastafarian community.

U.S. names Jamaican as Champion of Change

The White House, along with the U.S. State Department and U.S. AID, on July 27 honored Jamaican-born Dr. Claire Nelson, founder and president of the Washington-based Institute of Caribbean Studies (ICS) as a Champion

Champions of Change are leaders who have exemplified extraordinary successes and efforts toward the development of - and diplomacy with - their countries or communities of origin.

"The nine Champions of Change we honor today highlight the power of proximity," said Assistant Secretary of State for Western Hemisphere Affairs

"These members of the Latin American Diaspora remind us that geography matters, that being a good neighbor is both good manners and a good investment," she added.

"The Champions that we recognize today have helped their countries and communities of origin; and, in doing so, have bettered our region as a whole," she continued.

"These exceptional individuals, with their work in sports and community development, in education and financial inclusion, inspire others by their example," Jacobson said. "In a region with such profound human links

between our societies, ideas and inspiration spread quickly to the benefit of people all over the Americas and the Caribbean."

Dr. Nelson was recognized for her work with the Caribbean American Diaspora and, among other things, advancing exchanges and partnerships with both the US public and private sector.

ICS has planned forums and conferences, mentored Caribbean American leaders and organizations around the country and served as a National Profile Partner for Census 2010.

Nelson has also been instrumental in encouraging Caribbean American civic engagement and promoting the engagement of the Caribbean Diaspora in the development agenda of the Caribbean region.

An international development expert with over 30 years of experience, Nelson has used her passion and acumen to open doors for the disadvantaged and excluded across the Americas.

She is also an accomplished playwright and Caribbean folkloric performer.

Nelson holds a bachelor's and master's degree in industrial engineering from the SUNY at Buffalo and Purdue University, respectively, and a doctorate in engineering management from George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

A Nation on a Mission

In only six months of leadership, Prime Minister Portia Lucretia Simpson-Miller of Jamaica has elevated the island's profile by attracting positive world attention and in the process gleaned accolades for the Caribbean.

The nation's first female head of state distinguished her governance soon after the January inauguration by meeting with CARICOM leaders and US President Barack Obama to discuss the way forward.

Simpson-Miller became the first head of government in Jamaican history to formally endorse civil rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender citizens.

She made the commitment during the election campaign.

"I have no problem giving certain positions of authority to a homosexual as long as they show the necessary level of competence for the post."

She confronted the controversial issue many before her had either side-stepped or denounced.

The latter position resonated as bigotry towards a segment of the society and may have fomented intolerance and discrimination against the minority population.

Her statement was in direct opposition to her predecessor's PM Bruce Golding who told a BBC reporter he would never allow gays to sit in his cabinet.

"I make no apology in saying decisively and emphatically that the government of Jamaica remains irrevocably opposed to the recognition, legitimization or acceptance of same-sex marriages or same-sex unions."

Simpson-Miller also took a bold and controversial stance when she endorsed replacing the position of the British monarchy with an elected head of state.

She is the second head of government to openly endorse republicanism after PM Percival J. Patterson. Simpson-Miller has reportedly pledged to transform Jamaica into a Republic as part of the fiftieth anniversary of the island's independence.

Reportedly, she believes Jamaica should become a republic, in keeping with the mandate of independence.

However, she pleased crown and country in April, welcoming Prince Harry to the Commonwealth nation. In commemoration of Queen Elizabeth II's 60th reign on the throne of England, her grandson visited Jamaica and was graciously received.

Now in the sixth month of her affiliated People's National Party rule, the 10th prime minister of the island is immersed in fulfilling campaign promises regarding domestic demands.

She recently appeased Diasporan residents of New York visiting Brooklyn, home to the largest immigrant community from her country.

While here, Simpson-Mill-

er accepted the oldest suspension bridge in the United States, generously gifted by Borough President Marty Markowitz, who chose the Brooklyn Bridge as a significant keepsake for her first-time visit since her inauguration.

She accepted the miniature replica of the 129-year-old, steel suspension and national monument at a church in the Crown Heights section of Brooklyn.

In addition, Markowitz signed a proclamation declaring April 25, 2012, "Jamaica 50 Day in NYC."

Jamaicans showed up in numbers to greet their leader.

While here the PM also introduced the new consul general to the tri-state area. She endorsed the appointment of Herman G. Lamont, saying "inclusiveness" is the aim of the new consul.

"He will work with all Jamaicans," and maintain an "open door policy, one of inclusiveness."



2007: Jamaica Labour Party wins the national elections with Bruce Golding at the helm. Twenty-three-yearold, Jamaican Barrington Irving becomes first Black and youngest pilot to fly solo around the world.

2008: Jamaica rules track and field at the Beijing Olympics. The tiny island runs away with six gold, three silver and two bronze medals. Usain Bolt, 21, emerges the world's fastest human. He stacks up three gold medals winning the 100 metres, 200 and 4x100 relay. He is also championed for breaking world records in every win.

Maroons hope tourism can save Jamaican culture

CHARLES TOWN, Jamaica (AP) — In a backwoods town along a river cutting between green mountains, quick-footed men and women spin and stomp to the beat of drums. One dancer waving a knife is wrapped head-to-foot in leafy branches, his flashing eyes barely visible through the camouflage.

This traditional dance reenacts the Jamaican Maroons' specialty: the ambush. It was once a secret ritual of the fierce bands of escaped slaves who won freedom by launching raids on planters' estates and repelling invasions of their forest havens with a mastery of guerrilla warfare.

But on this day, descendants of those 18th century fugitives are performing for tourists, academics, filmmakers and other curious outsiders in a fenced "Asafu" dancing yard in Charles Town, a once-moribund Maroon settlement in eastern Jamaica that seemed destined to lose its traditions until revivalists gradually brought it back.

Maroons in the Caribbean are increasingly showcasing their unique culture for visitors in hopes that heritage tourism will guarantee jobs for the young generation and preserve what remains of their centuries-old practices in mostly remote settlements.

The basic idea has been tried around the world, from the Gusii people of Kenya to the artisans of the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina.

"If we don't follow in the footsteps of our foreparents we will find ourselves on the heap of history," said Wallace Sterling, the "colonel" of the Windward Maroon community of Moore Town. It is one of Jamaica's four semiautonomous Maroon tracts, each governed by an elected colonel, a title bestowed on Maroon leaders since their battles with the British army,

and a council appointed by the leader.

Trying to counter the endless tide of migration and assimilation, long secretive Maroons are more and more going public with the old ways — singing sacred songs, drumming, making herbal medicine, talking to ancestral spirits, woodcarving, hunting and "jerking" wild pigs. Maroons are credited with inventing Jamaica's "jerk" style of cooking, in which aromatic spices are rubbed or stuffed into meat before it is roasted on an open fire.

