
# SVG laments antipathy against SIDS



At least four Caribbean heads of governments, legal representatives from Europe, academics from around the world and civil society activists are to attend a key preparatory meeting in Antigua next month to prepare the region's case to make European nations pay compensation for the Trans Atlantic slave trade officials said this week.

Caribbean governments in July, through Barbadian Prime Minister Freundel Stuart, formally wrote to countries like Britain, Spain, France and The Netherlands demanding a high level summit to set the stage for compensation payments with Europe before the end of this year or early



#### Antigua

Antigua and Barbuda is hoping that China will provide US\$18 million towards the expansion of the Five Islands Secondary School to the University College Antigua.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne, who was on an official visit to Beijing, has officially informed the principals of China Civil Engineering Construction Corporation (CCECC) of the intention of his government regarding the facility, according to a

government statement. It said prior to leaving Antigua, Prime Minister Browne toured the facilities at Five Islands with Chinese Ambassador Ren Gongping and noted that the new proposal will include student dorms, an expanded

library, expanded ICT facility, Olympic size swimming pool and tennis courts.

Prime Minister

Browne said he has already started talks with the University of the West Indies (UWI) on establishing the local university and that the government will be appointing a National Committee with a corresponding committee from the UWI to produce a proposal for collaboration and timeframe for implementation.

The statement said that Prime Minister Bowne is expected to finalize the agreement for US\$18 million towards the expansion of the facility of Five Islands.

#### Bahamas



#### Grenada

The Grenada senate has given the green light to legislation governing casino gambling that the government said would further enhance the vital tourism industry.

The Senate recently followed the Lower House that last month unanimously approved the legislation that would provide certain guidelines for casino gambling in Grenada.

"Now that we have approval from both Houses for the bill, the process is not yet complete as it has to receive



Economic and Planning Minister Oliver Joseph told the media during the weekly post-cabinet meeting.

The legislation makes it an offense for Grenadians to participate in gambling activities.

The legislation notes that only hotels with more than 300 rooms can apply for a license to offer casino gaming as part of its entertainment package. The casino facility must be on the same compound with the hotel.

### Guyana

The main opposition grouping A Partnership for National Unity (APNU) has called on President Donald Ramoutar to do more than talk in dealing with the illegal drug trade in Guyana.

"He must become personally involved in directing the war on illegal narcotics which, apparently, are now being exported on an industrial scale. The president's response to the recent discovery of a selfpropelled semi-submarine marine vessel in the Barima-Waini Region is deeply disturbing," the APNU said in a statement.

Ramoutar was quoted in the Gov-

ernment Information Agency (GINA) as saying

that the government will spend "whatever neces-

sary" to deal with the illegal drug trade.

"We have limited resources and we have competing areas that we want to put our money into," Ramoutar said.

But APNU describe the statement as "weak" adding "it ignores the facts, that for two decades the People's Progressive Party/Civic (PP/C) has failed to curb trafficking in illegal narcotics.

The APNU said it was calling on President Ramoutar to "immediately execute a credible national drug strategy master plan; establish an effective national enforcement structure; enforce current legislation vigorously; and equip the security forces with the assets to curb the trade."

#### Jamaica

Jamaica says it expects to receive US\$71 million from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) as the government continues to meet key economic objectives outlined in a four-year deal.

Finance Minister Peter Phillip says the IMF recently finished a fifth review of the country's economic performance.

He said officials will continue to reduce debt and reform the tax and labor market sec-

tors, among other things.

Jamaica's government said in a statement that it

has so far secured US\$44 million in funding in the first year of a US\$930 million loan package with

the Washington-based financial institution.

#### Jamaica

The London-based Privy Council has granted leave to convicted hijacker Stephen Fray, to appeal his 83-year jail term for the attempted hijacking of a Canadian aircraft in the western city of Montego Bay in 2009.

Fray's legal team is contending that medical evidence of his mental disorder was rejected and the standard used to judge his mental condition had bene outdated.

They argued that a narrow approach was taken in assessing his true mental state, and this error resulted in the conviction.

Fray was convicted in October 2009, one eight counts for illegal possession of firearm, shooting with intent, assault at common law and breaches of the Airport Act, arising from the attempted hijacking.

Although sentenced to 83 years, Fray is to serve 20 years because the sentences are to

run concurrent. Fray lost his appeal in Jamaica in 2011, to have



the sentence and conviction overturned.

However. Frav and his attorney have maintained that he was mentally ill in April 2009, when he attempted to hijack the Canjet flight with 159 passengers and crew at the Sangster International Airport with a loaded gun.

#### St. Lucia

The European Union (EU) has provided St. Lucia with EC\$ 14.3 million worth of diagnostic equipment for the new National Hospital

The donation is the first phase of the EU's total contribution to the hospital, valued at EC\$32 million.

The pieces of equipment installed and tested so far are CT scanners, a mammography system and the general x-rav unit.

Part of the equipping agreement

is for the suppliers to provide training to the technicians who will be responsible for the



maintenance of the equipment as well as the end-users. The training is ongoing for the

teams from the Victoria Hospital in the capital.

# Caribbean countries discuss reparations

**Continued from cover** next year to discuss its collective push for reparations. Stuart is the lead regional prime minister on reparations.

Regional reparations activist Eric Phillips said that details about such the Caribbean-Europe conference are to be announced at the Antigua three day meeting starting on Oct. 12.

The meeting is being billed as an experts conference and already representatives from Britain, Denmark, France and other countries have indicated plans to attend, signalling some interest in hearing what the Caribbean has to say about its claim.


In July, British legislators invited, Sir Hilary Beckles, the principal of the University of the West Indies' Barbados Campus and head of the regional reparations commission to make the case before the British House of Commons on the reparations issue. His presentation was reportedly well received and ended with a standing ovation among MP's.

Phillips dubbed the invitation from Britain "as an indication" that the case is being taken seriously and that a resolution could be found starting with the high level summit whenever it is held.

He said the leaders who have already hired the British law firm of Leigh Day law firm to push their case. The firm has become famous ever since winning a court ruling that forced Britain to compensate Kenyan tribesmen for genocide against them in the colonial era.

Its representatives have attended several high level meetings with CARICOM and other leaders and thinks there is a case to win here.

