

U.S., Grenada sign energy security initiative

As part of the Caribbean Energy Security Initiative, the United States says it has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Grenada to "promote a cleaner and more secure energy future in the Caribbean."

The U.S. Department of States said on Wednesday that Acting Special Envoy and Coordinator for International Energy Affairs, Amos Hochstein, and Grenadian Ambassador to the United States E. Angus Friday signed the agreement here on Aug. 27.

"The United States will work with Grenada on a pilot program that seeks to develop and apply a visionary approach to improving its energy sector, which includes integrating policy and regulatory reforms, and encouraging private sector investment in environmentally responsible and economically sustainable technologies," said the State Department in a statement, adding that the MOU was announced by Prime Minister of Grenada Dr. Keith Mitchell at the Third U.N. Conference on Small Island Developing States (SIDS) in Apia, Samoa, on Sept. 1.

"This cooperation, which is integral to the Caribbean Energy Security Initiative announced by Vice President (Joseph) Biden,

An Australian mining company preparing to open a large-scale mine in Guyana has unwittingly handed the opposition a key elections issue on a platter by publicly condemning demands by government officials for bribes and inducements to help it get things done in the mineral-rich country.

Thanks to the successful filing of a no confidence motion by the sevenseat Alliance for Change (AFC) last month, general elections could be held later this year or early next year depending on whether parliament reconvenes from its summer break and votes on the issue in early October or whether the governing Indoled People's Progressive Party (PPP) decides to call an early date or not. This week, Perth, Australia-based Troy Resources said in a statement that it absolutely won't pay any bribes to government officials and regulators to get things done in relation to a large gold mine it is preparing to open in the west of the country near Venezuela next year.

This is so because it is still subjected to Australian laws on graft, transparency, and corruption whether or not it is at home or outside of its Australian home base.

It is unclear whether company officials knew what kind of impact the company statement would have as nearly every group in the country, be it religious, political or civic, has complained about the level of graft and greed among top PPP officials

Popular Vincentian group holds successful school-supply drive

The popular Internetbased Vincentian group, VincyCares, has expressed great satisfaction with its recent fund-raising drive to provide school supplies for primary school children in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

"VincyCares' dream is to make sure that school supplies do not come between a child and his or her education, thus leveling the playing field for more equal opportunity for a proper education," VincyCares president Franklyn "Supadex" Richards told Caribbean Life after the group staged its latest drive on Aug. 30 at Standard Shippers in Brooklyn.

about the mouth-watering delicacies.

Richards said most of the food was contributed by supporters, and well as well wishers and members of VincyCares.

Additionally, he said the sound system was supplied — free of charge — by Nolan Bulze, of the Brooklyn-based Vincentian band Solid, with DJs SupaEyes, Kemmy, Yung Hova, Bajan King, and Blondie, and announcer Atiba Williams.

"It was a festive mood that saw Vincentians from as far as California coming to Brooklyn to support a worthy cause," said Richards, adding soca artistes Luta and Fireman were also on hand in giving the crowd "a mini performance leading up to the show that Saturday night" at Café Omar in Brooklyn.

He said VincyCares has successfully distributed school supplies to every primary school in St. Vincent and the Grenadines "and is continuing the trend to supply school supplies where they are needed."

In addition to school supplies, he said VincyCares has awarded nine scholarships to student throughout St. Vincent and the Grenadines "and will continue to provide scholarships as long as the general public continues to supper our cause.

Bichotte makes history with win over Tulloch

A Haitian American candidate made history on Tuesday night by becoming the first politician of Haitian descent to win the Democratic Party Primary Election for a seat in the New York State Legislature.

Rodneyse Bichotte, who was born and raised in Brooklyn to Haitian immigrants, handsomely defeated Jamaican-born economist and accountant Rickie Tullock by 20 percentage points to win the primary in the 42nd State Assembly District in Brooklyn.

Since New York is heavily Democratic, winners in the primary are considered shoo-ins to win the general elections in November.

With 100 percent of the polling precincts reported, Bischotte, who was the District Leader of the 42nd State Assembly District, garnered 47.4 percent, or 2,669 votes, to Tulloch's 29.7 percent, or 1,592 votes.

The other candidates in the race were Haitian Michele Adolphe, who received 800 voters, or 14 percent, and Guyanese Victor Jordan, who received 306 votes, or 5.7 percent.

"We did it!" exclaimed Bichotte. "I am humbled and exceedingly grateful to have received the confidence of the people of the 42nd Assembly District to serve as their next assemblywoman.

