Caribbean agrees to new energy security

Caribbean countries have agreed to new energy security with the United States and other international partners.

In a joint statement issued at the end of an extraordinary Energy Security Summit, organized by the White House, delegates stated their "commitment to support the Caribbean's transformation of the energy systems of Caribbean states, to share lessons learned through new and expanded regional information networks, [and] to report progress in relevant fora."

They agreed to comprehensive,

planning-based and research-driven approaches to energy transition, including implementation of pilot and demonstration projects, based on successful models "so that individual clean energy projects are part of a fully integrated, climate-resilient energy transition plan toward clean sustainable energy for all."

For Caribbean countries, "necessary and specific reforms", including recommendations from the 2013 CARICOM (Caribbean Community) Energy Policy and the outcome of the 2015 Dominican Energy Pact, were agreed to in sup-Continued on Page 4

ELECTION TIME IN CARICOM

Five general elections scheduled

At least five general elections are scheduled to be held in the 15-nation Caribbean Community this year including three in the politically volatile Southern Caribbean region but if opinion polls are anything to go by at least three could result in new governments.

First out of the starting blocks will most likely be St. Kitts and Nevis as Prime Minister Denzil Douglas Tuesday night fixed Monday Feb. 16 as the date when islanders will vote for a new government.

Douglas, head of government since the late 90s, will face challenges from an opposition group, Team Unity, headed by former foreign minister Timothy Harris and including Douglas' ex deputy prime minister, Sam Condor.

The faction broke away from Douglas' Labor Party several years ago, complaining about his links to the underworld, a well developed dictatorial management style, the implementation of a controversial dollars for St. Kitts passport scheme, citizenship grants to foreigners and general widespread corruption involving high officials.

Next in line most likely could be Guyana, the mainland South Amer-

ican country that is home to the region's administrative secretariat and one of the original founders of the community.

Its general and regional elections are scheduled for Monday, May 11 and a concerted effort is being made to oust the Indo-led People's Progressive Party (PPP) which has run the country since October 1992 amid credible domestic and international charges of widespread corruption, official blessings of the narco trade and the use of private hit squads to take out suspected criminals among other malfeasant acts.

A Partnership For National Unity (APNU), which the PPP defeated by a mere 26,000 votes feels that it will form a new government by May 12 when the bulk of the results should be known. It is led by retired army commander Brig. Gen. David Granger.

In the same month of May, voters in neighboring Suriname, which is the other geographical continental nation in the regional bloc, will vote for a new government on May 25, five years to the date when former military strongman and two-time coup-maker Desi Bouterse was elected president with a decent parliamentary majority.

Barbados

The Central Bank of Barbados (CBB) said that the island's economy is poised to achieve growth of about two percent this year up from 0.3 percent in 2014.

In an analysis of the Barbados economic performance, the CBB said that the growth in 2015 will be as a result of tourism and construction activity and the spin-off effects to wholesale, retail and business service sectors.

It said the tourism industry is expected to benefit from increases of nine percent and 20 percent in airlift from the United States and



Canada, respectively during the winter season.

The CBB is projecting an estimated Bds\$300 million of construction activity in 2015, mostly in the private sector.

The bank said overall economic activity is estimated to have improved by 0.3 percent in 2014. Construction activity expanded by an estimated one percent, largely on account of about Bds\$152 million in investment in tourism related projects.

The CBB said that construction and increased export demand for quarrying products, contributed to the 21 percent growth and mining and quarrying, contributed. Solar generation capacity grew by three mega-watts hours to seven mega-watts hours.

But the CBB noted that the fiscal consolidation measures of the past 18 months have stabilized the foreign reserve movements in 2014 reverted to the normal pattern observed in 2010, 2011 and 2012.

The CBB said that the stock reserves was Bds\$1.05 billion at the end of December, representing 14 weeks of import cover.

Cayman Islands



"The sector has to be carefully planned with Caribbean countries coordinating to avoid costly duplication and inefficiencies," she said.


Marchand believes countries should look as using the solid medical depth and experience of Health City to identify complementarities that can benefit other Caribbean institutions.

Dominica

The Dominica Ministry of Employment, Trade, Industry and Diaspora Affairs, in partnership with the CARI-COM Secretariat, is developing a Caribbean Single Market Economy (CSME) Communication Plan.

A recent workshop brought representatives from the public and pri-



mation flows on the CSME in Dominica.

The CSME Communication planning workshop is part of a broader platform to build capacity among public and private sector stakeholders to develop and sustain well packaged information on the Single Market for use by nationals.

In his opening remarks, Director of Trade Matthan Walter reinforced the importance of ownership of all Dominican entities which are responsible for facilitating CARICOM nationals - resident or moving, through the administration of processes, or in information sharing about the CSME.

"Dominica has several achievements in honoring its obligation under the revised Treaty of Chaguaramas, as it remains on the path towards sustained regional integration... All authorized restrictions on the free movement of goods, services, capital and rights of establishment to specified, identified categories of CARICOM nationals have been removed," he said.