The mini mid October summit will refine a 10-point to challenge to Europe including argu-

ments that European planters were compensated for losing slaves after emancipation in the 1830s but not a cent was paid to those enslaved and have also refused to acknowledge that slavery was a crime among other complaints.

He also said that the meeting will refine plans to grow the reparations effort into a global movement that would include Americans Blacks and others living outside the region, saying that there would be no turning back to win compensation for the slave trade.

**Continued from cover** that Small Island States should be observers, and not participants, in important matters of international relations is self-evident in our underrepresentation or outright exclusion from the inner sancta of decisionmaking bodies on international security, economic cooperation, development finance or sustainable development.

"It is evident here today, in the deeply disappointing absence of high-level representation from many large and developed nations," he said, adding that the absence of "high-level representation" has "largely left us to talk among ourselves, to preach to the choir, at what is a vitally important international conference."

Gonsalves said these "slights beg the question of whether some powerful states would prefer that we subsist as full members of the U.N. in name only, enjoying the legal fiction of sovereign equality, while remaining observers to a geopolitical drama in which we can neither meaningfully act nor contribute to scripting the outcomes."

He, however, urged participating countries to "reject those jaundiced perspectives and state with clarity and confidence that our time is now.

"Not for an episodic, once-per-decade engagement, but for a sustained and sincere restructuring of an outmoded one-size-fitsall approach that serves to diminish our nobility and retard our developmental aspirations," he said.

The Vincentian foreign minister also called for an immediate end to what he described as "the practice of using per capita GDP (Gross Domestic Product) as an obstacle to any form of developmental assistance or relief to Small Island Developing States."


"Stripped of context, per capita GDP fails to capture the obvious vulnerabilities and developmental hurdles that confront us on a daily basis," he said, adding that "any serious analysis of our economic and developmental health must include structured evaluations of our vulnerability and resilience.

"It is only then that a truer picture of our needs and possibilities can emerge," Gonsalves continued. "The time for such a reform is now."

Similarly, he said the related realities of existing debt burdens require "urgent corrective attention."

Gonsalves said SIDS' developmental aspirations and manoeuvres are "straight-jacketed by an acute absence of fiscal space."

"How can we address myriad climate challenges, the transition to modern modes of production, the adoption of renewable energy, the strengthening of our social safety nets, or the equipping of our citizens to meet tomorrow's challenges, while managing a debt burden that is among the highest in the world?" he asked.

# Whopping \$700 media fee creates controversy

After 46 years of coverage of the annual West Indian American Day Associations annual festivities in Brooklyn, in an unprecedented action, the organizers required media individuals to pay a whopping \$700 in order to report on the activities.

The fee demanded reporters to pay \$700 for a five-day media accreditation to report on all the activities and also allowed a Labor Day pass for \$300. Any reporter or photographer wanting to report on Saturday's junior carnival would have had to dole out a \$200 fee and for all concerts held at the Brooklyn Museum, a \$100 money order would have to be made out to the organizers by August 20 in order to be approved.

Imposition of a fee caused dissent and may have hampered support from minority media unable to honor the steep cost imposed by the organizers.

Allegedly, the fee was imposed in order to "control" negative press reports which "tarnish the intent and reputation" of the carnival.

Although some of the board members refuse to talk on the record about the 2014 demand, many claim they were "totally against" the idea of charging press to cover the event. Blame has been fully positioned on the

new leader William Howard who is allegedly not rooted in Caribbean culture but has a record of aligning himself with politicians and maintains that the new ruling will enhance the profile of the 47th annual celebration of Caribbean heritage.

Historically, predominantly covered by independent and minority media, the four days of concerts and activities preceding the holiday are virtually ignored by traditional media. They include - Junior Carnival, Brass Fest, Steel Band Panorama and Dimanche Gras. In latter years commercial television, radio and print have spotlighted the Labor Day spectacle, which allegedly attracts upwards of two million spectators to the Crown Crown Heights section of Brooklyn. However, coverage has either been limited to the one Labor Day parade and historically alleged to highlight negative behavior, crime and at times unrelated felonious activity throughout the area and at times in remote areas from the Eastern Parkway area. Hakim Mutlaq, a freelance photographer wrote: "I would be remiss if I did not speak to what I see as a grave mistake" He said when he was sent the accreditation form he thought it was an "an internet hoax. It made no sense and it seemed like Continued on Page 14

# **Boosting resilience in the Caribbean countries**

UNITED NATIONS, Aug 26, 2014 (IPS) - Having lived and worked for more than a decade in four Caribbean countries, I have witnessed first hand how Small Island Developing States (SIDS) are extremely vulnerable to challenges ranging from debt and unemployment to climate change and sea level rise.

Such aspects make their paths towards sustainable development probably more complex than non-SIDS countries. That was my experience, working closely with governments, civil society organisations and the people of Belize, Cuba, Guyana and Haiti - where I led the **U.N.** Development Programme's (UNDP) reconstruction efforts after the devastating January 2010 earthquake.

That's why the upcoming UN Conference on Small Island Developing States (SIDS), taking place in Samoa, Sep. 1-4 is so important. It will provide an opportunity to increase international cooperation and knowledge sharing between and within regions. And it takes place at a key moment, ahead of the Climate Change Summit at the UN General Assembly, to be held on Sep. 23.

Climate change-and all natural hazards, in fact—hit Small Island Developing States hard, even though these countries haven't historically contributed to the problem. Extreme exposure to disasters such as flooding, hurricanes, droughts, landslides and earthquakes place these countries at a particularly vulnerable position.

In the Caribbean, two key sectors, agriculture and tourism, which are crucial for these countries' economies, are especially exposed. Agriculture provides 20 percent of total employ-

ment in the Caribbean. In some countries, like Haiti and Grenada, half of the total jobs depends on agriculture. Moreover, travel and tourism accounted for 14 percent of Caribbean countries' Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2013 - the highest for any region in the world.

According to Jamaica's Ministry of Water, Land, Environment and Climate Change, during the period 2000-2010 the country was impacted by 10 extreme weather events which have led the country to lose around two percent of its GDP per year. Moreover, sea levels have risen 0.9 mm per year, according to official figures. This causes Jamaicans, who live largely on the coast, not only to lose their beaches, but it also increases salinity in fresh waters and farming soil.