"Our success today at the polls would not be possible without the support and effort of a dedicated team of volunteers, campaign staff, and supporters who came together to make today's victory possible," she added.

Bichotte said during the past few months leading to Tuesday's victory, her campaign was able to put together a widespread coalition of elected officials, unions, clergy and non-profits, "who believe that our community is in dire need of leadership in the state Assembly that will put their best interests at heart."

Tulloch had received the endorsement of the retiring Assemblywoman Rhoda Jacobs, whose 42nd Assembly District comprises Flatbush, East Flatbush and Midwood, among other Brooklyn neighborhoods.

But while Bichotte was successful at the polls, another Haitian American candidate was unsuccessful.

Lawyer and educator Rubain Dorancy lost soundly to another lawyer, African American Jesse Hamilton, for the 20th Senatorial District in Brooklyn.

Hamilton, the former legal counsel for Eric Adams who vacated the seat when he was elected Borough President, received 9,090 votes or 64.9 percent to Dorancy's 4,189 votes, or 29.9 percent. The other candidate, Haitian Guillermo Philpotts received 728 votes, or 5.2 percent.

"Tm glad that I ran on an issues-driven campaign," Dorancy told the Caribbean Media Corporation at his campaign headquarters on Nostrand Avenue in Brooklyn on Tuesday night.

"The most important thing is that the community's voices were heard," he added. "At the end of the day, the voters carried out the vote. I feel relieved."

Hamilton, on the other hand, said he was "humbled and honored by the trust voters have placed in me tonight, and I'll spend every day in Albany (the state's capital) working to live up to it.

Antigua

The Antigua and Barbuda government says more than 12 major conglomerates in China have expressed interest in doing business in the Caribbean state.

During a recent visit to China, Prime Minister Gaston Browne told a group of chief executive officers and presidents of corporations

attached to the Department of Commerce of Shandong Province that Antigua is part

of a network of trade agreements that allow goods to enter the Euro-

pean Union, Canada and the United States.

"Antigua and Barbuda has a stable investment environment. When you invest in our country, there is no need to worry about a fall in the value of your products, in fact value will increase instead," Browne said in a statement. He said investing in Antigua and Barbuda is also a gateway to other markets within Latin American and the Caribbean.

Deputy Director General of Shandong Department of Commerce, Yan Zhaowan said that Chinese business leaders were impressed with Browne's presentations and the economic possibilities in Antigua and Barbuda, the statement said. Yan said his division sees the possibility of investing in tourism, information communication technology (ICT), agriculture and manufacturing.

that a meeting had been held involving various stakeholders to look at the threat to the island, for which there is no known cure.

Dr. Johnson said that the advice is that "we cannot go down the route of imposing travel restrictions at this time."

"So we would not advise any restriction on travel or on trade at this time," he said noting that a screening questionnaire for West African nationals entering Dominica would be implemented.

He said based on the information provided during the screening process "we will take it to the next level in terms of isolation and management of those individuals."

The chief medical officer said

several countries, including Dominica, were now seeking to establish the appropriate isolation facilities to manage any case that may occur.

There are several students from Africa and Nigeria who attend medical school in Dominica.

Haiti

The United Nations has launched the second phase of a vaccination campaign against cholera in Haiti where health officials say more than 8,000 people have died since the outbreak in 2010.

The campaign initiated and implemented by the Haitian authorities until September, is part of the broader framework of the national plan for the elimination of cholera

in Haiti.

It aims to vaccinate 200,000 people living in the communes where the disease persists in particular the department of Artibonite.

Earlier this year, nearly 1,500 Haitians filed a lawsuit in the United States seeking compensation from the United Nations for victims of

the cholera outbreak that sickened more than 600,000 people. They claim

that the disease was brought to the country by the UN peacekeepers from Nepal, where the disease is endemic.

UN Secretary General Ban Kimoon rejected a previous claim for compensation for cholera victims, citing diplomatic immunity, but announced a US\$2.27 billion initiative to help eradicate cholera in Haiti in December 2012.

In August 2013, a similar vacation campaign was conducted by the Haitian government with the support of the United Nations and was able to reach a population of about 107,000 people.

Grenada

Grenada's Prime Minister Dr. Keith Mitchell says the decision by St. George's University (SGU) in Grenada to inject more than EC\$700 million into an expansion program will have enormous impact for the university and for the country.

Dr. Mitchell said since returning to office a year and a half ago his administration has been working diligently to improve the business climate in Grenada and "we have vigorously promoted new investments."

He said it is in this new envi-

ronment the university, which has been operational in Grenada for the past 40 years, "has



attracted such a huge and unprecedented new deal."