The turn to small-scale tourism for income can safeguard the Maroons' future and their cultural identity, leaders say. They say it has boosted pride among younger Maroons and encouraged some to stay in their rural hometowns. Other moneymaking opportunities are scarce in the communities of modest cement-block homes and tiny shops selling cold drinks and snacks.

"For a long time, it's been very difficult to keep the

tend to leave for the cities to seek work. But now we can train tour guides and our people can sell their crafts, their banana and coconuts," said Fearon Williams, the colonel of Accompong. An annual Jan. 6 celebration draws thousands of visitors to the isolated town, which sits among rocky cliffs and limestone towers in northwestern Jamaica. "Tourism is making us stronger."

A tour bus now comes weekly to Charles Town, a village whose colonel, Frank Lumsden, worked as a commodities trader in Chicago before returning to Jamaica in the late 1990s to focus on his ancestral roots.

There are also Maroons in Suriname, on the South American mainland, where escaped slaves over the centuries built their own Africancentered societies in sparsely populated Amazonian forests. Suriname's Maroons also say a broadening emphasis on ecotourism is helping fight cultural disintegration.

Rex: Jamaica's royal intellectual choreographer

"The heights by great men reached and kept were not attained by sudden flight, but they, while their companions slept, were toiling upward in the night."

—Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

One month after the island declared independence from Britain, Rex Nettleford launched a national, performing, arts group he named The National Dance Theater Company of Jamaica.

It was no accident that the same year Jamaica freed itself from colonial bondage nationals also danced to a new rhythm.

Perhaps driven by a desire to exercise creative freedom. Nettleford and his colleague Eddy Thomas birthed the entity that some might consider a manifestation declaring "out with the queen, in with the king."

Dubbed "King of Kumina" Nettleford was nicknamed Rex longer than many can recall.

Dance enthusiasts revered

him for glorifying "Kumina and Pocomania," - revivalist religious ritual which beckons African ancestral spirits using drums during traditional ceremonies.


While Quadrille exalted Europeans in dance, Kumina illuminated the African tradition.

Born in rural Jamaica, on Feb. 3, 1933, Ralston Milton Nettleford spent his early years in Bunkers Hill, Trelawny in the parish of Fal-

The boy nicknamed the Latin word for king showed early signs of genius and perhaps an ambition akin to royalty.

The teenaged youth studied at Cornwall College then furthered his education at Kingston's University College of the West Indies focusing on history. After attaining a bachelor's degree there, in 1957, he earned a Rhodes scholarship to study political science at Oxford University.

After graduation, he returned home and seized

every opportunity to aid in the growth of his country.

"The power to create and innovate remains the greatest guarantee of respect and recognition," Nettleford said.

"The jailers and the jailed are after all both in jail."

His voice emerged one to listen and learn from.

The entire Caribbean listened when he verbalized his hope for the region.

His dream was for development of a "sense of self worth, that self esteem which bolsters confidence in self to further forge in the crucible of a heritage a viable plural society where people live not just side by

side, but together."

In his first book, he focused on self esteem and identity.

"One unifying force in the Caribbean heritage is undoubtedly the African Presence. We may as well admit to ourselves the great moral strength that would accrue to Caribbean civilization were we to eschew once and for all the lingering plantation and colonial assumptions about the natural inferiority of those of its inhabitants who carry the 'stain' of Africa in their blood."

Published, 1970, "Mirror, Mirror – Identity, Race & Protest in Jamaica," he examined racial and social issues in Jamaica.

His essays on "The Rastafari Movement in Kingston," and "Manley & The New Jamaica" distinguished an important intellectual contributor.

Nettleford wrote and edited speeches for founding father and Premier Norman Washington Manley.

In an effort to narrow

the divide he identified between Jamaicans of African descent and others he said:

"The hidden history of Jamaica is here seen as the history of the struggle of the African component to emerge from the subterranean caverns into which it has been forced."

He was named vice chancellor of the University of the West Indies and in 1975 the nation honored him with the Order of Merit, the third highest distinguished award.

In 2008, Nettleford was awarded the Caribbean region's highest honor, the Order of the Caribbean Community (OCC) for his years of dedicated service as a regional ambassador. This award cemented Nettleford as the quintessential Caribbean citizen and international cultural icon.

The intellectual was a frequent visitor to Harlem's Schomburg Center for Culture for Research in Black Culture.



Call for a raise to the minimum wage

The U.S. Women's Chamber of Commerce supported the last increase in the federal minimum wage on July 2009 and we believe another raise is overdue. The business owners I talk with every day say that, far from hurting their businesses, raising the minimum wage in fact helps small businesses and the broader economy.

The number one problem for our member businesses is weak customer demand. Too many people forget that workers are also consumers. Consumer spending drives 70 percent of our economy, and we must repower consumer spending – backed by adequate wages rather than unaffordable debt - if we are going to repower our economy, create jobs and rebuild our middle class.

Raising the minimum wage puts dollars in the pockets of workers who are by necessity most likely to spend them immediately at the grocery store, the pharmacy, the autorepair shop and other local businesses. Raising the minimum wage boosts the economy from the bottom up, which is exactly what we need.

The U.S. Women's Chamber of Commerce has over 500,000 members across the nation. Women are more likely to own businesses in the services sector - such as in retail, healthcare, education and personal services. Raising the minimum wage reinforces their business strategies.

Many of the women business owners who belong to the U.S. Women's Chamber left the workforce to start their own businesses because they felt they were not being fairly paid. The migration of women from the workforce into business ownership has been one of the great economic achievements of the American dream. Women now own over 30 percent of American firms and are using their decision-making authority to effect positive changes in the workplace.

Women business owners understand and value security for families. And they know that when businesses invest in their workforces with decent compensation, they enjoy the benefits of a dedicated workforce with less turnover, higher productivity and better customer service.

Our members know that the typical low-wage worker is an adult woman. Think of your waitress at Applebee's or the cashier who rings you up at Walmart or the health aide who helps your mother or grandfather.

Our members know that the federal minimum wage of \$7.25 an hour - just \$15,080 for fulltime, year-round work - is too low. They know that keeping the minimum wage low, keeps women and families down.

From founding father, Alexander Hamilton to newspaper pioneer John Russworm, to poet James Weldon Johnson, Caribbean-Americans have played a historic role in shaping the ideals and values of this nation. Today Caribbean-Americans are everywhere. Hot in pursuit of the race for success, innovating new technologies in optics, setting new targets in sports; and breaking new moves in the dance halls.