Grenada

Grenada police have launched an investigation to determine how several pornographic photos, some showing school children have been posted on the Internet.

The photos were first posted on the social media site, Facebook, but were removed amid complains they were in violation of the Face-

book legal agreement.

But the photos are now appearing on other social websites and the police said they have received numerous complaints from several people on the matter.

The photos not only feature students from several secondary schools on the island and who are under age, but also young women from different parts of the island.

Parliament recently approved the Electronic Crimes Act that prohibits the publication of child pornography and pornographic materials online.

Anyone found guilty of contravening the law is liable to a fine of EC\$200.000 or to a term of five years imprisonment.

Guyana

Civil aviation authorities in Guyana say engine failure caused a small plane crash that killed a Canadian pilot and another man over a remote area of the rainforest last year.

The Guyana Civil Aviation Authority

said that investigators concluded that the Cessna Caravan experienced critical engine failure while ferrying fuel and other supplies for gold mining operations.

Canadian aviation authorities, the U.S. National Transportation Safety Board and engine manufacturer Pratt & Whitney participated in the investigation.

Community look forward to Mayor Bill de Blasio

There were no backs turned in protest of the appearance of New York City's Mayor Bill de Blasio when he appeared in Brooklyn to attend the nation's largest gathering held annually in tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Instead, during the 29th anniversary commemorative, the city's number one citizen received a standing ovation with cheers that may have boosted his approval rating to new heights.

Unlike the tepid, NYPD reception he met at Woodhull Hospital and twice at funerals for slain police officers Rafael Ramos and Wenjian Liu who were killed execution-style in the borough last month, approving applause and welcoming whistles greeted him following an introduction from the borough president.

"We love you!"

"And we love Dante too," spontaneous voices shouted as he made his way to the podium.

And with an embrace and handshake — the former police lieutenant and former president of 100 Blacks in Law Enforcement Who Care the now Brooklyn Borough President Eric L. Adams punctuated his message of support for the mayor.

Tasked with emcee duties at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, BP Adams explained that de Blasio is the CEO of the city.

"We did not elect the PBA (Police Benevolent Association)," he amplified to an audience seemingly fully aware of the rift that widened when police union leader Pat Lynch said he felt betrayed when the mayor explained how he had talked with his son Dante about possible confrontations with members of the NYPD.

Una's a phenomenal woman: JA prime minister

As members of the Brooklyn-based Progressive Democratic Political Association (PDPA) on Sunday celebrated the 80th birthday of former New York City Councilwoman Dr. Una S. T. Clarke, Jamaica's Prime Minister Portia Simpson Miller described the trailblazing Caribbean woman as "phenomenal."

In her glowing tribute – read by PDPA member Rose Graham, at the gala banquet at Tropical Paradise Ballroom on Utica Avenue in Brooklyn – Simpson Miller called Clarke, who is also PDPA founder and president, a "blessed woman."

"And I am proud to call you my friend," the Jamaican leader said. "During your lifetime, you have blazed illustrious professional paths, including achieving the distinction of being the first Caribbeanborn woman to be elected to the New York City Legislature.

"The tremendous contributions that you have made, as Councilwoman, to education, children's welfare, health, mental health and economic development, among other areas, are simply outstanding," Simpson Miller added.

Noting that Clarke has been driven by her passion to see people excel in academics, the Jamaican prime minister said the former legislator "worked tirelessly to secure significant resources to upgrade" the schools in her 40th Council District in Brooklyn.

"And, for this, I salute you," said Simpson Miller, adding that, through Clarke's "determined efforts," she was also able to expand services for the elderly, rebuild parks and playgrounds, and enhance the quality of childcare programs.

"Because of your hard work and com-

mitment, several communities in New York, as well as in Jamaica, have been made a better place," the prime minister said.

"You have not only lived a long life; your warmth and caring disposition as an exemplary matriarch – wife, mother, grandmother – are also worthy of emulation," she continued. "I, therefore, commend your family [and PDPA] for organizing this memorable celebratory event to show their affection to you and to reflect on your stellar achievements."

Guyanese-born Hugh Hamilton, a former Clarke legislative aide, noted that his former boss has been "variously described as the 'Queen Mother' and 'the Doyenne' of our Caribbean American community."

Hamilton, whose tribute was read by PDPA Secretary Joyce Henry, also described Clarke as "a trailblazing and visionary activist and political maverick who proudly embodies the revolutionary spirit of her Maroon heritage."

Candle light vigil for SVG minibus victims

Despite the very frigid and rainy weather, hundreds of nationals in the New York metropolitan area last Saturday night participated in a candle light vigil for the victims of the minibus tragedy in North Windward, St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

"Friends, we gather here, we come together in grief, acknowledging our human loss," the Rev. Dr. Glyger Beach told congregants at St. Mark's United Methodist Church, which hosted the event, in Flatbush, Brooklyn.

"In pain, we may find comfort; and, in death, resurrection," added the church's pastor, who hails from Brighton.

