Caribbean states light the renewable path

United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-moon savs Caribbean states are "lighting countries for taking on ambithe path" towards a sustainable future, as the international community is in the final stretch of preparing a trans-

formative post-2015 agenda for sustainable development.

"I want to salute Caribbean tious renewable energy targets," declared Ban in Bridgetown, Barbados on Thursday in addressing a high-level sym-

posium focused on sustainable development in the Caribbean.

"By 2020, for example, Barbados will be one of the world's top five leading users of solar

energy on a per capita basis," Continued on Page 3

CARICOM BACKS GUYANA Border dispute with Venezuela expected to worsen

Guyana's aggressive courting of international diplomatic partners such as the 15-nation Caribbean Community (CARI-COM) and the United Nations appeared to have pushed back plans by neighboring Venezuela to successfully lay claim to a large new offshore area that had stretched all the way to the small Eastern island nations but there is every indication that the simmering border controversy will worsen in the coming months.

Oil and gas-rich Venezuela has for decades disputed the 1899 boundary line between line between the two continental nations but authorities

there appeared to have been rattled by Exxon Mobil's recent discovery of an elephant well off Guyana's east coast and have ratcheted up claims much to the consternation and chagrin of their English-speaking neighbor.

Days after the American oil giant had announced that its Liza 1 well was ready to gush significant oil and gas deposits, President Nicolas Maduro's government published a new offshore boundary demarcation that ran as far southeast as northern Suriname and into the offshore areas of some of the smaller island nations further north in the regional

Caribbean

CARICOM says it disagrees with statements that the 15-member regional grouping "has been slow" to deal with the unfolding situation in the Dominican Republic where people of Haitian descent are being deported from the Spanish-speaking country.

CARICOM Secretary General Irwin La Rocque told reporters in Barbados ahead of the July 2-4 summit of regional leaders "I disagree. I fundamentally disagree".

He said the issue will be among agenda items to be dis-

cussed by CARICOM leaders regarding the Dominican Republic matter.

The Dominican

Republic gave a deadline of June 17, 2015, for people of Haitian descent to apply for legal residency.

Hundreds of people, mostly, lowwage workers from neighboring Haiti, waited in line for hours to submit residency applications under a registration initiative that began in June last year.

The Dominican Republic has said that migrants who can prove they entered the country before October 2011 can qualify for legal residency.

Antigua

Residents within the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) sub-grouping will no longer have to travel abroad for treatment of cancer and other chronic non-communicable diseases.

This as the grouping recently opened its Organization of Eastern Caribbean (OECS) Cancer Center in St. John's Antigua.

The Center, which is the brainchild of former prime minister now opposition leader Baldwin Spencer took three years from ground-breaking in April 2012 to formal opening in June 2015 and is partnered after a similar center in The Bahamas.

Although based in Antigua and Barbuda, the center will be jointly owned by all OECS member states.

Spencer said that the opening of the Caner Center will improve the provision of accessible cancer treatment services throughout the sub-region, since the center will provide high quality medical radiation and surgical oncology services which will be markedly discounted for government supported patients.

Cancer services at government hospitals throughout the sub region is expected to be boosted through regular oncology clinics, developing cost effective and safe chemo therapy services providing oversight and expertize in the various islands and by providing major

cost savings to partner governments.

Former Caribbean Community (CARICOM) chairman and prime minister of The Bahamas, Perry Christie, highlighted the fact that every year more than 1,000 persons are diagnosed with cancer within the OECS.

He also noted the opportunity for medical tourism even as he underscored the importance of healthier lifestyles by regional citizens.

Bahamas

After months of uncertainty, Bahamas mega resort Baha Mar announced it had filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy in the U.S. district court of Delaware and warned it would have to cut jobs if it does not resolve the matter "in the next few weeks."

"The board of directors has determined that due to the financial consequences of the repeated delay by the general contractor, and the resulting

loss of revenue, the Chapter 11 process is the best path to provide the time to put in place a viable capital structure and working

relationships to complete construction and successfully open Baha Mar," the resort said in a statement.

Baha Mar Ltd. will file an application in the Supreme Court of The Bahamas seeking approval of the U.S. court orders, the statement added.

ΒQ

The \$3.5 billion resort has been delayed three times and Baha Mar CEO Sarkis Izmirlian has charged that its contractor, China State Construction American Bahamas Ltd, is to blame.

The Export Bank of China is financing the resort. There are about 2,000 employees at Baha Mar.

Barbados

The Barbados government has imposed a 10 percent tax on carbonated soft drinks, and fruit juices, with sweeteners with the aim to decrease consumption.

This is intended to help reduce the high incidence of non-communicable diseases, especially diabetes, and contribute to the overall good health of Barbadians.

This message from the Ministry of Health is in response to suggestions in the Daily Nation newspaper

recently that the tax was less about health and more about generating revenue.

The tax is in fact, all about health, the Ministry said.

