





## Carnival's joy is deep with tradition

Get on bad and jump up, Bredren!

Crown Heights will burst into pomp and pageantry like a ripe Julie mango on Labor Day, as the age-old tradition of Carnival struts into Brooklyn with a steel band contest, a Fat Sunday extravaganza, a kiddie cavalcade, a new reggae festival, and the 49th Annual West Indian American Day Carnival Parade — a crown jewel encrusted with 83 costume bands, 12 steel bands, 50 tricked-out floats, and countless gloriously garbed revelers shimmying along Eastern Parkway to cheers from a sea of spectators spilling into the

This year's theme is "One Caribbean. One People. One Voice," and tourists from around the world will bask in air thick with the enticing aromas of codfish fritters, butterfly shrimp kebabs, and coconut bread, as they join in the extraordinary, multi-million-strong celebration of life, energy, vibrancy, and spirit all of it pouring vital doland strengthening our cultural kinships.

as J'ouvert — or daybreak in French — will kick off the festival, as costumed merrymakers dressed as political figures and celebrities pepper each another with powdered paint to whistles and music. The New York Caribbean Carnival Reggae Festival will also return after a 20-year hiatus to enliven the grounds of the Brooklyn Museum on Sept. 1.

#### **Celebration of life**

The pomp and pageantry is vibrant nod to the warmhearted folk whose ancestry lies 1,350 miles away in the azure-blue tropics strung with 28 islands and humming with the lilt of 23 different languages — a region where having a good time is as important as life itself.

Caribbean Carnivals are world-famous monuments to merriment, bursting with color, food, music, and spirit, and representing national ties to slavery, religious conversion, and freedom. The Trinidad and Tobago Carnival - arguably the most famous of all became a cultural icon after lars into our economic coffers the abolition of slavery in 1838, part-copying and part-jibing the pre-Lent celebrations of

British who banned drums in Trinidad, causing the industrious Trinidadians to use everyday objects as percussion instruments.

The steel bands most associated with Carnival didn't develop until the 1930s and 1940s when musicians experimented with damaged oil drums and discovered they could produce sweet notes.

#### **Brooklyn frolic**

The West Indian Day festival does justice to its Caribbean masters, as one of the America's largest parades prominently featured in the "I Love New York" commercials.

"The Carnival is a very important part of the joy and vibrancy of New York," says Jean Alexander, the commercial whiz behind the milliondollar celebration of Caribbean pride, who has spent decades putting the sensational spectacle on the map, as board secretary and director of public relations and marketing at the West Indian American Day Carnival Association.

It has humble, but handsome, roots.

Brooklyn's frolic, which has inspired imitators in Miami and Boston, dates back to Harlem in the Roaring '20s, when Caribbean immigrants from islands with a Carnival tra-

dition began celebrating the pre-Lenten season with lavish parties at the Savoy, Renaissance and Audubon Ballrooms. Community-conscious Trinidadian-American Jesse Wardell understood indoor spaces confined the fun, and secured a parade permit for a street festival on Labor Day along Seventh Avenue.

The permit was revoked in the mid-1960s due to a disturbance, but Carlos Lezama, a dental laboratory worker born in Venezuela and raised in Trinidad, moved the party to Brooklyn after new arrivals Trinidad and Tobago, Haiti, Jamaica, Barbados, and Grenada began settling in the central part of the borough.

Lezama's parade committee became the West Indian American Day Carnival Association, and the festival hit the big time in the mid-1990s when it was aired live on television.

"I think our day has come, perhaps," Lezama told reporters clamoring to relay the spectacle's uproarious impact.

The 2001 parade, the last Lezama organized before his death the next year, drew around two million spectators, 10,000 marchers, 42 bands, and 30 floats, including an imposing cavalcade of marchers gussied up as marine critters, outer space characters,

and flora and fauna.

#### Sensuous pleasures

Carnival's traditions go back to Ancient Greece and the naughty feast of Saturnalia, a time of licentious merrymaking and wild revelry that was the predecessor to Christmas. The Romans postponed the fun to the week before Lent around the spring equinox - and christened the party Carnival or Carnaval from the Latin words carnis ("flesh" or "meat") and levare ("to leave off") to honor the post-festival stretch of solemn penance and sacrifice that renounced red meat and sex.