"Remember, we're the light," continued Rev. Beach, as ushers distributed candles at the two-hour-long event. "Where our people are suffering, His (Christ) hands shall reach out. Light sustains us. God be with us."

Dr. Roxie Irish, youth minister at the evangelical Miracle Temple Ministries International in Brownsville, Brooklyn, offered prayers for all mothers in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, especially those who lost children in the accident.

Before praying, Irish, who is also president of the United Vincie Cultural Group of Brooklyn, referred to Isaiah 42:2, and asked all mothers in the congregation to stand and place their right hand on their stomach.

Isaiah 42:2 reads: "When thou passes through the waters, I'll be with thee; and through the rivers, we shall not overflow thee. And when thou walkest through the fire, thou shall not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee." "Father, we lift up every mother who's lost a child (in the tragedy)," Irish prayed. "Cover their minds; Father, you're going to walk with them in the name of Jesus.

"God, we want to glorify you; so, Father, we want to thank you for who you are," she added. "Lord, have your Holy Spirit look over St. Vincent and the Grenadines."

The Rev. Cornelius Olive, pastor of Trinity Apostolic Church in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn, read Samuel 12:20.

Lennox "Skully" Hunte, a Seventhday Adventist Church minister in Brooklyn, alluded to Matthew 18 in stating that "God is in absolute control."

Hunte, an erstwhile popular mas producer in St. Vincent and the Gren-

Caribbean electioneering in full swing

(NDP) is the main political force in the multi-party Mega Combination which will compete with the New Front Coalition Group that has run the country several times since independence from The Netherlands in late 1975.

Just north of Guyana and Suriname is oil and gas-rich Trinidad and Tobago. The mandate of Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar and her Indo-led People's Partnership administration expires on May 25 as well but she is yet to set a date for fresh elections.

Like her counterparts in Guyana, the main charges against the PP are linked to runaway corruption, the enrichment of a class of friends and family of people linked to the ruling elite, the growing power of narco traffickers and government's inability to stem a murder every 36 hours and an economy that is slowly sinking under very soft oil prices.

The Afro-dominated People's National Movement (PNM) of Opposition Leader Keith Rowley is likely to wrest control from Persad-Bissessar if political loyalties hold steady in the coming months.

And just further north of Tobago lies

St. Vincent and the smaller Grenadines island group. Its polls must be held by December 2015.

Prime Minister Ralph Gonsalves is rushing to complete construction of a new airport with a runway that is adequate to accommodate international jet aircraft. Like neighboring Dominica, their main airports can only cater to commuter aircraft and mid-sized private jets, robbing the islands of the chance of expanding their lifeline tourists sectors. The airport project would likely be Gonsalves' main campaign item sell to voters.

porting policy and regulatory environments that "facilitate the introduction of new technologies favoring sustainable and clean energy that provide legal certainty for investors and improved predictability in price and supply for users."

Delegates also agree "where viable" to alignment of national legal and regulatory approaches to facilitate greater clean energy investment throughout the region, provided that countries can access finance and other resources on affordable terms, "to set the stage for future electrical interconnection in keeping with the goals of Connect 2022."

In addition, "where technically and commercially feasible," participants agreed to promote and develop affordable no- or lower carbon electricity generation through wind, solar, geothermal power, hydropower, bioenergy, ocean energy, energy recovery from waste, and other clean energies, and energy efficiency measures.

They recognized also that alternative fuels, such as natural gas, can play a "useful bridging role."

Delegates also concurred on "open, transparent, competitive and criteria-based processes, including liberalization where cost effective, to procure energy investment and facilitate access to finance for cleaner and climate resilient energy projects and infrastructure."

Summit participants included the governments of Antigua and Barbuda, Aruba, Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Canada, Colombia, Curacao, Dominica, Dominican Republic, France, Germany, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, Mexico, New Zealand, Spain, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname, Trinidad and Tobago, United Kingdom and United States.

Other participants comprised the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Secretariat, Caribbean Development Bank, European Union, Inter-American Development Bank Group, International Renewable Energy Agency, Organization of American States, and the World Bank Group.

Delegates recognized that energy security, access to energy, economic development, environmental and climate goals benefit from and contribute to sustainable, modern, clean and diversified energy sectors.

They, therefore, reaffirmed their commitment to support access to "sustainable, reliable, and affordable energy services, with a particular focus on cleaner alternative energy resources, for all citizens in the region," the statement said.

Marijuana reform bill ready

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) Jamaica's Cabinet has approved a much-anticipated bill of drug law amendments that would decriminalize possession of small amounts of pot and pave the way for a legal medical marijuana industry on the Caribbean island, the justice minister said Wednesday.

the Cabinet's Following authorization, Justice Minister Mark Golding said he expects to introduce the legislation in the Senate by the end of this week. Debate could start before the end of the month in the pot-steeped country where the drug, known popularly as "ganja," has long been culturally entrenched but illegal.

Golding said the bill would establish a "cannabis licensing authority" to deal with the various regulations needed to cultivate, sell and distribute marijuana for medical, scientific and therapeutic purposes.