Also, when I visited Jamaica in July, the country was facing one of the worst droughts in its history. This had already led to a significant fall in agricultural production, higher food imports, increased food prices and a larger number of bush fires - which in turn destroy farms and forested areas.

Clearly, if countries do not reduce their vulnerabilities and strengthen their resilience – not only to natural disasters but also to financial crises - we won't be able to guarantee, let alone expand, progress in the

social, economic and environmental realms.

Preparedness is essentialand international cooperation plays a key role. UNDP is working closely with governments and societies in the Caribbean to integrate climate change considerations in planning and policy. This means investing in climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction and preparedness, particularly in the most vulnerable communities and sectors.

In Guyana and Trinidad & Tobago, where I also met recently with key authorities, UNDP is working with the government to enhance climate change preparedness on three fronts: agriculture, natural disasters and promoting the use of renewable energy resources, which is critical to reduce the dependency on imported fossil fuels.

Knowledge-sharing between and within regions is also vital. UNDP has been working with governments in the Caribbean to share a successful practice that began in Cuba in 2005. The initiative, the Risk Reduction Management Centres, supports local governments' pivotal role in the civil defence system.

In addition, experts from different agencies collaborate to map disaster-prone areas, analyse risk and help decisionmaking at the municipal level. Importantly, each Centre is also linked up with vulnerable communities through early warning teams, which serve as the Centre's "tentacles", to increase awareness and safeguard people and economic resources.

This model has been adapted and is being rolled out in the British Virgin Islands, Dominican Republic, Guyana, Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago.

# Unpardonable 'dis' of the steel band culture

The lineup of activities for the 2014 Labor Day weekend West Indian Carnival is history. And, like a couple of years ago when we were constrained to make scathing reference to the appearance in the Eastern Parkway parade of a few female exhibitionists who brought the skimpy-costume fad to levels of gross indecency, so was there this year reason for taking exception, this time to a patently poor-taste move on the part of the organizers. The Steel Band Panorama contest providing backdrop for the off-color display this time around.

Just a day or two before last Saturday's Panorama, it was revealed that the high command of the West Indian American Day Carnival Association (WIADCA), organizers of Labor Day weekend activity, had denied credentials to cover the event to When Steel Talks, the most important and comprehensive forum the steel band community, world-wide, has ever had. Given the reputation When Steel Talks has established, the international acclaim it has garnered, one would have to set a really high bar, as far as any justification trumpeted by WIADCA for such dastardly action passing muster. Immediately upon

learning of WIADCA's disrespect toward When Steel Talks -- and by extension every member of the pan music fraternity -- I reached out to the owner-operator of the web site to convey how abhorrent I though the WIADCA action to be. And I said that barring some transgression by When Steel Talks of "an unbelievably egregious nature," I failed to see what WIADCA could possibly offer by way of validating what smacked of petty, truculent behavior.

WIADCA's beef with When Steel Talks, reportedly, was comment critical of WIADCA that had previously appeared on the site. Whether or not that's an "accusation" that can withstand scrutiny. what the hell difference does it make? Firstly, When Steel Talks is as legit a media entity as any of the countless Internet sites geared to inform, educate, etc. Victimizing the site because of published material that WIADCA viewed as negative equates with an American president banning the Washington Post from White House news conferences because of something written in the Post that the president didn't like. If there's some hint here that WIADCA doesn't much care for media criticism,



then it's in the wrong place doing the wrong thing. But more importantly, WIADCA's kick in the butt to When Steel Talks totally disregarded the immense value the forum has been to the steel band world. And in consciously ignoring this, WIADCA's conduct betrayed a dumfounding insensitivity, to the point even of forgetting that steel bands were the reason the largest Labor Day weekend crowds annually gathered in back of the Brooklyn Museum on a Labor Day Saturday night.

If the organizing body chose not to acknowledge the critical importance of steel bands in the Labor Day weekend mix, it's unfortunate that the bands themselves, via the organization that represents a bunch of them, were involuntary contributors to the insult. Martin Douglas, president of the United States Steelband Association, told When Steel Talks, after his efforts to secure credentials for them had

failed, that he was "powerless" to bring about a reversal of WIAD-CA's edict. Douglas is a guy whose head seems to be screwed on altogether right, with his heart also in the right place. But sorry, Martin. You and the steel bands are hardly "powerless." Grousing about Panorama prize money, practice-yard problems and all the rest are all perfectly fine. Equally important, perhaps even more so, is the obligation to stand up for principle when comes the time. The kingsize "diss" of the pan culture that was the insufferable treatment meted out to When Steel Talks was just such an opportunity to take a principled stand and dramatize it in any number of ways. Let's hope that the 2014 experience for steel bands in these parts can be made to include an acute awareness of all else that matters beyond practice and performance.

In fairness, it would be in poor taste if we neglected to honor in this space the thankless service rendered by the people of WIAD-CA. There is undoubtedly tremendous dedication within the ranks, folks driven by an unbreakable bond with their cultural roots and wedded to the vision of the late Carlos Lezama, and Rufus Gorin before him, of an annual outpouring of unbridled Caribbean pride. Clearly, the undertaking has today assumed proportions that would astound those early dreamers. Clearly, too, with growth has come a litany of bedeviling problems. Given how we tend to roll, those of us not saddled with the responsibility of delivering this yearly bonanza, empathy for head-scratching planners isn't likely to be out among us in copious supply. Having said that, though, there should be no condoning either of ill-advised (and seriously consequential) knee-jerk responses, or actions seemingly spawned by vindictiveness, or being punitive when going there is an outrage, or whatever else motivated WIADCA's reach into the bowels of ugly to short-circuit When Steel Talks. It ought be condemned.

The Labor Day weekend celebration is suggestive of communal sharing. We're veering onto toxic ground if there begins to be troubling indicators of the event being used to sow seeds of disharmony, rather than the unison that is central to its raison d'etre.