Dr. Mitchell said among the new investments will be the establishment of a teaching hospital, noting "such a venture will open a new frontier in medical research and technology and provide training for generations of medical practitioners."

Guyana

The Opposition grouping, A Partnership for National Unity (APNU) has called on President Donald Ramoutar to uphold the pledge he made to hold local government elections "within one year of the 2011 general election."



during his trip to the region in June, will serve as an example to lead the way to a cleaner energy future for the Caribbean region and for small islands around the globe," it continued.

"The best practices and lessons learned from the comprehensive energy reform approach in Grenada will be helpful to other islands looking to reform their energy sector in support of environmental, economic, and social objectives," the statement said.

The State Department said the United States is "committed" to working with SIDS on "critical global issues," including climate change and ocean conservation, as well as the islands' sustainable development, energy security, food security and health issues.

Continued from cover and their audacious displays of wealth on a daily basis.

Troy Resources more than hinted that some key documents officials should have signed off on already have not been attended to expeditiously so it took the unusual step of going public with its complaint in a newspaper advertisement about plans for the mine and the way it operates at home and abroad.

"It should be noted that any form of payment or inducement to individuals and organizations to expedite, seek favors, get unfair advantage or to circumvent official procedures in any country of operation is unlawful under Australian corporate law and any breach is regarded as a serious crime which may result in a prison sentence for any company officer engaging in this practice."

The statement comes as the firm announced that it has already spent \$5 million on heavy duty equipment it would need at its mine in the western jungles while it awaits the signing of its mineral agreement with government to allow it to expedite the construction of its mine site and begin mining as planned in 2015. The firm recently announced that it had secured \$87 million in financing to build its open pit mine, plants, and tailings waste ponds but warned that it is not in the habit of paying inducements to get things done.

The miners association of which the company is a member chimed in this week saying that it is quite "aware of the frustrations" Troy is experiencing, noting that it has raised the issue at recent meetings with executives.

Spokesman Colin Sparman said that the company "has faced a lot of hurdles but is determined not to bribe anyone to get things done. They have told us that they don't do things that way and are very frustrated with the red tape in Guyana," Sparman said.

Opposition parties and rights groups have persistently complained about the level of corruption in the country. The issue is the main reason a parliamentary opposition party successfully filed a no confidence motion against government last month. The issue is to be debated in the opposition controlled 65-member parliament in early October. A successful vote will result in general elections in 90 days and about two years before constitutionally due.

candidates were also successful in the Primary.

State Sen. John L. Sampson, whose father is Guyanese, survived a challenge as three other candidates split votes for the 19th Senatorial District in Brooklyn. Sampson is under federal indictment on charges that he embezzled more than \$400,000 from the sale of foreclosed homes. He said he is vigorously fighting the charges.

Sampson received 7,218 votes, or 54.2 percent; Dell Smitherman received 3,981 votes, or 29.9 percent; Sean Henry received 1,668 votes, or 12.5 percent; and Elias Weir received 458 votes, or 3.4 percent.

"We had the governor, the mayor and some of my colleagues in the Assembly who didn't want to see this happen," Sampson told supporters at the Thomas Jefferson political club in the Canarsie section of Brooklyn on Tuesday night.

"Prosperity breeds friends, adversity proves it," he added. "It is going to be a different John Sampson."

In Queens, voters in the 14th District turned against state Sen. Malcolm A. Smith, who is accused of bribery in his bid for the 2013 New York City mayoral ballot.

Jamaica's Maroons champion UNESCO award

A group of Maroons in Jamaica are the winners of a United Nations' award of excellence for the outstanding Bench Drum submission they entered in the handicraft category judged in the Dutch and Englishspeaking Caribbean region.

The Charles Town Maroon Council beat out 26 entrants to win the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) award of excellence.

A statement from the three member jury that met in Curaçao to evaluate the entries from numerous countries said the African instrument was chosen "for its craftsmanship and cultural content."

The drum is "a standalone object that talks about music using noble materials such as local woods and goat skin," the jurors said. They noted that in addition to providing rhythm, the use of the drum in spiritual rituals is significant in calling on the African ancestors.

Colonel Frank Lumsden, the head of the Charles Town Maroon community, explained that the drum was designed to resemble a bench so that the ancestors could "hide it in the open" from the colonizers who had forbidden the use of the drums.

Maroons in Jamaica claim ancestry in Ghana, Africa where the bench drum is an integral instrument attributed to victories by the Ashanti people over the British invaders.