Taxation is a proven method used in public health to influence positive behavior. This was clearly demonstrated in the reduced demand from and consumption of tobacco products after these products were taxed," the statement added.

It further disclosed there is evidence emerging which suggests taxing food high in salt and sugar "had good public health benefits."

The "Health of the Nation Study" conducted in Barbados in 2012 revealed two in every three Barbadian adults were overweight or obese. One in three adults was hypertensive, and one in five, diabetic.

Grenada

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) announced that Grenada will receive US\$2.8 million after the island successfully completed the second review of its economic performance under a three-year program supported by the Extended Fund Facility (ECF).

The IMF said that the disbursement brings to US\$8.5 million the amount of funds made available to Grenada since the US\$21.7 million

EFC arrangements was approved in June 2014. Grenadian "The



authorities have achieved important results in the context of their Fundsupported economic program. Fiscal targets have been exceeded, important reforms of the fiscal policy framework have been put in place and significant progress has been made in restructuring public debt," IMF Deputy Managing Director Min Zhu said.

Fearing for the worse, Guyana took the issue to last week's CARICOM leaders summit in Barbados, transforming what had appeared to be a moribund agenda into one that had extensive discussions on the implications of the new boundary line for Guyana and its regional family members.

In the end the bloc, through current Chairman and Barbadian Prime Minister Freundel Stuart, told Maduro to keep its hands off Guyana despite diplomatic waffling from St. Vincent, Dominica and a few others which have extremely strong ties with Venezuela and are key beneficiaries of grant and other forms of aid from Caracas. "We have to make sure that the situation does not spin out of control and ensure that level heads are held on both sides," Stuart said noting the fact that CARICOM is behind Guyana on this.

sit at the table with President David Granger and other leaders but predictably backed out after Granger scrubbed plans

to meet him if the published map was not taken down and discarded.

But by the time Granger had landed back at his office in Georgetown, Maduro was addressing his own parliament, announcing plans to recall Ambassador Reyna Margarita Arratia for consultations, generally review relations with Guyana and to scale down its presence there, moves Foreign Minister Carl Greenidge dismissed as playing to a home gallery.

The saber rattling between the two, however, has not apparently affected Guyana's purchase from Venezuela of about 6,000 barrels or half the daily needs.

As Guyanese diplomats monitored the situation in Caracas, Maduro published a brand new map on Monday but this time without any numerical coordinates showing exactly where the country is claiming as its new marine borders.


Authorities there have made Maduro had been invited to it known that they are particularly irked by the fact that Exxon had palpably ignored 'orders' to stop the drilling and abandon the area much

as Texas-based firm Anadarko did when Venezuelan gunboats back in 2013 had expelled its seismic vessel and had arrested and detained its crew for more than a week.

And if anyone dares to think that the Venezuelan right wing is not in on the plot to grab Guyana's potentially rich offshore area, then they need only refer to recent statements by former foreign minister Jose Vicente Rangel who says the west is behind Guyana's aggressive saber rattling and is training armed groups to penetrate Venezuela.

He has charged that Guyana is being used as a platform by the west to smuggle arms into Venezuela, accusations Guyanese officials are yet to react to.

"U.S. Special Forces are reinforcing these activities in the area and, from the waterways of the Yuruani River in Essequibo in the vicinity of the sector called Anacoco, they are training personnel to raid Venezuelan areas as part of a social and economic destabilization program in the region. International intelligence agencies





Haiti president, business leaders open new container port



PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) _ Haitian President Michel Martelly, business leaders and civic boosters inaugurated an \$80 million container port Thursday aimed at giving the hemisphere's poorest country a much bigger role in global shipping.

Sitting just outside the capital of Portau-Prince, Port Lafito is designed to handle the massive ships that will be able to pass through the newly expanded Panama Canal. Hopes are it will anchor an economic zone that will create 25,000 jobs by 2020.

The canal expansion has caused many countries to build or upgrade port infrastructure in hopes of playing a major role in global supply chains. But perhaps nowhere are the stakes higher than in Haiti, where the World Bank says 59 percent of people live on less than \$2.44 a day and an additional 24 percent live on less than half that.

"This project will make a significant impact on the national economy and have a beneficial impact on the more than 10 million people that live here," said Reuven Bigio, CEO of the GB Group

conglomerate.

GB Group, which is majority-owned by Gilbert Bigio, one of Haiti's wealthiest men, has partnered at the port with Seattle-based SSA Marine, which will oversee operations. The Haitian state bank, International Finance Corp. and Dutch development bank are among institutions that invested in the project.

Officials already have agreements with international shipping companies Evergreen Marine and King Ocean Services to make port calls. An agreement was also signed between Port Lafito and Miami's port to collaborate on cargo traffic.

The port, which has two mobile cranes, two top loaders and 16 trucks, is scheduled to see its first ship Sunday.

Haiti is located on busy sea lanes between North, Central and South American markets, and independent shipping experts express optimism Port Lafito will be a boon for Haiti.

