Poet, author Maya **Angelou** dies at 86

NEW YORK (AP) — Maya Angelou, a modern Renaissance woman who survived the harshest of childhoods to become a force on stage, screen, the printed page and the inaugural dais, died Wednesday, her son said. She was 86.

Angelou's son, Guy B. Johnson, said the writer died at her home in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, where she had been a professor of American studies at Wake Forest University since 1982.

Tall and regal, with a deep, majestic voice, Angelou defied all probability and category, becoming one of the first black women to enjoy mainstream success as an author and thriving in virtually every artistic medium. The young single mother who worked at strip clubs to earn a living later wrote and recited the most popular presidential inaugural poem in history. The childhood victim of rape wrote a million-selling memoir, befriended Malcolm X, Nelson Mandela and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., and performed on Continued on Page 6

OBAMA DEPORT DELAY

Prez to Homeland Security: 'Delay deport review'

President Barack Obama this week directed Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Secretary Jeh Johnson to delay until after the summer a deportation enforcement review, officials say.

US officials said on Tuesday that they feared continuing the

review would anger House Republicans and doom any lingering hopes for an immigration overhaul in the U.S. Congress this year, according to the New York Times.

Caribbean

Caribbean Community countries (CARICOM) have condemned the kidnapping of hundreds of school children in Nigeria by members of the militant group Boko Haram last month.

They have joined the international community in demanding the return of the children.

The St. Kitts-Nevis government in a statement described the abduction as "morally reprehensible and has left a gaping vacuum in the entire community of Chibok and has had ripple effects across the nation of Nigeria and indeed the world.

Trinidad and Tobago Foreign Affairs Minister Winston Dookeran said he was pleased that Nigeria "is now seeking sup-

port from the outside to help them deal with the abduction issues pertaining to the



particular political conflict."

The Grenada government said it was expressing its "collective disgust about the situation."

"We are of the view that in a modern world community such barbaric actions must not be allowed to stand," Social Service Minister Delma Thomas said.

Bahamas Foreign Minister Fred Mitchell said the Bahamas government is joining the international community "in demanding the return of the more than 200 Nigerian girls abducted from their school".

On April 14, 2014 Boko Haram which means "Western education is forbidden" invaded an all-girl secondary school, then packed the teenagers, who had been taking exams, onto trucks and disappeared into a remote area along the border with Cameroon.

Bermuda

Bermuda Premier Craig Cannonier resigned after a long-standing political controversy that finally came to an end last week-end.

Deputy Premier Michael Dunkley was sworn

as the new premier by Governor George Fergusson during a ceremony at Government House

gations had called into question his leadership, the confidence of his colleagues and his support of his party- threatening the going forward."

Prior to the December 2012 General Election, Cannonier, as the leader of the One Bermuda Alliance, met with wealthy U.S. developer Nathan Landow and other entrepreneurs, who agreed to donate \$300,000 to the party.

It is alleged that Cannonier and two of his colleagues flew to Washington, DC on Landow's private jet last year.

There is no law that requires political donations in Bermuda to be publicly disclosed.

The opposition Progressive Labor Party (PLP) has called for a mass resignation of the OBA government following fresh allegations over "Jetgate".

Grenada

A former senior member of the then Grenada ruling National Democratic Congress (NDC) led by former Prime Minister Tillman Thomas is getting ready to join the ruling Dr. Keith Mitchell government.

Peter David, a former NDC member got the endorsement of Dr. Mitchell and senior executive members of his New National Party (NNP).

David convincingly won the Town of St George's constituency in the 2003 and 2008 general elections, but did not contest the 2012 poll, in which the PNP won all 15 seats.

He was among several NDC stal-

agreed with a resolution tabled by then Prime Minister Tillman Thomas to have them expelled.

The others included then foreign affairs minister Karl Hood, tourism minister, Glynnis Roberts and trade unionist Chester Humphrey.'

Hood is now serving the island's Ambassador to China.

Guyana

The Trinidad and Tobago-based Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) has ordered Guyana to repay more than US\$6.04 million to a Suriname-based beverage company over an environmental levy it imposed on the importation of non-returnable beverage containers.

The CCJ ruled that the government also repay to Rudisa Beverages any further tax paid from Oct. 25, last year, to the date of the judgment.

The Suriname-based company, whose products are imported into Guyana and distributed through CID Distributor, the other coclaimant, claimed that the environment levy under the Customs Act of Guyana did not contain any exemption in relation to CARI-COM goods.

It said that the environmental tax had the effect of raising the cost price on each imported container by Guy\$10 and that no similar tax is imposed on local producers of non-

returnable beverage company. It also argued

Haiti

on May 1, 2014 when a boat with 18 Haitians headed to Puerto Rico sank off the coast of Boca Chica, in the Dominican Republic. Of the Haitians aboard the boat, six died and 12 were rescued by the Dominican Republic's navy.

The tragedy forms part of the more than 20 incidents at sea in

various places in the Caribbean in 2014 so far, affecting around 320 people of which 19 drowned and 12 are still missing.

"We call upon all governments to carry out tasks to search for, rescue and intercept migrants at seat to establish appropriate measures to identify persons who may be refugees or have special protection needs for condition of their vulnerability, such as children," the IACHR said in a statement.

The UN High Commissioner says 440 maritime accidents with boats carrying migrants on the Caribbean Sea have taken place since 2010, affecting 15,190 people, of which 240 have died and 176 others missing.

St. Lucia

Police Commissioner Vernon Francois says while he welcomed the probe into extra-judicial killings by member of the St. Lucia Police Force, he is also hoping it will bring "a degree of closure" to the situation.

The probe was conducted by members of the Jamaica Constabulary Force under the aus-

pices of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Implementation Agency for Crime Security and (IMPACS).



The probe was initiated after the United States announced that it was cutting back aid to the police in St Lucia and the Kenny Anthony administration had said the assistance from Washington would remain suspended until the enquiry was held.

CAMSA to host fundraising golf tournament

The Caribbean American Medical and Scientific Association (CAMSA) says it is hosting an inaugural golf tournament next month aimed at raising funds to support its medical missions in the region.

Dr. Vincent Hutchinson, the group's Barbadian-born president, said the tournament will take place on June 18 at the Pelham/Split Rock Golf Course in the Bronx.

"We want to do a lot more in terms of outreach," the retired pediatrician told Caribbean Life in an exclusive interview. "We think the golf tournament will be more profitable.

"We're trying to get some sponsors as well. We've reached out to about a dozen people so far," added Dr. Hutchinson, a retired director of pediatrics at Harlem Hospital.

"If we get 48 people to participate (in the golf tournament), we can make from \$4-5,000 profit," he continued. "It's the first year, we're doing it. Hopefully, in the coming years, we'll get more people to participate."

He said proceeds from the golf tournament, will help, among other things, rehabilitation efforts in St. Lucia, which, with St. Vincent and the Gren-

adines and Dominica, was affected by a freak storm last Christmas.

The group had made monetary contributions to St. Lucia and St. Vincent and the Grenadines in the wake of the storm.

"We want to give supplies and to help in the rebuilding of the hospital in St. Lucia," said Dr. Hutchinson, stating that CAMSA, which is based in New Hyde Park, Nassau County, Long Island and was established in 2002, has, over the years, also made monetary contributions to KindestHearts. org, a group in Haiti.