Carnival flourished alongside the spread of Christianity in Europe and the Americas, and the conquistadors and colonials who transported its tradition were inspired by the Native Americans who had island roots and celebrated their harvest with food, music, and bejeweled dancers tattooed with spiritual bodywork.

The African contribution to Carnival is perhaps the most enduring, and the people brought to the West Indies' second largest island of Hispaniola in the early 1500s and their descendents added the most brilliant sights, sounds and colors to the Carnivals of

the Americas. The Africans brought with them their village cultural rites of lively, boisterous parades, eye-popping masks, and vivid costumes made of feathers and other natural objects thought to impart spiritual strength.

The shindigs included plenty of singing and dancing to signify luck and ward off evil spirit, accounting for the death symbolisms in many of today's Carnivals.

#### Timeless tributes to life

The extraordinary pageantry of the West Indian American Day Carnival Parade is due to the intense labors of thousands of dedicated Caribbean-Americans who want to preserve their timehonored traditions for future generations. Masquerade camps or "mas" toil all year long to produce living masterpieces to human skill, craftsmanship, and enterprise — including the memorable salute to Mother Nature, complete with colossal leaves crawling with mosquitoes, beehiveladen trees, and giant orchids resting on logs — to such themes as A Tribute to Bob Marley, Caribbeans Unite, and In the Garden of Good and Evil.

This year's Carnival promises no less of a sensory feast.

"It's going to bigger and better than ever!" says Alexander. "As peaceful and enjoyable a celebration as one could ever wish to have."

Williams has paid tribute on the day set aside by the United Nations to remember slavery and its abolition, saying that the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade and the enslavement of Africans represented "one of the longest and most sustained assaults on the life, integrity and dignity of human beings in our history."

# US TAX CHEATS NOTICE

## Caribbean countries move to comply with IRS financial reporting

Caribbean American citizens and permanent residents who hold large sums of cash in overseas bank accounts or have investments in trust and related companies as well as hold disposable assets will soon have to report these to the IRS or face stiff penalties in new laws being enforced from the end of September.

CARICOM member countries which have not set signed up inter governmental bilateral agreements with the United States are rushing to do so, well aware that their could be blacklisted by Washington as unwilling compliers with the Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA).

As August came to a close, authorities in Trinidad, the largest economy in the community of 15 mostly island nations, made quick steps to do so, formally signing the relevant tenants of FACTA and opening the way for an automatic exchange of finan-

cial information on Americans with cash and assets stashed overseas.

Back in March of 2010, Congress passed the controversial bill to catch alleged tax cheats, including those who use offshore accounts in the Caribbean and beyond to hide assets from the IRS.

The act requires Caribbean commercial banks to submit details about assets and cash of American citizens and permanent residents. The U.S. is also required to furnish information on Caribbean residents who stash cash and have assets in mainland America and its territories such as Puerto Rico.

Several member states including Barbados and St. Kitts have already signed bilateral agreements with the U.S., anxious to avoid being blacklisted by the international community, western industrialized countries in particular, as law enforce

## Almost last hurrah for SVG official

The Organizing Committee of the Brooklyn-based Vincy Day USA last Saturday gave New York Consul General Selmon Walters his penultimate last hurrah with a send-off plaque.

The departing consul general is expected to preside over an inaugural St. Vincent and the Grenadines-Martha's Vineyard Cultural Showcase this Saturday, Aug. 27, in Massachusetts.

Rosalind Goodluck, the treasurer of the Organizing Committee of Vincy Day USA, presented the award to Walters, who has chaired the Committee since its start, before hundreds of nationals at the annual unity picnic at Heckscher State Park in Long Island, New York.

"As many of you may know, the consul general has been recalled after five years," Goodluck told the crowd assembled in front to the huge stage on the eastern end of the camp ground. "Vincy Day USA Committee prepared a small plague to say good bye to the Counsel General.

