

Building a better Brooklyn

Friends of Wingate Park, a volunteer non-profit organization in Flatbush, Brooklyn formed in 2011 primarily to engage Brooklyn youth in activities aimed at maintaining a healthy physical environment, is today in the vanguard of the citywide effort to stem gun- and gang-violence.

Friends of Wingate Park targets youth and families of Crown Heights, East Flatbush, Brownsville, East New York, Bedford Stuyvesant and Canarsie in the effort to create a "One Brooklyn" identity, according to Jamaicanborn Vivia Morgan, the group's founder and president.

Friends of Wingate Park

builds community activism by "bringing neighbors together in an effort to drive out negative influences and create positive, free, fun, healthy programs for the community at large, so as to build a stronger Brooklyn," Morgan told Caribbean Life.

CARICOM backs Antigua against US

It's a classic example of a David vs Goliath story; but this one is not Biblical

A small Eastern Caribbean island which genuinely thought it had found an innovative way to make millions, by offering itself as a home-base for Internet gambling to supplement annual revenues from its tourism and offshore finance sectors.

But U.S. authorities -- upset that Americans were taking advantage of the opportunity to log on to the site and place millions of dollars in wagers, declared the operation a major crime and began preparations to dismantle it.

Court challenges followed but once the system was dismantled almost completely and indictments handed out to some of the investors, a fullfledged trade war developed between the U.S. and Antigua with the U.S. using its superior might to not only crush the online gaming sector, but also refuse to accept a ruling from the world trade referee that it was wrong to shut down the Caribbean island's major revenue source.

Stunned by what Prime Minister Baldwin Spencer described as the loss of more than 3,000 jobs and more than \$1B in revenues annually, Antigua took the mighty U.S. to the Geneva-based World Trade Organization (WTO) in 2004 to challenge the move and won. Washington made it clear that it was not amused but even before then, had agreed to abide by the ruling, confident it would have its way.

Now 11 years after the WTO ruling that Antigua had not only won its case

Caribbean

The head of the Caribbean Public Health Authority (CARPHA), Dr. James Hospedales, said the Chikungunaya virus has reached epidemic proportions in the Caribbean.

"By definition this is an epidemic since it represents an unusual number of cases of this problem where we would never have it done before," Dr Hospedales.

The mosquito-borne illness was first detected in the Caribbean in December 2013, in St Martin and recently Antigua and St Vincent and the Grenadines became the latest countries to declare an outbreak.

According to Dr. Hospedales,

as of April 28, there were 4,108 probable cases 14 countries across the region.



He also stated that Caribbean countries have putting measures in place in place to address the spread of the virus.

"In December, once it came into the region we established an incident management team and that has regular contact with the countries with PAHO (Pan American Health Organization)," Hospedales said.

To date Chikungunya virus has been confirmed in Anguilla, Aruba, Virgin Islands, Dominica, Dominica Republic. French Guiana, Guadeloupe, Martinique, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, St. Maarten (Dutch) and St. Martin (French).

Guyana

Guyana police are investigating the deaths of four people who unknowingly drank a tonic laced with cocaine last Sunday.

One other person —a child- is battling for her life at hospital.

Those who died are identified as Simone "Ngina" Price, 36, her husband, Alex Blair, 42, her sev-

en-year-old son Jahaquel Blair and her close friend, Natasha George,

the family for a family guest to be taken to the United States when she was returning.

The cocaine was dissolved inside, along with casareep and chicken foot.

Police said in a statement that the family ingested SSS Tonic into which a quantity of cocaine had been dissolved.

It said that the bottle of SSS Tonic, along with other goods had been left at the house by a man known to them for an overseas-based female relative to take with her on her return. However, she did not carry the items because she was traveling to Pennsylvania before going on to New York.

Haiti

The American government has awarded US\$4 million to help Haitian families hurt by a drought in the Caribbean nation.

The U.S. Embassy in Portau-Prince said recently that



awarded the money to CARE International.

About 60,000 people living in

the remote village of Jean-Rabel who are malnourished or at the risk of severe hunger will receive food vouchers for ten months under the emergency assistance. Some of the money will be used to develop savings and loans programs.

The northwest part of the country has long been prone to dry weather conditions but a drought since October has been particularly acute.

Subsistence farmers have lost two harvest seasons, seen food prices climb and have struggled to feed their families.

Jamaica

Plans to impose a tax on bank withdrawals as part of revenue measures for the 2014/2015 financial year, have been scrapped.

Faced with intense opposi-

tion to the proposed tax, the Simpson-Miller administration has decided to look elsewhere



to collect revenues for the Budget.

Finance Minister Dr. Peter Phillips who made the announcement

as he closed the Budget debate recently said the gap will be filled by the life insurance industry.

The first being the introduction of a 15 percent withholding tax on all insurance premiums paid by Jamaican residents to non-residents, premiums paid by Jamaican residents to registered Jamaican insurance companies will be exempt. The objective of this measure is to assist us in improving compliance while we strive to protect the most vulnerable," he said.

The Citizens Action for Principle and Integrity (CAPI) has welcomed the government's decision to reverse the bank withdrawal tax, which it says was widely perceived to be unjust.

CAPI says it is urging government to recognize the value of consultation in crafting future budgets and its usefulness in facilitating consensus on national issues.

St. Lucia

The National Vision Commission, which was announced by St. Lucia's Governor General, Dame Peralette Lousiy in the 2013 Throne Speech was launched

recently in Castries.

The Vision Commission will explore all sectors of the economy and is expected to capture the needs and aspirations of a wide cross section of the public.

Recently Prime Minister Dr. Kenny Anthony said the Vision Statement, which will be the end product of the process, will guide the development of economic and

social policies as well as strategic planning initiatives over the next few years.



He said the National Vision will help in defining priorities of St. Lucia's needs.

The Commission comprises representatives recommended by the Governor General, the prime minister, Leader of the Opposition, Civil Society (including youth) and other non-governmental organizations, trade unions, and major private sector groupings.


Trinidad

The 332 kilo grams of cocaine valued at US\$106 million, which was shipped to Norfolk, Virginia, USA from Trinidad and Tobago in fruit juice cans last December originated from Europe, according to Robert Kennedy, attaché for the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) Administration for Port of Spain.

Kennedy was at the time addressing the recent Association of Caribbean Commissioners of Police 29th annual general meeting and conference at the Hyatt Regency, Port of

initial focus on identifying, expanding and making physical improvements to their parks and neighborhoods in ways that would more adequately cater to the needs of community groups, the elderly, toddlers and the handicapped, Morgan says.

Besides issues of housing, parenting, jobs and immigration, the organization today has as a top item on its agenda: "addressing critical issues such gun- and gang-violence and incarceration," Morgan adds, citing a recent trip to Borough Hall

two weeks ago to engage the new borough president in the effort, as testimony of Friends of Wingate Park's comitment to the effort.

The April 16 visit was also sanctioned by Morgan's employer, Local 79 General Building and Construction Laborers Union, which lent its support to the community effort by sending Apprenticeship Coordinator Wendy Webb as their representative at the Stop Gun/Gang Violence Forum at Borough Hall. Webb outlined the union's recruitment process for candidates interested in joining its apprenticeship

class for April 17, 2014.

Assistant Commissioner Kevin O'Connor had a message for parents, urging them to monitor their children's social activities and warned them about the potential danger in visiting places notorious for harboring gang activities. Brooklyn Borough President Eric Adams referred to a video he created on ways to combat gun violence, which he said could be found on youtube.

Friends of Wingate Park is working with Community Board 9, area schools, the Office of the Brooklyn District Attorney and the 71st Precinct Community Council Affairs Unit "to strengthen and uplift the community," Morgan said. It is seeking to engage the support of Unions and local businesses to offer internship and apprenticeship opportunities to its volunteers, she added.