"We need to position our-

selves to take advantage of the significant economic opportunities offered by this emerging industry," Golding said.

It would make possession of 2 ounces or less a ticketable offense that would not result in a criminal record. Cultivation of five or fewer plants on any premises would be permitted. Rastafarians who use marijuana as a sacrament could also legally use cannabis for religious purposes for the first time in Jamaica, where the spiritual movement was founded in the 1930s.

For decades, debate has raged in Jamaica over relaxing laws prohibiting ganja. But now, with a number of countries and U.S. states relaxing their marijuana laws the Jamaican government is advancing reform plans.

Golding stressed that the government will not soften its stance on transnational drug trafficking and it intends to use a portion of revenues from its new licensing authority to support a public education campaign to discourage pot smoking by youngsters and mitigate public health consequences.

The head of Jamaica's Cannabis Commercial and Medicinal Research Taskforce said he expected the bill to be passed soon in Parliament, where Prime Minister Portia Simpson Miller's governing party holds a 2-to1 majority.

St. Kitts paves way for general elections

Prime Minister of St. Kitts and Nevis Dr. Denzil Douglas on Friday announced he had advised Gov. Gen. Sir Edmund Wickham Lawrence to dissolve Parliament with immediate effect, paying the way for general elections in the twin-island federation.

"Fellow citizens, earlier today the Parliament of St. Christopher and Nevis, the National Assembly met in emergency session to debate the draft proclamation that was laid before it pursuant to the provisions of subsection 3 or 5 of Section 50 of the Constitution of St. Christopher (St. Kitts) and Nevis," said Douglas in making the announcement on the steps of Government Headquarters in Basseterre, the St. Kitts capital.

He said the draft proclamation was approved by resolu-

tion of the National Assembly.

"Subsequently, the draft proclamation with accompanying resolution was submitted to His Excellency the Governor General and a proclamation in the terms of the recommended draft was gazetted today, Jan. 16, 2015," Douglas said.

"I hereby now announce that I have advised His Excellency the Governor General to dissolve the Parliament, the National Assembly, effective today, Jan. 16, 2015 to give effect to the proclamation which has realigned the constituency boundaries of St. Christopher and Nevis," he added.

"The date of the General Election in St. Christopher and Nevis shall therefore be announced at a later date." he added.

CAL pilots suspended

The two pilots of the Caribbean Airlines Limited (CAL) flight, which almost collided with a JetBlue plane at JFK International Airport in New York last Saturday night, have been taken off duties, pending the outcome of an investigation.

This was confirmed by director of the Trinidad and Tobago Civil Aviation Authority (TTCAA) Ramesh Lutchmedial in a news release.

He did not say whether they are on suspension.

He noted, though, that safety inspectors of the TTCAA are expected to meet with Federal Aviation Administration Air Traffic Control (ATC) officials at JFK Airport to determine the facts surrounding the incident.

He said CAL is fully co-operating with the investigators.

The JetBlue passenger flight 1295, which was bound for Texas, was forced to abort its take-off after BW526 shot across the runway in front its path.

Reports have stated the CAL flight had landed on runway 22L of JFK at 10:27 p.m. following a flight from Cheddi Jagan International Airport in Guyana. Its pilots were instructed by air traffic controllers to "hold short" or stop before the parallel runway (22R) on which JetBlue 1295 was about to gain speed for take-off.

According to a transcript of the ATC instructions, the CAL pilots were warned on three occasions to stop.

At 10.30 p.m, the final warning was given: "Caribbean 526, hold short... 526 STOP!"

The CAL pilots never responded and as a result JetBlue 1295 was immediately told to abort take-off to avoid a collision.

There were no injuries to passengers and both planes were not damaged. The JetBlue, an Airbus320, returned to the gate and took off for Austin, Texas three hours later.

In the news release, CAL said it was taking the alleged incident very seriously.

Two kinds of income inequality

Income inequality is back in the news, propelled by an Oxfam International report and President Barack Obama's State of the Union address. The question is whether government needs to do something about this — or whether government needs to undo many things.

Measuring income inequality is no simple thing, which is one source of disagreement between those who think inequality is a problem and those who think it isn't. But it is possible to cut through the underbrush and make some points clear.

We can identify two kinds of economic inequality, and let's keep this in mind as we contemplate what, if anything, government ought to do.

The first kind we might call market inequality. Individuals differ in many ways, including energy, ambition, and ingenuity. As a result, in a marketoriented economy some people will be better than others at satisfying consumers and will hence tend to make more money. The only way to prevent that is to interfere forcibly with the results of peaceful, positive-sum transactions in the marketplace. Since interference discourages the production of wealth, the equality fostered through violence will be an equality of impoverishment.

Is it better that people be equally poor or unequally affluent? This is the important question that political philoso-

pher John Tomasi, author of Free Market Fairness, puts to his classes at Brown University. Would they prefer a society in which everyone has the same low income, or one in which incomes vary, perhaps widely, but the lowest incomes are higher than the equal income of the first society?