## African-American and Latino individuals who are or were employed as New York City public school teachers and who failed the Liberal Arts and Sciences Test on or before February 13, 2004, may be eligible for money and other relief

- A Federal court ruled that the New York City Department of Education ("DOE") (formerly the Board of Education) discriminated against African-American and Latino teachers who either lost or were denied a permanent teaching appointment as a result of failing an administration of the Liberal Arts and Sciences Test ("LAST") prior to February 13, 2004.
- The Court certified a class of plaintiffs for monetary and other individual relief, such as restoration of in-system seniority (the "Class").
- > You have a choice to either stay in the Class or not, but you must decide this now.
- <u>Option 1:</u> You may choose to remain in the class and be represented by Class Counsel. You will be
  entitled to share in any settlement or recovery on behalf of the Class. You will be legally bound by all
  orders and judgments of the Court and will not be able to file a separate lawsuit for the same conduct
  alleged in this case.
- <u>Option 2:</u> You can remain in the Class and hire your own counsel at your expense. At this time you are represented by the Class Counsel.
- <u>Option 3:</u> You may ask to be excluded from the Class, in which case you will not be entitled to share in any settlement or recovery obtained on behalf of the Class, but you will have the right to file your own suit for monetary relief.
- To exclude yourself from the Class you must send a letter postmarked no later than September 15, 2014, with your (i) name, (ii) address, (iii) telephone number, (iv) signature, and (v) say you want to be excluded from Gulino v. BOE. Send the letter to Gulino v. Board of Education, PO Box 9000 #6543, Merrick, NY 11566-9000.
- If you choose to remain in the Class, you must submit a claim form in order to be eligible for monetary and other individual relief.

In Jamaica, for example, in hazard-prone St Catherine's Parish on the outskirts of Kingston, a team has been implementing the country's first such Centre, mapping vulnerable areas and training community leaders to play a central role in the disaster preparation and risk reduction system.

In Old Harbor Bay, a fishing community of 7,000 inhabitants, UNDP, together with the government of Jamaica, has provided emergency equipment and train-

ing for better preparation and evacuation when hurricanes or other disasters strike.

Boosting preparedness and increasing resilience is an investment. In addition to saving lives, for every dollar spent in disaster preparedness and mitigation, seven dollars will be saved when a disaster strikes.

However, it is also crucial to address vulnerability matters beyond climate change or natural disasters. Small Island Developing Statesin the Caribbean and other regions- are often isolated from world trade and global finance. The international community needs to recognise and support this vulnerable group of countries, as they pave the way to more sustainable development.

After learning that the fee demand was in place, he was still in disbelief that "in the media capital of the world, in the year 2014, that we would find an organization attempting to charge press people for doing their jobs/covering an event."

"Now, the workings of the Fourth Estate may be mysterious to some but one does not have to go googleing to acknowledge the importance of it in many ways," Mutlaq wrote. He said "freedom of the press in a democratic society" was being violated.

Herman Hall, a former WIADCA board member, and publisher of Everybody's Magazine, A Caribbean monthly called the decision antiquated. In an article he titled "Dinosaur Leadership" Hall wrote:

"The West Indian-American Day Carnival Association (WIADCA), organizer of Brooklyn's Carnival on Labor Day Weekend in New York City, has a new chief. He is William Howard who was an aide to Carlos Lezama in the early 1970s when Lezama brought carnivalparade to Eastern Parkway.

Carnival was brought to Brooklyn from Harlem in

the late 1960s by the late Rufus Gorin.

"We are almost in 2015 when the yuppie and millennial generations are energized to govern and administer. So why is the carnival association going back to the age of the dinosaur to get a leader," one carnival bandleader quipped.

Howard is the first African-American with allegedly no Caribbean roots to head the carnival organization. He replaced Thomas Bailey who abruptly resigned."

Inquiries to the WIADCA president were not addressed at press time.

# Integrating climate, water policies

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Aug 27 2014 (IPS) - Concerned that climate change could lead to an intensification of the global hydrological cycle, Caribbean stakeholders are working to ensure it is included in the region's plans for Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM).

The basis of IWRM is that the many different uses of finite water resources are interdependent. High irrigation demands and polluted drainage flows from agriculture mean less freshwater for drinking or industrial use.

Contaminated municipal and industrial wastewater pollutes rivers and threatens ecosystems. If water has to be left in a river to protect fisheries and ecosystems, less can be diverted to grow crops.

Meanwhile, around the world, variability in climate conditions, coupled with new socioeconomic and environmental developments, have already started having major impacts.

The Global Water Partnership-Caribbean (GWP-C), which recently brought international and regional stakeholders together for a conference in Trinidad, is aimed at better understanding the climate system and the hydrological cycle and how they are changing; boosting awareness of the impacts of climate change on society, as well as the risk and uncertainty in the context of water and climate change and especially variability; and examining adaptation options in relation to water and climate change.

"Basically we're looking to integrate aspects of climate change and climate variability and adaptation into the Caribbean water sector," Natalie Boodram, programme manager of the Water, Climate and Development Programme (WACDEP), told IPS.

"And this is a very big deal for us because under predicted climate change scenarios we're looking at things like drier dry seasons, more intense hurricanes, **Continued on Page 35**



# Haitian American confident of winning 42nd AD

Haitian American District Leader for the 42nd State Assembly District in Brooklyn, Rodneyse Bichotte, is confident that she will win the seat vacated by the retired Rhoda Jacobs.

the people of AD42," added Bichotte, referring to the 42nd Assembly District that comprises the Brooklyn neighborhoods of Ditmas Park, Flatbush, Flatbush Gardens, Midwood, Prospect Park South and Terrace Gardens.

She said she has partnered with Flatbush Tenants Coalition to make affordable housing "a reality for the people of this district," stating that she wants to be "their voice in Albany.

"I know what it's like not to have an advocate," said Bichotte, the first Haitian American woman to hold elective office in New York City. "This ordeal has transformed me into the fighter that I am today.

"No candidate has been more focused on economic development, job opportunity for the Assembly district than me," she added, stating that the coalition of support and endorsement she has received includes that of Mayor Bill deBlasio.

Bichotte said the mayor's endorsement is "a testament to my proven leadership in the district."

Born and raised in Brooklyn, Bichotte said her "steadfast devotion to providing resources" in the district is demonstrated through her "ongoing involvement in the community," including delivering on the rehabilitation of Haiti by volunteering to help build 100 homes through Habitat for Humanity with President Jimmy Carter.

She said she is proud of her Haitian-American roots. Her father was the lead saxophonist of legendary Haitian jazz band, "Jazz Des Jeunes"; while her mother is considered to be a "matriarch" in the Haitian Caribbean community.