Friends of Wingate Park is also working with Councilman Eugene and Community Board 9 on the renovation of the Wingate Park playground, Morgan said, adding: "I am asking (other) City Council members to help."

Former Grenada Consul General passes

Stephen Alexander, a former Grenada New York Honorary Consul General, died on April 28 after a short illness. He was 73.

Alexander's very close friend, Derek Ventour, a leading Grenadian-born entertainment promoter in Brooklyn, said he died after a two-week hospitalization at Downstate Medical Center and University Hospital of Brooklyn.

A wide cross section of the Caribbean community in New York paid their final respect to Alexander on May 9, at a viewing and funeral service, at St. Vincent Ferrer Roman Catholic Church, 925 East, 37th St., and Glenwood Road in Brooklyn. His remains were cremated.

Alexander's passion for current affairs, especially political developments in his homeland and the Caribbean, led him to freelance as a writer for the New York Carib News and a frequent commentator on the Bob Fredrick's show during his tenure at WNYE Radio.

He had studied political science and sociology at the Brooklyn campus of Long Island University, receiving his bachelor's degree in 1976.

Alexander worked for the

brokerage firm of Merrill Lynch for a number of years before moving to the New York Depository Trust Fund as a research analyst.

Although he was very much occupied with his career and community work, Alexander yearned to serve the country of his birth.

Therefore, in 1995, he assumed the Honorary

Setting the minimum wage in New York

More than 1,000 low-wage workers from around the city joined hands recently with interfaith clergy members and labor officials for a historic "Faith and Justice" walk to Harlem's Riverside Church, urging Albany to let cities around the state to set their own minimum wages.

"Throughout history, clergy of all faiths and denominations have been deeply involved in the fight for civil rights and for fair treatment for all people, and this is another front in that battle," said the Rev. James A. Forbes Jr., Senior Minister Emeritus of The Riverside Church.

"New York ranks No. 1 in income inequality in the U.S. No one who works 40 hours a week at minimum wage can afford basic living costs," he added. "In a speech to striking sanitation workers in Memphis before he was assassinated in 1968, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, '...it is criminal to have people working on a full-time basis ... getting part-time income.' It was criminal then and it is still criminal today!"

Faith leaders from across the city and community groups, such as UnitedNY, New York Communities for Change and Make the Road New York, joined the chanting, sign-

carrying workers for a three-block "Faith and Justice Walk" from the northwest end of Sakura Park at 123d St. to the front of the historic Riverside Church, on Riverside Drive and 120th St.

"It's very important to me and my fellow 'carwasheros' that we raise the minimum wage in New York City," said Ernesto Salazaar, 39, who works at Webster Car Wash in The Bronx. "It is very difficult for us to pay all of our bills on such a small salary. It's important we have the power to change the minimum wage, and end the inequalities and hunger that many New Yorkers face. As immigrants we contribute to this economy, and we deserve to be able to support our families and give our children better opportunities."

Following the march, workers filed into the mammoth church for a two-hour service featuring prayer, music, testimonials from workers and calls from priests, ministers, rabbis and imams for passage of legislation that would let cities and counties around the state set their own local minimum wage and for a higher federal minimum wage.

But it was short-lived, as his service was terminated after only 15 months. Though it remains unclear what exactly led to Alexander's sudden termination, it was widely speculated that he had fallen out with a top government official.

Stephen Walter Alexander, nicknamed "Spin Break," for his spin bowling in cricket, was born in Grand Bras, St. Andrew's on May 12, 1940.

He was the son of Veronica Alexander and William Thomas, and was raised by his grandmother, Lucy Bernard. They all predeceased Alexander.

Alexander received his primary school education at the Old Church Roman Catholic Primary School in Grenville, St. Andrew's and was among the fortunate few to attend secondary school in that period.

He started his secondary school at the Presentation Boys' College

in St. George's, the Grenadian capital, but returned to his parish to complete his secondary education at the St Andrew's Anglican Secondary School (SAASS), graduating in 1960.

In the U.S., he organized the first SAASS alumni fund-raising event for his alma mater.

Alexander taught at the St. Andrew's Anglican Primary School in Grenville before gaining employment with the Grenada Cooperative Nutmeg Association.

In 1965, he pursued studies for a year in trade unionism at Canada's Labor College; and, a year later, he migrated to the U.S., marrying the former Denise Shears on Dec. 23 of that year. He remained committed to Denise and their family until his demise.

"He was a great friend with whom I discussed many things of importance to the Caribbean community in Brooklyn," Ventour said. "His views and knowledge on current affairs were always up to date. His contribution to his country will always be remembered for his many patriotic and volunteer deeds. May he

rest in peace!"

New York City Mayor Bill deBlasio, Brooklyn Borough President Eric Adams, U.S. Congresswoman Yvette D. Clarke, Grenadian American Councilman Jumaane Williams and former Grenada U.N. Amb. Lamuel Stanislaus were among elected officials and community figures who paid tribute to Alexander through messages read and personally delivered at the funeral.

"Whether serving as Grenada's consul general or uniting Brooklyn residents as a community activist, Stephen's long-standing commitment to lifting up others helped make New York more open, accessible and just for Caribbean Americans and other immigrants in our city," said de Blasio in a letter to Mrs. Alexander.

against the U.S., but slso should be compensated to the tune of millions of dollars per year, it is yet to benefit from the courrt ruling, having not received a penny to date in payments and there is no indication that the dispute will end anytime soon.

Entirely frustrated, the island's delegation to last week's Caribbean trade bloc's trade ministers meeting, which ended at the weekend in Guyana had asked the meeting to pronounce on the dispute and show support for a fellow bloc member that is suffering from more than a decade in denied revenue earnings.

The ministers wasted no time in issuing a special statement on the issue, warning that the very credibility of the WTO is on the line, given the blatant American disregard for its ruling in favor of Antigua.

"The ministers said that the case is long outstanding and had the potential to undermine the credibility of the dispute settlement mechanism of the multilateral trading system. The council noted that the U.S. had so far failed to become compliant with the decision of the tribunal and had also failed to reach a settlement. The

meeting urged the U.S. to make additional efforts to reach a fair settlement."

The WTO ruling, a year after Antigua approached it for settlement, had said that while the U.S. had a right to protect its citizens from the perils of online gaming, it was nevertheless allowing its domestic horse-racing industry to offer Internet wagering also internationally calling it a contradiction

The body then gave the U.S. a year to either allow gaming to restart out of Antigua, shut down the Internet gaming section of its horseracing industry or settle bilaterally with Antigua; but authorities say the ruling has largely been ignored. Antiguan authorities said the U.S. had offered it a settlement starting at a mere \$500,000 and other smaller amounts, calling it an insult.

It is unclear what other options are left to Antigua, since it had in 2007 made a second approach to the WTO for redress.

The body ruled that Antigua could ignore American copyright patent and related laws; sell copyrighted products and rake in the sales even as Washington warned of dire consequences if it so did.





Petrotrin aims to shrink its carbon emission footprint

PORT OF SPAIN, May 5, 2014 (IPS) - Trinidad and Tobago holds the dubious distinction of being among the top 10 emitters of carbon dioxide per capita in the world, much of it due to the petrochemical industry that is the main driver of its economy.

According to the University of Trinidad and Tobago, the country's petrochemical sector is responsible for 60 percent of those emissions.

Melissa Mohammed-Rajkumar, a business analyst at the state-owned oil company, Petrotrin, told IPS that six percent of the country's greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) are from its own operations.

But now Petrotrin is eager to reduce its carbon

footprint.