"This will go a long way at improving the commercial prospects of a country that is plagued with inefficiencies, corruption and rent-seeking behavior," said Jean-Paul Rodrigue, a global transport expert and professor at Hofstra University in Hempstead, New York.

Martelly said Haiti needs "more models of this type of project" as it continues to recover from the 2010 earthquake that devastated much of the capital and surrounding areas.

The port sits next to a rapidly growing community called Canaan where so many people displaced by the quake carved out homesteads that it's now considered Haiti's fourth largest urban district. Residents hope the port will provide them with jobs.

Warner hires legal team

Former FIFA Vice-President Jack Warner has hired a team of attorneys, including British Queen's Counsel Edward Fitzgerald to fight his extradition to the United States.

Warner, a former Trinidad and Tobago national security minister, and leader of the Independent Liberal Party (ILP) has been indicted by the U.S. Department of Justice on charges of corruption, money laundering and racketeering during his time in FIFA, is free on \$2.5 million bail.

He also a member of Parliament for Chaguanas West, Central Trinidad.

So far the U.S. had not yet sent a final request for extradition.

Warner said he intends fighting the extradition, but would go to the U.S. if the court ruled against him.

"It is going to be a long hot summer," he told supporters at a cottage meeting in South Trinidad last week.

One of his local attorneys Reka Ramjit said the extradition matter could take several years in the local courts.

Attorney Fitzgerald QC is reported to have defended controversial Muslim cleric Abu Hamza and Moors murderer Myra Hindley in the United Kingdom.

Everyone can't simply move to the Caribbean

Living life on an island with beautiful ocean views, breathtaking sunsets, rich in culture, history, food and plenty rum that is a life envious of anyone. Whether you are of Caribbean descent or not, there is something enticing about leaving the fog and dirty beaches of our beloved New York City for that clear ocean blue found in Trinidad and Tobago or the Bahamas.

A new trend seems to be heating up, though it isn't very new at all, of people leaving their lives up to fate to live a simpler life on the island of their choice. Articles on Forbes, the New York Times and other blog sites have tapped these individuals to discuss their journeys.

Most recently, Noelle Hancock penned a liberating story for Cosmopolitan Magazine explaining why four years ago she packed her bags and left her cushy \$95,000 job to scoop ice cream with the ocean as her backdrop.

Hancock described her life living comfortably in Manhattan as a journalist pulling in a hefty salary as unfortunately very unfulfilling. She wrote:

"I need a vacation.' This was a constant refrain in my head. I wasn't living in the moment; I was living for some indeterminate moment in the future when I'd saved enough money and vacation days to take a trip somewhere. If you're constantly thinking you need a vacation, maybe what you really need is a new life. But I was complacent. My life wasn't satisfying, but it was comfortable."

This persistent mantra led to her moving to the island of St. John (one of the Virgin Islands) without even visiting, much to her mother's dismay and friend's confusion. Hancock was on a mission to reinvent and restart and that is exactly what she did.

Her story is liberating. For many feeling that they have hit a point in their life where the cogs are no longer moving, Hancock's story might be all that one needs to push them to start afresh.

But before you quit and pack those suitcases filled with permanent summer dresses, shorts and open toed shoes, consider all the factors that made Hancock's move possible.

For starters, it is safe to assume that Hancock had the means to make such a bold move – she was grossing a salary of \$95,000. Savings coupled with good credit is certainly a necessary detail needed. Many articles with the same story as Hancock manage to neglect the nest egg necessary to ship off on a one-way ticket to paradise.

Enshrining a presumption of openness

The president has a new opportunity to ensure that the openness policies laid out on his first day of office do not end on his last day. On Jan. 21, 2009, President Obama signed an executive order and two presidential memoranda to usher in what he called a "new era of openness."

The presidential memo on the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) ordered federal agencies to operate under a clear presumption of disclosure for information requested under FOIA. "All agencies should adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure, in order to renew their commitment to the principles embodied in FOIA, and to usher in a new era of open government," according to the memo. "The presumption of disclosure should be applied to all decisions involving FOIA."

Following on the president's day one FOIA memo, Attorney General Eric Holder issued new guidelines for implementing the presumption of disclosure. Holder's March 19, 2009 memo states that agencies "should not withhold information simply because it may do so legally," and strongly encourages agencies "to make discretionary disclosures of information." The memo also emphasizes that "FOIA professionals should be mindful of their obligation to work 'in a spirit of cooperation' with FOIA requesters," and notes that "[o]pen government requires agencies to work

proactively and respond to requests promptly."

The language in the presidential memo and subsequent FOIA guidance was praised by transparency proponents who had called on President Obama to reverse the secrecy trend of the Bush-era and issue new directives on openness. The directives marked a transformative shift from the prior administration, when the DOJ instructed agencies to essentially withhold whatever they could under FOIA.

Now the president should support legislation that ensures that the next administration cannot undo his guidance, and resort to the presumption of secrecy that guided agencies in the past. However, much to the chagrin of openness advocates, instead of the hoped-for support of the President for his own language and directions, persistent behind-the-scenes resistance appears to have come from the administration and executive agencies.