In addition, he said members travel to Haiti annually in providing medical service to rural patients.

Hutchinson said CAMSA has reached out, for sponsorship for the golf tournament, to a number of area businesses, including restaurants and auto dealerships, as well as the insurance company, Health First.

"Our generous supporters have enabled CAMSA to provide a wide range of programs, including health education, via health fairs, conferences and

BOLT'S CHAMPIONSHIP SPIKES FOR NY AUCTION

A pair of beautifully handcrafted spikes by Puma that was specially created for world sprint prodigy Usain Bolt and used in his training preparation for the 2013 World Championship Games in Moscow, Russia will go on sale at an auction in New York City on Friday, June 6. The auction will be a highlight of Rum & Rhythms, a signature event hosted by the Caribbean Tourism Organization during the annual Caribbean Week celebration in New York, and the premium event will take place at the posh Tribeca 360 in Lower Manhattan starting

at 6:30 p.m.

With a bounce from these specially made preparation spikes, Usain Bolt won gold for both the 100m and the 200m taces at this meet as well as winning the

4 x 100m relay for Jamaica. He also took home the title of being the most successful athlete ever in the history of the World Championships.

The spikes are autographed by Usain with one of his two aliases 'UGO' written on them. The teeth and laces were personally inserted by Bolt and they have been worn by only him.

'Usain Bolt is a rare global legend from the Caribbean who continues to make history and to make us proud, and we are thrilled to have his training spikes from the 2013 World Championship Games as a part of the CTO's Caribbean Week auction," Sylma Brown Bramble, director, Caribbean Tourism Organization USA. Inc. said.

The starting bid is set for US\$18,000 and the auction is a collaboration among the Caribbean Tourism Organization, Dave Rodney, marketing executive at Images Media and the Lay Magistrates Association of Jamaica (Kingston Chapter). The spikes were handed over last year to Norma Brown Bell, former president of the Lay Magistrates Association, and proceeds from the sale will be used for the benefit of charities in Jamaica.

Continued from cover last two months searching for ways that Obama could legally shield some of the 11 million immigrants in the country illegally, from deportation.

Among the ideas was new guidance for law-enforcement officers to focus on people who have committed serious crimes or who are caught on the border.

While some immigration activists have demanded that Mr. Obama take even bolder actions to reduce deportations, senior White House officials said the president was worried that any action would be viewed by House Republicans as an abuse of executive power. Officials also fear that an action would fuel the already intense Republican opposition to a more long-lasting solution to the country's immigration problems.

"There are a number of folks suggesting that anything that the administration does could become an excuse for inaction in the

House," said Cecilia Muñoz, director of the White House Domestic Policy Council and the president's top immigration adviser. Muñoz said Obama

decided to put off any recommendations arising from Johnson's review of deportation policy, to give lawmakers one more chance to negotiate a compromise on an immigration overhaul, according to the Times.

It noted that the Senate has already passed a bipartisan bill, but that House Republicans have balked, saving it does not do enough to secure the border and goes too far in providing a path to citizenship for people who broke the law to get to the U.S.

U.S. officials, however, said that Johnson would continue to conduct his review, which includes conversations with a variety of interest groups.

But they said he would not present any findings to the president for several months.

"The president has been saying for months that he believes there is a real possibility for action in the House, and that the best window is over the next couple of months," Muñoz said. "We have to keep the pressure on."

Obama had hoped that opposition to an immigra-

tion overhaul among House Republicans would soften after the Republican primaries this Spring, and that the legislators might be willing to compromise before the general election season begins in earnest in September, The Times

reported. But it added that Obama's optimism has been tested in recent months as opposition to an immigration overhaul in the House of Representatives has solidified among some Republicans.

In January, Republican House Speaker John A. Boehner of Ohio unveiled a set of principles which he said could guide a Republican immigration overhaul, but they were strongly rejected by many of his own members.

Since then, the Times said Boehner has repeatedly suggested that there is little appetite among House Republicans for anything like the bill passed by the Senate.

In addition, he has also "mocked members of his caucus for not having the courage to tackle a tough issue like immigration," the Times said.

Muñoz said Johnson briefed Obama on his deportation review last week and that the president told Johnson to continue the review but to hold off making any recommendations.

"During this interim, we strongly urge President Obama and his administration to allow for this process to take place before issuing administrative action," said several immigration advocacy groups in a statement on Tuesday. "We believe the president should move cautiously and give the House leadership all of the space they may need to bring legislation to the floor for a vote."

But leaders of immigrant youth groups said they were outraged at the decision to postpone action that was expected to slow the pace of deportations.

"Now they want us to cater to the Republicans' strategy of death-by-delay for immigration reform and continue to put our families at risk," said Lorella Praeli, a leader of United We Dream, a national network of young immigrants. "The time for space has come and gone."

An actress, singer and dancer in the 1950s and 1960s, she broke through as an author in 1969 with "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," which became standard (and occasionally censored) reading, and was the first of a multipart autobiography that continued through the decades. In 1993, she was a sensation reading her cautiously hopeful "On the Pulse of the Morning" at President Bill Clinton's first inauguration. Her confident performance openly delighted Clinton and made the poem a best-seller, if not a critical favorite. For President George W. Bush, she read another poem, "Amazing Peace," at the 2005 Christmas tree lighting ceremony at the White House.

She was a mentor to Oprah Winfrey, whom she befriended when Winfrey was still a local television reporter, and often appeared on her friend's talk show program. She mastered several languages and

published not just poetry, but advice books, cookbooks and children's stories. She wrote music, plays and screenplays, received an Emmy nomination for her acting in the 1977 miniseries "Roots," and never lost her passion for dance, the art she considered closest to poetry.

Selling the souls for a chance to survive

While economicallypressed Caribbean countries are selling citizenship to mostly Middle Eastern, Asian, and Russian applicants as an easy revenue source, reports say abuse of the program is on the rise.

According to the Christian Science Monitor, the twin-island federation of St. Kitts and Nevis, of roughly 55,000 people, grants citizenship in exchange for either a contribution of US\$250,000 or more to its Sugar Industry Diversification Foundation or the purchase of approved real estate worth a minimum of US\$400,000.

"Selling passports is a way for the cash-strapped nation to raise money and has helped transform an economy once dependent on sugar cane," said the paper on Friday. "But, as the program has grown, so have allegations of abuse."

The Monitor noted that just last month the U.S. Treasury Department raised

concerns that St. Kitts and Nevis had issued passports to three Iranian men who were using the documents to allegedly help Iranian banks launder millions of dollars. "The negative attention has some calling for better regulations, or even an end to the program," it said.

Nevertheless, the paper said money St. Kitts and Nevis has made from the program has spurred other countries – from Malta to Bulgaria – to start their own.

In the Caribbean, the Monitor said Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, and Grenada have followed St. Kitts and Nevis' lead, adding that others are considering similar programs.

Citing economic headwinds, such as lower tourism and high energy prices, the paper said St. Lucia Prime Minister Dr. Kenny Anthony announced last month that he was open to the idea.

"I think we cannot close our eyes [to selling citizenship], because it's an option we may have to consider," it quoted Anthony as saying.

The Monitor said countries that offer economic citizenship do not release the number of applicants or approval rates.