It has succeeded in registering a Programme of Activities (PoA) project that would bundle together projects by several petrochemical companies in

Trinidad and Tobago and require only one validation process for all of them – the first such project in Trinidad to be registered under the U.N.'s Clean Development Mechanism (CDM).

It seeks to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by recovering and utilising methane-rich natural gas currently vented in the fields.

This PoA project was registered with the CDM in August 2013.

According to the CDM Programme Design Document Form issued in 2012, "Venting and flaring of associated gases from oil wells is commonplace, in Trinidad and internationally. This PoA will improve the economics of collecting associated gases from both onshore and off-shore oil fields in Trinidad."

Venting involves controlled release into the atmosphere of unburned gases that are a byproduct of oil production. The vent-

Jamaica traces just \$300,000 to kingpin

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) — Investigators in Jamaica have traced a relatively paltry sum of dirty money to a convicted gang kingpin who profited from government contracts while he oversaw an international crime syndicate, a senior official said Tuesday.

Christopher "Dudus" Coke long controlled a sizable network of drug dealers and he was once identified by the U.S. Justice Department as one of the world's most dangerous drug kingpins. He surrendered to authorities and was quickly extradited to the U.S. in June 2010, about a month after Jamaican soldiers and police conducted a bloody siege of the blighted West Kingston slum that served as his virtual fiefdom.

But the director of the

Finance Ministry's investigative division the past two years said Tuesday that his agency has uncovered bank accounts with just \$300,000 they can trace back to the gangster, who is serving a 23-year sentence in a U.S. prison. They are seeking to confiscate the money through the island's courts.

Justin Felice voiced frustration with the amount that could be traced to Coke,

the second-generation leader of the notorious Shower Posse syndicate that got its name from the gang's practice of "showering" its enemies with bullets. Without disclosing specifics, Felice said that a "lack of meaningful information and intelligence from other law enforcement agencies has been disappointing" and hobbled their investigations.



Black lawyer nominated as new ABA president

The American Bar Association (ABA) has nominated a black lawyer as the first woman of color to be its president.

Paulette Brown, a labor and employment law partner and chief diversity officer with the Morristown, N.J., office of Edwards Wildman Palmer, was nominated as the ABA's president-elect for 2014-15.

If elected by the ABA House of Delegates in August, she will become, in August 2015, the first woman of color and third African-American to serve as ABA president, the ABA said.

As a candidate for the president-elect position, Brown said the ABA should prepare itself to be more inclusive.

"Just as the U.S. Constitution has been amended to safeguard our liberties, the ABA must continue to respect and include lawyers in all practice areas and types, from solo practitioners to members of our largest international law firms, as well as public servants and in-house counsel," she said.

Brown has held many positions throughout her career, including as inhouse counsel to a number of Fortune 500 companies and as a municipal court judge.

In private practice, she has focused on all facets of


labor and employment and commercial litigation.

Brown has been recognized by the New Jersey Law Journal as one of the prominent women and minority attorneys in the state of New Jersey and by the National Law Journal as one of "The 50 Most Influential Minority Lawyers in America."

She has been listed as a NJ Super Lawyer since its inception and for the past three years as one of the top 50 women lawyers and one of the top 100 lawyers.

Brown has repeatedly been named by U.S. News as one of the "Best Lawyers in America" in the area of commercial litigation.

Adding tourism in the school curriculum

On behalf of the Caribbean Tourism Organization I want to commend the Caribbean Examinations Council for the launch of the five new subjects at the CAPE level, which addresses specific needs in our societies or areas where we want to develop knowledge and skills, including in the area of Tourism and I want to thank CXC for inviting the CTO to say a few words at this launch.

We at the CTO are really one of the major advocate behind the Tourism subject being launched here today having had discussions with ministers of education, ministers of tourism, chief education officers, the Caribbean Examinations Council etc. over many, many years to try to convince them of the need to introduce tourism as a subject within our school system. Some countries in the region have gone this route already without waiting for the education directorate to sanction anything. The Commonwealth of the Bahamas has developed and uses tourism education materials for all levels of its school system, the Cayman Islands have developed tourism education materials, which they actively use, Jamaica, at the primary school level invested heavily in integrating or infusing tourism into other subject areas and developing specific curricula for the same. You have just heard Minister Jespere, minister of education for St. Martin and St.

Barth, speaking of their success in being able to convince the French government in France of the need to introduce tourism education in their school system. CTO went the route of developing specific tourism education materials for primary and secondary schools and some countries are using the materials to buttress their own tourism education and awareness programmes.

But why is it important to introduce the tourism subject into our schools:

It is one of the building blocks in the development of the human resources environment to support tourism.

1. Building Career Awareness in Tourism - Tourism is the lifeblood of the Caribbean at this time in our existence and will continue to be an important economic sector for our region for some time to come. We have been saving for the longest while that one in every four persons in the region either works directly or indirectly with the tourism sector. Tourism is labour intensive, which is a good thing for our small economies, and we need to attract persons to work in the sector. In fact, there is a strong likelihood that many school leavers will actually end up working in jobs in tourism or in jobs that link to tourism, whether it be in events and conference planning, public relations and marketing, research and statistics, conducting tours, working

Caribbean religious leaders inspire IMF Sunday Schools

WASHINGTON, May 5, 2014 (IPS) - Last Fall, I witnessed the Grenada Council of Churches insert themselves into negotiations between their government and the International Monetary Fund (IMF) around the island's debt restructuring and presumed austerity policies. Religious leaders called from pulpits across the tiny island for a "Jubilee" or national debt cancellation.

When I recently returned to the Spice Isle, I was awed by what I saw – the religious experiment in Grenada was spreading like wild fire to other Caribbean countries.

At Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, overlooking the Caribbean Sea, the Caribbean Council of Churches, four Catholic Dioceses and various religious leaders from across the region gathered to launch the Caribbean Debt Network.

They came from St. Vincent and The Grenadines, Barbados, Dominica, Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica and Grenada, knowing their unity is more vital than ever.

Out of the 20 most heavily indebted countries in the world, six are Caribbean countries.

The islands are dotted with makeshift shacks, where depending on the island, 20 percent to 50 percent of the population lives in poverty. Various islands see high unemployment rates from 30 to upwards of 50 percent.

Like dominoes, island after island is going through International Monetary Fund IMF debt restructurings that demand austerity policies that hurt millions of people living in extreme poverty.

Among most Caribbean tourist areas, you can't avoid the

working poor.

In fact, the plight of the vulnerable along with infrastructure challenges are so palpable on the small islands, you scratch your head wondering why the IMF calls these countries "Middle Income." When a poor country is defined as Middle Income, they cannot apply for existing debt relief processes such as the Heavily Indebted Poor Countries Initiative or HIPC.

The process by which economists define a country as Middle Income is by averaging the total income of everyone in the country (per capita). In other words if 99 people make one dollar and one person makes 100,000 dollars, the average income per person is 1,001 dollars.

In a place like Grenada, where the poverty rate ranges from 38 to 50 percent, the income levels are skewed. The religious community uses the words "social sin" to describe how income inequality is hidden from us as struggling Caribbean economies are denied relief because of what they are called.

Even with HIPC, any poor country will tell you it's not a walk in the park. The IMF and other international financial institutions acknowledge that the process offers too little debt relief, too late, with too many benchmarks. However, when struggling economies go through the painful act of debt

restructuring without even the framework of HIPC, it's wrangling a hurricane.

And real hurricanes are real threats. In 2004, 200 percent of Grenada's GDP was wiped out in three hours by Hurricane Ivan. With powerful hurricanes landing every 10 years and financial crises in other parts of the world impacting the Caribbean's primary industry of tourism, countries across the region seem destined for never-ending cycles of austerity and debt.