It might be strange to say to give CAHM is to promote visibility, when the street of Brooklyn are paved with patty and roti shops and there is hardly a city, town or hamlet in America where the music of Bob Marley is not revered. But the fact remains that in the decision-making halls of America, the Caribbean American is largely invisible. We are the invisible elephant in the room. stood that like the Mayflower arrivals, we too Build AMERICA. Invisibility is the cause for marginalization. And marginal you are when nobody wants to count you, or ask your opinion even when they make millions of dollars on the money to spend to send money back home and such. Visibility is necessary to give voice to the intimate historical relations that exist between the islands of the Antilles formerly known as the West Indies.

We need voice for a Democracy is only as good as it citizens. Note I did not say leaders. It is important that we as a community understand more fully the privileges and responsibilities that come with living in one of the most successful experiments in national-shaping – this American democracy. Voice is a necessary prerequisite to having agency or power. We were taught voice by people like Stokely Carmichael; who as a Student immigrant from Trinidad at Howard University in the 60s saw that he could not sit to study while others could not sit at the lunch counters. Bring on the 'well (un)regulated militia!'

e can probably assume that we're on the way to inmate running the asylum, based on not one isolated nut case but input from multiple sources about how best that awful business in Colorado the other day could have been thwarted or minimized. The suggestion was advanced a few times by gun rights advocates that had the Aurora citizenry gathered in that ill-fated cinema been packing heat, an early takedown of the shooter would have likely spared the nation another episode of this gunfire- eruption grief it has so often had to endure.

When there's sentiment in more than one quarter for arming members of the public as the most effective means of maintaining order, keeping aberrant behavior at bay. that sounds like cause for alarm. It starkly brings home how much those who favor an even greater proliferation of firearms than now exists, have controlled this debate. It reinforces why the Assault Weapons Ban passed during the Clinton administration got to its sunset date in 2004, only to make its exit, with nary a whimper about renewal. And it perhaps makes us

reluctant believers of those polls which indicate, incredulously to many of us, that majority opinion in the U.S has turned against the need to tighten gun ownership laws and in favor of those who parrot the NRA line.

Mayor Michael Bloomberg, to his credit, was all over the shamefulness of the political mainstream's non-presence on the matter of gun control, calling out both President Obama and his Republican rival and demanding that they both declare where they stand. The mayor correctly described Obama as having dodged the issue thus far.

The president, for his part, did do somewhat of a minimalist acknowledgment of this radioactive area at a campaign event a few days after the massacre, declaring that "we can all agree" AK47 rifles belonged only in the hands of the military. The comment was in a way reminiscent of the left-handed salute he made to candidate William Thompson at a Manhattan dinner in 2009 during the mayoral contest, Obama offering only a fleeting reference to fellow Democrat Thompson being "in the house."

Bloomberg, of course, could afford the high road, a-political

stand on the gun problem in his position of not running again (as far as we know) for mayor of New York or any other office. Indeed the mayoralty of New York, we New Yorkers can proudly boast, figures to be one of the dwindling elective offices in the country where championing strict gun laws serves as boost rather than badge of dishonor. At any rate, Bloomberg is seen as one of the few voices insistent on hammering away at lax laws that allow guns to be possessed by folks who clearly shouldn't own them. Predictably, he characterized as "one of the dumbest" ideas the bone-headed notion that allowing citizens unrestricted access to firearms is the solution of choice for preventing these periodic bouts of trigger-happy madness.

An altogether different scenario for Obama. Not that he needed another wedge issue around which his opponents could rally, but were he to go all principled about this gun

debate, talk about maybe introducing proposals to prevent guns from winding up in the wrong hands, the NRA would assuredly commit to appreciably more resources than it's already contributing to help end Obama's White House occupancy. They would no doubt redouble their efforts to influence congressional races involving anyone likely to be supportive of anti-gun ownership policy. The NRA likes lording it over advocates of sanity in the national community, making the latter the bad guys in a warped interpretation of the American ideal.

"A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." So says the Second Amendment. It is perhaps one of the great puzzlements of American jurisprudence that the Amendment has sailed along these many years, successfully maintaining its position as gun rights advocates' stamp of legitimacy. Given the precise language in which it is couched, though, it is difficult to avoid the conclusion that justices who over the years have let stand the claim that the Amendment gives license for keeping and bearing arms in modern American society, have been influenced more by political than letter-of-the-law considerations. How the now long obsolete "well regulated militia" could be read as other than the sole premise of the Amendment boggles the mind.

So now comes the beyond ridiculous idea originating from wackos evidently anxious to have us embrace the militia concept, or some facsimile of it, yet again. Aurora wasn't the first such happening to generate this particular brand of lunacy. After the Virginia Tech. massacre in 2007, for example, there was talk that guns should be allowed on campus among the student population, and how much this could have positively impacted that situation. It's unreal; going to such extremes -- anything to avoid looking dead center at where the problem exists.

Or maybe these proponents of wild west vigilantism just want to get ahead of the curve. Maybe there's some sense of foreboding in that camp of the Supreme Court brethren one day having the courage to engage that "well regulated militia" language with greater honesty than some of them have been wont to do.

End Bush-era tax cuts for the wealthy

The U.S. House of Representatives will vote this week on proposals for dealing with the Bush-era tax cuts. This includes a proposal that passed the U.S. Senate last Wednesday [July 26] that will extend Bush-era income tax cuts for every American, but end extra breaks for the richest two percent (on take-home income beyond the first \$250,000). As a small business owner - my wife and I own and operate an auto repair shop with a dozen employees – I'm all for this. Especially the part about ending extra breaks for the top two percent.

Surprised to hear that? If so, I couldn't blame you, not after the debate about the Bush tax cuts has been so thoroughly confused by claims about the possible impact on small businesses. House Speaker John Boeh-

ner and other defenders of the tax cuts for the top rwo percent have repeated over and over again the assertion that ending special breaks at the top would harm small businesses. Unfortunately for Speaker Boehner's argument, repeating a false claim over and over again doesn't make it true.

Let's look at some basic facts.

In reality, only a tiny fraction - roughly three percent - of taxpayers who report any form of business income on their tax returns earn enough to be impacted by the tax rates for take-home income over \$250,000. What's more, this small fraction includes hedge fund managers, corporate lawyers, and K Street lobbyists – not who most Americans think of as small businesses. So the number of real small businesses taking home more than

\$250,000 is even fewer.