Highlighting the national value of the international honor Secretary-General of the Jamaica National Commission for UNESCO Everton Hannam said the award "aims to ensure that when consumers buy awarded handicrafts they receive high quality, culturally authentic products that have been manufactured in a socially-responsible manner with respect for the environment."

According to the spokesperson for UNESCO, the award for handicrafts was established to "encourage artisans to produce handicrafts using traditional skills, patterns, and themes in an innovative way in order to ensure the continuity and sustainability of these traditions and skills."

Based in Paris, France with more than 50 field offices located throughout the world, UNESCO is an agency within the United Nations that is responsible for promoting peace, social justice, human rights, and international security through international cooperation on educational, science and cultural programs.



Pres. Obama follows Bush's Iraq playbook

United States. politicians are exploiting the gruesome beheadings of two American journalists to whip up war fever against ISIS, the "criminal gang" masquerading as an organization of devout Sunni Muslims that controls large parts of Syria and Iraq. The American propaganda campaign seems to be working if recent polls are accurate.

No decent person is anything but appalled by those executions. But are they grounds for the United States to go to war?

No, they are not. Barack Obama says his job is to protect Americans wherever they are, but he doesn't cite the source of this power. No such power is implied in the president's oath of office, which obligates him only to "faithfully execute the Office of President" and to "preserve, protect and defend the Constitution."

Article II of the Constitution vests the "executive power" in the president, but that just means he has the power to execute laws passed by the legislative branch. There is no blank-check language about protecting Americans, particularly outside the country.

Section 2 of that article of course says the president is "commander in chief" of the armed

forces, but no matter how many times the war party repeats that phrase, it cannot be reasonably interpreted as unilateral power to take the country to war. Article I reserves the power to declare and finance wars to Congress alone.

True, since the end of World War II, presidents have assumed the unilateral power to make war, and most members of Congress have been more than happy to defer. But this does not mean that we who understand the danger of autocracy should acquiesce.

Obama says he can go to war against ISIS anywhere without "authorization" from Congress. (No one in government or the media uses the word declaration.) In his interview on Meet the Press, Obama said,

I'm confident that I have the authorization that I need to protect the American people. And I'm always going to do what's necessary to protect the American people. But I do think it's important for Congress to understand what the plan is, to have buy in, to debate it.

But understanding, buying in (whatever that means), and debat-

ing are not the same as authorizing through a declaration of war. Just because most members of Congress would hate to sign off on a years-long, offensive war less than two months before an election, that's no excuse for Obama to exercise autocratic powers.

Note that Obama speaks of protecting the American people. He means Americans both abroad and at home. Americans of course are free to travel anywhere. If the U.S. government is to have the power to protect or avenge them abroad, it will have to be able to exercise military power globally. Such imperial power, which the government has long exercised, should disturb peace- and freedom-loving Americans precisely because it creates the potential for perpetual war, invites retaliatory terrorism, and requires high government spending and borrowing.

It may be taken for granted that a president can go to war when an American is killed overseas, but that kind of power is too dangerous to accept meekly. Americans, especially war correspondents, should be on notice

that they travel at their own risk. This may sound callous, but the alternative is a global empire that we cannot afford either in blood or treasure.

What about protecting Americans at home? Here the irony of Obama's position is striking. U.S. intervention in the Middle East is what endangers Americans at home. Osama bin Laden's al-Qaeda hit Americans here because for many years the U.S. government had perpetrated and supported violence against Arabs (Palestinians, Iraqis, Egyptians, Lebanese and others) — and it still does.

No al-Qaeda affiliate existed in Iraq before George W. Bush launched his invasion and occupation in 2003. ISIS is an offshoot of al-Qaeda, and its execution of the two journalists was retaliation for recent U.S. bombings in Iraq. No doubt those murders were intended also to goad Obama into sending American forces, which would boost ISIS's recruitment and prestige. Bin Laden did the same thing, bragging he would bleed the United States bankrupt through long years of war. He succeeded.

Taking one for the team — when necessary

o, as we hit the pivotal two-month mark prior to November's mid-term elections, the buzz around control of the United States Senate has predictably intensified. Pundits and pollsters across the board seem inclined to giving an edge to Republicans to emerge from the elections with a slim advantage of maybe two seats. All of them, though, are hedging bets and noting how much Election Day turnout of the respective party bases could alter the picture. Even crackerjack Democratic strategist James Carville commented in a television interview the other day that if the GOP doesn't have itself a Senate majority after the dust clears in November, its leaders would seriously have to look into what's wrong with their party.