Both of Bichotte's parents were union members. Her mother is currently a retired member of the Hotel Trade Council Local 6 union. She worked as a housekeeper for 30 years.

Bichotte said she has been a dedicated public servant for over 20 years, and have

continuously worked on a number of initiatives on education.

She said she has lobbied against cuts in special education programs and funding for public schools.

Bichotte said she has also lobbied against tuition increase and universal Pre-K, busing residence in the Flatbush community - parents, seniors and students - to lobby Republican senators to vote for funding for full-day universal Pre-K.

She said her lobbying efforts in Albany and Washington also included issues on affordable housing and healthcare, minimum wage, the Dream Act, jobs and against hydro-fracking.

As a district leader, Bichotte said she has facilitated and sponsored a number of community events in Flatbush, such as the first Voter's Forum, promoting fair elections and voters' rights; held the largest mayoral and other candidate forum/debate in Brooklyn; conducted an annual senior luncheon; launched safety street initiatives; and held the largest funding forum in Brooklyn to help clergy and non-profit organizations get government funding.

Bichotte's work experience includes public school mathematics teacher, and an engineer and finance manager.

She is the co-founder of the Shirley Chisholm Democratic Club in Brooklyn and is an alumnus of the White House Project from Brooklyn College.

While living in Chicago, Bichotte served on President Obama's then U.S. senatorial campaign with the Will County Democratic Club.

She was then selected to be an Obama Delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 2012 by Congresswoman Yvette Clarke.

Bichotte said she continuously partners with the elected officials in her district, such as Councilman Jumaane Williams on social and economic initiatives.

# Jamaican competes for Rhoda Jacobs' seat

Jamaican-born Rickie Tulloch says he is the best candidate to replace the retiring Rhoda Jacobs in the 42nd State Assembly District in Brooklyn.

"I am proud Assemblywoman Jacobs believes I am best suited to carry on her tireless leadership," said Tulloch, who migrated from Jamaica when he was only 14 years old, in a Caribbean Life interview. He will compete in the Democratic Primary on Sept. 9.

He said Jacobs, for decades, fought to protect the environment, and supported proposals to combat climate change, and enhance clean and renewable energy.

"As your next Assembly member, I will continue to support the Assembly's leadership for a three-year moratorium on hydraulic fracturing or "fracking" in New York State," Tulloch said.

"New York City's drinking water must not be threatened by oil and gas industries more interested in extracting profits than ensuring the environment is protected," he added, stating that other states have witnessed water pollution and destruction of lands as a result of "fracking."

In addition, Tulloch said there are links to "fracking" and increased seismic activities, including earthquakes.

He said his story is that of the American dream -

"a story of a man who has been lifted up through hard work, public education" and the support of his "great" Brooklyn community.

Tulloch's story is also that of a community advocate, stating that he has dedicated his life to giving back to the diverse Brooklyn neighborhoods that welcomed him and his family with open arms in 1976, when they arrived in Flatbush from Jamaica in search of a better life

Tulloch said he lived on Snyder Avenue, and attended and graduated from Erasmus Hall High School in the 42nd District.

He also attended and graduated from Brooklyn College, also in the district, with a bachelor's degree in accounting and a master's in economics.

Along the way, Tulloch said he grew passionate about public service and assumed leadership roles in a range of community organizations.

He served for 18 years on Community Board 17, where he was the Land Use chair for seven years and treasurer for three years.

He also served, for 15 vears, on the Board of Directors of Flatbush Action Daycare Center, and on the Board of Erasmus Neighborhood Federation that provides, among other services, immigration and housing.

In addition, Tulloch formed and served as president of the Ginger Ridge Past Student Association, the rural school that he attended in Jamaica.

He also formed and chairs the Visionary Political Action Committee (V-PAC); and, most recently, he became chair of Jacobs' Community Advisory Council.

In these roles, Tulloch said he continues to nurture a "deep understanding of the issues that matter to community residents," and is a "strong advocate for the concerns of our working and middle class families, senior citizens, vouth, immigrants and local community groups.'

Tulloch, who is "the proud father" of four children, has been "an involved resident" of the 42nd Assembly District for the past 38 years.

He said he will fight for,

among other things, job creation, affordable housing, healthcare access, education, immigration and quality of life.

Besides Jacobs, Tulloch has been endorsed by unions DC 37. United Federation of Teacher and the AFL-CIO.

## REMOVING IMMIGRATION NIGHTMARES

There are solutions to problems immigrants frequently experience. Among the problems and solutions are the following:

#### **1. GETTING MARRIED TO A US CITIZEN OR GREEN CARD HOLDER AND BEING ABUSED OR ABANDONED BY THE SPOUSE:**

If you are married to a US Citizen or green card holder who is abusive or has abandoned you, you may be entitled to a work permit and green card even if you are divorced or have a criminal record. You can also get relief if you are married to a citizen or green card holder who was already married but did not divorce before marrying you, that is, a bigamy or polygamy situation.

# Bonding Link between grandparents and grandkids benefits both

hat used to be the "golden years" of life for seniors is now turning into any opportunity to spend even more time with their youngest family members. Nowadays, a growing number of grandparents are called on to provide child care for their grandkids, many of whom are growing up in two-income households. Others are helping to raise grandkids while providing financial assistance for adult children who may not be able to live on their own.

This trend has been corroborated in a few recent studies. Information from the Pew Research Center showed 7.7 million children in the United States were living in the same household as one of their grandparents in 2011. A University of Chicago analysis of a decade of data based on interviews with 13,614 grandparents, ages 50 and older, found that 61 percent of grandparents provided at least 50 hours of care for their grandchildren during any given year between 1998 and 2008. And an April 2012 study for the MetLife Mature Market Institute and the nonprofit Generations United, an intergenerational policy group, found that 74 percent of respondents provided weekly child care or babysitting service for grandkids.

Grandparents often cite helping their own children financially as well as staying in touch with grandchildren as motivating factors behind providing care. According to Generations United, staying in touch with grandkids can give seniors a feeling of self-worth and improve their overall Continued on page 28

# FIVE FOODS FOR THE OVER-50 CROWD

en and women must alter their diets as they age. Portion sizes that young adults might have been able to get away must shrink when those same men and women enter their 30s. And as 30-somethings head into their 40s, what's on the plate requires more careful consideration than it might have a decade ago. The same goes for men and women over 50, who must take steps to reduce their risk for heart disease, stroke and diabetes. One of the easiest ways to do just that is to eat healthy

foods. The following are five flavorful and healthy foods tailor-made for the over 50 crowd.