It is the time for the president to publicly support the language in the FOIA reform bills moving in Congress.

Two bipartisan Freedom of Information Act bills in Senate (S. 337) and the House (H.R. 653) will codify the administration's FOIA policy and guidance while strengthening citizens' access to public information.

Each contains language that closely mirrors the administration's instructions on FOIA - which otherwise cannot be guaranteed to last into the next administration. While there are differences in the language, the bills would solidify the presumption of openness, requiring records to be released unless there is a specific foreseeable harm or legal requirement to withhold them.

These FOIA reforms are critical for achieving the unprecedented levels of openness promised by the president, on day one, when he announced that "every agency and department should know that this administration stands on the side not of those who seek to withhold information, but those who seek to make it known."

Although we remain adamant, in this space, that the less said about one Donald Trump the better, it should be more than a bit bothersome to the bulk of the national electorate that it was a good news / bad news scenario that followed this racist buffoon's entry into the Republican field of presidential aspirants. Why was there a bad-news component? Why, with the likes of NBC, Macy's, professional golf and others responding maturely to his typical sleazeball utterances and giving him the boot, was there need for a countervailing madness of second place in GOP voter preference polling going to such a jerk? Why, indeed, a result so ludicrous from a supposedly informed citizenry?

For starters, we ought be reminded that the notion of the informed or enlightened electorate is one that at times cries out for strict reality-check review – that although the electorate has twice shocked itself and voted Barack Obama into office, it has also seen fit to maintain a Republican majority in the House of Representatives

that, among other things, has voted about 60 times to derail the Affordable Care Act, indifferent to the critical need it fills for millions of fellow Americans. The "informed" electorate routinely votes into office Senators and House members who pooh-pooh scientific evidence on global warming and attach no priority to protection of the environment. An "informed" voting public, both at federal and state level, elects avowed apologists for ongoing carnage resulting from the profusion of unregulated guns in the country. In light of all of which, and more, so-called likely Republican voters giving a significant enough thumbsup to a Trump side show performance seems not much of an oddity, where Republicans are concerned.

Fact is, Trump may be the most obscenely distasteful of the lot but among the cast of characters vying for the nomination there's no shortage of weirdos who would lead the country God only knows where, if given the chance. Conservative extremists like Rick Perry, Rick Santorum,



Scott Walker and others in the mad GOP scramble may not have the Trump capacity to make themselves super-obnoxious, but they don't cede much to Trump as far as their ambitions for taking the country into a darker, more regressive place.

The recent Supreme Court decisions on the Affordable Care Act and marriage equality highlighted the energy in the conservative sector for stopping in its tracks anything that hints at embracing a 21st century outlook for the country. There's no one among the Republicans running for president who is on the side of what the high court decided in those two matters, with the possible exception of a contender whose name is hardly ever mentioned, former New York Governor George Pataki. And what's amazing is that the presidential wannabes adopt hard-line positions on the recent court rulings and other front-burner issues, little concerned that theirs is not a reflection of majority sentiment among the population. Indeed, two high court conservatives, Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Anthony Kennedy, were not surprisingly blasted across the conservative spectrum for daring to cast votes that mirrored the views of the hoi polloi.

That conservative disconnect with popular sentiment makes a GOP House major-ity since 2011, a GOP Senate majority as of this year and GOP control of most of the state houses around the country difficult to reconcile. On its face, the idea that Republicans, touting values that are out of step with most of the polity, could exercise a disproportionate amount of control doesn't seem to add up. Thoughts again turn to the high court and the infamous Citizens United decision that allowed unlimited, unregulated funds into the electioneering process and brought names like the Koch brothers front and center as shapers of the nation's political

course — a decision in which the votes then cast by Justices Roberts and Kennedy made for the great un-leveling of the political playing field, turning participatory democracy on its head.

We thus have an environment in which a Trump revels. Spewing racist venom as he did against the Mexicans, his was a direct appeal to the haters like himself on the Republican side of the divide. We of course had heard him play that song before, even targeting the president of the United States, no less. The Republican crowd, even as partial as it has been known to be on occasion to extremist hucksters, will likely humor Trump only but so long. Obama's being elected president has set in motion this frenzy among a collection of right-side kooks, that any of them could do likewise. Sometime between now and when the next president is sworn in. the kooks will have come to realize, we think, that those dreams of relatively easy elevation to the White House are pure myth.

Zhu said Grenada is well advanced in its ambitions fiscal adjustment and in restoring debt sustainability.

He said good progress has been achieved in advancing the regional the banking system, coordinated by the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank.


Guyana

Former Guyana President Bharath Jagdeo has been named as Opposition Leader by the main opposition People's Progressive Party/Civic, even though it is still to determine whether or not he will take up the position in the National Assembly.

PPP/C General Secretary Clement Rohee told a news conference recently that the PP's list of legislators has already identified and the party's list of regional representative has been forwarded to the Guyana Elections Commission.