"We're going to miss you," Goodluck told Walters. "You made the Consular office what it is here."

In responding, Walters, a former minister in the administration of Prime Minister Dr. Ralph E. Gonsalves, said tersely: "Sometimes, you get things you don't expect. This is a surprise."

But despite the praises showered on the consul general by Goodluck, Walters — who will be replaced by Howie Prince, the head of the National Emergency Management Organization (NEMO), by month's end — has been under heavy fire in recent years.

Observers, and critics alike, claimed that Walters woefully mismanaged the office that provides consular and other services to nationals in New York, which is considered to comprise the

largest concentration of Vincentians in the Diaspora.

Walters' pending departure comes about 2 ½ years after a major scandal erupted at the New York Consulate General involving Walters' deputy, Edson Augustus, a former Seventh-day Adventist Church pastor, who was recalled on Feb. 5, 2014, because of what the government said were "activities outside the scope of his employment and inimical to interests of the Consulate General and the government and people of St. Vincent and the Grenadines.'

In recent months, Walters' situation was exacerbated with increased criticism, in several quarters, of his stewardship.

The government, however, did not cite allegations levelled against Walters nor did it particularly single him out in its diplomatic shake-up, but it was clear, many pundits said, that the administra-

Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Affairs Minister Sir Louis Straker told Caribbean Life last week, in an exclusive interview, that Walters was among three diplomats who are being recalled.

The others are ambassadors to Cuba and Venezuela Dexter Rose and Andreas Wickham, respectively.

But, despite his fate, Walters, unequivocally, has left his indentation on Vincy Day USA.

He made it his primary mission of making the annual Vincy Day USA extravaganza a success. The notion was first broached to him five years ago by popular, Brooklyn-based Vincentian entertainment promoter, Ulric "Soca" Jones, Jr., who last Saturday co-emceed, as in previous years, the cultural package, with prominent Vincentian radio personality Don Bobb.

"I am confident that this great event may outlive all of us," said Walters in the foreword in the Vincy Day USA booklet, distributed to nationals on Saturday as they entered the park. "Committee members may come and go, but the event must remain.

"Long live Vincy Day USA!" he added. "Long live all our Vincy folks in the Diaspora and at home. May our prosperity be guaranteed by our love for each other and by our faith in the God of the universe!"

On Saturday, the committee also honored another entertainment promoter, Atiba Williams; Nolan Bulze, manager of the Brooklyn-based Solid band; retired Registered Nurse Celia Bramble, former president of the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Nurses Association of New York; Monica Laborde, president of the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Association of Massachusetts; and Dave Auguste, ground tion had to take action once and for all. manager of Heckscher State Park.

## **Festival** marks Crown **Heights riot**

Hundreds of people turned out for a controversial festival commemorating the Crown Heights riot on Aug. 21, despite some slamming as a distasteful way to mark such a dark period in the neighborhood's

Organizers say they understand why the family of Yankel Rosenbaum — the Australian Jewish man killed during of the 1991 turmoil described a fete promising "fun for all ages" as "an insult" to his memory, but the large turnout from both black and Jewish residents shows it really did bring the communities together. https://nypost.com/2016/08/16/ crown-heights-plans-insensitive-carnival-to-mark-1991-riots/

"I definitely understand — he felt it was inappropriate," said organizer Rabbi Eli Cohen director of Jewish group the Crown Heights Community Council. "We did it because we feel it's important and to focus on what we can achieve when we work together — because look at what can happen."

The One Crown Heights festival marked 25 years since a motorcade carrying a prominent Jewish leader ran over seven-year-old black boy Gavin Cato, igniting racial tensions in the predominantly black and Hasidic Jewish community. Hours later, rioters fatally stabbed Rosenbaum, and three days of chaos followed.

Local leaders including Borough President Adams, Councilwoman Laurie Cumbo (D-Crown Heights), and Councilwoman Mathieu Eugene (D-Crown Heights) started the day at the Jewish Children's Museum with a ceremony remembering both Cato and Rosenbaum, followed by a march down Kingston Avenue to Brower Park for the festivities, which included rides, games, and performances from Caribbean steel pan bands.