Apples: Apples definitely qualify as a superfood, helping reduce cholesterol by preventing plaque buildup in the blood vessels and, as a result cutting an individual's risk of diabetes considerably. In fact, a recent study published in the British Medical Journal found that eating at least two servings of apples per week can reduce a person's risk of type 2 diabetes by as much as 23 percent. Apples also make for a great



source of fiber, potassium and vitamin C. **Blueberries:** Blueber-

ries help men and women maintain healthy blood sugar levels because they are high in soluble fiber, which lowers cholesterol while slowing the body's uptake of glucose. And despite their relatively small size, blueberries contain more fiber, vitamins and minerals per ounce than any other fruit.

**Broccoli:** Broccoli is loaded with vitamin C. A single 3.5 ounce serving of broccoli contains more than 150 percent of the recommended daily intake of vitamin C, which can shorten the duration of the common cold. In addition, a 2013 British study published in Medical News Today found that broccoli may help prevent osteoarthritis, a degeneration of joint cartilage and the underlying bone that is most common from middle age onward. A similar study from researchers at New York's Roswell Park Cancer Institute published in the same publication six years earlier found that just three servings of broccoli per month can decrease bladder cancer risk by as much as 40 percent.

# Memory loss not an automatic side effect of aging

one, regardless of age, is immune to random bouts of memory loss. While misplaced car keys or forgetting items on your grocery list are nothing to get worked up over, many men and women over 50 do start to worry about memory lapses, especially when they start to occur with more frequency than they might have just a few years ago. But while memory loss might be quickly associated with aging, increased forgetfulness is not an inevitable side effect of getting older, a fact that those at or approaching retirement age should find comforting.

relationship between memory and aging, it's important that men and women recognize the distinction between memory lapses and dementia, as the two are not one and the same. As a person ages, his or her hippocampus, the region of the brain involved in the formation and retrieval of memories, often deteriorates. This can affect how long it takes to learn and recall information. But just because this process is slower does not mean it's a warning sign of dementia, which is the loss of certain mental functions, including memory. 

# New York Methodist Hospital provides rehabilitation options for seniors

ew York Methodist Hospital's Acute Rehabilitation Unit recently opened a new physical therapy gymnasium. With a west-facing wall of windows overlooking Park Slope, the bright and modern gym is large enough to accommodate several new pieces of advanced therapeutic equipment, including two robotic orthosis devices that automate locomotion of the arms and legs. These two machines provide robotic-assisted rehabilitation, which allows patients to repeat specific movements at a high level of accuracy.

New York Methodist Hospital is the first hospital in Brooklyn and one of the first in the country to acquire these devices.

These machines are especially useful in the rehabilitation of patients with gait and upper extremity disorders, often caused by orthopedic injuries or neurological disorders. The computerized robots, which are manned by the trained physical therapists at NYM, not only control the speed and level of difficulty, but monitors how much effort the patient is making, providing constant feedback and personalized assessment.

The therapy exercises include computerized games and activities to improve coordination and functional ability, and are designed to provide patients with the specific skills needed to reach the highest level of independence in daily activities.

"These technological advances help our physical therapists refine the way

# Memory loss not an automatic side effect of aging

one, regardless of age, is immune to random bouts of memory loss. While misplaced car keys or forgetting items on your grocery list are nothing to get worked up over, many men and women over 50 do start to worry about memory lapses, especially when they start to occur with more frequency than they might have just a few years ago. But while memory loss might be quickly associated with aging, increased forgetfulness is not an inevitable side effect of getting older, a fact that those at or approaching retirement age should find comforting.

# **EXERCISE AND AGING** Addressing common concerns about fitness after 50

xercise is an essential element of a healthy lifestyle. Including exercise in your daily routine can lower your risk for diabetes, heart disease and stroke, and exercise can even sharpen mental acuity, reduce anxiety and improve mood. But as beneficial as exercise can be, many men and women — particularly men and women over the age of 50, who have not laced up their sneakers in years are hesitant to begin an exercise regimen for a variety of reasons, potentially putting their long-term health at risk.

Regardless of a person's age, beginning a new exercise regimen can be intimidating. But it's especially so for men and women over the age of 50, who might not know where to begin or how to approach adopting a healthier lifestyle. According to the National Institute on Aging, the following are a few points men and women should know as they attempt to improve their physical fitness with a more active lifestyle.

Exercise is safe even if you have not been physically active in a long time. Many older men and women worry that suddenly embracing physical fitness after years of inactivity may be detrimental to their health. But that's only true if they don't exercise caution at the outset of their routines. When beginning the routine, take things very slowly at first, choosing to walk or bike every day rather than hitting the treadmill and adjusting it to maximum resistance. When strength training, start off with very little weight so your muscles can grow acclimated to the motions and you can get the exercises down pat. As you grow more comfortable and your body starts to feel more up to the challenges of daily exercise, you can begin to gradually alter your cardiovascular and strength

Exercise can make existing medical conditions more manageable. The NIA notes that studies have shown that regular exercise and physical activity can benefit people with arthritis, high blood pressure, and heart disease. But it's still recommended that men and women with preexisting medical conditions consult with their physicians before making any lifestyle changes. Some conditions may affect a person's ability to be active, and it's best to get the go-ahead from a physician before beginning an exercise regimen. Doctors may even suggest certain activities that have been known to alleviate particu-

lar conditions.

Exercise reduces fatigue, so sitting around to preserve strength is not effective. Exercise improves strength and energy levels, so sitting on the sideline to preserve your strength is counterproductive and could lead to serious medical problems. The "Report on Physical Activity and Health" from the U.S. Surgeon General's office noted that men and women who are inactive are almost twice as likely to develop heart disease as those who are more active. While getting adequate rest and giving your body ample time to recover from physical activity is essential, your body won't benefit by avoiding exercise to preserve your strength. However, even moderate physical activity performed on a regular basis can reduce fatigue.