Rohee confirmed that a report in a daily newspaper in Guyana identifying Jagdeo as Opposition Leader was true and that it was now left to the former head of state to accept the posi-

tion. The report noted that Jagdeo, who served as president from 1999-2011.



The PPP/C controls 32 of the 65 seats in the National Assembly, but the party has claimed that the May 16 poll was rigged and has since filed a petition to declare the results null and void.


Jamaica

Damion Bryan Barrett, the first Jamaican to be extradited to the United States to face lottery fraud charges, has been sentenced to almost four years in a U.S. federal prison.

Barrett, 29, who pleaded guilty earlier this year of being part of a wire fraud conspiracy, was sentenced recently when he appeared in a south Florida court.

District Judge Williams Zloch sentenced Barrett to 46 months in prison and ordered to pay US\$94,456 in restitution.

If he receives a job in prison that pays wages, he would have to turn over half of it toward the judgment.



Barrett was part of a conspiracy that tricked senior citizens into believing that they had won millions of dollars and as a result, needed to pay advance fees to claim their winnings.

The sweepstakes scam that operated between late 2008 and 2012, used middlemen in South Florida to collect cash from victim all over the U.S. The middlemen took a percentage and sent the rest to Barrett in Jamaica.

According to prosecutors, this case could pave the way to holing foreigners accountable for preying on Americans.

Suriname

President Desi Bouterse has fired Paul Somohardjo as the acting Speaker in a move he said was aimed at avoiding a possible legislative and constitutional crisis in Suriname.

Somohardjo, the oldest elected legislator, was sworn in recently by Bouterse in order to convene the first session of the new Parliament following general elections last month.

But Bouterse told reporters he had no other choice than to relieve Somohardajo of his duties after the legislator sent a letter to him indicating he wasn't able to convene the meeting.

"I had no other choice than to dismiss Mr. Somohardajo since his actions would have created a constitutional incident if by June 30 the new parliament hasn't been sworn it," he said.

Somohardjo, during a meeting with

Bouterse, had said he needed more time to prepare the inaugural session of the legislative, but the head of state argued



that it would have been against the constitution since the term of the current parliament ended on June 30, exactly five years after it was inaugurated.

The acting Speaker said that taking into account the results of the May 25 general elections were only confirmed on June 15, that newly-elected members of Parliament should be sworn in no later than 30 days, making July 15, the appropriate day to begin the new parliament.

In the general elections Bouterse's National Democratic Party secured 26 seats in the 51-seat parliament.

However, legal experts are questioning whether or not Bouterse has constitutional powers to fire the acting Speaker.

Trinidad

A new air transport agreement signed between Trinidad and Tobago and Canada is expected to further boost trade and tourism between the two countries.

Speaking at the signing ceremony held at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Port of Spain, Foreign Minister Winston Dookeran described the agreement as an important milestone.

"Trinidad and Tobago will benefit by being able to do more flexible routing to Canada via other countries, also



with respect to coming from other countries to Trinidad," he explained.

Noting that Trinidad and Tobago's last air services agreement with Canada was signed in 1971, High Commissioner of Canada to Trinidad and Tobago Gerard Latulippe said, once ratified, the new agreement will replace the former agreement. ATTORNEY

Belizean sustainable fisher receives award

Since she was seven years old, Anna Ramirez, now 63, has been fishing with her family off the coast of Belize's southernmost district - Toledo, but her gender has not stopped her from working just as hard as the men do while at sea.

Her most challenging moments have involved braving the rough seas, even under the threat of hurricanes, to ensure they make it to shore safely. "It's not easy. You have to be brave and willing to take chances - big chances too!" she said.

"The same way a man could fish, you can. The same way they drive an engine, you could do it too. The same way they could throw a net, you could throw a net!" Anna says. "It's the way they raised me," she later explained.

The area where they traditionally fished was declared the Port Honduras Marine Reserve Area in 2000, and today, the family says that the introduction of a managed access program there by the Belize Fisheries Department has notably helped to reduce illegal fishing in the area, thus improving their fish catch. Notably, Mrs. Ramirez was instrumental in the establishment of the reserve.

Anna married Rafael Ramirez, who is also a fisher. They have, in turn, taught their children to fish and five of them are still active: Carlos, George, Roy, Armando, who is the chairman Mrs. Ramirez has three of the Rio Grande Fishermen's Cooperative in Punta Gorda, and Anna, who is the secretary of the Toledo Fisherman Association and the president of

daughter of Francisco Castel- the Toledo Dry Fruit women's group. Genny, who does scuba diving with the Toledo Institute for Development and Environment - TIDE, does so to a lesser extent. Her other daughter, Claudio Olivarez, lives in Corozal in northern Belize and works as a teacher at a Seventh Day Adventist high school in Calcutta Village.

Mrs. Ramirez said that her biggest reward is having been able to train her children, teaching them what she knows. "It is a very good feeling!" she said.