"Our churches are on the front lines of fighting poverty in the Caribbean. We see how the debt crisis is hurting the poorest people on the islands," notes the new chair of the Caribbean Debt Network, Presbyterian Minister Osbert James.

James's historic cathedral, among many structures unrepaired since the 2004 Hurricane, still lacks a roof.

While it's still too early to assess Grenada's debt restructuring, we can see that the Jubilee model is opening up shop on other Caribbean islands.

At Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, the regional Caribbean religious leaders launched the new coalition in a conference room aptly named The Upper Room. For Christians, it evokes Pentecost when the Holy Spirit empowered religious leaders to inspire others. Pentecost is derived from the more ancient Jewish holiday, Shavuot, which celebrates the gift of our covenant with God and God's abundance.

At the founding conference last week, the religious community sought to spread Pentecost and Shavuot. They resolved the following:

More see-through scheming by the Republicans

This business of predictability in what passes for strategy on the Republican side would be hilarious, were there not such potential for dire consequences, depending on the extent to which gullible nonrabid partisans climb aboard the hard-liners' bandwagon, to swallow intact the twaddle served them by GOP past masters of guile. Critical mid-term elections are upcoming in November, and the intensity surrounding the 2016 presidential stakes is already through the roof. The need to bait-and-switch, to bamboozle, to con their way to ballot-box success is what right now consumes Republican strategists like nothing else. Hence, in a routine gone stale, their pulling, the other day, yet another Benghazi rabbit out of the hat.

The latest Benghazi resurrection is seemingly intended to be a GOP two-fer: a rally cry to be used against Democrats in this year's mid-terms and a broadside that they hope will eviscerate Hillary Clinton if she decides to be a presidential candidate in 2016. The good betting says neither of these will be particularly effective. Only because Benghazi has already been beaten to death as

a would-be issue by Republicans to no avail. From Mitt Romney's failed attempt to give it bite in his face-off with President Obama in 2012 to the elongated witch hunt of Congressman Darrell Issa (whose position heading "investigations" into anything is probably Capitol Hill's number one absurdity), the Benghazi ship has long sailed, absent the bounty Republicans had hoped to load in.

To be sure, this latest destinedto-be-futile effort to re-float the Benghazi episode would have been left in the propaganda suggestion box, if the mining potential for stuff once considered "can't miss" campaign fodder hadn't looked so bleak of late. Most notable among those avenues of attack no longer offering big-time promise is, of course, the Affordable Care Act. After a problem-plagued launch, recent news of sign-ups in excess of eight million wasn't what Republicans cared to hear, and in a demographically proportional mix, to boot, that ensures the program's financial viability. After the obligatory huff and puff decrying those figures as fabricated and all the rest, GOP masterminds had to face up to health care not

being the Democratic punching bag they were sure it would be, and the need to devise a plan B. That their best option turns out to be this desperate bid to hike the tired Benghazi trail once again probably explains why relying on gobs of Super-PAC money is really the only campaign game plan Republicans have.

And with nothing doing by way of substance, here come the actors. House speaker John Boehner is the lead. Every once in a blue moon, Boehner makes like he's capable of being a true stand-up guy. As when he refused, a few days ago, to join the chorus of voices in his caucus demanding the resignation of Secretary of Veterans Affairs, Gen. Eric Shinseki. Not so, Benghazi, where all bets are evidently off for Boehner. Something like this crystal-clear obvious attempt to make political hay out of that unfortunate happening in Libya should have aroused, one would think, any "better angels"

that there might be to Boehner's nature. Clearly, a straight-shooter demeanor is nowhere close to being typical Boehner. He is certifiably a full-fledged subscriber to the bottom-feeder mentality and tactics of his party.

Boehner is one of a couple of GOP principals who readily come to mind, in terms of attempting to project, on occasion, an image designed to preclude their being lumped in with the party's extremist kooks. The other is John McCain. Because of his military background, including time spent as a Vietnam era p.o.w., McCain has assumed a position as the Republican foreign policy face. Which would be fine. except that he insists on, again, predictably bludgeoning the public with a take on foreign policy that is totally out of step with Americans' sentiments on foreign policy priorities at this juncture. Even if the Obama administration believes. for instance, that Vladimir Putin's simulated war dance in Ukraine has warranted the application of sanctions and some tough talk, hardly has there been any level-headed observer who thinks U.S. involvement on some military level is a smart option. Trust McCain to insist that it is and to insist further that the American people "should be led" to that ramped-up response to Putin's antics.

McCain isn't easily resigned to there being exit dates for this country's military involvement in Iraq and Afghanistan. To hear him tell it, hawkish posture is still alive and well. What's perplexing is that for some reason, there's seemingly a McCain hammer lock on the media which uncannily guarantees him continuous talking-head exposure.

The flip side McCain contributions like his up-front positioning on immigration reform and campaign finance reform necessarily are obscured by the hard-charging, power-packing imperative that McCain thinks must continue to define America's place in the world. And an awareness that McCain was willing to entrust the presidency to Sarah Palin certainly doesn't enhance one's impression of the man.

Unlike a few decades ago, one doesn't find in today's Republican ranks the kind of mettle that inspires confidence suggestive of good governance. Only on the one hand, outright wackos.





New effort to halt spread of HIV in the Caribbean

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP)

— A handful of sex workers sit on discarded cardboard along a filthy sewer channel, sharing food and razors to shave their legs and faces as they prepare for the night's labor on the streets of Jamaica's capital.

Gay sex and prostitution is illegal in Jamaica, and LGBT people who sell sex face arrest or worse. But this normally wary group is welcoming on a recent evening as a volunteer descends into the open channel with condoms, lubricant and health advice

"It's hard living like this, but we're trying our best to stay safe and healthy. Nobody wants to get HIV," says one of the gay men, a shirtless 21-year-old who gives his name only as Kris.

In much of the world, giving out condoms and

guidance to gay, bisexual and transgender sex workers is routine. But reaching out to men who have sex with men is practically revolutionary in parts of the English-speaking Caribbean, where homophobia and laws criminalizing gay sex have long driven people underground — turning them into the toughest group to reach with HIV prevention programs and fueling a regional epidemic.

Now, there's a growing momentum to turn the tide in Jamaica, Trinidad & Tobago, Guyana and eight other countries that criminalize sex between adults of the same gender. Even as funding grants get tighter, HIV prevention programs to reach men who have sex with men are scaling up and advocacy groups appear energized.

"We are in an entirely new era," said Ernest Massiah, the Trinidad-based Caribbean director for the United Nations program on HIV and AIDS.

A clear sign of changing times is Jamaica's Color Pink Group, a nonprofit founded in 2011 whose existence would have been almost unthinkable on the island a decade ago. On a recent night, founder James Burton, one of very few Jamaican homosexuals who feel comfortable disclosing their full name, wore a loud pink shirt as he spoke about HIV prevention to a group of young gays outside a Kingston shopping mall.

"This is what was really lacking before: visibility and one-on-one connections," said Burton, whose group also provides vocational training and distributes condoms and lubricant.

But while societal acceptance of homosexuality is increasing, according to

new polls commissioned by UNAIDS in eight Caribbean countries, the problem for gay men remains dire, even as the region has seen sharp declines in overall HIV infection for the population as a whole since 2000.

Around the globe, men who have sex with men generally face elevated levels of HIV infection compared to heterosexual men. But experts say Caribbean nations with high levels of stigma have disproportionately high rates. One study published in the medical journal Lancet in 2012 found that the HIV prevalence for them in the Caribbean is one of the highest documented rates in the

world

Overall, the Caribbean has the highest rate of HIV outside sub-Saharan Africa, though both the overall and per capita numbers are much lower. Regional infection rates are highest for men who have sex with men in countries with long-standing laws that criminalize gay sex.