Carville, like other observers of the ebb and flow of American party politics, made note of how traditionally dicey it has been for the party of an incumbent president in the sixth year of a two-term presidency. Even that darling of all conservative darlings, Ronald Reagan, saw his Republicans lose the Senate in 1986, his sixth year. It is rational to assume that, considering the anti-Obama venom that has bubbled up over this president's six years in office, 2014 figures to be tough sledding for Democrats. Republicans having done a noholds-barred number in gerrymandering solidly hard-right Congressional Districts across the electoral landscape to keep them red for the foreseeable future, control of the House continues to be a non-issue. But given what the president (not to mention we, the people) has already had to endure with just one Capitol Hill chamber under GOP control, it is no endearing prospect, the full legislative branch committed to the kind of obstructionist, renegade M.O. that now typifies the House GOP.

Naturally, much of the focus in these Senate majority-control stakes is on toss-up states like North Carolina, Iowa, New Hampshire, and others. But what ensues in the normally safe Republican stronghold of Kansas suddenly figured to be a big deal in the Election-night math, after some developments a few days ago shook up the race in which veteran Republican Pat Roberts is up for re-election. The Tea Party supposedly viewed Roberts as coming up short in far- right



style and substance and mounted a primary challenge, which he beat back. Even so, the scuttlebutt was that support for Roberts in the state wasn't what it used to be, compounded perhaps by reports that he didn't live in the state he represents. Those headwinds, though, didn't look strong enough to prevent Roberts from defeating his Democratic opponent, Chad Taylor. But complicating matters was the presence in the race of Greg Orman, an independent candidate who, polls showed, was a stronger opponent for Roberts than the Democrat. Last week, when Taylor announced his withdrawal from the race, the ground shifted dramatically in Kansas. And the possibility of a non-Republican being elected to the Senate for the first time since the 1930s grew instantly stronger - with whatever the implications for reconfiguring the GOP game plan to assume Senate control next January. True

to form, the state's Republican secretary of state issued a ruling that the Democratic candidate's name must remain on the ballot.

The Democrat's decision to get out of the way is worthy of applause whether or not what has all the appearances of a nakedly political move by the secretary of state will stand (the candidate withdrew a full two months before the election, for heaven's sake) — even if there was some friendly persuasion required to seal the deal. Being adult, pragmatic and public-spirited about such scenarios has been frequently shown to be beyond the capacity of players involved.

Taking one for the team is an off-limits concept for those who regard politics as a "me first" pursuit. Over the years we've had some showcase examples of ignoble conduct when there was a clear need for doing the opposite. Because of how it probably affected the course of early 21st century American history, the obstinate refusal of Ralph Nader to withdraw from the presidential ballot in Florida in 2000 remains a highranking instance of ego trumping the public good.

Nader's absence from the bal-

lot would very likely have meant Florida's secretary of state being denied a spotlight turn in that vote count debacle and, later, Supreme Court conservatives not being called upon to hand the presidency to George W. Bush.

We'll see whether the Democrats' thanks to candidate Taylor will extend to stymieing this year's GOP grab for Senate control. Or if, conversely, Republicans will be looking to declare Taylor Public Enemy Number One for being key in having those GOP ambitions frustrated. Either way, who would have thought that in steady-asshe-goes solidly red Kansas, there would be suspense surrounding what voters do come November?

Historically, mid-term elections are viewed as a presidential referendum. Based on all that has preceded them, the mid-terms this year will probably reflect antiadministration feeling to a degree equal to or surpassing some of the celebrated instances of presidential disfavor in the past. The calculus, more so if Republicans gain Senate control, doesn't bode well for even a moderately productive final two years for this White House incumbent.

held in Guyana in 1994 which was won by the ruling People's Progressive Party/Civic.

The APNU said that when he campaigned as the PP/Civic presidential candidate, Ramoutar had written in the party's manifesto that "in the area of local government and governance, the next PP/Civic government will ensure, within one year of the 2011 general elections, that local government elections are held bringing much needed reinvigoration into local government."

The APNU said three years since the election, Ramoutar "has failed to keep his promise on local government elections."

The opposition grouping has accused the head of state of showing "gross disrespect for the National Assembly by refusing to assent to a bill which was approved after careful scrutiny and arduous work," to pave the way for the poll.

Jamaica

Jamaica says the agricultural sector has lost nearly J\$1 billion as a result of the prolonged drought that has hit the island.

Water, Land, Environment and Climate

Change Minister Robert Pickersgill in a joint statement on the effects of the drought on schools and agriculture said that 2,190 hectares of crops valued at

\$953.3 million had been lost and that an estimated 18,309 farmers were affected.