While the elder Anna no longer routinely fishes, most of her nine children, including her namesake, still do, and she markets their produce at the Punta Gorda Town market in Toledo, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. She does not sell at the market on Saturdays, since she has observed the Sabbath for the past 35-40 years.

She said that her fishing career has made her an independent woman, and she never

THE CARIBBEAN BUSINESS REPORT Healthy twists on Caribbean dishes

Can organic, healthy and Caribbean be said all in the same sentence?

"It's not expected but it's really good and I am dying to try these coconut wings," Tempral added.

Accompanied by the sounds of the steel pan in the backvard of the venue, all in attendance enjoyed Ro's staple cocktails and sample portions of her reimagined Caribbean food. Taking an Italian staple, ravioli, Ro reinvents the pasta dish by filling it with callaloo and drizzling it with a Guyanese curry sauce. Another staple and favorite on the menu are her "Fun N'Flirty Fish Cakes.'

"He's doing very well with reading so he reads his own recipes. He knows what needs to go into the dish, he'll help me mix them — the only thing he doesn't get to do is anything with the stove or fire or anything that can injure him," Ro said.

The self-proclaimed "mom-mypreneur" prides herself in creating food that is delicious

and good for you - rich in flavor but light on your body.

"My menu is Caribbean and American fusion. I have a lot of vegan and vegetarian options as well. I would also like to point out what gives my company a difference or an edge from other companies that are doing a similar thing is that my ingredients are not processed," Ro said.

Although Sumptuous Bites was made public June 28, Ro has already catered many events during the past six months. From book launches to weddings, Sumptuous Bites combats the "you serve curry chicken" stigma with her versatile menu.

This is only the beginning for Ro. While she juggles being a mother to her four-vearold son Pharaoh, helping her mother with their restaurant, managing "Make Food Not War" blog and her rising client list for Sumptuous Bites, the serial entrepreneur is already working on her next venture: an Internet cooking show.

"Pretty soon I will be recording an online cooking show. I love being in the kitchen and I think it's a great way for bringing awareness to this idea of a healthier, more nutritious, Caribbean type of food," Ro said.



reason why Anna Ramirez is deemed outstanding. It is her commitment and dedication to hard work, to encouraging the young people to take up the mantle—but moreover, to do so sustainably.

It is for these reasons that she was chosen for special recognition as the winner of the "Punta Fuego Outstanding Fisher of the Year Award," which was presented on the occasion of the first ever Fisherman's Day festivities in Belize on Monday, June 29, 2015.

In addition to the Punta Fuego award, she received a cash award from the Caribbean Regional Fisheries Mechanism (CRFM), whose Executive Director, Milton Haughton, lauded Mrs. Ramirez, who now stands out as a role model for the entire Caribbean, for her milestone achievement.

Punta Fuego, a drama which airs on Love FM, is also the name of a fictional coastal village in Belize, where Richie, a young fisherman, is put to the test when deceit and danger come to his village.

Mrs. Anna Ramirez was nominated for the award by Marla Ramirez of the Fisheries Department, who described her as, "not only a responsible fisher and advocate but a Belizean sustainable fisher."

"She has always taught her children to take out what is necessary and put back what is small. She is a strong advocate for size limits on finfish especially snappers and grunts," said Marla Ramirez. "Mrs. Anna has seen fishing change over the past decades and realizes that it is important to manage the fisheries in a sustainable manner."

Her sons dive for conch and lobster, but the family also catches a lot of finfish using drop lines or hand lines. Anna said that they don't use nets anymore because of the regulations introduced to govern fishing at the reserve.

Alliance was critical of the divisiveness that she said has "destroyed our nation", and called on her fellow citizens to pledge to "renew national spirit and our inheritance of hospitality, unity and cohesiveness."

Bishop John Cummings, Hindu Pandit Tilachdharry Seeratan and Muslim Imam Hajji Zakir blessed the commemoration in keeping with Guyana's multicultural heritage, after which, 11-year old Kamiyah Parchment delivered the national anthem. She has taught her children to leave the small fish to live and catch the bigger ones.

At the age of 34, the younger Anna is still fishing with her brothers and applying the wisdom her mother taught her. She fishes during the day and attends night school at Claver College Extension. She plans to attend the University of Belize afterwards to be qualified as a nurse, although she doesn't plan to give up fishing.

Her earnings from fishing are helping her to pay for her education. She may earn BZ\$50 to BZ\$100 a day, depending on what they catch and how much. The mother of four says that this is adequate for her to raise her family.

The younger Anna Ramirez started fishing when she was 13 and she did that until she was 22. Her husband, a tour guide, wanted her to be a homemaker and so she quit fishing for seven years, but today, Anna, who is now single, is back fishing with her brothers off the shores of Toledo, in the area of the Port Honduras Marine Reserve – the family's traditional fishing grounds.