Nuri Katz, president of APEX Capital Group, a US consultancy, estimates that between 15,000 and 20,000 people apply annually for second passports. Pushed by political turmoil, or seeking a pass-

travel visas, the Monitor said applicants come from around the world, especially Russia, the Middle East and Asia.

It said a passport from St. Kitts offers visa-free travel to more than 120 countries.

Dwyer Astaphan, a former St. Kitts and Nevis minister of national security who now works as a citizenship lawyer, estimates the program generates tens of millions of dollars for the country.

But Astaphan, according to the Monitor, conceded that "we don't know where the money goes."

Still, the investment "is an economic vitamin b-12 shot for a country our size," he told the Monitor.

The Monitor said a surge of new countries offering such programs has raised concerns over abuses.

Earlier this week, the U.S.

Treasury's Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (Fin-CEN) office advised international financial institutions to more closely review dealings with clients using a St. Kitts and Nevis passport, stating that certain foreign individuals are abusing the Citizenship-by-Investment program to obtain passports for the purpose of engaging in illicit financial activity.

"Financial institutions can mitigate exposure to such risk through customer due diligence, including risk-based identity verification consistent with existing customer identification program requirements," it said.

"FinCEN believes that illicit actors are abusing this program to acquire SKN (St. Kitts and Nevis) citizenship in order to mask their identity and geographic background for the purpose of evading U.S. or international sanctions or engaging in other financial crime," it added.

Rights to Garifuna

Local creative economy development requires a functioning system of intellectual property rights. [1] These rights provide opportunities in several ways, as they regulate ownership, add value and facilitate trade in cultural goods and services, thus benefitting individual creators as well as creative communities.

The incentives and rewards they afford encourage investment and the development of sustainable business models, helping to produce lasting economic and social benefits. They give authors and other creators the exclusive right to control the use of their literary, artistic, musical and dramatic works for a limited period of time (subject to certain limitations and permitted exceptions).

As cultural expression is forged by a wide cross-section of society, copyright policies and regulations can facilitate the creation of economic opportunities that penetrate through to the grass-roots level. They are a necessary instrument for the integration of community based creativity into the national and global economy. Intellectual property rights thus enhance the local development potential of culture, notably among the least developed countries.


On July 18, 2013, I wrote an article entitled "Garifuna Music Business: Ichahówarügüti vs Intellectual Property", and I shared that nineteen years after the "Sopa de Caracol" Conch Soup controversy, there were only 35 Garifuna titles registered with the U.S. Copyright Office and only 12 had been

authored by Garinagu. To date, there are 48 and 20, seven new ones since the article and one that was brought to my attention recently, which was registered in 2008! Following is a breakdown by year: 1979 1, 1995-1999 6, 2002-2014 13

The "World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) ", one of the 17 specialized agencies of the United Nations, which was created in 1967 "to encourage creative activity, to promote the protection of intellectual property throughout the world". Intellectual property (IP) is a term referring to a number of distinct types of creations of the mind for which a set of exclusive rights are recognized-and the corresponding fields of law. Under intellectual property law, owners are granted certain exclusive rights to a variety of intangible assets, such as musical, literary, and artistic works; discoveries and inventions; and words, phrases, symbols, and designs. Common types of intellectual property rights include copyrights.

In 2011, the Garifuna Coalition USA, Inc. sponsored two music symposia, including a workshop entitled "The Business Of Music: Music Copyrights and Music Publishing,"presented by Music Business Professor Gary Fritz. I am happy to report that one symposium participant, has registered two copyrights with the U.S. Copyright Office.

A copyright is a form of intellectual property law, which protects original works of authorship including literary, dramatic, Continued on Page 12

The presence of pan in the panoply of musical instrument

The steelpan – or pan, as it is more widely called - is the bedrock of Trinidad Carnival. It is also an instrument that is part and parcel of calypso and soca music. The instrument's versatility easily lends itself to jazz, R&B, gospel, classical music.

The names Tony Williams, Bertie Marshall and Ellie Manette go hand-in-hand with the instrument's evolution. And apart from Trinidad and other areas of the Caribbean, its impact, since its inception some seventy years ago, the instrument continues to play a major role in the music of the Anglophone Caribbean diaspora.

Fact: the steelpan is only instrument to be invented in the 20th century. And, according to Zahra Gordon in her article, "Steel-Pan Music: It's Origin & History," she posits: "Steelpan, the national instrument of Trinidad & Tobago, has become ubiquitous, with its music being found in numerous commercials for Caribbean tourism, in school programs as close to home as Grenada and as far away as Japan, and even in the song 'P.I.M.P' by rapper 50-Cent. Yet as popular as steel-pan has become, people seem to know very little about its origins. Many still think that the instrument is a Jamaican invention."

This generally seems to be a veritable chronic problem with the inhabitants of the region. Indeed, the pan instrument, however, is still wending its way toward asserting itself as a more "visibly" recognized instrument in the pantheon of internationally recognized musical instru-

ments.

By its very structure the steelpan is an exquisitely beautiful chromatically pitched percussion instrument which is a joy to the ear in its character. Every so often one hears it here and there. But unlike other percussion, it is highly under utilized, in my view.

Where does the steelpan figure today, not so much from a cultural perspective, but more so from an economic standpoint in the wider scheme of Trinidadian, and world musical landscape?

"We can take solace in that the Pan still has an untold future," says Anthony Salah Wilson, a steelpan musician, composer, arranger, educator, scholar and founder of Salah's Steelpan Academy in Quebec, Canada adds: "The meteoric rise of the Pan internationally in the last two decades is evidence of a perceived longevity." Wilson is one of several people who have in the past proposed a ministry exclusively for steelpan in the island nation of Trinidad and Tobago. Wilson's essential proposal includes several factors such as: A ministry that must be able to offer "something meaningful to the country, to the population, to the world". A ministry that must, he proffers, "be able to provide a service to the country, to the population, to the world" one that has the ability to "generate finance and contribute to the economic development of the country;"

one that should have a "positive impact on the social status of the population of the country;" as well be able to attract foreign investments and tourism and be able to positively affect the youths of the nation as well as be able to "create jobs and spin off related industries."

Is this a pipe dream? In Jamaica right now attempts are being made through the Jamaica Reggae Industry Association - incorporated on Feb. 3, 2009 - with its primary mission being to represent the interests of its members, with the aim of fostering economic and professional growth while at the same time contributing to the development of Jamaica and its music.

Additionally, its vision also wishes to attempt at uniting all persons and organizations within the music and entertainment industry with the hope of becoming the "most effective trade association" in the island and to provide "superior service" to the music industry.

Ambitious? It ought to be. The time for leaving Square One is way overdue. We are in the middle of the second decade of the 21st century! Trinidad can do it. Trinidad had better do it if wants this the instrument to assume a more solid stance within the vast musical panoply of world musical instruments.

Unheeded cries coming from the fringes

Without a doubt, whenever another shooting spree claims innocent lives, innocent young lives especially, it's that insane element that we first look upon with disfavor - those who argue unabashedly that a gun-toting citizenry is the preferred way forward for American society. The ease with which advocates of gun rights lunacy have been able to work their will in a number of states does nothing to advance any claim of American society being, here in the 21st century, an enlightened one. But folks championing the rights of Americans to have unhindered access to guns is but part of the problem. It should not obscure or minimize an obvious need for some fundamental rethinking of the kind of attention given to emotional instability, which has so often been at the root of mass-killing episodes.