Task Force (CFATF) has warned of harsh consequences should Guyana fail to pass anti-money laundering legislation.

The task force addressed the matter during a meeting recently with President Donald Ramotar, Attorney General Anil Nandlall and others.

Following the meeting, Nandlall said CFATF noted that Guyana is the only country yet to implement all of the recommendations related to the bill.

He said although Guyana has a completed a bill that has been examined by CFATF and deemed to be compliant, the proposed draft amendments made by the parliamentary opposition do not address the bill.

In response, vice-chairman of A Partnership for National Unity (APNU), Dr. Rupert Roopnarine, said there is a political crisis and it requires a political solution.

APNU maintains that even if an agreement was reached in the Special Committee on amendments to the 2009 Anti-Money Laundering and Countering of Financing Terrorism, there are several political issues to be resolved.

Trinidad

Former Prime Minister Basdeo Panday has joined several cit-



izens who have called for foreign investigators to be used to probe the murder of special prosecutor Dana Seetahal SC.

He said citizens lacked confidence in the Police Service and in the interest of speedy justice foreign assistance should be used.

The government must take the blame for the crime problem in the country as it had no clue on how to fight crime effectively, he added.

According to Panday, the People's Partnership was selected to deal with the problem but failed "miserably."

He said the government must consequently be blamed, not only for Seetahal's death but all the murders in the country since it assumed power in 2010.

The former prime minister said since Sunday's killing, the population was more scared.

Taxing for a fairer travel deal

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, May 1, 2014 - The newly appointed CEO of LIAT - The Caribbean Airline believes a reduction in taxation on intra-regional travel will help increase revenues for the governments of the Caribbean and give customers a fairer deal.

David Evans, who assumed leadership duties on April 22, 2014, acknowledged taxes are important to reinvest in aviation infrastructure, but he would like to see governments fully examine the overall economic and social impact of LIAT.

Speaking on the Caribbean Tourism Organization's Destination Caribbean – a series of live, regional broadcasts on the importance of Caribbean tourism - Evans, a former British Airways executive. stated that the Caribbean tax burden is not significantly high compared with other parts of the world, but he suggested that a lighter taxation regime will stimulate greater demand and an increase in the "tax take" back to the government.

"LIAT is worth - outside of its airline activity - well over US\$100 million dollars annually to the region in terms of the jobs it creates and the impact that it

has on tourism," declared Evans who assured viewers that meeting increased demand with more capacity was not a major hurdle. "Any airline faced with increasing demand will be happy with that situation and it would find a way either in its own right or in some sort of a cooperative fashion in order to provide that extra supply or capacity."

Meanwhile, the LIAT CEO sees a real opportunity for collaboration among regional carriers. "Whilst competition is absolutely essential, there is more we can do in cooperation with each other than we are doing at the

Looking ahead, Evans stated that LIAT is well positioned to increase connectivity to and from other regional and international carriers, thereby increasing the volume of traffic and returning benefits back to governments.

Immigration Primer:
Cut This Out and Hang It
On Your Fridge

If you are an immigrant or have friends or family members who are immigrants, you should know this information. Too many people are deported from the United States because of mistakes on their applications, because they ignore letters from the government or simply because they did not know what to do or whom to turn to. If you think that you are protected just because you have a green card, think again! Sometimes even a small criminal conviction can become grounds for deportation. What to do if your family member is detained

4213. If your family member was picked up as a result of a criminal matter, he might still be in police custody – go to your local precinct to find out. Don't forget – neither the police, nor deportation officers will help you save your loved one from deportation! Only an experienced immigration lawyer can do that. Contact an experienced

2. What to do if you or your family member gets arrested for a criminal matter.

Okay, you (or your friend or a family member) gets arrested by the police. However, you are not a U.S. Citi-

zen. Many people mistakenly believe that if they have a green card, they will be protected from deportation. In fact, a green card does not guarantee that you will not be deported if you break the law - many, many green card holders lose their permanent resident status as a result of their criminal convictions. So, it is very important to make sure that you do not get convicted of anything that might become grounds for your deportation. If you had just been arrested, contact a criminal lawyer AND an immigration lawyer. An immigration lawyer will be able to tell your criminal lawyer what to do, so that you are safe from deportation. Of course, all this doubly applies to you if you are here illegally - if you are arrested, have your family contact an immigration lawyer as soon

3. What to do if you are illegal here and got a letter from immigration.


As a general rule, never ignore any letters that you receive from the government. This letter might tell you to

come to Immigration Court and if you do not show up, the court can issue an automatic deportation order. And then, you might get picked up, thrown into jail and deported - all because you ignored that letter! If you are not sure what the letter is, call an immigration attorney - he will be able to explain it to you. A good immigration lawyer will be able to go with you to any hearing or an appointment and sometimes even to save you from deportation.

Minimum wage increase for Haitian workers

Haitian President Michel Martelly has issued an executive order raising the minimum wage for apparel workers.

Based on current exchange rates, the increase from 200 Haitian Gourde to 225 Gourde (US \$4.44 to \$5) is a 12.5 percent increase, but currency devaluations make the boost equivalent to only an eight percent hike in U.S. dollars, which is widely used in Haiti, according to the Miami Herald.

It said the increase for apparel workers comes after a settlement earlier this month with the Martelly administration.

But Georges Sassine, general manager of Lafito Industrial Free Zone under construction on the northern outskirts of Port-au-Prince, the Haitian capital, and former president of the association of industries of Haiti, said "salary increases without further social services, health, education and transportation provided don't mean anything."

"It's just a continuation of the same," he added.

Solidarity, the nonprofit affiliate of the American Center for International Labor, said in a report that, based on the cost of basic expenses and a basket of food items, a garment worker in Port-au-Prince needs to earn US\$23.12 for an eight-hour day to support a family of four.

The Herald said the pay

boost is not only less than what Solidarity has outlined, but also far less than the US\$11.11 protesting garment workers have asked for in recent months, as they forced some factories in the capital to stop production.

Yves Savain, the executive director of the commission overseeing the U.S. HOPE legislation that provides preferential trade benefits to Haiti's apparel sector, said he believes the increase will quell demands.

He said because Haiti's apparel industry is still relatively small but growing, it can sustain the pay

A recent report issued by Better Work Haiti showed that 39 percent of Haiti's nearly 30,000 workers were already earning more than the US\$4.44 a day minimum and 29 percent earned US\$6.66, according to the Herald.

With one of the highest unemployment rates in the hemisphere, the paper noted that Haiti has struggled to attract investors to create jobs.

Press freedom essential in a democratic society

Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the United Nations, John W. Ashe, says freedom of expression and freedom of the press are "fundamental rights" that form an "essential pillar" of democratic societies.

"When journalists are able to report freely, they support informed citizen participation in political and social processes and promote civic engagement," said Ashe, who is also president of the U.N. General Assembly, as the United Nations on Saturday marked World Press Freedom Day with an appeal to all States, societies and individuals to actively defend press freedom as a "fundamental right" and as a "critical contribution" to achieving and sustaining the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs).

Ashe recalled that, in December 2013, the Assembly adopted for the first time a resolution condemning all attacks and violence against journalists and media workers, and proclaimed Nov. 2 as the International Day to end Impunity for Crimes against Journalists.

"Our Assembly called upon member states to promote a safe and enabling environment for journalists to perform their work independently and without undue interference," the Antiguan envoy said.


"In this regard, the U.N. Plan of Action on the Safety of Journalists and the Issue of Impunity is an important multi-stakeholder mechanism," he added, stating that "only by ensuring that journalists can work safely and without fear will they be able to give voice to those who do not have one,

tell stories that are untold and help build open and transparent societies."