Her mother, Mrs. Anna Ramirez, said that she has 33 grandchildren, and those who live in the community also go out to sea, particularly during the summer vacation. Joash Ramirez, 13, her daughter Anna's son, dives and gets a portion of the family's earnings to help take care of his school expenses, his mother said, demonstrating how the fishing tradition has been passed down to the fourth generation in her family.

While Mrs. Anna Ramirez is hopeful about the prospect of her grandchildren being able to earn a decent living in the industry, she emphasized the need for authorities to crack down on illegal fishing by foreigners who come from the neighboring countries to the south of Belize. She said that this sort of illegal fishing is currently the greatest threat to the industry.

Punctuated by all things Guyanese, included the Golden Arrowhead flag that littered the rotunda of the municipal building, emcees Tanuga Ragoo and Jonathon Locke brilliantly shared in the richness of Guyana's cultural diversity during presentations by Dr. Keith Proctor, "Glory" movement by Impressions Dance Theatre, and a Unity in Motion choreography by Shawn Shazim.

Drums of Freedom and Unity performed by Akoya Rudder and Winston Hoppie and a fashion extravaganza showcasing Sonia Noel's multi-layered talents, capped the vibrant independence celebration which was attended by more than 500 nationals.

Union Islanders see their beaches disappear

KINGSTOWN, St. Vincent, July 1, 2015 (IPS) - Fifteen years ago, Stephanie Browne, a former Member of Parliament in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, needed only to look at the beach outside her house to know why her community in Union Island was called "Big Sand."

So expansive were the beach and dunes that people played cricket games there without getting wet.

Today, just a few feet of sand remain, saved only by the large boulders that have been placed more than 20 feet into the sea, where the fence for Browne's property once stood.

"There could have been other reasons but I think climate change is the main reason for losing that beach down there," Browne, who retired from politics 15 years ago, tells IPS.

"The water is too deep to show you where our fence was because a part of our fence is now way out in the sea and we have lost land for a number of years," she says. "What we've had to do is to use the boulders to try to keep our land and that's why we are able to still have a little beach there. If not, there would absolutely be no beach," she explains.

Browne tells IPS that she estimates the amount of land lost is enough to build a two-bedroom house of the type common in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, complete with a yard and fencing.

"There was a lot of sand and a lot of beach. Now, we have a lot of rocks, trying to save what we can," she says.

Union Island is one of the southern-most islands in the archipelagic nation of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, a country of 32 islands, islets and cays.

Unlike St. Vincent, the "main island," the Grenadines has the white sand beaches commonly associated with tourism, the main revenue earner on the island and the country.

But rising seas, blamed on climate change, are beginning to imperil the beaches on the

"What we've had to do is to use five-kilometre by three-kilomee boulders to try to keep our tre island of 3,000 people.

Allan Providence, a senior officer at Union Island Airport, was born in St. Vincent but has been living in Union Island for 22 years.

"I know exactly what the island was like before it came to this point," he tells IPS while standing on the sliver of sand that remains at Big Sand.

"What you are seeing here, this location, this is a structure that they used to have beach-orama and picnics and so on, and even out in the water where you are seeing the water is breaking now was where people would congregate, partying," Providence says, pointing to an area 30 to 40 feet away.

The structure to which he referred is a concrete building with a zinc roof that has begun to collapse as the rising water undermines its foundation.

"But now, we have the sea is here. So, over the years, it has really degraded and brought it to this point," Providence tells

IPS.

"The water is rising and the sea is coming in, and that would definitely be as a result of climate change. Definitely. It was never like this," Providence tells IPS.

Residents of Union Island are doing what they can to highlight the impact of climate change.

One way that this is being done is through Radio Grenadines, an Internet radio station that was officially launched on June 12, two years after it was founded in the bedrooms of two residents.

The launch of the not-forprofit radio station coincided with the graduation of 21 its contributors from a media training course endorsed by the Association of Caribbean Media Workers.

The training programme focused on using media to spread awareness about climate change and what can be done at the level of the citizen. It was funded by the Global Environment Facility Small Grants Programme (GEF SGP).

Speaking at the graduation ceremony, Haydn Billingy, national co-ordinator of the GEF, noted that the National Anthem of St. Vincent and the Grenadines celebrates the seas and "golden sands" of the Grenadines.





The life of a 1960s Harlem kid

"Finding Samuel Lowe: China, Jamaica, Harlem" by Paula Williams Madison c.2015, Amistad \$25.99 / \$31.99 Canada 276 pages

Your last family reunion was a big one.

It was fun, too, and eye-opening. You hadn't really stopped to think about how many people are related to you until you saw aunts you hadn't seen in decades and met cousins you didn't even know you had.

That one had Grandma's eyes. This one has the distinctive family laugh. And, as in the new book "Finding Samuel Lowe" by Paula Williams Madison, there were many more surprises to come.