Furthermore, the "trickle down" theory used to justify extra tax cuts at the top simply doesn't work. When the Congressional Budget Office examined close to a dozen options to jumpstart economic activity and job creation in early 2010, including tax cuts for everyone, it found that extending special tax breaks for the richest Americans was the least effective of all 11 options for creating jobs and boosting the economy.

Finally, claims about how ending these special tax cuts will impact job creation ignore the most basic fact about what drives small business hiring. Customer demand is what drives my hiring decisions, not tax cuts. We hire when we see an opportunity, when we've got more customers walking in the door asking us to fix their cars than we

can serve with our current workforce. It has nothing to do with the tax rate on our take-home income.

And here's another thing: small business owners pay personal income taxes only on the net income we take out of our businesses – after deducting payroll and other business expenses. So if we take operating income and plow it back into hiring, we don't pay taxes on that money either way. The marginal tax rate on our takehome income doesn't even factor into that equation.

So if politicians really want to help small businesses, they should focus on how to bring more customers in our doors and stop wasting time defending extra tax cuts for the richest Americans. How do we get more customers? Rebuild our crumbling roads and bridges, stop cutting education, quit laying off teach-

ers and first responders, and extend the Bush tax cut for 98 percent of Americans – that's the way to bring more customers into our businesses. But if we take the nearly \$1 trillion we would raise from ending the extra Bush tax cuts for income over \$250,000 and hand it right back to the top 2 percent, we won't have the resources to do these

Here's the bottom line: the Bush tax breaks for the top two percent are not helping America's small businesses and they're not helping our economy – they're just another giveaway at the top. When politicians steal the good name of small business to advance a special interest agenda that's not really about us at all, that's a form of theft – political identity theft. Small business owners have an obligation to set the record

traight

It's time to stand up for the good name of small business. The Senate has already done the right thing. Now the question for every member of the House of Representatives is, will you stand with real small businesses and vote to end the extra Bush tax cuts for the top two percent, or will you use us as a human shield to defend wasteful tax breaks for Wall Street hedge fund managers, corporate lawyers, and high-powered lobbyists? It's time to show which side you're on.

Braata scores big at Choir Games

The acclaimed Braata Folk Singers of New York handed Jamaica an early Golden Jubilee gift by walking away with three medals at the seventh International World Choir Games held in Cincinnati, Ohio from July

The 12-member ensemble, under the direction of Founder and Artistic Director Andrew Clarke, earned two silver medals and one bronze medal- hence taking silverware in all three competitive categories in which they participated as Jamaica's representatives.

The 10 day event saw participation from hundreds of choirs representing some seventy countries from across the globe.

Jamaica's medal haul of three, tied the nation with world superpowers Great Britain and Germany, as well as Caribbean neighbors, the Bahamas, and despite being the second smallest choir at

Returning with the ensemble to New York on Sunday, Artistic Director Clarke was "Over the moon" with pride and joy at the accomplishment of his three year old group.

"To know that we have come so far so fast, and that within three years of our existence we could take the stage at this prestigious event, representing Jamaica- and walk away with the same number of medals as Britain and Germany - is just an incredible feeling."

now joins an elite corps of Jamaican choirs who have earned medals at the internationally renowned event. including the Nexus Performing Arts Company and the Cari Folk Singers.

Of the three medals won. Clarke states that the bronze in the category of 'Mixed Chamber Music' was perhaps the sweetest of all.

'That category is really for classically trained choirs which we are not," he says."We were required to do a 15 minute suite . in which we performed renditions of Freedom Song by Noel Dexter, Jammin by Bob Marley and Saloh- a Jamaican folk song- all sung with a classical bend. We took a big risk entering that category because it's not a style to which we are accustomed, but under the baton of Musical Director Garnett Mowatt, the members really delivered and the judges were extremely impressed."

For their silver medal winning performances in the 'Scenic Folklore' and 'Music of The Religions' categories, Braata performed two suites of well known Jamaican and secular selections.

Their folk repertoire included "Evening Time," "It Was Under the Coconut Tree" and "Dawg War," while highlights of the religious suite included "Dip Dem Bedward," "Bright Soul" and "Weeping Eyes."

According to Clarke, "The silvers in these categories were also rewarding as folk and religious music is more of our specialty. But just to know that we medaled in all three categories in which we participated- and that we could give Jamaica this pre-independence gift in our Golden Jubilee yearis extremely gratifying.

The group will have little time to bask in the glory of their accomplishments, with a slate of performances scheduled throughout the New York and tri -state area leading up to Jamaica's 50th birthday in August.

And although Clarke indicates that the group still has bills to pay relating to the trip to Cincinnati, Braata is already looking even further ahead - to the next edition of the games in Latvia, 2014.

Guyana's opposition elects new leader

A former army commander whose multiparty coalition group narrowly lost last November's general elections, was early Monday elected to lead the country's main opposition party officials said.

Brig. Gen. David Arthur

Granger, 66, defeated former Finance Minister Carl Greenidge by 508 to 175 votes at the end of the three-day biennial meeting of the People's National Congress (PNC), the party that is traditionally supported mostly by Guyanese of

African origin. Voting for the party leadership went late into Sunday night ending with victory for Granger after 2:00 a.m. on Monday.

The PNC is the largest player in A Partnership For National Unity (APNU) that Granger also heads and holds 26 of the 65 seats in parliament. Granger who qualified as a historian after leaving the military in the mid 90s, is the leader of the opposition in Parliament and now holds all of the top three jobs in the opposition community.


Greenidge, who spent several years as a top official of the Barbados-based umbrella regional negotiating machinery of the Caribbean trade bloc, was bidding to become leader of the PNC as many were of the view that Granger might suffer from work overload by holding down all three jobs.

Following his win,

Granger will now immediately have to deal with a near two-week stand-off between the military, police and the Afro-dominated bauxite mining town of Linden where police shot and killed three people and injured more than 20 during street demonstrations against steep hikes in electricity rates on July 18. The town is 65 miles southwest of the city.

Angered by the shooting, thousands of residents have locked down the town of 30,000, blocked all entrances and exists to it and sealed off a crucial river bridge that provides the main access to the road to Brazil and gold, diamond and timber concessions owned by foreign and local interests. Burial of the three killed is scheduled on the river bridge on Wednesday, African Emancipation Day.

The continuing unrest forced President Donald Ramotar to cancel a visit

to the town last Saturday after residents replaced huge logs and other debris on roadways and after soldiers and police refused to exert strong arm tactics following the recent deaths and injuries to others

The standoff has pushed up food and fuel prices in interior areas that depend on a road supply system through the opposition stronghold of Linden.