Which would you choose? Let's remember that it is entirely possible for the poorest in a society to become richer even as the gap between the richest and poorest grows. Imagine an accordion-like elevator that is rising as a whole while being stretched out, putting the floor further from the ceiling. Would such a society be objectionable? Why is the relative position of the poorest more important than their absolute position? Is concern about relative positions nothing more than envy?

We could argue about that all day, but a much more urgent subject is political-economic inequality. This is the inequality fostered through the political system. Since government's distinctive feature is its claimed authority to use force aggressively (as opposed to defensively), this second sort of inequality is produced by violence, which on its face should make it abhorrent.

Political-economic systems throughout the world, including ones typically thought to be market-oriented (or "capitalist"), such as in the United States, are in fact built on deeply rooted and long-established systems of privilege. MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 18, 2015 (IPS) - Two decades after the first Summit of the Americas, a lot has changed in the continent and it has been for the good. Today, a renewed hemispheric dialogue without exclusions is possible.

Back in the mid-1990s, at the time of the Miami summit, it was the time of imported consensus, models of economic and social development exclusively based on the market and its supposed perfect allocation of resources through the invisible hand.

Hidden under a development rationale, the greatest wave of privatisation and deregulation took over the continent. The role of the state was reduced to be a facilitator of a process based on the principle of survival of the fittest. Solidarity, equity and justice were all values from the past and poverty a necessary collateral damage.

However, these values were in the top of the minds of the people of the hemisphere, who turned their backs to these policies and instead during the past 15 years, have forcefully supported the alternatives that combine economic growth with social inclusion, broadening opportunities for all citizens.

Economic growth went hand in hand with social inclusion, adding millions to the middle class – which today accounts for 34 percent of Latin Americans – surpassing the number of poor for the first time in the history.

If this was possible it was because governments added to the invisible hand of the market, the very visible hand of the state.

And this took place within the context of the worst post war global financial crisis that led to an unprecedented recession in the United States and Europe, which the latter still strives to leave behind.

Growth with social equity turned out to be the new regional consensus.

Today, this binds the region together.

Today, conditions are present to set up a more realistic cooperation in the Americas, where all members could partner in equal conditions, from the most powerful to the smallest islands in the Caribbean.

Today, nobody holds the monopoly over what works or does not; neither can anybody impose models because the established truths have crashed against reality. While in the 1990s social exclusion in domestic policies and voice exclusion at the international level were two sides of the same token, this in not any longer acceptable.

G20; still, this is not enough to embrace the new reality of our hemisphere.

To the existing bodies, the region has added in this past decade the dynamic UNASUR in South America and CELAC in the Americas, thus leaving the OAS as the only place for dialogue among all countries of the Americas, whether large, medium, small, powerful or vulnerable.

But, governmental or inter-governmental actors by themselves are not the only answer to the problems of today's world. Non-state actors of the non-governmental world, the private sector, trade unions and social organisations must be part of the process.

Leaders need to interpret the time in order to generate an agenda for progress, but progress that is tangible for people, for citizens, to whom we are accountable to.

Therefore, in a more uncertain international economic environment, we should focus on maintaining and expanding our social achievements and a new spirit of cooperation in the Americas can be instrumental for that.

The Summit of the Americas in Panama, in April 2015, may be the beginning of this new process of confidence building, where all countries can feel they can benefit from a cooperative agenda. This will be a historical moment because this time there will be no exclusions.

Dems not blameless in GOP Capitol gains

Speaker John Boehner was constrained to remark in a TV interview the other day that President Obama, during his recent State of the Union address, was looking out on members from the House and Senate that included 80 more Republicans than the last time he had done his State of the Union routine. Boehner's beef — that the president's speech should have reflected in tone and content the new Republican plurality, but didn't — was of course no excuse for the scowl the speaker wore on his face while sitting in back of the president for the entire hour or so of the address. But it does underscore a need to follow up on our comments last time around about the healthy GOP majority of Boehner's boast, and the distorted picture it paints of political reality across the landscape. And the role Democrats have accommodatingly played in facilitating this.

If last year's midterm results didn't light a fire, not under the average Democratic voter (since that clearly looks to be a stretch), but under those who consider themselves party leaders, heaven

only knows what else would. The presidential election year of 2012 found Obama staring at a sizeable enough chunk of the electorate hating his guts, a GOP/ Tea Party hierarchy obsessed with making the president a one-termer. The president's bold Affordable Care Act, fraught with teething problems, taking heat from all sides and with an "Obamacare" label derisively attached, gave opponents what they felt sure was a winning arsenal. Yet Democratic strategists were able to rally the troops, again assembling the same coalition of the Democratic faithful and middle-ground moderates as in 2008, to pull off a secondterm victory. Two years later, all of that boundless energy within the ranks dissipates and Democratic masterminds meekly cede the responsibility and power to energize to a Republican party that comes up on the wrong side of so much that ordinary people care about. An incredulous turn of events!