When the back story to the Sandy Hook tragedy in Connecticut came to light, we learned of a young perpetrator of that unspeakable violence whose behavior pattern was anything but normal. And we learned of a mother who, before she became his first victim that awful morning, ought to have made authorities aware of her son's unbalanced state...unless she was herself not of sound mind. In the horror that unfolded last week on the campus of the University of California, Santa Barbara, the young man who killed six persons and himself had similarly been on a violent-eruption trajectory in which, with fortuitous intervention, another sickening headline would likely have been averted.

Media coverage, including expansive reporting by Adam Nagourney and Ian Lovett in The New York Times, revealed a tortured existence as a social misfit that had evidently come to define life in full measure for the 22-yearold at the center of last week's mayhem. Cries for help disguised as sworn commitment to murderous rampage once again eluded the system, the net result of which was college student Elliot Rodger's demons having their way.

That seven lives were lost, not to mention persons reportedly wounded, in Rodger's violent spree was particularly frustrating because of how close authorities came to thwarting the young man's plans for what he called "retribution" against those he held responsible for the life of



rejection he knew. Rodger's mother. divorced from his father when their son was quite young, had voiced some concern about his emotional state to folks in the mental health establishment, which prompted a visit in April to Rodger's apartment by a crew of law enforcement officers. In the chilling video Rodger posted that spelled out his planned rampage, which authorities would discover only after it was too late. he added this entry after the cops had come by to check him out:"If they had demanded to search my room, that would have ended everything. For a few horrible seconds I thought it was all over." The police would say, following the carnage, that their interview of Rodger gave them no reason to think a search of the apartment (where weapons and ammunition had been stockpiled) was warranted.

Maybe it's simply 20-20 hindsight, or maybe not. But there's something that seems not altogether right about mental health authorities cueing cops to go assess the emotional state of someone considered likely to snap by at least one source close to him. One appreciates the need for law enforcement personnel to be involved in any effort to come up with a good read on someone who possibly may be dealing with emotional issues, given the unpredictability such a scenario presents. The non-inclusion of at least one mental health professional in the group doing such an evaluation is more difficult to fathom.

Apart from the shouting both sides of the gun debate do after each shocking gun violence episode breaks into the news, what's invariably heard is that greater attention must be paid to the mental health area to curtail the many instances of binge violence revealing persons in need of help who slipped through the cracks. In truth, if some of us look askance at pronouncements from the gun crazies of that sort, it's with abundant justification. How else but with less than a pinch of salt should we take any such utterance from folks so vehemently opposed to a common-sense measure like background checks for firearms

purchases?

Last week's eruption in California gave us as graphic an illustration as we might desire of how easily any of us could become ensnared in the twisted thought processes and designs of common or garden folk in the mix. Elliot Rodger had roommates whom he despised, according to the documentation he left behind. Did they not get enough of a sense, from that extended close proximity, that he exhibited too much oddball behavior to engender trust or to be entirely comfortable with him around? And did the police officers handed the responsibility to determine where this guy's head was, not think it productive to talk to his roommates?

They talk mainly about increasing funds allocated for mental health when events swing the national conversation that way. At government level there are already some modest steps in that direction we've heard of. But even absent huge infusions of cash, there's clearly more that should and presumably can be done, hopefully without much political agitation, toward having a better handle on addressing our awesome mental health challenges.

Continued from page 10 musical, and artistic works, such as poetry, novels, movies, songs, computer software, and architecture. Copyright is a form of protection granted by law for original works of authorship fixed in a tangible medium of expression. Copyright covers both published and unpublished works.

Registered works may be eligible for statutory damages and attorney's fees in successful litigation. Some individuals promote the practice of sending a copy of your own work to your-

Exclusive rights to creations of the mind.

self, which is called a "poor man's copyright."However, according to the U.S. Copyright Office, there is no provision in the copyright law regarding any such type of protection, and it is not a substitute for registration.

Therefore, if the Garifuna Community wants to take advantage of the incentives and rewards afforded by intellectual property rights to encourage investment and the development of sustainable business models, Garifuna authors and other creative must continue to increase copyright registrations. As professor Fritz emphasized during the Symposium "If you don't take care of your business, your business will not take care of you!"



The Jamaican investigators were conducting the independent probe into 12 extrajudicial killings dating back to 2010, during which period there were claims that local officers had a "hit list" of criminals who were being targeted.

Suriname

Suriname's President Desi Bouterse is making another effort to have dismissed the jail sentence and conviction imposed on him in absentia by a court in the Netherlands.


His attorney, Inez Weski said his client has filed an appeal against an 11-year jail term handed out by the court in the Netherlands in 1999.

She said that Patrick van L, the Belgian who had given incriminating statements against Bouterse has since recanted his story and for

years has tried to clean the president's slate.

Weski said Van L. was under pressure when he incriminated Bouterse. The attorney said the Prosecutor's Office had ordered him a lesser sentence for his involvement in the 474 kilos of cocaine that was intercepted in the Netherlands in 1997, if would help them build a case against Bouterse, the former army sergeant who rose to power following a 1980 coup.

The 1999 sentenced was read in The Hague in his absence, was the result of the so-called Co-Pa investigation, in which a Dutch intel-



Bouterse was democratically elected president of Suriname in 2010.

Trinidad

Trinidad and Tobago nationals may be able to travel without a visa to the European Union (EU) by April next year.

Recently, the European Council approved an amended list allowing citizens from 16 countries - including Trinidad and Tobago - to be exempt from the visa requirement when traveling to the Schengen Zone.

The Schengen Zone comprises 26 European countries (mostly part of the (EU) that have abolished passports or any other type



of border control in between their common borders.

"The exemption will only come into force when bilateral agreements on visa waivers between the EU and the respective country have been concluded in order to ensure full reciprocity," the EU said in a release.

"The regulations that open for the visa waiver for Trinidad and Tobago have been done. So from our side it becomes effective, but it really becomes a reality only when we sign an agreement with Trinidad and Tobago. To sign an agreement we have to finalize negotiations, which being an international agreement it is based on reciprocity," the EU said. *Compiled by Azad Ali*

Forced to choose between hunger and safety

ST. JOHN'S, Antigua, May 21, 2014 (IPS) - Climate change is forcing the nine-member Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) to choose between expending scarce resources to deal with its impact or other pressing development goals.

"There is a very thin line between consumption and conservation...progress and protection," Grenada's Environment Minister Roland Bhola told IPS. He explained that countries still have to fulfil the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), which include reducing poverty and hunger, while dealing with the impacts of climate change.

But there is a flicker of hope for these countries. The European Union (EU) has signed a financial agreement for 39.5 million East Caribbean dollars for a project designed to improve the sub-region's natural

resource base and its resilience to impacts of climate change.

The OECS consists of the islands of Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Grenada, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, St. Kitts-Nevis, Montserrat, Anguilla and the British Virgin islands.

Head of the EU delegation to Barbados and the Eastern Caribbean, ambassador Mikael Barford, has acknowledged that this is a "very vulnerable region" and that the project is a reflection of Europe's commitment to support climate action in developing countries.