"To mitigate the effects of the drought,

the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries has disbursed J\$33 million, of which J\$30 million has been allocated to the Rural Agricultural Development Authority, as well as to members of Parliament in the most affected areas, as well as to increase production in those areas," the minister said.

He told legislators that the government is undertaking an audit of the available underutilized greenhouse capacity with a view of working with greenhouse farmers to maximize their production.

Pickergill said that drought is a result of climate change.

St. Vincent

St. Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves has defended the new policy of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) to developing countries, even as he acknowledged not being fully satisfied with its lending policies.

Gonsalves called in to the television program "Time to Face the Facts" recently. The program looked at the role of the IMF in the Caribbean.

Gonsalves recalled St. Vincent and the Grenadines had benefitted from a US\$6.4 million loan given by the Washington-based



financial institution, "especially in relation to balance of payment difficulties which arose after the December 2013 natural disaster."

Suicide rates soar in **Guyana this year**

The World Health Organization (WHO) said Guyana has by far the highest suicide rate among countries in the Caribbean. It is also listed in the top 10 most suicidal countries.

So far for this year more than 30 people have committed suicide, while several others are recovering from failed attempts.

The government says it has developed a "strategic partnership" with the Indian Arrival Committee (IAC) to heighten awareness on the need to prevent suicides in the country.

It said that Health Minister Dr. Bheri Ramsaran met with the IAC who presented their organization's initiative and explored the possibility of a meaningful collaboration.

So far for this year more than 30 people have committed suicide, while several others are recovering from failed attempts.

Ramsaran said there was a need for all stakeholders to be involved in the fight against suicides reiterating the ministry's commitment to work with organizations that have expressed an interest in dealing with social issues.

The IAC in the past had demonstrated its willingness to lead and support an intervention regarding this issue and based on the magnitude of incidents, called for suicide

to be declared a national priority. Further, the organization noted that due to the high rate of suicide, a major international news network visited Guvana and produced a story highlighting this distressing trend.

The IAC believes that much more can be done and had called for meaningful collaboration among the various government ministries "to derive a plan of action which will lead to the provision of education through awareness and related counseling with the aim of reducing and hopefully, eliminating incidents of suicides."

Earlier this year, the government said a multi-sectoral approach was needed to deal with the number of suicides in the country.





Regulation to curb obesity should be 'stimulated' in the Caribbean

The Pan American Health Organization has welcomed regulations that seek to inform and protect consumers in the Americas, including the Caribbean, while creating incentives for healthier eating, saying that they are "important advances that should be stimulated throughout the region."

In addressing and International Conference on Food Labelling and Fiscal Policies on Healthy Food and Obesity Prevention in Quito, Ecuador, over

the weekend, the group's Dominican-born director Dr. Carissa F. Etienne noted that countries in the Americas — which have the highest obesity rates in the world — are fighting the epidemic with "new, stricter regulations on food labelling, promotion, and advertising."

Etienne said that one in two adults in the Americas is overweight or obese, adding that the proportion reaches 75 percent or more in some countries.

And 20-to-30 percent of school-age children and adolescents are overweight or obese.

The organization said growing obesity is one of the major contributors to chronic diseases, such as heart disease, cancer and diabetes, which are now the leading causes of death and illness throughout the region.

"These conditions bring not only suffering and pain but also the spectre of economic bankruptcy for both national economies and family budgets," Etienne said.

The causes of the epidemic include "profound changes in eating patterns in recent decades, with an unprecedented increase in consumption of processed foods and a parallel decrease in consumption of natural products," Etienne said.

She said although the countries of the Americas are "rich and diverse" in healthy, natural foods, the region is increasingly making junk food "the new basic food."

Etienne said Ecuador's Law on Food Security and Sovereignty, which was updated in 2012, is an example of the kind of efforts that are needed to reverse this trend.

The law's provisions protect small farmers' rights to produce healthy foods, guarantee consumers' rights to decide what they want to consume, and stimulate the development of fair international trade.

Efforts such as these, aimed at increasing access to affordable healthy foods, "fall within the framework of strategies that both PAHO and [World Health Organization] promote to stop this pandemic," Etienne said.

During the week's conference, Minister of Health of Ecuador Carina Vance presented data from her country's National Survey on Health and Nutrition that show declines in malnutrition, but also significant increases in obesity.

She said Ecuador's response to obesity includes a new system of food labelling based on World Health Organization recommendations, which tells consumers how much sugar, salt, and fat are in processed food products.