U.N. Secretary General Ki-moon and Irina Bokova, director-general of U.N. Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), said U.N. bodies are already working together and with other partners, under UNESCO's leadership, to create a "free and safe environment for journalists and media workers around the world."

They stressed in their ioint message that, this year, the international community has a "once-in-ageneration opportunity" to prepare a long-term agenda for sustainable development to succeed the MDGs when they end in 2015.

"Successfully implementing that agenda will require that all populations enjoy the fundamental rights

of freedom of opinion and expression," said the U.N. officials, underscoring that those rights are essential to

democracy, transparency, accountability and the rule of law.

"They are vital for human dignity, social progress and inclusive development," they added.

World Press Freedom Day, which was designated as May 3 in 1993 by the U.N. General Assembly, was marked in about 100 coun-

UNESCO is holding an international conference, entitled "Media Freedom For a Better Future: Shaping the Post-2015 Development Agenda", on Monday and Tuesday in Paris.

Also marking the Day, 31 specialists from the largest body of independent experts in the U.N. Human Rights system called on all Governments to promote and protect the rights to freedom of expression and information, freedom of peaceful assembly, and freedom of association and public participation.

They said the protection of these fundamental freedoms is essential for full realization of all human rights for all and for the achievement of related development goals.


On May 19, 2014, my father, Charles James Barrett, lovingly called "Papa" by his children and grand children, will turn 95 years old. Although he is almost a centurion, my dad still stands erect despite needing the assistance of a cane. His smile and strength of his voice has not been dulled by age.

Born and raised in the hills of St. Ann in Western Jamaica, Charles Barrett was a force in his native land before immigrating to the United States in 1974 when he was in his early fifties. A champion for education despite his modest schooling, my father was instrumental in bringing schools to the rural district of Higgin Land where we grew up. As a farmer, he worked with the Jamaican Agricultural society to bring training to the local farmers. Papa, a peacemaker, was the "Go-to" person for resolving conflicts.

Charles Barrett is a dedicated father and devoted husband to my mother whom he was married to for 68 years before she passed away two years ago at the age of 91. My parents' greatest pride was that they produced 12 children as a result of their union. There are 11 of us now as one sibling only lived for three months.

When a person has been alive for almost 10 decades, he has experienced a lot and has achieved a great deal. My father, Charles James Barrett, is no different. For example, in 1945, he was denied the right to sit at a lunch counter in Maryland, yet in 2008 and, again in 2012, he experienced the pride of voting for the first Black President of the United States.

Throughout his 95 years, my father taught us all through simple and universal principles: "Respect yourself. Don't settle for less than the best. Make hay while the sun shines. Don't squander your education opportunities. Avoid the deadly habit of procrastination. Treat others the way you want to be treated. Pray without ceasing". Along with my mother, Papa instilled first in my brothers, sisters and I, and then later to his grandchildren, the desire to achieve excellence.



Through his teachings, my father has guided us and created many special memories for all of us: his 11 children, 23 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren who love him dearly and are in constant

A man of principle, integrity and honor, my father is most proud and fervent about being a preacher of the Gospel. Back home in Jamaica, we grew up in the church in which my father tirelessly worked, developed and preached before moving to the United States. Here, 30 years ago, he founded Faith Redeeming Church of God, a small storefront Pentecostal church in the Carnarsie section of Brooklyn, New York where he is the Senior Pastor and, today, remains active in that ministry.

Papa has made deep impressions on many lives. It would be impossible for me to list the many, many ways he has graced the lives of his children, grandchildren and so many others with his strength, wisdom, loving nature and living by example. A truly humble man who is more concerned with others than himself, Papa gives his time and smiles generously to his family, friends and parishioners alike.

On this past Easter Sunday, I closed my eyes and listened to that familiar, sweet and melodious voice. It was hard to believe that this strong voice is that of a man who is about to turn 95 years old. Listening to my father's voice from the pulpit was overwhelming. I literally had goosebumps. Smiling proudly, I could not help thinking, "my sisters, brothers and I are from good stock!"

York City is an economic and moral issue," said Vincent Alvarez, President of the New York City Central Labor Council, AFL-CIO. "As a just society, we cannot continue to allow New York City's workers to be undervalued, while the wealthiest in society continue to get rich on the backs of everyday working men and women. Today and every day, we must stand up for the rights of the workers whose dedication, skill, and professionalism keep our city going."

City Council Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito said: "Working together with faith leaders in our communities, we're sending a clear message that it's time for New York City to set an appropriate local minimum wage. We can no longer allow so many of our workers to struggle on an unfairly low wage that does not reflect the cost of living in this city."

New York has the worst income inequality in the

nation, largely because the state's \$8 minimum wage is too low. Pending legislation in Albany would let cities and counties across New York supplement the state minimum wage by raising their local minimum wage. Recent polls show 73 percent of New Yorkers support the measure.

"We've fought long and hard for dignity and respect in the workplace," said Michael Carey, a security officer at John F. Kennedy International Airport. "Some of the progress we are now seeing can be attributed to the help we've received from the civil rights and faith communities.'

Elizabeth Davis, a worker at a McDonald's in The Bronx, agreed: "We are here today to stand up not just for fast food workers like me, but for all lowwage workers across New York who are struggling to support our families. The support we're getting here today is remarkable. Albany better start paying attention, because our move-



hoping for a better future, but I have experienced the exact opposite. I started working for a bodega owner in Washington Heights for \$5 an hour. Ten years later, I was only earning \$7.25 an hour, which is not nearly enough to survive in this city. New York City must be able to raise its own minimum wage."

Clergy members said the service was the start of a new, long-term coalition with low-wage workers. Historically, religious leaders played key roles in the civil rights movement and other struggles against economic and racial injustice.

"It is a sad commentary of our country when people who work full-time and beyond still live in poverty and are unable to provide for their families. This moment calls for political will and the courage to pursue equality and justice for all," said Rev. Michael Walrond Jr., senior pastor of First Corinthian Baptist Church in Harlem.

Indigenous Hondurans unite to preserve culture

Were it not for conscientious documentaries, topical, historic and often under-reported news-worthy issues might never be exposed. Thanks to Ali Allie and Ruben Reyes who wrote, produced and directed the documentary "Garifuna in Peril," the fast-vanishing Afro-Amerindian culture struggling to survive in Guatemala, Nicaragua, Belize and Honduras is now getting some notice.

Reportedly the entire community could disappear after the next generation.

Since production in 2012, the film has consistently gained momentum with screenings at film festivals throughout the USA, Canada and in every country the culture endures. From Cannes, France, to Zanzibar, the plight of a proud people is slowly being acknowledged as one to save from extinction. In a 99-minute documentary that begins with a mother schooling her two sons about the importance of maintaining the



Garifuna language, she lovingly implores -- Ricardo and Miguel -- to speak the tongue of her people.

In an environment where Garifuna lags third behind Spanish and English she is of a minority that believes in its salvation.

"We went to cast the movie and were shocked that there was almost no one under 18 years old who spoke the language," director Allie stated.

Although small villages proudly boasts the hybrid Carib, Arawak and West African traditions, youth seem to eagerly embrace the more dominant Latino culture. An adult Ricardo portrayed by Reyes is determined to abide by his mother's wishes. Later seen as a husband, father and teacher he attempts to instill the

pride his mother passed on to him as a youth. His son is as not as open to the idea. The teenager, like his friends, prefer to converse in English and Spanish. And while the teacher and father tries hard not to dictate to his son, as a proud keeper of the culture it is almost instinctive for him to impress the urgency and importance of conversing in the language of the Garifuna people. The film makers use music, dance, community and heritage to detail the vitality of the descendants who as a small group of only 2,500 survived along the coastal countries of Central America. Ricardo teaches how a community banded together after a marooned British slave-ship caused them to seek refuge in the jungles of St. Vincent

which was colonized in 1627 by the British.