How to protect hair and skin from pool chemicals

A pool can provide a welcome respite from the heat and humidity. Taking a daily dip in a pool is great cardiovascular exercise and can help relieve stress. However, the chemicals used to keep pool water fresh and clean may wreak havoc on hair and skin.

Chlorine is one of the most widely used substances for water purification. It is often added to public water supplies to kill off pathogens that have the potential to cause illness. Variations of chlorine are used in pool filtration to ensure the water is clean and safe for swimming because it reduces bacteria and other contaminants, and may also help keep algae growth under control.

Although chlorine is very good at purifying the water people drink and

bathe in, too much of a good thing can prove troublesome. Oftentimes, chlorine — especially in high amounts — can affect the hair and skin of people who regularly use pools.

Hair

Chlorinated water that is also high in copper may form a chemical reaction that turns hair green. The chlorine reacts with the copper to form a compound that is green in hue. This can attach to the porous hair shaft and give hair a green tinge. The green is especially obvious in light-colored

Chlorine is harsh and caustic, while hair is porous. Dry hair that becomes saturated with chlorine-treated water can eventually have salt crystals locked inside, which leads to breakage. Washing

hair directly after swimming may help rinse off external chlorine, but it will not adequately remove chlorine locked inside follicles. Hair may need to be soaked for several minutes in fresh water. Hair that is prone to dryness may become more dry from

Swimmers can wear a waterproof swimming cap to prevent against chlorine damage. If this option isn't available, soaking hair in fresh water to saturate hair shafts and then applying a barrier, such as conditioner combed through the hair, can help repel some of the chlorinated water and protect against damage.

Hair that has turned green from pool water may need to be treated with special shampoos or strippers to remove the chlorinecopper compounds. Cutting off the green areas may be an easier solution.

Chlorine is caustic, and high concentrations can burn the skin. Individuals with sensitive skin may be even more susceptible to rashes and burns from chlorinated pools.

To prevent skin irritation, keep chlorine levels in pool water as low as possible. Applying a waterproof sunscreen or lotion to the skin prior to swimming may also serve as an additional line of defense. There are commercially made products that are designed specifically for application prior to getting in the pool. Because they are waterproof, they will not wash off in the pool or foul up water.

Public pools with a high volume of swimmers tend to have more chlorine in them than backyard pools at private residences. This is evidenced by the strong and often overwhelming aroma of chlorine in the vicinity of the public pool. The effects of chlorine can be seen by the bleaching and wearing

A career where food is love and an art

Elle Phillipe had many jobs as an office manager after she emigrated from Haiti, more than two decades ago.

When she saw a sign "cooking class" in the window of the Greenwich Village bistro Tartine, Elle Phillipe went in and registered. "I remember, the first class was veal," Elle says of the three-hour, every Thursday from 5:00-8:00 p.m., cooking classes Elle took for a year that ultimately changed the direction of her life.

Since she was eightyears-old, she remembers visiting her grandparents in Leogane, Haiti where they grew food. She always was attracted to food. The classes propelled her onto her current path.

"It was so much fun, all of us from all walks of life, in the kitchen pealing potatoes and talking," she reminisces.

Three years later, Elle studied at the French Culinary Institute, receiving a certificate, and began to cater parties at the Australian Consulate. Two years later, continuing to work as an office manager by day, she went to the New School at night earning a certificate in catering and food laws.

Now, after 12 years of working as a personal chef, she is segueing into a business of event catering and personal dining at your

place or in her "apartment bistro."

"I love entertaining, I don't just want to cook, I want to set the stage," she says of her vision. "You sit, you stay for hours and enjoy the creative meal I prepare for you."

What this means is that clients pick from a menu considering their taste and budget. Elle will set an elegant table, prepare and serve the meal in her Upper East Side apartment or your home. Her specialties are

French, Italian, American and Haitian cuisine.

A sample Haitian cuisine-personal dining menu includes in-season farmers market salad with fresh goat cheese and roasted beets —"so versatile," she says, green pea puree (sauce pois) and white rice, vegetables with conch (legumes), and roasted chicken. Dessert is beignet (fritter) with English cream and raspberry sauce garnish.

Higher price menus include different vegetables,

entrées, amount of courses, and desserts. "Everything is fresh, I never open a can!" she boasts. "My philosophy is keep it fresh, keep it real, and keep it simple."

"I'm working on my website, now," she says, but people can email me at metropolis2@verizon.net and we can discuss dining and entertaining needs.

Through the years and with a boundless curiosity, Elle has taken master classes with highly regarded chefs.

Come fall, Elle will begin teaching her own cooking classes. "Show up with enthusiasm, a smile, and open to learn" are the requirements for her six-session series that will take place on Saturdays between 10:00-2:00 p.m. The class

will then eat what they prepare. "We will also work on menu development," she says.



New York Thanksgiving Service for Jamaica's 50th

New York, NY (July 29, 2012) – Thousands gathered into the majestic nave of the Riverside Church in Morningside Heights, New York City, for the annual Service of Thanksgiving celebrating the nation of Jamaica's 50th Anniversary of Independence on Sunday July 29, 2012.

In the dedication of Jamaica's 50th year of Independence, the Right Reverend Howard Gregory, Anglican Bishop of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands, delivered the sermon with reflections from one of the lesser prophets, Haggai. Ironically, he spoke of the neglect of the lesser of these, the poor and humble, and the great divide of the rich and poor from 1962, the year of Jamaica's Independence from Britain.

Bishop Gregory made the correlation of the corrosion of citizens' social responsibility to that of their neglect of God's temple: "The God of the Judean Christian tradition should be in the midst

He cited the exponential growth of murder crimes from 1962 to the very present time, wherein the numbers speaks to the neglect and decay of the community of God's people

and the temple of God as a direct correlation to the moral and social decadence.

As a post-colonial nation he rhetorically asked: "What is it that we are seeking to celebrate?" 'Emancipendence', a termed recently coined by the late Professor the Honourable Rex Nettleford, as he quotes from Jamaica's iconic singer, Robert (Bob) Nesta Marley who used words from the Rt. Excellent Marcus Mosiah Garvey; "Emancipate yourselves from mental slavery, none but ourselves can free

our minds." He noted from recent international study, that racial discrimination is persistent in the Caribbean, its existence is so covert and subtle; that only astuteness and sensitivity to its subtleties allow for consciousness of its very existence.

"Emancipate yourselves from mental slavery, none but ourselves can free our minds, "he quotes from Bob Marley. The very good news is that "God has enabled our liberation." He implores, that Jamaicans must keep hope alive, and that "the future always contains the best that is yet to come" although slavery in varied forms continues to loom.