"The Caribbean is one of the most disaster-prone regions in the world but we tend to ignore the threat that could occur as a result of the impact of climate change..."

"On your doorsteps, scientists are warning that your 62-square-mile [161-squarekilometre] sister island of Barbuda is becoming one of the most vulnerable spots due to the consequences of climate change," he told IPS.

"Already there is accelerated erosion taking place because of the rise in sea levels and it's estimated that if this continues, a third of the island could be lost."

Antigua and Barbuda, the only country in the OECS to have appointed an ambassador for climate change, has had more than six hurricanes of various intensity over the last 20 years.

Antigua and Barbuda's ambassador Diann Black-Layne told IPS: "Climate change is impacting our country."

She said that many small island developing states (SIDS), were suffering percentage losses of their GDPs because of the impact of climate change.

"We've had extreme weather, variation in rainfall, significant flooding and Continued on Page 25

TRIGGER MIGRAINES

Many factors, including food, can contribute to the onset of migraine headaches. However, migraine headaches remain a mystery to migraine sufferers and medical professionals alike. Researchers have studied the effect of foods on the genesis of a migraine, and some foods have proven to be repeat offenders when it comes to triggering the headaches.

Chemical components of certain foods may play a role in why they cause headaches to occur. The effect certain foods have on the body may also be instrumental. For example, alcohol tends to thin the blood, which can increase blood flow to the brain. Furthermore, alcohol is a diuretic and can dehydrate the body, another headache trigger. Although everyone reacts differently to alcohol, whiskey, red wine, champagne, and beer are the most common alcoholic migraine triggers.

Tyramine

Foods that contain tyramine may also trigger migraines. Tyramine is a naturally-occurring compound often present in many plants and animals. It can also form from tyrosine - an amino acid found in a variety of foods — when those foods are fermented, or start to decay. Tyramine can have effects on the adrenal gland, which triggers the "fight or flight" reaction in the body. This elevates the heart rate, increases blood pressure, and increases the amount of adrenaline and other substances in the blood. All of these factors may trigger a migraine.

Aged cheese, preserved meats, and other items that have been fermented are prime sources of tyramine. They can be reduced or avoided if it seems these foods play a role in migraines.

Additives

Chemical additives may be used in foods to preserve freshness or modify flavor. Some people report headaches from monosodium glutamate (MSG), but there is no definitive research linking it to headaches. However, heavily processed foods may affect people who suffer from migraines in different ways.

Cured and processed meats, such as hot dogs and sausage, will contain additives. Additives are present in many convenience foods, such as frozen and packaged dinners, as well. Processed cheese may have additives as well as high levels of tyramine, making them a double threat.

Whenever possible, migraine sufferers should limit processed foods and choose fresh foods to minimize exposure to chemical additives.

Other triggers

There are other foods beyond those with tyramine or additives that may trigger headaches as well.

Dairy products are often a

cause of allergic reactions in people. Dairy may contribute to the overproduction of mucous in the sinuses, which can create pressure and lead to migraines. Published surveys have

found that after cheese, chocolate, alcohol, bananas, and citrus fruit are the most common triggers of migraines. These foods may influence the release of serotonin, causing constriction and dilation of blood vessels, or directly stimulate areas of the brain such as the trigeminal ganglia, brainstem, and neuronal pathways. The result is a propensity for migraines.

Caffeine products are triggers for some people, while others find caffeine helps them find relief. That is why caffeine is sometimes paired with a pain-relief medication for faster efficacy.



Another sinus headache? Not so fast!

Your nose is stuffed up, pressure is building in your face, and you have a pounding headache. Your mother calls and you tell her you have another sinus headache. But do you?

Each year, millions of people report having a sinus headache. While a person may be experiencing symptoms like those of sinusitis and also have a headache, it does not necessarily mean they have a sinus headache.

"The fact is, sinus headache is an uncommon occurrence that affects a small percentage of people," says Dr. Curtis Schreiber, a headache specialist. "The confusion comes from prematurely assigning symptoms like congestion and facial pain to sinusitis instead of considering the other medical conditions that can produce the same or similar symptoms."

If not a sinus headache, then what?

"Many of these patients are actually experiencing a migraine headache, which can produce sinus-associated symptoms such as nasal congestion," confirms Dr. Schreiber. "Since people tend to know very little about migraine, they are unaware of its similarities to sinusitis." Migraine is a real medical condition that can be treated with appropriate medicines. Symptoms of migraine vary by person, and one migraine may exhibit different symptoms from another. Migraines include some of the following symptoms:

• Pain on one side of your head.

• Moderate to severe pain.

Throbbing pain.

• Worse pain when you move or bend over.

• Nausea or vomiting.

• Sensitivity to light and sound.

• Aura (flashing lights, visual

disturbance).

Migraines don't always include such classic symptoms as auras. According to the American Migraine II Study, only about 24 percent of people previously undiagnosed with migraine experience aura.

In addition to the symptoms listed above, migraines can also have symptoms that overlap with other kinds of headaches. Migraines are sometimes mistaken for "sinus headaches" because:

• Migraine pain can be felt on the face, around the eyes, or in the sinuses.

Relaxation techniques to calm your nerves

Headaches can often be brought on by stress. Since 2007, the American Psychological Association has commissioned an annual nationwide survey to examine the state of stress across the United States and understand its impact. The 2013 survey found that people continue to experience what they feel are unhealthy stress levels, with 42 percent of adult respondents reporting that their stress levels have increased over the past five years. Research has suggested that routine meditation sessions can alter the brain's neural pathways and make a person more capable of combatting stress.

Yoga

GET THE FACTS ON MIGRAINE HEADACHES

Headaches are a common response to stress, but migraine headaches are a type of headache that seem to be a unique breed. Migraines cause significant pain and are often accompanied by other symptoms that make them particularly bothersome.

Much is not understood about the cause of migraines, but environmental factors and genetics seem to play a role. According to The Mayo Clinic, migraines may be caused by changes in the brain stem and interactions between this part of the neurological system and a major pain pathway called the trigeminal nerve.

Imbalances in brain chemicals, including serotonin, may trigger the formation of neuropeptides, which travel to the outer covering of the brain known as the meninges, causing pain. The World Health Organization estimates that more than one billion people will get a migraine at some point in their lives.

Women are more prone to migraines, possibly due to hormonal fluctuations. In fact, many migraines are triggered by certain situations or conditions. Menstruation is a common trigger of migraines. Here are some other common triggers:

Stressful situations may cause both mental and physical responses in the body, which can trigger migraines.

Stress: Stressful situations may cause both mental and physical responses in the body, which can trigger migraines.

Foods: Caffeinated products, monosodium glutamate, alcohol, aged cheeses, and even salty foods can bring on a migraine in some people.

Environmental changes: Migraines may be triggered by the weather and changes in barometric pressure.

Sights, smells, and sounds: Perfumes, unpleasant aromas, bright sunlight, or even loud noises may be the causes of migraines in some people.

Medications: Some medicines, such as nitroglycerin, are known to cause migraines.

Symptoms of migraines

When a person has a migraine, he or she is likely to report a throbbing pain on one side of his or her head. But the pain may be on both sides of the head, too. Also, the pain may switch sides and doesn't necessarily have to occur on the same side each and every time a migraine occurs. Many people report blurred vision, tunnel vision, or a temporary blind spot as part of the symptoms of a migraine. Sensitivity to light is common, as is accompanying nausea. For some the nausea is so severe it leads to vomiting.