Other measures taken by Ecuador include regulations on school meals, an obligatory hour of physical activity during the school day, promotion of breastfeeding, promotion of healthy spaces for physical activity in towns and cities, and stricter regulations on tobacco and alcohol.

"Measures directed only at education and action that is directed only at promoting healthy individual behaviours are necessary, but they are not sufficient," Etienne said.

"The great challenge is to promote public policies that aim to transform the environment, encourage healthy behaviour and inhibit those unhealthy behaviors that are increasing exponentially and that promote harmful and unhealthy patterns of consumption," she added.

Independents seek to revoke bill

The opposition Independent Liberal Party (ILP) in Trinidad and Tobago is taking the government to court over the controversial Constitution Amendment Bill which was passed recently in the Senate.

The ILP last week filed a constitutional motion in the High Court, Port of Spain arguing that that the bill breaches constitution rights, as detailed in the affidavits also filed by two citizens, Sherwin Mitchell

and Dane Francois, both ILP members.

Mitchell is contending that the bill breaches his constitutional right as an elector, while Francois has alleged that the bill violates his rights as a potential general candidate.

Attorney Rekha Ramjit, who is representing the ILP, said Section 4 of the Constitution states, rights including freedom of political expression, while Section 5 says no law must infringe those rights, even as section 13 says any infringement can only be done with a three-fifths special majority.

She said even as section 73 of the Constitution says you elect a Lower House by first past-the-post system, the bill amends this to read a runoff.

She warned that this new voting system could create an inequality of treatment in violation of the constitutional norms.

Embattled registrar to stay in St. Vincent

The Immigration Department has prevented the embattled former registrar of the High Court in St. Vincent, Vanessa Tamara Gibson-Marks, from leaving the island for her homeland, less than 24 hours after she was granted bail on theft, abuse of office and falsification charges.

"The information received is that there is an ongoing investigation in which Marks was needed and she was stopped," said Chief Immigration Officer Stanford Hamilton.

Marks was granted EC\$30,000 bail when she appeared at the Kingstown Magistrate's Court recently. The court did not ask her to surrender her travel documents,

Marks checked in to travel on a one-way ticket to St. Lucia recently, but she was unchecked and her bags removed.

She pleaded not guilty to the charges and is scheduled to re-appear at the Kingstown Magistrates Court on Oct. 7, 2014.

Marks is also expected in court later this month to give cause why she should not be disbarred from practicing law in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

Named to parody Bob Marley's hit song "Satisfy My Soul," the ice cream treat adds to the long list of specially named flavors marketed by a company acclaimed for being a "socially conscious ice-cream maker."

Due in stores on Sept. 15, the Marley treat was named to "pay tribute to a man who dedicated his life to bringing people together through music" and will mark the 30th anniversary of the release of the legendary track which was compiled on Marley's best-selling "Legend" album.

"We're celebrating our father's legacy of bringing people together and using music to drive social change through a sweet partnership with Ben & Jerry's," Marley's eldest daughter Cedella



reportedly said.

First released on the "Kaya" album in 1978, the song debuted simultaneously with the launch of the ice cream company by two former hippies in Burlington, Vermont.

It was 1978 and the concept of healthy eating, conscious music, and clever marketing coincided. In England and Jamaica, Marley's message and music exploded.

Ben & Jerry's is reputed for advocating for some worthy causes. The company is acclaimed for supporting Farm Aid to independent farmers; increasing voter turnout among young people by partnering with Rock the Vote to offer Free Cone Day and registering more than 11,000 voters the biggest one-day grass



roots registration in Rock the Vote's history.

When the U.S. Food and Drug Administration declared that it believed meat and milk from cloned animals was safe to eat, Ben and Jerry's defied the decision by urging Americans to speak out against cloning. They sent a herd of cow-costumed individuals to Washington, D.C. for a protest "Truth or Clone-sequences" demonstration.

They were also prominent in the Occupy Wall Street campaign which rallied against increasing economic inequality in the United States, high unemployment, mortgage fraud, and corporate influence in American politics. Its board of directors issued a statement of solidarity and showed up in Zucotti Park on several occasions to scoop ice cream for Occupiers. As the campaign to label food products made with genetically modified organisms moved across the states, the company also stood with a growing consumer movement that advocated for transparency and "genetically modified" labeling legislation. The company boasts that all of their ingredients are fully non-GMO.

The new Marley venture adds to a long list of commercial projects associated with the Marley brand which includes a restaurant, coffee, children's books, and a musical. There have also been a shoe line, water, and a number of concert series.