There was commonality with Bishop Gregory's reflections to that of the Independence Message of the Prime Minister of Jamaica, the Most Honorable Portia Simpson Miller. Consul General of Jamaica in New York, Herman G. LaMont, quotes from the Hon. Prime Minister: "As we celebrate the notable achievements and successes we have made as a nation and a people. I also call on everyone to make this time a time of renewal of commitment; a time to forge and strengthen relations and help build our beloved country into becoming the place we all want it to be - the country to live, work raise families, do business and retire."

The Prime Minister calls on all Jamaicans "to build on our great legacy so that future generations can be proud of Jamaica."



Dr. Steven C. Tawil: Colon Cancer Screening & Prevention

Stop postponing your colonoscopy.

Everyone age 50 and over needs one, but African-Americans are at an especially high risk of developing colon cancer, says Dr. Steven C. Tawil, gastroenterologist and internist.

"It is recommended that they be screened for colon cancer at age 45," says the doctor.

The reasons the mortality rate is higher for African-Americans is not known, says Dr. Tawil, but the good news is that having this simple procedure "can improve the numbers."

It has never been easier or more convenient to undergo this procedure. It can be done right in Dr. Tawil's Brighton Beach office, with an anesthesiologist present.

"This means it is an 100 percent painless procedure," says the doctor.

The administration of the anesthesia is quick, so patients feel no pain, he assures. The presence of the anesthesiologist also means that a patient's vital signs are constantly being monitored.

"It's another pair of hands in the room, another doctor checking oxygen, heart rhythms, and pulse," says Dr. Tawil. "It's all about the comfort and safety of the patient."

Dr. Tawil's office is recognized by the American Association for Accreditation of Ambulatory Surgery. Facilities accredited by this organization must meet rigorous standards of cleanliness and other criteria that assures the highest standards, says the doctor. This feat is not an easy achievement, and he takes pride that his practice is held in such high esteem.

The Brighton Beach Avenue facility, at the same location since 1991, recently moved from the second floor to the third floor, securing a new 6,000 square foot office. Among the highlights is an endoscopy suite with a private changing room, a recovery room, and a private bathroom in the recovery room. Such a set-up makes screening easy for the patient, as there's no running down a hall to find a toilet. Everything is convenient and private.

Make an appointment to see him if you have rectal bleeding. This could be a sign of colon cancer, and should never be ignored, says the

doctor. A change in bowel habits or unexplained weight loss are other reasons to undergo an exam. If there is a history of polyps in the family, being screened is a must, he says. Polyps are small growths that occur on the wall of the colon, and if they are not removed, some may eventually turn into cancer, says Dr. Tawil. The removal of polyps can be done right after the colonoscopy is performed, while the patient is still under anesthesia. That way, patients don't have to return to get another proce-

Patients can also come to him to get their blood pressure checked and their sugar levels monitored. He also treats heartburn, ulcers, constipation, liver issues, and stomach ailments. He specializes in the treatment of hepatitis, particularly hepatitis C.

"We have the latest treatment, available right in the office," he says.

Dr. Tawil's credentials are impeccable. He is boardcertified in internal medicine and gastroenterology, which means a "double certification," he notes. In addition, he is re-certified every 10 years, which involves undergoing a seven-hour test. It all proves he is at the top of his game, aware of the most recent developments in the

Former Bahamas PM bows out



Former Bahamas Prime Minister Hubert Ingraham recently tendered his resignation via a letter to House Speaker Kendal Major at the House of Assembly.

He confirmed his resignation from Parliament will be effective on Aug.

Ingraham told the Bahamian media that he decided to delay his resignation to allow Greg Gomez, his preferred choice to run in the North Abaco by-election on a Free National Movement (FNM) ticket, to meet the constitutional residency requirement. Ingraham had earlier said his resignation would have been effective from July.

Gomez previously lived outside the country. The constitution requires that candidates in elections be ordinarily resident in The Bahamas for a year prior to nomination. Gomez is expected to meet the resident requirement at the end of August.

"It has been a singular privilege and honor to serve in the august House of Assembly of the Commonwealth of The Bahamas," Ingraham said before a packed Minority Room of the House of Assembly.

The former prime minister also addressed a number of other issues. He said the approaching referendum on gambling should include the guestion of casino gambling.

He spoke out against Bahamas Police Commissioner Ellison Greenslade for making what he (Ingraham) claimed were political comments to Urban Renewal and condemned the decision of the government to end the contract of Hospital Administrator Coralie Adderely, although he said she has not yet received a letter. Finally, Ingraham said he would never accept a Knighthood if offered.

Following General Elections in May, Ingraham's incumbent FNM lost power to the Progressive Liberal Party (PLP), he announced his resignation as FNM leader and further shocked supporters by saying he was retiring from active politics and would not take his seat in the Assembly although he was re-elected for an eight successive time for the North Abaco constituency.

His resignation marked the 35th anniversary of Ingraham's first election to Parliament.

Court annuls FIFA ban on Bin Hamman

Trinidad and Tobago Minister of National Security Jack Warner said he feels vindicated after the Court of Arbitration for Sports (CAS) annulled the FIFA-imposed lifetime ban on former FIFA presidential candidate Mohamed Bin Hamman.

Warner told a press conference last week at the Ministry of National Security, Port of Spain "I waited a little more than a year for this day and now I feel, not only a sense relieved, but I feel comforted, adding that a few friends, including Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar, never lost faith in him during the difficult time.

Warner said if he had not resigned as FIFA vice-president in June last year, he too would have been found not guilty by the CAS. "But I was not prepared to go through this charade," he said.

Last June, both Warner and Bin Hamman were suspended from FIFA after reports that several Caribbean Union Football (CFU) officials were offered bribes of US\$40,000 during a meeting at the Hyatt regency hotel in Port of Spain last May.

Warner and Bin Hammam (who had challenged Sepp Blatter for the FIFA presidency) were accused of giving bribes to delegates of

the CFU.

No action was taken against Warner as he resigned his executive position while a lifetime ban was imposed against Bin Hammam.

The three-man CAS panel, which included British QC Phillippe Sands, emphasized only that it was "case not proven," because the evidence compiled following FIFA's own investigation, was insufficient to prove Bin Hammam provided the suitcase of dollar bills.

The CAS judgment found by a 2-1 majority, damag-

ingly for Bin Hammam: "it is more likely than not that Mr. Bin Hammam was the source of the monies... and that his conduct... may not have complied with the highest ethical standards that should govern the world of football and other sports."

CAS found, though, that the investigation carried out by FIFA into the allegation that the US\$40,000 payments came from Bin Hammam and were bribes to buy the CFU delegates "votes' was not complete or comprehensive enough."