No one is too old to ex-

ercise. It's not uncommon for men and women in their golden years to think they are too old to exercise. Some may feel that their toneddown workouts cannot possibly be making much of an impact thanks to the physical limitations old age has put on their bodies, while others may think it's unwise for someone in their 70s or 80s to be physically active. But no one is too old to exercise, as exercise helps the body stay strong and fit even when you can no longer max out on the bench press or squat hundreds of pounds. Scaling back your exercise routine will be necessary as you get older, but that does not mean you cannot still enjoy and benefit from physical activity.

with more ready access to culture and restaurants. While that accessibility is great, grandparents may find that it comes at the cost of less time with their grandchildren. 

when we do get rain we are going to get more intense rain events, flooding.

"All of that presents a substantial challenge for managing our water resources. So under the GWP-C WACDEP, we're doing a number of things to help the region adapt to this,' she added.

Current variability and long-term climate change impacts are most severe in a large part of the developing world, and particularly affect the poorest.

Through its workshops, GWP-C provides an opportunity for partners and stakeholders to assess the stage of the IWRM process that various countries have reached and work together to operationalise IWRM in their respective countries.

Integrated Water Resources Management is a process which promotes the coordinated development and management of water, land and related resources in order to maximise economic and social welfare in an

city.

equitable manner without compromising the sustainability of vital ecosystems.

IWRM helps to protect the world's environment, foster economic growth and sustainable agricultural development, promote democratic participation in governance, and improve human health.

GWP-C regional co-ordinator, Wayne Joseph, said the regional body is committed to institutionalising and operationalising IWRM in the region.

"Our major programme is the WACDEP Programme, Water and Climate Development Programme, and presently we are doing work in four Caribbean Countries -Jamaica, Antigua, Guyana and St. Lucia," he told IPS.

"We're gender-sensitive. We ensure that the youth are incorporated in what we do and so we provide a platform, a neutral platform, so that issues can be discussed that pertain to water and good water resources management."

The Caribbean Youth

#### Environment Network (CYEN) is a non-profit, civil society body that focuses its resources on empowering Caribbean young people and their communities to develop programmes and actions to address socioeconomic and environmental issues.

Rianna Gonzales, the national coordinator of the Trinidad and Tobago Chapter, has welcomed the initiative of the GWP-C as being very timely and helpful, adding that the region's youth have a very important role to play in the process.

"I think it's definitely beneficial for young people to be part of such a strategic group of people in terms of getting access to resources and experts...so that we will be better able to communicate on water related issues," she told IPS. The CYEN programme

aims at addressing issues such as poverty alleviation and youth employment, health and HIV/AIDS, climatic change and global warming, impact of natural disasters/hazards, improvement in potable water, conservation and waste management and other natural resource management issues.

The GWP-C said the Caribbean region has been exposed to IWRM and it is its goal to work together with its partners and stakeholders at all levels to implement IWRM in the Caribbean.

"A very significant activity for the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States has been to prepare a Water Sector Model Policy and Model Water Act which proposes to remedy the key water resources management issues through new institutional arrangements and mechanisms that include water and waste water master planning, private sector and community partnership and investment mechanisms," GWP-C chair Judy Daniel told IPS.



# 'Yardies' revel on The Parkway as united Jamaica

B

from the English, Dutch, Spanish and French Caribbean who annually parade pride and culture on Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway on Labor Day to distinguish themselves by waving the black, green and gold flag of their nation. They turned out in large numbers to represent the English-speaking island located in the Greater Antilles and the one nation outside of the Eastern Caribbean whose history and tradition apprehensively embraced carnival.

Representing on floats, trucks, as spectators, a great majority comprised a generation born in the United States to at least one parent rooted from the island/ nation.


Jamaican filmmaker Selena Blake whose documentary "Taboo Yardies" expose the plight of homosexuals in a feature film walked the path for the first time to "publicly let everyone know" that human rights issues affect a certain



segment of Jamaicans.

Walking along the thoroughfare she handed out tee shirts decorated by the island's colors, a map of the island and bearing the motto "Out Of Many One People." Brandishing a contact connection www.unitedjamaica.com, the shirt seemed to explain the purpose of her participation in the public display of heritage and culture.

Charley Simpson who introduced a Jamaican presence on the Parkway in 1991 with a section in Borokeetes Band walked this year with Sharon Clarke who wants to be a judge on the Civil Court. Running from district 6, Clarke was surrounded by a diverse Caribbean following. Simpson reportedly introduced a Jamaica Carnival to Jamaica in 1986 when



he promoted Soca Madness at Albion Farms. According to the JAmerican, he presented his idea to Byron Lee who disproved the concept but offered a similar fete he wanted to name Jamaica Tangerine. Simpson said he took his carnival revelry downtown Kingston in 1990 and later with endorsement from the Jamaica government Lee launched what is now the popular annual known as Jamaica Carnival.

Richard Hoven, a Chinese Jamaican brandished Jamaica's colors and joined members of the Jamaica Progressive League to tout membership with New York State Nurses' Association.

And Tessanne Chin, winner of NBC-TV's "The Voice," found celebrity status with spectators who cheered her presence.

Perhaps most vocal were revelers who waved banners to signal the arrival of VP records. With the music of deejays Shabba Ranks, Beenie Man and prominent Jamaican reggae artists signed to the U.S.-based record distribution label, Jamaicans were not only seen but heard.

Jamaicans were promi-

nent with a float representing "The Diggers of Panama," "Caribbeans for Cuomo," the Tivoli Gardens Marching Band and in virtually every band displaying heritage and culture.

Although forms of the revelry existed on the island with jonkanno, parades featuring effigies, -- ceremonial jourvert, steel pan, mas-

queraders, road march and other aspects of the eastern Caribbean phenomenon eluded the island.

In the 20th century Jamaica became a prominent tourist destination for its original ska and reggae music. Devoting marathon concerts series to celebrate the music form borne to the island, calypso and soca never really rooted as a national treasure.

Late converts to the annual festivities here Jamaicans were apprehensive about joining the parade of masqueraders that walked west along Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway each Labor Day. Steel Pulse, Aswad, Lieutenant Stitchie, and a young talent named Little Vicious were booked to entice nationals. They performed at the Brooklyn Museum pre-Labor Day festivities but crowds were sparse and the WIADCA organizers disbanded a night devoted to the Jamaica-honed music.