Some people find they are able to predict when a migraine is coming. Seeing stars, zigzag lines, or bright spots and colors called "auras" can often be warning signs that a migraine is coming on.

Get to the bottom of painful headaches


Headaches cannot all be traced back to the same cause. Recent scientific research has determined that headaches may be the result of several factors, and that not everyone experiences headaches in the same way. This can make finding headache relief a bit more challenging.

Diet, physiology, and individual lifestyle and habits can all play a significant role in headaches. Scientists used to believe that headaches were the result of the dilation of blood vessels in the nervous system. The tension created pain and the subsequent relaxation caused throbbing. While blood vessels may play a role, they're not the single cause of headaches. Here is a look at the more common types and triggers.

Migraine

percent of all headaches are migraine headaches. Migraine headaches result from a combination of blood vessel enlargement and the release of chemicals from nerve fibers that coil around these blood vessels. During the migraine, the temporal artery just under the skin on the temple enlarges. This causes a release of chemicals that cause inflammation, pain, and further enlargement of the artery



Migraines may be preceded by warning signs, such as sensitivity to light, flashing lights, nausea, and tingling.

Migraine triggers can result from a number of things. Smells, lights, foods, allergies, and other environmental factors can cause a migraine. In general, treating migraines involves prophylactic therapies designed to avoid triggers. Anti-inflammatory medications also may be used once a migraine is in full effect.

Sinus

Blocked sinuses (air-filled pockets around your eyes, nose, and cheeks) generally cause a throbbing headache known as a sinus headache. It is located in the front of your head and face. Cold or damp weather can exacerbate sinus headaches, as can bending over.

Treatment of sinus conditions, such as using a decongestant or irrigating the nose, can help alleviate a sinus headache.

Continued from Page 16 our waterways are not able to cope with the climate as we know it.

"Antigua and Barbuda is known as a dry weather country and so we design our homes, our roads and our lives around that reality. But today it's getting worse and we experience flooding that Antiguans never knew or experienced before," she added.

Black-Layne, who is also the chief environmental officer here, explained that the authorities have undertaken many initiatives in planning for climate change but did not have the funding for adaptation measures.

'Starting in 2016, just to get prepared to adapt to climate change, we will need to spend 40 to 50 million East Caribbean dollars a year," she said.

"Political will is not what we lack here in Antigua and Barbuda. We lack financing and low cost financing which is something that we are now working on aggressively."

Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister. Baldwin Spencer, who is the present chairman of OECS, boats of an outstanding record on recognising the importance and taking action on climate change.

But he said Antigua and other SIDS face challenges

originating from their small size and economies, geographical location, limited infrastructure and high vulnerability to environmental disasters.

Spencer said these challenges are exacerbated by the projected impacts of global climate change coupled with increasing competition for limited resources, which combine to erode the ability of member states to meet their development aspirations on a sustainable basis.

"This reality was manifested between the evening of Dec. 24 and the morning of the Dec. 25, 2013 when severe rains and high winds impacted significantly on the islands of St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines and to a lesser extent Dominica, resulting in dozens of lives lost," Spencer told IPS.

The government of St. Vincent and the Grenadines declared a national level two disaster. In its rapid damage and loss assessment of Jan. 16, it reported total damages and losses of at least 279.3 million East Caribbean dollars, equivalent to 15 percent of the country's GDP. Most of the damage sustained was in the infrastructure sector, placed at some 97 percent; followed by the social sector, three percent.

needs assessment estimated that the total impact on the economy was at 224.7 million East Caribbean dollars in damage and losses to physical assets.

"While this represents a moderate 6.3 percent of GDP, the severe infrastructure, environmental and social fallout, coupled with the cumulative effect from the recent 2010 battering by hurricane Tomas means that in reality the impact was significant," Spencer said.

In its most recent fifth assessment report, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change stated that it has long been recognised that greenhouse gas emissions from small islands are negligible in relation to global emissions but that the threats of climate change and rising sea levels are very real to small islands.

"There is no doubt that on the whole the impacts of climate change on small islands will have serious negative effects especially on socio-economic conditions and bio physical resources including the land," Spencer said.

The number of hurricanes passing through the

Caribbean has risen from about five percent in the early 20th century to more than 25 in part of the 21st century.

"One study prepared for the World Bank estimates the potential economic impact of such related climate change on CARI-COM [Caribbean Community] countries could be as much as 10 billion dollars," he said.

The EU funding is being made available through its Global Climate Change Alliance (GCCA) project.

In the Caribbean, the GCCA is active in Jamaica, Belize, and Guyana as well as within the Caribbean Community Climate Change Centre.

Barford hopes the project will strengthen the bonds between the EU and the OECS countries in the joint efforts in international climate change negotiations.


"There is clear evidence that climate change is having an effect on the region," Barford pointed out. He said that only recently, two OECS member states, St. Lucia as well as St. Vincent and the Grenadines, signalled that they had severe water problems.

Wolverine travels back in time to save the future

"X-Men: Days of Future Past" represents the seventh episode in the storied mutant series, and is the third directed by Bryan Singer who also helmed X-Men 1 and 2. This installment is loosely based on the 1981 Marvel Comics (issues #141-142) of the same name, a convoluted tale in which one of the superheroes is sent back in time to prevent an impending disaster threatening the present.

The story unfolds in a dystopian future where we find a race of robots called Sentinels slaying mutants and subjugating humanity. X-Men founder/leader/brain of the operation Dr. Charles Xavier (Patrick Stewart) summons his surviving protégés to a meeting in a monastery in China to hatch a plan to preserve the planet.

With the help of "phasing" Shadowcat's (Ellen Page) quantum tunneling ability, Wolverine (Hugh Jackman) slips through a portal to a parallel universe in 1973. His mission there is to stop fellow mutant Mystique (Jennifer Lawrence) from murdering Trask (Peter Dinklage), the diabolical genius who invented the Sentinels.

Why would you want a vanquished villain to be reincarnated? Don't ask. After all, that's one of the easier leaps of faith this flick's farfetched plot expects you to make. If you need a plausible plot, then you

might be too close-minded for this imaginative sci-fi.

Try on for size the novel notion that President Kennedy was killed "because he was one of us." OK, let's see, so JFK was assassinated for being a mutant? Why not? Just a couple of years ago we learned from another movie that Abraham Lincoln was a vampire slayer. Revisionist history? Or little known fact? You be the judge. What's next, Dwight Eisenhower as an alien?

But I digress. Fortunately, X-Men 7 audience members will be very richly rewarded for taking flights of fancy, provided they succeed in suspending their disbelief. Don't try to make sense, for instance, about how you go back in time, reverse a long-deceased person's demise, and not simultaneously unravel myriad aspects of reality which have already subsequently transpired. "Playing Asagai on Broadway is satisfying for me as an actor,' noted Thomas who no doubt was born for this role in "A Raisin in the Sun." He was nominated for an Image Award in 2009, for Outstanding Actor in a mini series.

Thomas said he never had the desire to become an engineer like his father. "I was never a math and science guy. I did o.k. with B's, but I was more enthusiastic about history and English.