The British minister of state hoped that the writing hoped that the writing-off debts to the Department for International Development "will help boost the chances of success and help free up resources to help protect the poorest and most vulnerable citizens of St Kitts and Nevis during the challenging time."

Warner said when a shot is fired from a gun "you would know where it came from and know the area, you can pinpoint the house and if they have the squad cars in the area, as there will be, it will be a matter of seconds."

Police recorded 35 killings in one week in July, pushing the murder rate to 228 so far for the year.

TURKS AND CAICOS

The acting governor of the Turks and Caicos Islands has signed into law Value Added Tax (VAT) to boost the finances of the troubled British territory.

An Il percent tax will be levied on a range of goods in the island chain southeast of the Bahamas starting next April. A government statement said the rate is the second lowest in the Caribbean region, after Haiti.

The law signed contains several exemptions, including fruit and vegetables, fresh meat and hurricane sup-

plises.

The tax is intended to

stabilize the finances in an island placed under direct

rule by Britain in 2009 amid allegations that local officials had taken payoffs from developers.

Elections making way for a return to local rule are scheduled for November.

Jamaicans bolt to Olympics for gold and glory

amaicans led by Prime Minister Portia Simpson-Miller joined delegations representing athletes from 205 countries across the world to attend opening ceremonies of the 30th Olympiad in London, England.

The leader – who is also minister of sports – made the four-day visit to the international, sports mecca where thousands of athletes from around the globe will compete in 36 sports until Aug. 12.

Although her visit ends one week before Usain Bolt races to face challenge for Olympic gold and dominance in track and field, the prime minister said she had confidence in team Jamaica and urged nationals to cheer on all the athletes who represent the island.

"Once again, all roads lead to London and I am expecting the Jamaican team to perform to the best of its ability and it is only fitting that we give them all the necessary support dur-



ing the Games," Simpson Miller said.

Jamaicans hold high hopes for a repeat sweep in both the men's and women's races they compete – akin to their victory in 2008 at the Beijing, China Olympics – shutting out any aspirations for competition to medal gold, silver or bronze.

While all athletes aspire to Olympic glory, Jamaicans are forcefully going for the gold that also celebrates their golden anniversary of independence.

The prime minister said there was much significance in the Games in this 50th year of Jamaica's Independence and 64 years after Olympians Herb McKenley, Arthur Wint and others "blazed a trail of glory at our first participation in the Olympics in London in 1948."

Prior to the opening ceremonies on Friday, she participated in a welcome flag-raising ceremony at the Olympic Village and met with the Jamaican athletes.


Diaspora Vibe 2.0

Haitian dance troupes Feet of Rhythm, Kongo – featuring Peniel Guerrier, and La Troupe Makandal will perform to the percussion and melodies of authentic Haitian traditional music. The ra-ra group Raram will also perform.

Three of these dance groups collaborated in a recently completed three-part series with Center for Traditional Music and Dance (CTMD) as part of a five-year Community Cultural Initiative with the Haitian performing arts community, funded by the National Endowment for the Arts. About 10 Haitian cultural workers and activists, now calling themselves Ayiti Fasafas, Haiti face-to-face, have been meeting with CTMD, since last fall, to organize the series

A memorial evening, June 30, paying tribute to the great master drummer and Brooklyn-resident Frisner Augustin who died of a stroke in Haiti in February of this year was the second in the series. CTMD and Ayiti Fasafas assembled the most talented top musicians and dancers from the traditional arts community who volunteered their talents for the free tribute. Haiti Cultural Exchange provided refreshments.

Ninaj Raoul of Kongo said, "There's a lot of love here," refer-

ring to warmth in the packed Roulette theater on Atlantic Ave., the engagement between performers and audience, and the sense of remembering Frisner's immense talent and joyfulness.

Jazz guitarist Ti-Pascal (Alex Pascal), who isn't usually associated with the "traditional" music scene, performed with Avant-garde drummer Andrew Cyrille who collaborated with Frisner on the CD Route De Frères, released last year. Cyrille was planning their next collaboration at the time of Augustin's passing.

Ase Dance Theatre (modern and vernacular movement), Brother High Full Tempo, (ra-ra) Gran Chimen (troubadour), and Pat Hall Dancers were among those who channeled the spirit of Frisner. Frisner's own drummers from La Troupe Makandal were an integral component of the evening, which also included student drummers from the Makandal Haitian Drum Workshop, classes Frisner taught at Hunter College since 1983 and will continue with others from Makandal.

The third program in CTMD's series highlighted dance. Held at El Museo del Barrio on July 14, this event honored master dancer Jean-Léon Destiné.

Among his many noteworthy milestones, Destiné performed at the National Folklife Festival

in Washington DC in 1941, and danced with Katherine Dunham's Broadway production and touring company of Bal Negre. He started his own dance company that played theaters, concert halls, and venues coast to coast and has a long list of honors and awards for excellence in the dance.

During the tribute, dancer Peniel, garbed in shiny red, presented Destiné, seated in the audience with an asson and bell–instruments integral with vodou rituals.

Destiné later came on stage and thrilled the crowd when he joined Peniel for some dance movements before he told the audience about his trajectory as a dancer.

Five performing troupes, from

those deeply embedded in the traditional to those blending contemporary with the traditional—all accompanied by the talent of local drummers, filled the evening.

Ethnomusicologist Lois Wilcken said of the three-part series, "With CTMD's collaboration with Ayiti Fasafas, the Haitian cultural community has brought together artists from their own corners. We've come to know each other on a deeper level and we enjoy working together. Our task, now, is to carrying this understanding into our respective established communities."

Batman battles terrorist in trilogy finale

"The Dark Knight Rises"

The Dark Knight Rises brings down the curtain on the brilliant Batman trilogy directed by Christopher Nolan and starring Christian Bale as the Caped Crusader. Each of the earlier episodes, Batman Begins (2005) and The Dark Knight (2008), earned a spot on this critic's annual Top Ten List, #s 9 and 1, respectively.

Given how the late Heath Ledger played The Joker to perfection, delivering an inspired, Oscar-winning, career performance in the previous installment, you knew it would be hard for Nolan to find as compelling a character for his highlyanticipated finale. And if The Dark Knight Rises does have a weakness, it lies in the fact that its primary villain pales in comparison. Otherwise, the movie measures up to franchise expectations, though its convoluted plot and 24 hours running time is likely to have younger kids squirming in their seats.

The picture's point of departure is eight years after the end of the last adventure, when Batman selflessly accepted the blame

for the untimely demise of District Attorney Harvey Dent (Aaron Eckhart). The broken, embittered vigilante has apparently kept a low profile over the intervening years, allowing the Gotham Police Department to fight crime on its own.