Yankel Rosenbaum's brother Norman — who was in town for the anniversary — and some local Orthodox leaders denounced the event in the press, though Gavin Cato's father Carmel attended. Both men, who have been friends for 15 years, nevertheless broke rye bread at a Midwood deli before mourning in their own ways. http://www.nydailynews.com/ new-york/brooklyn/men-kin-deathssparked-crown-heights-riots-breakbread-article-1.2755252

Festival attendees say their families enjoyed the fair, and defended the neighborhood get-together as a way of showing how far the community has come since its ugliest days.

#### **Antigua**

A 35-year-old French national was fined EC\$4,000 after he pleaded guilty to causing a bomb scare on a LIAT flight at the VC Bird International Airport, Antigua recently.

Francois Renaud Boisneuf, 35, who was returning to the French Caribbean Island of Guadeloupe from Barbados where he had attended the Crop Over Festival, used the word "bomb' and "terrorist" when he was repeatedly asked by the flight attendant for his boarding pass.

The flight attendant reported the matter to the captain and the police were called in resulting in the aircraft being checked out.



The plane with 69 passengers on board then departed for Guadeloupe after a long period.

When Boisneuf appeared in court before Magistrate Conliffe Clarke, he pleaded guilty to the offence and was fined EC\$4,000 or six months in pris-

#### **Bahamas**


A call has been made for the Bahamas government to open a Sex Offenders Registry and Marco Alert system for missing children.

It has come from a non-profit group Solidarity 242- some five years after the murder of an 11-year-old boy, Marco Archer — a tragedy that called for the Sex Offenders Registry.

In October 2013, Kofhe Goodman was sentenced to death for abducting, kidnaping and mur-

dering Archer.

Co-founder of Solidarity 242. Kishlane Knowles said there are no Sex Offenders Registry, and no Marco Alert.

#### **Barbados**

Barbados has recorded a 1.3 percent economic growth for the first six months of this year, compared to no growth a year ago, according to figures released by the Central Bank of Barbados (CBB).

CBB Governor Dr. DeLisle Worrell said this was a slight deceleration from the first quarter, mainly on account of unexpected delays in major tourism

investment projects.

In terms of the outlook, Dr. Worrell said the reduced growth projection was "mainly because most major investment projects are behind schedule."

He noted that the main impact of the recent fall in the value of sterling may well be on the sales of villas and second

homes to United Kingdom residents, adding the growth rate could be higher if investments in tourism and alternative energy can be speeded up.



#### **Dominica**

The Dominica government has received a EC\$25 million loan from the Agricultural Industrial and Development Bank (AIDB) to help develop the agriculture and tourism sectors.

Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit speaking at the recent signing ceremony said that at least 17 properties will benefit from the EC\$15 million set aside for the tourism sector.

He said construction jobs would be created but some of the properties are also expanding and enhancing their ability to compete and become compet-

itive much better than they are doing now.

The prime minister also said he is hoping that the facility will



lead to more sustainable jobs in the economy, adding, "the terms and conditions of this loan are exceptional."

The EC\$15 million dollars from the proceeds of the Citizenship by Investment Program (CIP) will be made available for on-lending to the hotel sector to

ment fights international money laundering efforts and alleged financing of terrorism.

Trinidad's government said in a weekend statement that the system is almost ready to provide the IRS with the necessary information on assets held in local banks, trust and related companies.

"This is another milestone in the relationship between both countries on tax matters and brings to an end approximately three years of negotiations occurring between the two countries on the agreement. To bring the agreement into force, the finance minister will take to the parliament the necessary legislation, among other things, to provide for the automatic exchange of information by the board of Inland Revenue to the United States Inland Revenue Service," the statement said.

The announcement came a few days before Guyana's Finance Minister Winston Jordan announced the country's readiness to also sign on with the U.S., being fully aware that the end of September deadline looms.

"We are ready. Cabinet has given its approval but the Americans are the one to set a date. It is an extra territorial act designed to get information on people who have offshore accounts and other assets. We are ready when they are."