In the late 1700s, after French settlers developed plantations there, they fought and lost to the British. The British deported 5,000 Africans to the island of Orinocco near Honduras. According to Ricardo's lesson, suicide and homicide accounted for the reduction in numbers. But the culture combined with those of the indigenous people created a Garifuna nation. What makes this story a caution-

ary tale is that in addition to the dwindling practice of the language, the peril lies with exploitative land developers who con Garifuna villagers into selling their land for less than fair prices. The profit margin ultimately involves tourists who are being lured to visit the rural, agricultural villages. Miguel's role in doing business with one such resort owner helps to crystallize the kind of exploitation that will quickly erase the culture and people. Instead of


building a school he was tasked to construct for teaching his people, Miguel falls prey to a greedy resort owner.

The storyline unfolds to reveal Miguel's exile from the community he was reared. And although Ricardo's son eventually embraces his heritage, his daughter must come to terms with growing into womanhood, dating and the perilous HIV-AIDS virus. The multilayered documentary is a wake-up call to preserve the heritage and culture of the Garifuna people. With food, a language lesson and dance that mimic colonial occupation, the film offers an opportunity to revel in the culture.

Like the maroons in Jamaica who fled to the mountains to avoid slavery, the Garifuna people eluded slavery in the Caribbean by taking to the jungles.

When Kelly (Rose Byrne) and Mac Radner (Seth Rogen) decided to settle down in suburbia, they reasonably expected to raise their newborn in a quiet community. But that dream was threatened soon thereafter, when the local chapter of Delta Psi Beta bought the house next-door.

As a precautionary measure, the concerned couple introduced themselves to their new neighbors and asked for assurances that there

lating war of attrition with more losers than winners. That is the point of departure of Neighbors, a relentlessly-raunchy revenge comedy directed by Nicholas Stoller (Get Him to the Greek).

Unfortunately, the sophomoric

parties prove to be more cruel than clever in their attempts to get even, and the shocking behavior displayed onscreen is invariably more smutty than funny, as it features plenty of prolonged frontal nudity. Plus, the picture's only good gag, when the office chair jettisons Mac into the ceiling, was totally spoiled by the TV commercials.

Otherwise, the film is memorable mostly for its homoerotic humor, as director Stoller is fond of seizing on any excuse to lampoon gay sexuality. First, Kelly kisses a college coed she's recruiting as a confidante. Then, fraternity pledges are forced to parade naked in a circle while clutching the penis of the guy in front of him.

On another occasion, a male student is raped by a classmate seemingly in his sleep, only to later admit that he was aware and welcomed the rude intrusion. Throw in the gratuitous use of the "N-word" twice, of anti-Semitism ("You Jews and your f*cking mothers!"), as well as a profusion of misogynistic comments like referring to breasts as "udders," and there's little left to recommend about this ugly descent into

"He sounds the same," a grandmother said.

And indeed as if it was decades ago, Sparrow seemed no different than during his coronations.

There was no denying that he had fully recovered from the threemonth comatose condition that kept him recluse from fans anxious about his recovery. A majority of fans seemed able to recite the lyrics first performed at Queens Hall, in Port of Spain, Trinidad on the October 5, 1964. Banned for four decades afterwards on the twin islands, the suggestive, hilarious and ambiguous "Congo Man" recalled Sparrow's heydays as the sole griot of note to amplify controversies surrounding global issues but particularly those emanating from the Caribbean, African, European and American communities.

Explained as a song about can-

nibalism, other interpretations have alluded to clever composition of a calypso, lust and other sexually subtle double entendre as the focus of the infectious hit.

Sparrow in an interview said: "The Congo Man" came to me on a subway in New York — just the melody," he told the interviewer. "And the lyrics came from the many activities in Africa at the time. So many nuns and priests were being ambushed and beaten....and I got the idea that this was probably happening there: white people were just traveling through and found them-

selves in the hands of head hunters ...who put them in a pot, had a fire at the bottom, and had a chant. (That's where the "haw, haw, haw" comes in). Jump up and down and see how the food is cooking, and forbid anybody to fraternize with the meat."

He added that "Congo Man" was purely humorous and completely un-suggestive."

The Sunshine Band kept the beat true to form and its origins causing many to dance in their seats.

Sparrow's mellifluous voice

sounded soothing and reminiscent of his spectacular career. Few had heard the 78-year-old calvpsonian since he recorded "Barack Di Magnificent" in honor of the first Black president of the United States. Most had neither heard nor seen him since he slipped into a diabetic coma and was hospitalized last year for almost one month. There were rumored news of his death and only when he recuperated in Trinidad & Tobago did an official statement confirm that the monarch was alive and thriving.

ing ensures that associated natural gas can be safely disposed of in an emergency.

Oil companies resort to venting when they cannot store or use gas commercially, to reduce the risk of fire and explosion.

Mohammed-Rajkumar, a member of Petrotrin's CDM team, told IPS, "Sustainable development of the country will be enhanced by the project as valuable resources that would have been wasted through venting will contribute to eco-

nomic development when captured and utilised for productive end-uses.

"There are also positive social impacts through job creation and utilisation of services and materials from the local energy sector," she said.

The CDM, which operates under the auspices of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), validates and subsequently certifies the effectiveness of projects in reducing carbon emissions.

Such certification can then be used as a basis for obtaining Carbon Emission Reduction (CER) credits that are sold to developed countries seeking to meet emissions reduction targets under the Kyoto Protocol.

The CDM has registered over 7,400 emission-reduction projects in developing countries since 2004 and generated over 1.2 billion emission credits. However, it has been jeopardised by a steepe plunge in CER prices in recent years.

Trinidad and Tobago's PoA is one of the few CDM projects in the English-speaking Caribbean to achieve registration.

Though some countries have expressed an inter-

est in launching CDM projects that would reduce greenhouse gas emissions and thus make them viable players on the Carbon Emissions Reduction (CER) market, only four projects in the English-speaking Caribbean have achieved registration under the CDM – two in Jamaica, one in the Bahamas, and one in Guyana.

Of the 18 CDM-registered projects in the Caribbean, 12 are in the Dominican Republic and two are in Cuba.

There are two CDM-registered PoA projects in the Caribbean, the one in Trinidad and Tobago and one in Haiti.

Whereas the Wigton windfarm project in Jamaica has achieved a measure of success, the CDM project in Guyana has failed to achieve its targets under the CDM, according to Sharma Dwarka, the factory operations manager of Guyana Sugar Corporation Inc., otherwise known as GuySuCo.

Though the Caribbean is not a major source of GHG emissions, GuySuCo chose to get involved in the CDM because of its commitment to reduce its carbon emissions.

GuySuCo. chose to launch a bagasse cogeneration project under the CDM, Dwarka said, "because it fits directly into GuySuCo.'s operations. The processing of sugar cane to produce sugar produces bagasse [a fuel] which is utilised for power generation for the operations.

"The quantity of power produced from bagasse is more than adequate for the operations. As such, excess power is available for sale to the national grid."

The hoped-for effect was the reduction of Guyana's dependence on fossil fuels for energy and, hence, of its carbon emissions.

Unfortunately, Dwarka told IPS that there have been no financial gains to Guyana or GuySuCo. to date from registration with the CDM.

This was mainly "due to non-achievement of design parametres of the sugar plant. The main issues at the sugar plant include non-achievement of cane throughput (tonnes of cane processed per hour) and frequent stoppages due to breakdowns, no cane periods due to poor weather conditions, etc."