In an exclusive telephone interview from his New York location recently, Thomas recalled that his parents made education a top priority in his Guyanese household.

His mother, Chervl, a retired financial analyst, and father Carlton, an engineer, who both worked for DuPont, celebrated with loud applause when "you brought home a good report card, a diploma from a graduating class, or an award," the actor added.

"My father was very disciplined, very focused, and he took his job of being a dad seriously."

There was never a day where felt he wasn't thinking about my siblings and me. He taught us how to improve our lives for adulthood," said the actor whose dance steps alongside actress Julia Styles in "Save The Last Dance"

Thomas' triumphant acting career has no doubt satisfied his mom, who wanted him to become a lawyer.

"I am grateful that she did resist that I wanted to do something else. She allowed me to try acting to see how it would play out."

Today, his mother could not be more proud of his success. But despite his enormous accomplish-

ments, the illustrious actor says he stays close to his Guyanese relatives, even picking up his favorite Guvanese foods: Roti and Curry, Tennis Rolls and Pepperpot, when he visits his aunt Lynn in Brooklyn.

The 43-year-old intensely focused actor said, "It would be nice to receive an award for my work. But I act because I love doing it. I am satisfied just working to support my family, and becoming a better actor than I am today."



Howard U partners with medical mission to Haiti

"We have about eight Haitiandescent students participating who have never been to Haiti," reports Howard University Department of Medicine Chair Dr. Shelly McDonald-Pinkett, of the upcoming, late June, medical mission to Haiti. "Their parents are very excited, enthusiastic, and they encourage their participation."

Howard University Medical School is collaborating for the third year with NOAH NY's annual medical service trips to northern Haiti. These trips are part the organization's long-term commitment of medical treatment (including professional trainings and physical education) to the people Ft. Liberté.

"Some students are second or third generation Haitian and have never been to Haiti," says Dr. McDonald-Pinkett. "For some, it's a sense of social commitment, others like to travel, and a few have never travelled outside of the country and this is a great

opportunity with a good support network."

The Department chair explained that last year; the Howard medical group saw 150 patients the first day. During their time in Ft. Liberté, the surgical team performed hernia repairs; surgically set a broken arm, performed hysterectomies, and delivered babies.

The medical team handled patients with hypertension- many

previously untreated, and treated and dispensed WHO-approved medications for a number of local residents with diabetes, many advanced. In the pediatric realm, malnutrition and skin disorders due to bad water were common.

This year, 50 Howard University students, along with 10 of the university's doctors, faculty and other staff will join the NOAH NY 85-member team – including 25 doctors– for the nine-day trip. Among this year's post-grad residents, there will also be three nursing students, a pharmacist, and a physician-assistant.

Embedded in the Howard Medical School curriculum, the time at the Ft. Liberté hospital is part of the students' training rotation in the areas of internal medicine, OB-GYN, pediatrics, and surgery.

"The Howard group to Haiti is designed to look like our hospital teams of students, residents and faculty when they're doing their clinicals," says Dr. McDonald-Pinkett, returning for her fifth time.

Caribbean 'smart' classrooms launched

A series of technologically advanced classrooms designed to benefit thousands of students and educators in schools across the Caribbean has been launched following a commitment from international telecommunications company Samsung to the Organization of American States (OAS) and Virtual Educa.

The OAS said the initiative follows the lead taken by the government of Trinidad and Tobago and its Ministry of Education to establish "smart" classrooms in partnership with domestic and international information and communication technology (ICT) partners.


"What Trinidad & Tobago is doing is commendable," said OAS Assistant Secretary General, Albert Ramdin, who was in Trinidad and Tobago to launch the seconnd Edition of Virtual Educa Caribbean.


"They have sourced partnerships with the private sector, they have been persistent with their follow up and execution, and now they are sharing their experiences and best practices with neighbors in the region," he added. "This is a practical model, and the OAS and Virtual Educa support this initiative."

The OAS said more than 16,000 students and educators attended the two-day event earlier this week. In addressing stakeholders at the opening ceremony, Ramdin said he was pleased to note that education continued to be a priority in the Caribbean, and called on stakeholders across the political divide to continue to work together to ensure the education system produced "analytical, critical and creative thinkers, able to compete with counterparts from around the world."

Ramdin also called for more "effective and practical methods to assess student progress," saying that "coping mechanisms have become critical in today's high pressure environment."

He also suggested the consideration of specific Caribbean Development goals and more collaboration at the Inter-American level to "effectively pool, assess, recommend and source assistance for education projects, through a specialized agency."

"I think we cannot close our eyes [to selling citizenship], because it's an option we may have to consider," it quoted Anthony as saying.

The Monitor said countries that offer economic citizenship do not release the number of applicants or approval rates.

Nuri Katz, president of APEX Capital Group, a US consultancy, estimates that between 15,000 and 20,000 people apply annually for second passports.

Pushed by political turmoil, or seeking a passport that requires fewer travel visas, the Monitor said applicants come from around the world, especially Russia, the Middle East and Asia.

It said a passport from St. Kitts offers visa-free travel to more than 120 countries.

Dwyer Astaphan, a former St. Kitts and Nevis minister of national security who now works as a citizenship lawyer, estimates

the program generates tens of millions of dollars for the country.

But Astaphan, according to the Monitor, conceded that "we don't know where the money goes."

Still, the investment "is an economic vitamin b-12 shot for a country our size," he told the Monitor.

The Monitor said a surge of new countries offering such programs has raised concerns over abuses.

Earlier this week, the U.S. Treasury's Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (Fin-CEN) office advised international financial institutions to more closely review dealings with clients using a St. Kitts and Nevis passport, stating that certain foreign individuals are abusing the Citizenship-by-Investment program to obtain passports for the purpose of engaging in illicit financial activity.

"Financial institutions can mitigate exposure to such risk through customer due diligence, including risk-based identity verification consistent with existing customer identification program requirements," it said.

"FinCEN believes that illicit actors are abusing this program to acquire SKN (St. Kitts and Nevis) citizenship in order to mask their identity and geographic background for the purpose of evading U.S. or international sanctions or engaging in other financial crime," it added.

For example, FinCEN said it believes that several Iranian nationals designated by the U.S. Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) have obtained passports issued through the SKN Citizenship-by-Investment program.

"While many countries offer programs similar to the SKN Citizenship-by-Investment program, the SKN program is attractive to illicit actors because the program, as administered, maintains lax controls as to who may be granted citizenship," FinCEN said.

While the SKN government has publicly pledged to improve these controls, FinCEN said it believes that "they remain ineffective."

For example, in 2013, it said the SKN government announced that all Iranian nationals were suspended from participating in the SKN Citizenship-by-Investment program.

But, despite this public assurance, FinCEN said it believes that Iranian nationals continue to obtain passports issued through the program.

"As a result of these lax controls, illicit actors, including individuals intending to use the secondary citizenship to evade sanctions, can obtain an SKN passport with relative ease," it said.

Prime Minister Dr. Denzil Douglas, however, told a press briefing: "We are evaluating what, if any changes should be made to our global program."

At the same time, Astaphan told the Monitor that he feared such scandals "are hurting the country's reputation and that eventually European countries will say, 'we have to review these visa agreements.'

"And that will ruin it," he said.