The agreement has stiff penalties and other sanctions contained in the 2010 legislation including the imposition of a 30 percent withholding levy on assets of persons failing to report their assets to authorities.

The bill is interested in folks who have in excess of \$50,000 held overseas. Banks are required to search their data bases to detect people with foreign passports, green cards and identities who have money and assets overseas and inform the IRS of this as Americans are required to file yearly tax returns regardless of where they

Wikipedia for example, says the bill was enacted for the purpose of detecting the non-U.S. financial accounts of U.S. domestic taxpavers rather than to identify non-resident U.S. citizens and enforce collections. There might be thousands of resident U.S. citizens with non-U.S. assets, such as astute investors, dual citizens, or legal immigrants. FATCA was enacted with the purpose of having non-U.S. financial institutions identify approximately 8.7 million U.S. citizens believed to reside outside of the United States and those persons believed to be U.S. persons for tax purposes. FATCA will also be used to help identify non-U.S. person family members and business partners who share accounts with U.S. persons.

which to help provide solutions," said the outspoken legislator, calling on all New Yorkers and Americans in joining forces to "support and spread the principles of freedom, equality and equity.'

Williams said that the need is "even more prevalent with such divisive messages being not only spewed but also received on a national political stage as acceptable political discourse in a way we have not seen in decades.

"It is imperative that we recommit to the hard work it takes to live together in our multicultural societies and continue to fight against contemporary forms of slavery, of which millions are still the victims of," he added.

Irina Bokova, head of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), said that the courage of the men and women, who, in August 1791, revolted against slavery in Haiti, "has created obligations for us" on the day set aside for remembrance of that rebellion.

In her tribute, the UNESCO director general noted that "all of humanity is part of this story," adding that efforts to teach the history of the slave trade will help build a better world.

'The uprising was a turning point in human history, greatly impacting the establishment of universal human rights, for which we are all indebted,"

said Bokova in her message commemorating the night in 1791, "when people who had been torn from Africa and sold into slavery revolted against the slave system to obtain freedom and independence for Haiti, gained in 1804."

She said that UNESCO marked the Day of Remembrance to pay tribute to "all those who fought for freedom, and, in their name, to continue teaching about their story and the values therein.

"The history of the slave trade and slavery created a storm of rage, cruelty and bitterness that has not yet abated," said the director-general, "but the courage of these men and women has created obligations for us."





## Twenty-five years after **Crown Heights Riots**

Twenty-five years ago, I Heights erupted in unrest cars flipped, businesses burned, rocks thrown, and voices raised in anger following the tragic deaths of seven-year-old Gavin Cato, hit and killed by a car, and the stabbing death of college student Yankel Rosenbaum.

I watched and I listened to concerned mothers and fathers, sons and daughters, students and neighbors from both the West Indian and Hasidic community who worried that not enough was being done to protect their safety or address the racial and social disparities in their communities.

Over those tough three days - and the weeks that followed — my colleagues at the NYC Commission on Human Rights and I took to the streets to speak with community members about their concerns, calm their fears, and offer any assistance we could to help heal their

We also met with community groups, like the Jewish Community Council and Crown Heights Youth Collective, to chart a path forward and create programs that promote respect for the neighborhood's cultural and religious differences.

Twenty-five years later, as those wounds continue to heal, the NYC Commission on Human Rights is still a part of those communities, working in Crown Heights and across Brooklyn to ensure that people feel safe, respected, and empowered to live and work

free from discrimination.

The NYC Commission on watched as the streets of Crown Human Rights exists to protect every New Yorker from discrimination. We are a city agencv that enforces the nation's strongest city anti-discrimination law, the NYC Human Rights Law, which protections people from discrimination in the workplace, housing, and in public spaces.

> We work with immigrant and faith-based communities, landlords, bodegas, law enforcement agencies, and business associations to ensure that everyone in New York City knows their rights and obligations under the law and are protected from unfair treatment no matter who they are, what they look like, where they come from or what they believe.