However, he said, "Guy-SuCo. remains committed to reducing its carbon emissions. Having identified the root cause of problems at the sugar factory, corrective action is currently being taken such that the factory can achieve the original design parametres.

"Once this is achieved, the cogeneration plant will be positioned to generate carbon emission reductions (CERs) and tap into the carbon credit market."

Mohammed-Rajkumar told IPS that Petrotrin's PoA project is now in the implementation stage. "Tenders have been issued and we are awaiting responses," she said. The project is approaching its study and design phase.

Regarding funding, she said, "Commercial arrangements are in the process of being drafted and their form will depend on the outcome of the engineering estimates."

The initial CDM project, in its first year of operation, is expected to remove approximately 90,000

tonnes of CO2 equivalent (tCO2e).

"For the next nine years, the project is expected to remove an average of 78,000 tCO2e per annum, but this estimate is subject to further engineering studies to be conducted."

Mohammed-Rajkumar said that the initial phase will focus on its wells in the Fyzabad, Grand Ravine, Parrylands, Palo Seco and Barrackpore fields.







Gatlin beat compatriot Mike Rodgers by .09 at Tokyo's National Stadium. Christophe Lemaitre of France was third in 10.31.

"Once I got past the 50-meter mark, I just wanted to stay relaxed," said Gatlin, who had to race into a strong wind. "If the wind was none, you might have been looking at

Coach criticized for surprise omission

U.S. Men's National Team coach Jurgen Klinsmann selected a 30-man preliminary roster for the final training camp before next month's FIFA World Cup in Brazil, and his surprise omission of forward Eddie Johnson had many folks

miffed, especially me.

While justifying Johnson's omission, the coach acknowledged the player's invaluable contribution in qualifying the team; he said that he hadn't forgotten the important goals Eddie Johnson scored while helping the team to qualify for the

World Cup.

Klinsmann, in a conference call, added that other players had moved past Johnson on the U.S. forward depth chart, but where Klinsmann, a former German national player, erred is by using John-

son's slow start this season with his new team, DC United, to make his final decision. Although Johnson has scored only a goal in eight games this season, the veteran forward is a proven scorer at the international level. His goals were crucial to the U.S. in qualifying, and I see no forward in the squad that has 'moved past Johnson on the depth chart' since those crucial goals a year ago.

Johnson's slow start is understandable; traded in the off season from Seattle, where he was the leading scorer the past two seasons, the forward is with a new team put together during the off-season. Not only is he new to the players, but more than three-fourth of the team are new to each other as well.

Johnson isn't the only U.S. player off to a slow start this year! Landon Donovan, whom Klinsmann says is picked as one of six forwards, which was one of the reasons for Johnson's omission, missed the final round of qualifying and has not scored for the Los Angeles Galaxy this season. Except for a decent showing in last summer's Gold cup, Donovan has been out of the loop. U.S. captain Clint Dempsey got very little playing time this past winter at his old club, Fulham FC, in England and only got in the scoring column recently with a very good Seattle Sounders team. Jozy Altidore has struggled for playing time at Sunderland FC in the England Premier League.

By using Johnson's current slump, Klinsmann disregarded the players already proven goal-scoring ability at the international level. Player-slumps are a part of the game and are frequent when coaches and players change teams. Johnson's overall contribution to the squad and his proven effectiveness at the international level should have garnered him a trip to Bra-

zil. Brazilian Paulino had a torrid time at Tottenham Hotspurs in the English Premier League, but coach Phil Scolari knows Paulino as a proven international. Among the forwards selected, Terrence Boyd, Aron Johannsson and Chris Wondolowski have not played at Johnson's level internationally.

"By putting these 30 play-

ers together, we just think that's where we want to see them compete in (the) first place, that's where we see them as a first option," said Klinsmann. "That makes it maybe then difficult for a player like Eddie that you have to leave out. In Eddie's case, it's really, really difficult because he's also a player that brings so much to the table and he's done tremendously well with us over the last two years and scored very, very important goals for us and he can also play in the left wing and right wing. So, why Johnson?

The 30-man squad must be reduced to 23 by June 2. The squad: Goalkeepers Tim Howard, Brad Guzan and Nick Rimando. Defenders DaMarcus Beasley, Omar Gonzalez, Matt Besler, John Brooks, Geoff Cameron, Tim Chandler, Brad Evans, Fabian Johnson and Clarence Goodson Michael Parkhurst and DeAndre Yedlin. The midfielders are Kyle Beckerman, Alejandro Bedoya, Maurice Edu, Brad Davis, Michael Bradley, Jermaine Jones, Julian Green, Mix Diskerud, Joe Corona and Graham Zusi. The forwards are Jozy Altidore, Clint Dempsey, Landon Donovan, Aron Johannsson, Chris Wondolowski and Terrence Boyd.

Singleton and his very competent staff, was once again a success marked by fast times and long distances as well as outstanding performances. Many records fell to the delight of the coaches and athletes. The meet drew 242 schools, including those from Canada, 353 teams, 1616 boys and 1517 girls on the high school level.

Benjamin almost pulled off a double by winning the 400-meter hurdles in a time of 52.42 and finished second in the 400 meter dash in 47.17. Scoring was based on a 10-8-6-4-2-1.

The junior at Mount

Vernon High School competes during the indoor and outdoor seasons and trains in the fall doing base work for the winter. His time in the hurdles thus became the fastest clocking in the nation during this outdoor campaign. It also became the second best on the Loucks Games all-time list.

Benjamin also ran the anchor leg on the 1600-meter relay team that finished second, but in the hurdles Benjamin did not get out the way that he wanted to.

"I was still a little tired from the Open 400 but gradually I built 'it' up, Benjamin said. "With more practice then I'll be fine All in all it was a god race."

Benjamin's father, Winston Benjamin, was a professional cricket player in Antigua, West Indies. He now manages an under 17 cricket team.

"I was born here (in New York) but have traveled back and forth," the student athlete said. "I don't have any problems going back and forth. It's always fun to go to the beaches and see the people (there). When I go down there it's a vacation.

"My goal is to get under 47 seconds for the 400 and get under 50 seconds in the hurdles."

He has been competing in the Loucks Games for three years and holds numerous indoor and outdoor school records.

Meanwhile, coming into the race, Richard Rose, a junior at Boys and Girls High School in Brooklyn, felt very good and confident that he could win his event. And he did it!

Rose just edged Benjamin 46.38 seconds to 47.17 in the 400-meter dash and earned outstanding athlete of the meet award for the boys. Rose is a versatile track performer and he is capable of running at any distance from the 200 meters to the 800 meters. He is top-ranked in New York State in the 400 after his performances last week in the Loucks Games. He also set a record and has the fastest time in the nation this year.

"To be top-ranked and win the race means a lot to me," Rose added. "I'm a hard worker. Everybody's goal is to make an Olympics team (and I'm no exception)." Rose's farther Collin comes from Jamaica, West Indies.

"He is a hard working and dedicated man, and that's who I got that trait from," he said.

On the distaff side, Brenessa Thompson, a senior at Medgar Evers High School in Brooklyn and a native of Guyana in the Caribbean, was timed in 12.22 in the preliminaries of the 100-meter dash, and then captured the finals in a faster time of 11.97. In addition, the highly ranked sprinter also took the 200 meters in 24.31. She helped her school to the combined men and women team title with 78

"I'm satisfied with my win," Ms. Thompson said. "My start was slow and I have to work more on it."

Brenessa's farther used to be a runner in the Caribbean. The student athlete was born in Guyana and the family moved to Brooklyn three years ago.

All the athletes and coaches had nothing but praise for the meet.