Growing up on the roughest block in Harlem in the early 1960s, Paula Williams Madison knew her family was unusual, starting with her Chinese-Jamaican mother. Nell Vera Lowe Williams was fierce and fearless she once held a meat cleaver

to a man who'd threatened her son – but she was also quietly sentimental. To Nell, nothing was more important than family and she insisted that her three children remain close, maybe because Nell had no parents or known siblings of her own.

Though they were estranged, Madison knew her mother and dad loved her. That, in fact, was a repeated theme she heard as a child: Nell often said that Madison was lucky to know a father's love. On that, Nell didn't elaborate much and she rarely discussed her childhood, leading Madison to wonder about her mother's father...

Over time, she learned that Samuel Lowe had left China for Jamaica in the early 1900s and later became a shopkeeper, having little-to-no contact with his "outside child" before returning to China in 1933, when Nell was 15. This, perhaps, caused the "persistent and painful sense of loss" Madison felt her entire life: her mother's hurt had become hers. She imagined finding her grandfather.

In late 2011, she finally seized the chance.


"Samuel Lowe" was too common a name for online searches, but querying elderly relatives offered clues and a long-lost cousin who informed Madison about an "alumni reunion" in Toronto. Someone else led her to a contact who knew some Lowes in China .

One of them was Samuel Lowe's son.

There's a lot to like about "Finding Samuel Lowe." There's a lot to learn here, too, but first, you'll have to ready yourself.

Be prepared, for example, not to fret over things that are hard to follow in this book. Author Paula Williams Martin includes a lengthy and highlyconvoluted family tree that's often "duppyproofed" with false names and birthdates. Seriously, the Book of Genesis is easier to follow than those sections; vou're best off just accepting that it mightn't make sense.

Get past that, though, ignore the repetition, and you'll find a

IRD 2015 Awards were presented to Winston Blake whose family has consistently provided the sounds Jamaicans appreciate regardless of genre. Using his popular Merritone Music soundsystem Blake and his family of deejays provides entertaining music that is distinctly reggae but also often mixed with country, pop or rhythm and blues.

Also distinguished in the same category were: King Jammy, Stone Love Movement, Prince Buster's Voice of the People and champion advocate for operators of the systems: the late Louise Fraser-Bennett. Japanese sound system benefactors Mighty Crown and the Jamaica Sound System Federation were also honored.






The International African Arts Festival (IAAF) began in 1971 as the African Street Carnival, a PTA's block party fundraiser for an independent school in Bedford Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn with local entertainers, about 20 arts and crafts vendors, along with food prepared by the parents. Almost 2,000 people came to the event and it was a success.

The festival has been part of the Brooklyn cultural landscape for 40

years. Each year, a committed team of board members, consultants, part-time seasonal staff and volunteers, work together to transform a city park into an outdoor African cultural oasis that celebrates traditional and contemporary expression of various African cultural art forms.

Today, the IAAF is a communitybased, non-profit organization that produces an annual event attracting an estimated 75,000 attendees from all over Brooklyn, New York City, the United States and from around the world.

In 2001, the IAAF relocated to Commodore Barry Park which is the third transition to a larger venue to accommodate its growing audience. The original line-up of local folk arts entertainers which has included dance companies such as Dinizulu African Dancers and Drummers, Marie Brooks Pan-Caribbean Dancers, emerging singers such as Martha Redbone and many others, continue to be an important part of the festival's programming. Over the years, the stages of the festival has featured renowned artists such as Blue Magic, The Mighty Sparrow, Fela Anikulapo-Kuti, KRS-1, Lauryn Hill, and India Arie.



motivation that breathes champions - the dream of winning a World Cup and being the best team in the world... And knowing that Americans girls can do it!

The USA showed good technique, tactical acumen and sheer power and bravado on the world stage; the women captured the hearts and minds of many around the world with a display of confidence, professionalism and superiority. They were the toasts of soccer purists because they passed soccer's old litmus tests echoed in old adages: a great team never loses to the same foe twice; and great teams put away important contests within the first 15 minutes of the match.

Japan had rallied twice when it beat the USA for the title four years ago in Frankfurt, Germany, but the Americans remembered and said never again; with 16 minutes of the kick-off on

Sunday, the Americans were ahead, 4-0. Lloyd now is in world class company as only she and English legend and West Ham United star, Sir Geoff Hurst, share this accomplishment. Hurst scored a hat trick versus Germany in the 1966 final at Wembley Stadium in London when the host defeated Germany, 4-2, to win England's only world title.

There were other very significant moments to the World Cup win; all-time international scoring leader Abby Wambach will retire with a world title, and so will her veteran teammates Christie Rampone, Shannon Boxx, Heather O'Reilly and Lori Chalupny, all stalwarts who contributed on this historic journey. We saw the last and have also said goodbye to another great female player, former Japan captain Homare Sawa, who led her country in victory over the U.S. four years ago and won the Golden Ball Award. Sawa, showed her class and recognized a moment never to be duplicated again, when she greeted Wambach with a high-five touch of the hand as the American entered the World Cup game for one last time.

This 2015 USA World cup team may just have secured the future of USA women's soccer for guite some time.