# Husband searches for missing wife in erotic thriller

"The Strange Color of Your Body's Tears" Good (2 stars) Unrated In French, Danish and Flemish with subtitles Running time: 102 minutes Distributor: Strand Releasing

Dan Kristensen (Klaus Tange) could find no sign of his wife Edwige (Ursula Bedena) when he returned home from a business trip. Moreover, the communications executive's suspicions were aroused by the fact that the chain was across the door when he unlocked their apartment, suggesting that someone ought to be inside.

Inquiring of neighbors only served to compound the mystery, between his landlord who suggested that his wife had a reason to disappear, and the provocatively-dressed elderly senior who tries to seduce him after saying that her husband had disappeared, too. As he makes his way around the building, Dan gradually discovers that the place is a den of iniquity where people participate in all sorts of bizarre sexuality.

With each flat he enters, the sadomasochistic displays revealed are increasingly kinky, eventually even rising to the level of a bloodbath replete with decapitation after the word "decapitation." Codirected by Helene Cattet and Bruno Forzani, "The Strange Color of Your Body's Tears" is not so much a mystery with a linear plotline as a surreal thriller designed for cinephiles with a taste for abstraction and eroticized violence.

Undeniably artistic, yet gruesome and harrowing, this atmospheric adventure has a dark, ominous air about it which keeps you braced for something bad for the duration of the entire endurance test. A difficult to decipher whodunit guaranteed to have you still scratching your head even after its confounding resolution.





### Search for new Windies coach



In other awards on the day, Guyana's Anthony Abrahams won the trophy for most goals as he led the tournament with 13 strikes, and Team Grenada won the third-place trophy by forfeit because Team Guyana failed to show up for the contest.

#### RED BULLS FALL TO D.C.

Host DC United (14-8-4, 46pts.) is now firmly in first place in the Eastern Conference with a 2-0 win over the New York Red Bulls (7-8-10, 31 pts.) at RFK Stadium last Saturday afternoon. New York looked energy-sapped from the hot temperature in DC, but the host overcame the hot temperature and got goals from Luis Silva (57th) and second half substitute Eddie Johnson in stoppage time.

United's goalkeeper, Bill Hamid, got his seventh shutout of the season and his first assist in his five-year MLS career. He sent a long kick down field for Fabian Espindola to head on for Silva, who chased and got to the ball before the on-rushing Red Bulls goalkeeper Luis Robles to score. Johnson scored a classic; he went in one-on-one against Robles and chipped the ball over the on-rushing Robles and into an empty net. D.C. United is now four points ahead of second-place Sporting Kansas City.

#### MLS

In other MLS results last weekend, host Los Angeles Galaxy (13-5-7), as usual, getting into play-off gear at this time of the year, came out on top in defeat of neighbor Chivas USA, 3-0, behind a double strike from Gyasi Zardes and a tally from Robbie Keane at Home Depot Center in Carson, CA.

Zardes scored in the 41st minute when he ran down the left wing and one-timed a shot off a Landon Donovan pass, and Keane made it 2-0 in the 68th; Zardes registered his second goal in the 71st minute after a combination play between Donovan and Keane. The Galaxy is now in second place in the West Conference, just two points behind leader Seattle Sounders. Chivas USA (6-13-6) has played its last six games without scoring.

USA international midfielder Jermaine Jones made his MLS debut with the New England Revolution on Saturday but was not a factor in the Revolution's 3-0 win over host Toronto FC, which fired its coach Ryan Nielsen after the game. Jones entered the contest as a second half substitute, but by that time. Lee Nguyen had put the Revs up, 1-0, early in the first half, Kenlyn Rowe had made it, 2-0, in the 21st minute and Teal Bunbury got the third goal around the 60th minute.

The Seattle Sounders held on to first place in the West with a 1-0 win over the Colorado Rapids.

Clint Dempsey provided

the winner from a corner kick in the 52nd minute for the host Sounders at CenturyLink Field. Meanwhile, the Portland Timbers travelled to the Vancouver Whitecaps' B.C. Place and ran away with a 3-0 victory. Alvas Powell headed home Diego Valeri's cross for the first goal in the 51st minute, Maximiliano Urruti made it 2-0 in the 75th and Rodney Wallace completed the scoring.

The Chicago Fire came up with a 1-0 victory against FC Dallas on a Robert Earnshaw goal at Toyota Park . Earnshaw headed home a cross from Jeff Larentowicz late in the contest for the win. The San Jose Earthguakes and Real Salt Lake played to a 1-1 draw at Buck Shaw Stadium, home to the Earthquakes. Sam Cronin tallied for the host and Javier Morales evened the score for RSL from the penalty spot.

The Montreal Impact suffered a loss at home when it was beaten by the Columbus Crew, 2-0, at Saputo Stadium. Ignacio Piatti (40th, 90+) scored both goals for the visitors. 
America. However, his mother ran track at James Madison High School in Brooklyn,

### West Indies batting must improve!

The West Indies cricket team under its new coach will have to take positive steps towards improving its batting performance. At the moment the team lacks international commitment and the high batting standards that go parallel with the game. The West Indies lost to New Zealand, which merely ranked number eight in Test cricket, is a disgrace. Too many players have not shown that commitment in Tests and Oneday International and that has been the downfall of West Indies cricket. This has been compounded by at one stage and incompetent captain, unqualified selectors and too much interest in the Twenty20 format of the game.

#### Combination of problems lead to failures

The West Indies cricket team now has a new captain for Test cricket, a new chief of selectors, a new One-Day International captain and apparently another new plan by the West Indies Cricket Board. At this stage, the players must step up and perform credibly with all the resources having been put into the development of the team.

West Indies batsmen must develop strategies to combat constant mistakes. Kirk Edwards was caught in the slips three times against New Zealand because of his lack of foot movement — a front line batsman at that. I would expect that when players have travelled all over the world, played under different conditions and faced the best of bowlers' pace and spin that they have learnt sufficient to build their game and be successful. Much more should be expected particularly from the West Indies batsmen. The head coach must work harder to remedy the batting flaws.

#### India and South Africa tours will be tough

The West Indies team faces some uphill tasks going to India and South Africa. Both teams play very well on home turf. India will be looking to rebound after a rough tour of England.