He said the group provides three scholarships for children of Caribbean parentage to attend U.S. colleges, bringing the total to 15 awards over the last five years.

CAMSA has also participated in three health missions to Jamaica, St. Lucia and Guyana, Hutchinson said.

In August last year, he said CAMSA collaborated with the New York Caribbean Community (CARI-COM) consulates and the Brooklyn-based Caribbean Nurses Association (CANA) in hosting a health fair at the Holy Cross Parish School in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn.

A month later, CAMSA collaborated with the Barbados Cancer Association U.S.A. (BACA), Inc. in sponsoring a cancer symposium at Kingsbrook Jewish Medical Center in Brooklyn, Hutchinson said.

This August, he said CAMSA is again partnering with the CARICOM Consulates in New York, as well as Caribbean American Nurses Association and Caribbean Women's Health to sponsor a back-to-school fair.

Hutchinson said CAMSA was formed by a group of doctors of Caribbean descent, "who wanted to improve health care for the Caribbean community both locally and in the Caribbean, as well as to give back to the Caribbean countries from which they had derived so much."

He said the group's membership is currently composed of both medical and non-medical professionals, and "reflects the rich diversity of the Caribbean Basin with members from the English, French, Spanish and Dutch Caribbean."

Hutchison said CAMSA was formally incorporated in 2003 as a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization (tax ID 16-1673235).

"The success of the association is due to the hardworking and committed members who volunteer their time and resources in the spirit of giving back to the people and governments of our respective home countries," he said.

As MLS all-time leading goal scorer

Landon Donovan was dropped from the USA World Cup preliminary squad and responded in the big way that a professional should -- by putting the doubts about his scoring ability to rest. The USA all-time scorer with 57 goals in over 100 appearances became the MLS all-time leading goal scorer with his 136th goal. Donovan passed Jamaican-born and former U.S. international Jeff Cunningham, who scored 135 in a long and illustrious career.

Donovan, playing in his 311th MLS contest in his 14th season, scored twice in host Los Angeles Galaxy's 4-1 win over the Philadelphia Union on Sunday night at Stub Hub Center and was voted Player-of-the-Week for his efforts.

RED BULLS LOSE AND DRAW

The New York Red Bulls had mixed results this week as it lost to the Portland timbers, 2-0, on Saturday night and then tying, 1-1, at Sporting Kansas City on Tuesday night. On Saturday, Forward Maximiliano Urruti (45th, 74th) scored twice to lead the Timbers to victory at Red Bull Arena; Bradley Wright-Phillips (45th) had the lone goal for New York. On Tuesday night in Kansas City, the Red Bulls did well to rally from a 1-0 deficit to tie the game on Wright-Phillips' league-leading eleventh goal of the season.

In other MLS games last weekend, Real Salt Lake played to a goalless draw with FC Dallas and now has an MLS, 12-game unbeaten streak to start the season, in Rio Tinto Stadium; the streak at the start of the season puts RSL in good company as only the Los Angeles Galaxy teams in 1996 and 2010 and the 2000 Sporting Kansas City team have accomplished the feat.

Another tie occurred when the Vancouver Whitecaps and the Seattle Sounders played to a 2-2 draw. Chad Barrett's header put the Sounders ahead in the 39th minute, but Erik Hurtado equalized for Vancouver; Gershon Koffie squared the game again for Seattle and Gonzalo Pineda tied the score. Host New England Revolution, leading the Eastern Conference, defeated the much improved DC United. 2-1. at Gillette Stadium; Patrick Mullins and Kelyn Rowe scored for the Revs, while Fabian Espindola tallied for DC United.

The Columbus Crew knocked off the Chicago Fire, 2-0, at Crew Stadium; Ethan Finlay and Jairo Arrieta scored for the winners.

US WINS

The USA men's national team scored two late goals to top Azerbaijan, 2-0, in a friendly international at Candlestick Park in San Francisco on Tuesday night. The game was the first of three in a sendingoff series before the U.S. meets Ghana, Portugal and Germany in group play at the World Cup, which kicks off in Brazil on Thursday, June 12.

Continued from page 39 ing. She along with Chris LaCaopa and Bill Wiese were the last members of the original Mayor's Cup committee, which started in 1988.

"A number of years ago Claudette missed a number of years of being on the committee and being the referee of the tournament because of a health related issue," Wiese recently said. "She came back ... and continued. She had a lot of courage. She never let the committee other than one person understand the extent of her illness."

"She made it a point that she would be on our Mayor's Cup committee in 2013. By time it got to the Mayor's Cup, she was hospitalized and she couldn't come and participate. We kept her in touch with what was happening with the Mayor's Cup. We didn't realize how poorly she was doing."

"Last June 22, Townsend passed away from serious heart issues," according to Shelly Reznick, chief umpire for this year's Mayor's Cup tournament.

The New York Junior Tennis & Learning Program will be giving an award to an individual to honor her memory at the conclusion of the boy's' singles final, which will be held on Sunday, June 8 at the USTA National Tennis Center.

"We set up an award in her memory...and it will be a camp scholarship based on sportsmanship and academic accomplishments," continued Wiese. "She was a wonderful person." In addition to tennis, she was a New York City Board of Education teacher.

The recipient will receive a plaque with Claudette's name on it. (All the details have not as yet been finalized.

Wiese recalls one highlight that stands out in his mind about his 'teammate' in various tournaments and programs.

"One day I was fortunate enough to be in the grandstand with a reserve seat at the US Open," he recalled. "Claudette was officiating a match. I hadn't signed her referee certification for the Mayor's Cup. On a change-over she walked across the court and had me sign it. Probably it was a highlight of my tennis life...What ever type of person would do that just to make another person feel good..."

As for the upcoming Mayor's Cup competition, there will be nine instead of eight varsity teams, eight middle school teams, and eight girl's varsity teams Beacon is top seeded for the boy's varsity. But, one can not count out Cardozo. In addition, there will be about 350 individuals competing in the singles and doubles competition.

Prior to the Mayor's Cup competition, New York Junior Tennis & Learning conducted after school and weekend programs for youngsters of any age. This tennis organization also started an advanced training program in 1986 with the cooperation of other sites, including the USTA National Tennis Center, in Flushing Meadow Park. There were two tryouts for the winter and springsummer programs.

One was staged last Saturday on the Memorial Day weekend at Crotona Park in the Bronx, and it drew many youngsters from the five boroughs.

"The kids who make the team get free training for an eight-week period of five days during the summer," added Wiese. "A second tryout will be held on the Labor Day weekend for the indoor season. Children will receive training at different clubs throughout the City, including the USTA National Tennis Center. We don't have a training location in Brooklyn."

For instance, the advanced training program had 80 participants during the winter. They go on the court, do drills with and without their racquet, run, hit backhands and forehands, and try to serve better. They try to improve on their weaknesses. And they are competing under the direction and coaching of staff members.

Left-arm spinner Sulieman Benn has the correct mixture as a bowler to create problems for New Zealand batsmen. He turns the ball frequently and often deceives batsmen in playing to the wrong line of the ball. West Indies' mixture of spin - both left and right, should create some momentum.

West Indies Test Captain Denesh Ramdin is very unique in moving bowlers around and keeping pressure on the opposition. New Zealand batting is strong and Ramdin must get his bowlers to pick up early wickets and keep the opposition under pressure.