But that's only until the arrival in town of Bane (Tom Hardy), a card-carrying member of the association of assassins known as The League of Shadows. Although his speech is pretty much muffled by a Hannibal Lecter-like contraption affixed to his face, you don't need to understand his unintelligible mumblings to know that he's a maniacal menace. The masked terrorist is hell-bent on blowing up the city with a nuclear device and of course it isn't long before Commissioner Gordon (Gary Oldman) needs help handling the mayhem.

Meanwhile, Batman's alter-ego Bruce Wayne already has his hands full with Selina Kyle (Anne Hathaway), a cat burglar he catches snooping around his mansion. Fortunately, Wayne still has loyal assistants in his butler Alfred (Michael Caine) and weap-

ons/vehicle/gadgetry specialist Lucius Fox (Morgan Freeman). Plus, he forges a new friendship with John Blake (Joseph-Gordon-Levitt), an idealist cop with excellent instincts who might be sidekick Robin should the series be spun off.

Outfitted with a state-ofthe-art motorcycle and hovercraft, a revivified Batman engages his evil adversary with an unbridled enthusiasm. And between purist Nolan's loyalty to 35mm film and live action stunts, what's served up onscreen proves to be nothing short of spectacular.

A tip of the cap, or should I say of the cape, to a terrific trilogy for the ages!





Sammy is no specialist bowler nor a specialist batsman in Test cricket and to have him bowl first in a Test match is a

disgrace to West Indies cricket. Sammy takes up the position of a specialist bowler and when the West Indies plays against the better performing ICC teams, another bowler will have to be included in the Test squad.

Gayle, Narsingh Deonarine

and Marlon Samuels ought not be exposed to too much bowling because they have to concentrate on their batting. Another pacer is required in the Test team. The West Indies selectors should act now and prepare for teams with greater opposition. Bowlers must be prepared as a unit of four to counter attack and remove any top batsman or batsmen on the opposition. Narine, Rampaul and Roach have already signaled their preparedness. Clones win three-game series in Ohio

SCRAPPERS 3 CYCLONES 2

July 28 at Eastwood Field An eighth-inning throwing error from Clones first baseman Jayce Boyd set the stage for a two-run homer that erased Brooklyn's onerun lead over the Mahoning Valley Scrappers.

The Cyclones got on the board in the first inning of the back-and-forth bout in the Buckeye State when center fielder Brandon Nimmo hit a leadoff single and crossed the plate on catcher Kevin Plawecki's line-drive double to right field.

But the Scrappers scraped up a run in the second as Brooklyn starter Hansel Robles gave up a double to catcher Richard Stock, followed by a single to designated hitter Logan Vick. Scrapper right fielder Andrew Campbell then singled on a line drive out to left field, driving Stock home.

The Clones recaptured the lead in the next inning, with right fielder Eudy Pina chopping a grounder to Scrapper shortstop Jairo Kelly for

a single and taking second on ground out by Brooklyn shortstop Phillip Evans. Pina then ran home on a linedrive single by first baseman Jayce Boyd.

But everything fell apart in the eighth. With two outs on the board, Scrapper second baseman Joseph Wendle reached first on Boyd's throwing error — giving third baseman Joe Sever another runner to bring home when he crushed a homer out over left field off a pitch from struggling Cyclones reliever David Wynn.

CYCLONES 10 SCRAPPERS 5

July 29 at Eastwood Field Brooklyn's line-up came alive as the team hammered the Mahoning Valley Scrappers' pitching staff in their second night in Ohio.

Cyclones center fielder Brandon Nimmo opened the game with a leadoff single off hurler Ryan Merritt just a preview of what was to come for the first-round draft pick from Wyoming. Second baseman Jeff Reynolds drew a walk to bring up shortstop Philip Evans, who crushed a three-run dinger to left. Catcher Kevin Plawecki grounded out and first baseman Jayce Boyd flied out, but the amount of contact the Clones were making worried Scrappers skipper Ted Kubiak enough that he vanked Merritt for reliever Josh Martin. The new pitcher managed to end the inning, but he wouldn't succeed in keeping Brooklyn's bats quiet — the mini-Mets posted two more runs in the second frame, with back-to-back homers from Nimmo and right fielder Julio Concepcion.

The Scrappers managed to get on the board in the bottom of the second and picked up another run in the third thanks to an RBI single from first baseman Evan Frazar. But Martin pitched himself into a jam in the fifth, giving up back-to-back singles to Reynolds and Evans and walking Plawecki with no outs. Boyd then hit a sac fly that brought Reynolds home. The Scrappers

went to the bullpen again, this time for hurler James Stokes. After striking out Sabol, Stokes let Clones third baseman Alexander Sanchez rope one to center field, driving in Evans.

And Brooklyn's batters still had more in the tank: the team put up two more runs in the sixth, with singles by Concepcion, Nimmo — who went four for six on the night Revnolds and Evans. In the eighth, Reynolds singled again and scored. The Scrappers attempted to rally in the bottom half of the frame, but fell short after an RBI single by right fielder Andrew Campbell and a two-run double off the bat of center fielder Tyler Naquin.

CYCLONES 5 SCRAPPERS 1

July 30 at Eastwood Field Mini-Mets center fielder Brandon Nimmo led the Cyclones to victory over the Mahoning Valley Scrappers — but this time he had some help from hurler Rainy Lara.

The last match-up of a six-

game Clones road trip got off to a rough start when the Scrappers put one on the board in the first after Lara gave up a double to center fielder Tyler Naquin, and catcher Charlie Valerio chopped an RBI grounder up the middle to drive Naquin home. But after that, Lara was dominant the rest of the game, sending the Scrappers down in order the next four innings, allowing no addi-

tional runs, and striking out a total of 10 batters in seven innings of work.

Meanwhile, the Cyclones offense surged, bringing home two runners in the third, two in the fifth and a final run by right fielder Eudy Pina on a line drive blast from Nimmo, who now boasts 24 RBIs on the season and a batting average of .286 over the last 10 games.



"Most newspapers print a disclaimer in their classified ad section to warn readers about numbers that are a direct line to trouble. Any number starting with 900, 540, 595 or 871 charges a fee beyond a local call. In some instances, ads initially advertise calls to a local number, but then direct callers to a second number starting with one of the paid exchanges. "Consumers must also question legitimacy of sifieds because vague classifieds too could be a scam. Be fore responding to an ad-consumers should verify verify the source of all information & always be wary about sending money or signing a contract with an unknown party."