Gerrymandering in GOPcontrolled states explains a disproportionate breakdown of Congressional seats that favors Republicans. It does




not explain, even in borderline states, an incumbent Democrat or a new Democratic aspirant losing a Senate seat to the GOP, since gerrymandering isn't a factor. The more likely scenario is Democrats losing such contests either because of a resources deficiency or simply being outmaneuvered by the other side. Either way, the Democratic party leadership's pattern of a full-throttle, ramped up operation in presidential election years and markedly less pedal to the metal in off-year elections has been shown now, often enough, to be the inexplicable folly it is.

Democrats have a sizeable advantage, as far as the public siding with their views on what is America's better way forward. On issue after issue, Republicans are out of synch with the majority public perception. On hiking the hourly federal minimum wage to

\$10.10 from the current \$7.25, which Republicans in Congress steadfastly oppose, a Pew Research Center poll last year found raising the wage favored by 73 percent of respondents. One survey of small businesses, the regular Republican straw man in opposing this, found roughly two-thirds in favor of the wage hike. On giving priority to protection of the environment as opposed to allowing businesses to sidestep environmental considerations in the course of development plans, the public, by a healthy margin, again rejects the position of near indifference to environmental protection espoused by the GOP. On taxes, the public favors, by a wide margin, closing tax loopholes for large corporations that allow them to ship jobs overseas, another Republican no-no. And the public also gives broad support to raising taxes on the wealthy and big business to fund programs in education, job training, etc or, as the president has proposed, to offset a tax cut for middle-income earners. And the list goes on. Given such broad public

backing for where they stand, what excuse could there be for Democrats losing elections in places that aren't irreversibly red? We know all about the Koch brothers and others of that ilk prepared to spend whatever it takes to make the country more red than it is. And we know about the con jobs and dirty dealing that could come into play in campaigns. But Democrats coming out second best in places where they have no business doing so can only be attributed to the party organization's failure to up its game to the extent it has to.

If, institutionally, there's a malaise that attends much of the Democratic base, when a hot presidential candidate isn't leading the charge, then it's obvious that purging the base of that off-year stupor requires a focus it hasn't so far had from those calling the plays. Messaging may be wrong-headed, tactics as well. But devising effective means of sensitizing the troops to how critical is participation in the off-year game is priority bar none, to stem the tide of those losses by default.

which the rest of us must pay for one way or another, typically go to the well-connected, and prominent business executives have always been well represented in that group.

In the United States this has been true since the days of John Jacob Astor, the fur trader who had the ears of such influential politicians as James Madison, James Monroe, and John Quincy Adams. Government was little more than the executive committee of leading manufacturers, planters, and merchants (to risk opprobrium by paraphrasing Marx). As Adam Smith put it in The Wealth of Nations in 1776, "Whenever the legislature attempts to regulate the differences between masters and their workmen, its counsellors are always the masters."

While business interests today are not the only ones that get consideration in the halls of power, it's a mistake to think they do not retain major influence over government in economic and financial matters. "Regulatory capture" is a well-known phenomenon, and ostensible efforts to limit it always fail. Unlike market inequality, politicaleconomic inequality is unjust and should be eliminated.

How? By abolishing all direct and indirect subsidies; artificial scarcities, such as those created by so-called intellectual property; regulations, which inevitably burden smaller and yet-tobe-launched firms more than lawyeredup big businesses; eminent domain; and permit requirements, zoning, and occupational licensing, which all exclude competition. These interventions and more protect incumbent firms from conditions that would lower prices to consumers, create self-employment and worker-ownership opportunities, and improve bargaining conditions for wage labor.

Instead of symbolically tweaking the tax code to appear to be addressing inequality -- the politicians' charade -- political-economic inequality should be ended by repealing all privileges right now.

Commemorating Haiti's earthquake, 5 years later

In the morning of Jan. 12, 2015, Haitian government officials, foreign ambassadors, and ranking police commemorated the five-year anniversary of the Haitian earthquake at the site where thousands had been buried in a mass grave near Titanyen, miles north of Port-au-Prince. The earthquake killed 230,000 and injured thousands more.

Following speakers from Haiti's Catholic, Protestant and Vodou religious communities, President Michel Martelly spoke. During the proceedings, covered extensively by Haitian media, Martelly reminded the public how in the immediate aftermath of the earthquake everyone had come together, there was no Lavalas or Makout (political affiliations) or black or white and that Haitians, sometimes using nothing but bare hands and digging through the rubble of collapsed buildings, helped "a neighbor, a colleague, someone whom we had never met before."

Erol Josue, a Vodou priest called for all to reflect on the country as he recounted its his-


tory and that Vodou had been blamed for the earthquake. He retold that in fact, it was Vodou that set in motion the revolution. "Give Haiti a chance, put aside all of your personal problems," he said. "We lost a lot of people, even people who came to visit us...we lost hope."

Following remarks, the president and his wife placed wreaths on a memorial that had been constructed just days before.

Outside the ceremony, two small groups of Haitians demonstrated for and against the current government.