In a recent article in Speakeasy Magazine, the singer and entrepreneur who also launched her "Catch A Fire" clothing line — named in honor of her famous father's recording – responded to a question about the perception of over-commercialization of the brand saying: "It's a fine

line because I don't think lots of people know daddy was a very smart businessman. He started his own record label, built his own (recording) studio."

She added that her iconic father also "started his own distribution company where he was pressing records."

"We have to remember daddy was in the music business and it's a business. At the same time, we keep the integrity of the man separate from the integrity of the musician," she explained.

"He was very strict when it came to his business. He was the first person to print a Bob Marley T-shirt, let's not get it twisted! He would wear his own T-shirt because that is the music business."

Agreed through a partnership with the family's One Love Foundation, the ice cream company will donate proceeds from the special-edition flavor to promote peace, love, and social equality on the island of Jamaica by energizing the creative skills of youths. Ben & Jerry's ice cream tribute to the king of reggae

tribute to the king of reggae is a blend of caramel and cookie swirls with bananas topped off with "a chorus of chocolatey peace signs."

But don't rush to outlets to purchase the sweet treat. Unfortunately, sales are limited to the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, Ireland, Denmark, Finland, Sweden, and Norway.

A petition is being encouraged to urge Ben & Jerry's to make the flavor available to American ice cream buyers.

"I think we can all agree that this is a big mistake, and so we need to take action," an ice cream lover wrote at www.ipetitions.com

The blogger said "I am going to try to convince them (B&Js) to make it a global flavor."

A number of individuals have also voiced the need for the Marley signature flavor to be made available for retail in the United States.

Fictional tale of Elvis' twin brother fails to rock



What if Elvis Presley's stillborn twin had survived his mother's pregnancy rather than passed away during delivery back in January of 1935? That is the alternate reality contemplated by "The Identical," a faith-based musical marking the underwhelming directorial debut of Dustin Marcellino.

Unfortunately, Dustin tapped an Elvis impersonator to star in his revisionist version of events, a dubious decision that comes back to bite him whenever Blake Rayne isn't singing and shaking his hips onstage. The first-time actor plays both Ryan Hemsley and his identical sibling, Drexel (the Elvis in this fictionalized account of the life of the King of Rock and Roll).

The speculative endeavor's point of departure is Decatur, Georgia during the Depression, which is where we find poverty-stricken sharecroppers Helen (Amanda Crew) and William Hemsley (Brian Geraghty) fretting about how they're going to provide for their twin newborns. The answer to their prayers arrives soon thereafter, at a revival meeting pitched under a big tent by Reverend Reece Wade (Ray Liotta), a Pentecostal preacher with a soulful of hope and a barren wife (Ashley Judd).

The Wades' desire to start a family conveniently dovetails with the Hemsleys' having one more baby than they can reasonably afford. So, with God as their witness, Reece and Louise agree to adopt Ryan before surreptitiously

slipping out of town and back to Tennessee. Meanwhile, Helen and William announce the missing boy's death to friends and relatives, and stage a faux funeral, complete with an empty casket.

Reece proceeds to raise Ryan in the church with a career in ministry in mind although, given his great vocal chords, the kid proves more comfortable in the choir than the pulpit. He rebels in his teens by enlisting in the military, leaving his domineering dad and a budding sweetheart (Erin Cottrell) behind. By contrast, Drexel, who was also blessed with powerful pipes, is allowed by the Hemsleys to pursue his passion, and naturally blossoms into the nation's next singing sensation.

Will the twins ever learn of each other's existence? If so, will they be able to forgive their folks for having separated them at birth? And will Ryan ever enjoy an opportunity to take his own shot at fame and fortune?

These are the probing questions posed by a production so flawed in terms of plot, dialogue, and performances that it ends up unintentionally funny at practically every juncture.

Regrettably, "The Identical" flunks the basic plausibility test, whether in terms of its farcical reimagining of race relations in the Jim Crow South or its equallysilly staging of sophomoric car chases straight out of "The Dukes of Hazzard."

To paraphrase a Presley classic, only fools rush in to see a onetrick pony revolving around an annoying Elvis look-a-like.





Real Salt Lake registered a 2-1 win over FC Dallas when Costa Rican international Javier Saborio (77th) broke a 1–1 tie; Robbie Findlay scored Salt Lake's first goal and Michel registered for FC Dallas. Meanwhile, DC United and the Vancouver Whitecaps played to a goal-less draw.

The Philadelphia Union is still improving while Toronto FC seems to be regressing; Philadelphia knocked off the host, 2–0, behind first-half goals from Conor Casey and Andrew Wenger. Toronto