## The Jamaican gov't has forgotten the diaspora!

The compelling evidence of pride displayed during the observation of Jamaica's 54th independence in the Tri-State area was the paradigm of a people strongly rooted in their culture and history. Culminating the 54th independence also was the overwhelming and strong performance of the Jamaicans at the 31st Olympics in Rio de Janeiro,

Brazil. However, in the midst this celebration was the noticeably absence of a Jamaican consul general for New York and the Eastern states, with further investigation we learnt also that there was no fixed appointment for a Jamaican ambassador in Washington DC, since April 2016, as well. The trajectory is not uncommon for any new government to replace its top diplomats in its new administration. It is almost six months since the former Jamaican council general to New York resigned and so too did the Jamaican ambassador in Washington DC. These changes are not mandatory, but for obvious and obnoxious reasons party loyalists would have it no other way.

The Consul General's office in New York has a

wide community to serve; its role is to be the government for its people in a foreign country. However, a consul general should be prepared or be on standby for replacing vacant positions when there is a new government. An announcement was made a few months ago for the evacuation of some Jamaican diplomats from their positions among them was the Jamaican Council General for New York and the Jamaican ambassador in Washington DC. Someone in the Foreign Affairs Ministry could have spearheaded a planning committee to replace the consul general. There is a community of over two million Jamaicans on hand waiting to be represented and served unequivocally. How do you feel when you telephone the Jamaican Consulate's office and no one wants to speak to you, obtaining our passports is not the only reason why some of us Jamaicans call the office of the consul general. We call for numerous reasons, to verify issues that are of serious concerns to us in Jamaica. Even more disappointing is after 15 to 20 years of attending the Jamaican independence church services in New York City you come to know what kind of crowd to expect. Not so this time there was a low turn out of fellow Jamaicans. You wondered why and asked what work was done to reach the thousands of Jamaicans in New York City? You ask where was the outreach personnel and you realized that the position is also currently vacant. The Jamaican community needs to be informed on the official events relating to Jamaica that is taking place in a foreign country. Please give us the choice of choosing whether or not we should participate in these events. Did this lapse in the community affairs outreach caused a lack in effective communication? A consul general should be in place for many reasons. Life is also unpredictable and a few years ago when hundreds of Jamaicans were misplaced or affected by hurricane sandy, in Brooklyn and Queens, New York, the then consul general visited sites, as several of the homes affected belonged to Jamaicans. The Jamaican Consul's General office could not do much, as Hurricane Sandy hit Jamaica as well. The then government of Jamaica was asking us to help the victims in Jamaica. but a consul general on site could let the government know what was happening with some Jamaicans in the United States as well. This is just an example of the important and effective work of the consulate office. We are also in another hurricane season, as Jamaicans we need someone to always stand shoulder to shoulder with other leaders, representing our people and our

## Corruption accusations fly in Barbados

#### By George Alleyne

Opposition Member Parliament, Edmund Hinkson, has warned that Barbados' future access to favorable loans from international ogranisations is at risk if officials do not crack down on corruption.

"One of the main problems in Barbados now is corruption. We are clouding our eyes over it... Many people in the international community have tremendous concerns about this country of ours. They know about the level of corruption and 'take' that they have in Barbados, and they're keeping a very close watch on it."

Hinkson, a lawyer, issued the warning at a political meeting, a full week after former Chief Justice, Sir David Simmons, appeared to open the flood gates of public statements when he made no bones about it by declaring that there is corruption in the island's topmost quarters.

"I think that there is a lot of evidence, but it seems to be more than a perception of corruption at all kinds of level in this society," Sir David had said, and added, "The bribers are usually the people in the private sector... they would have bribed the politician who is then held up to ridicule and exposed, and a lot of them get away".

For years sleaze in high office was rumoured, and following Sir David's remarks, Chairman of the Barbados Private Sector Association, Charles Herbert, suggested that there was a culture within the public sector that encouraged bribery.

"It is difficult to do everything," he said. "it takes three days to get a liquor licence. It takes a month to get an amalgamation through [the department of Corporate Services.

"Everything we do is difficult to do."

Herbert, the chairman of Barbados conglomerate, Goddard Enterprises, conceded that some companies appear to be getting their business done quickly, but added, "We don't know if it is because they push harder than us, because they know somebody that we don't know."