Now Haiti's memorial day, other intimate local commemorations took place on Jan. 12 including one held at a memorial area at the environmental education center Martissant Park.

A mass took place at a church adjacent to the main Cathedral that collapsed during the earthquake. There was an observance at the Bureau of Ethnology where Vodou priestesses performed a ceremony to bless those killed.

Fight to save Haiti's gingerbread homes

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) _ It wasn't until the 2010 earthquake devastated Haiti's capital that many people even realized that dozens of the city's grandest old buildings were still standing — its quirky and ornate "gingerbread houses" with their fancy latticework, turrets and spires.

Amid the destruction, some Haitians realized time was running out to save the architectural gems, often hidden behind concrete walls, that had been steadily vanishing to bulldozers and cheap renovations as Port-au-Prince became a sprawling and overcrowded city.

It was when the concrete walls and structures crumbled all around them that you suddenly saw these ginger-bread houses from the street," said Lucie Couet, a French city planner working for a Haitian nonprofit group trying to safeguard the old dwellings.

Now, there's an uphill race to save them the graceful structures that, unlike the tens of thousands of modern concrete buildings leveled by the 7.0-magnitude quake, often emerged largely unscathed because of the flexibility of their wooden frames.

Local craftsmen working for the Haitian nonprofit Knowledge & Freedom Foundation, or FOKAL, are learning how to restore the homes to their former splendor. Since masonry and carpentry skills aren't being passed down the generations as they used to be, the dozen young builders are being trained how to work with imported wood, ochre-colored bricks and lime mortar instead of contemporary concrete blocks and cement.

tian art, not like the concrete block boxes that replaced them," trainee Jean Lucknor Lefevre said while using a trowel to mix lime mortar in a wheelbarrow at one of two dilapidated gingerbread homes bought by FOKAL in hopes of restoring them into showpieces of cultural preservation.

The group's president, former Prime Minister Michele Pierre-Louis, said the roughly 200 gingerbreads still standing in Port-au-Prince are an important part of the national identity. While their restoration might be seen as inessential given the sheer scope of Haiti's housing problems, she believes it is imperative to protect the troubled country's architectural heritage.

You see there is a trend, a tendency to say since you are poor, it's like you don't deserve this type of thing (restoration efforts). This is really what we have been fighting against," said Pierre-Louis, whose group is getting support from the New York-based World Monuments Fund and the Walloon Heritage Institute in Belgium.

The hurdles are many.

Unlike in many countries in the developed world, Haiti has no government subsidies for restoring privately owned, historic buildings. And as the price of real estate soars amid quake reconstruction, owners of land with gingerbread homes are being enticed by offers from developers wanting to build offices or apartments



Former Guyanese MP Dr. Faith Harding has died

Compatriots are in shock and saddened at the passing of Dr. Faith Harding, a Guyanese treasure and an educator who touched the lives of thousands of citizens in the Republic and around the world. She was 67-years old.

Dr. Harding, a former member of Parliament under the People's National Congress/Reform (PNC/R) and government minister, died on Friday, Jan. 23, in her homeland after a brief illness.

"I feel deep sadness to hear of the death of Dr. Harding.""She was a phenomenal woman," "she had an infectious laughter," "a warm personality," "a woman of class," "lovely lady" "I feel deep sadness to hear of the death of Dr. Harding."were all sentiments shared by many.

Dr. Harding who was the first female born in Guyana to seek the nomination of her party to vie for the presidency in 2011 but was unsuccessful, inspired a generation.

A psychotherapist and fierce advocate for women's rights, Dr. Harding was vigilant in her pursuit to educate youth and empower women through several projects. She started an agricultural initiative with

a gift of sorrel seedlings she received from the Mexican government, giving women the opportunity to start their own businesses.

"I loved that she always sent out positive vibes. She always had a smile, and would extend a hug. My most indelible memory was attending a Kwe Kwe at her home for her son's marriage," said Dr. Vibert Cambridge, president of the Guyana Cultural Association.

He added, "She enjoyed and celebrated her heritage. I will always remember her culinary skills. For me, she made the best souse in Guyana."

Cultural Director of GCA, Claire Goring expressed her sadness, and remembered Dr. Harding as a staunch supporter

According to Guyana's Kaieteur news, the veteran mental health practitioner was instrumental in developing the Early Childhood (Nursery) Education curriculum for the Cyril Potter College of Education (CPCE) in the 1980s. She once held the position of assistant chief education officer within the Ministry of Education.

Dr. Harding, who did extensive work studying the human brain, graduated from Columbia University and held a Bachelor of Education Degree, and two master's degrees, one in Arts & Curriculum and the other in Education.

Husband Patrick Harding, president of the Gold Miners Association, son, Patrick Jr., sister Christine Blackmoore Williams, and others mourn her death.

Canadians are to enjoy exemption from stocks purchased on the Jamaican Stock Exchange (JSE) as of April 1, 2015, said Arnaldo Brown, minister

of state in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade.

The minister was speaking at the Jamai-

ca Association for the Resettlement of Returning Residents (JARRR) Conference at the Jamaica Conference Center in Kingston recently.

The Canadian government has previously announced that as June 2014, Canadian investors were exempt from taxes on the income derived from stocks purchased on the Jamaican Stock Exchange.

The Canadian High Commissioner to Jamaica Robert Ready, noted these changes to the Income Tax Act while speaking at the Jamaica Stock Exchange Best Practice Awards last month.

He said that this development "will be more attractive to Canadian pension funds, investment managers and investors, including the diaspora."

With the implementation of measures to facilitate Jamaican Canadians purchasing Jamaican stocks, Brown is urging members of the diaspora to invest in the Jamaican stock market. He said that this would be the main focus at the Jamaica Diaspora Conference to

be held in June.

St. Lucia

St. Lucia has recorded a six percent increase in tourist arrivals in 2014 when compared to figures for 2013.

According to the St. Lucia Tourist Board, total stay over visitor arrivals are estimated at 338,158.

It said figures recorded for seven months in 2014 — February, March, April, June, October, November and December were the highest ever reached for these specific months.

At a recent news conference called to review



the industry's performance, Tourism Minister Lorne Theophilius reaffirmed the buoyancy of the U.S. market as the island's main geographic market.

"The U.S. is by far the island's largest source market, commanding just under half (42 percent) of total arrivals. Further, arrivals from this market is due to targeted marketing strategies grew ll percent over the last year's figures," Theophilius noted.

The UK maintained the second-largest source market, with 22 percent share of arrivals.

However, the minister said the Caribbean market shrank by eight percent in 2014, acquiring 16 percent of market - compiled by Azad Ali share.

"Old pirates, yes they rob I" — Bob Marley.

Some Jamaicans are voicing Bob Marley's "Redemption Song" to express their ire about Miss Jamaica's fourth-runner up position in the recent Miss Universe beauty pageant.

They are convinced Kaci Fennell was robbed of the jeweled crown and title she contested against 87-queens from as many nations at the Florida University Arena in Doral, Miami. Named among the five finalists to win the title, Fennell received overwhelming approval from the crowd early in the contest and from the applause and cheers from patrons was perceived favored to win.

However, when the last segment of the pageant announced the runners up to the winning queen, loud boos were heard after 22-year-old Fennell was named first to be eliminated from the international contest.


"Kaci was robbed," dominated social media network.


And at viewing parties throughout the Caribbean island, Jamaicans conceded their queen may have been victimized.



CONCACAF Under-20 men's tourney

Last Saturday, Jan. 24, was a crucial date in the CONCACAF Under-20 men's soccer tournament in Montego Bay, Jamaica. Group A winner Mexico came up against Group B winner Panama in the 2015 CONCACAF Under-20 championship, while the USA was in a must-win battle against El Salvador for a berth in the FIFA Under-20 Men's World Cup slated for New Zealand next summer. Mexico and the USA prevailed.

After a hard-fought battle between Mexico and an emerging and talented Panama team that lasted two overtime periods, Mexico came away with a 4-2 win in penalty kicks to capture the 2015 CONCACAF title in this age group; it was Mexico's third consecutive title in the event and 13th overall. The CONCACAF tournament also qualifies the top four teams for the **Continued on Page 36**

FIFA tournament, which means, despite the championship loss, Panama, along with second-place group finishers USA and Honduras, will join Mexico to represent CONCACAF in New Zealand at the FIFA Under-20 Men's World Cup in June.

Mexico forged ahead, 1-0, on Guillermo Martinez's header off a corner kick in the 50th minute and continued to lead for most of the game; it was the first goal scored against Panama during the tournament. The talented and relentless Panamanians kept playing, searching for the equalizer, which came in the 70th minute when Fidel Escobar registered a penalty kick after Ismael Diaz was fouled in the penalty area.

Both teams battled tirelessly through two overtime periods in a well-played game. Mexico won on penalties from Martinez, Alejandro Diaz, Jose Robles and Erick Aguirre; Escobar and Diaz hit penalties for Panama.

In another game at the same venue, the USA, which got off to a slow start in the tournament, had put together late wins versus Trinidad and Tobago and Guatemala in earlier games to put the team in a position to battle El Salvador for the second place in Group B. Goals from Ben Spencer and Paul Arriola gave the Americans a 2-0 win.

The Tab Ramos-coached U.S. team depended on its bench for the win. Spencer gave the U.S. a 1-0 lead in the 37th minute off an assist by Emerson Hynd-

man. The lead lasted through halftime. Ramos, a former U.S. international forward, went to his bench and replaced Spencer with Arriola just after the half. Arriola combined with another second half substitute, Junior Flores, to ensure the win with the second goal in the 68th minute. Arriola tallied off Flores' cross when Bradford Jamieson' initial shot was fruitless. U.S. goalkeeper Zack Steffen saved a penalty kick that would have tied the game for El Salvador in the 53rd minute. 


Guyana bowled out for 65 runs in 23.5 overs