"In a lot of cases you can't get anything done in Barbados unless money pass," Hinkson said Sunday


He complained that since 2012 both chambers of Parliament had passed the Prevention of Corruption Act, "But they [government] would not carry it to the governor general for him to sign, assenting to it. So it does not stand as the law of Barbados. Why?"

He followed up by asking what, "Cabinet ministers, politicians, the people who would be subject to the Prevention of Corruption Act, what do they fear?"

The MP warned, "there will come a time when Barbados, if it doesn't [enact] that legislation, will not be able to borrow development funds from UN agencies, from the World Bank because of this issue.

"Those institutions will not lend countries, or they will lend only at very high interest rates, if you do not have systems, legislative and administrative, in place to curb, or curtail corruption," Hinkson said.

Contending that the Democratic Labour Party Government has broken its anti-corruption campaign promises, he said the party came into office




Barbados MP, Edmund Hinkson, talking about corruption.

in 2008, "on the basis that they were going to stamp out corruption, that they were going to be transparent, that they were going to have post-Cabinet meetings every Thursday to tell the people what went on in Cabinet."

He continued, "The Demo-

cratic Labour Party promised that they would bring in integrity legislation forthwith... eight and a half years gone, no sign of integrity legislation whatsoever, excuses after excuses from both the prime minister and the attorney general as to why none would come in."

# Grenadians to vote on constitutional changes

Grenadians will go to the polls for the Oct. 27 referendum on changes in the Constitution to replace the London-based Privy Council with the Trinidad-based Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ).

Parliament has recently passed legislation that allows the island to replace the Privy Council with the CCJ as its final court of appeal.

Grenadians will also be asked to institute term of limits for the prime minister; ensure that there is always an opposition leader; enable Parlia-

ment to provide fixed election dates for general elections; institute an Elections and Boundaries Commission; and require that allegiance to be sworn, no longer to the Queen, but to Grenada.

Supervisor of Election Alex Phillip said there are more than 69,000 people who are eligible to vote.

He said, "we have already designed the ballot paper and will be a simple question of asking them if they approved the Bill to amend the Constitution, the choices will be yes or no."

over two million. Some names should have been submitted by now," Beckford reasoned.


In the midst of this can we asked the question why the government made

question why the government made such an early announcement for the removal of the ambassador in Washington and the consul general in New York. I am certain there are suitable individuals in the Foreign Affairs Ministry to take these positions. As questioned on so many occasions, did the election victory take Mr. Andrew Holness by surprise? "Couldn't the government asked the diplomats to stay in office until they find suitable replacements," Mr. Patrick Beckford asked.

Former Provost of John Jay College of Criminal Justice, Professor Basil Wilson, said the absence of leadership could have stemmed from many reasons. "The processing of the ambassadorship has to go through the U.S. State Department. They have to accept the process and the credentials of the individual and that could slow the process down, these appointments are important," Dr. Wilson noted. Professor Wilson also reminded us that the government is currently negotiating with the International Monetary Funds (IMF) and that could also be a central reason the government did not direct its attention elsewhere. "You could have missteps, when you move quickly sometimes," the former Provost acknowledged.

Should we wrestle with the thought that the government is focusing on economic development and has put the Jamaican Diaspora (foreign affairs) on the side line. In trying to come to a better understanding of why these two positions are not yet filled I reached out to the New York Consulate office this proved futile, as the acting consul general did not return any of my calls. Several other Jamaicans that I have spoken to in New York City and New Jersey saw this as total neglect of a people, "the Foreign Affairs Ministry should have made a replacement, and this shows lack of respect for the Jamaican Diaspora," President of the Jamaica Progressive League, Mrs. Sadie Campbell remarked. ## **Our Perspective** Eliminate Tip **Credit for Car** Wash Workers

ar wash workers in New York City - or 'carwasheros," as they call themselves have made great strides since their campaign to unionize began in 2012. Hundreds of carwasheros at 10 car washes have won the dignity and respect that comes with union membership.

Union contracts have given carwasheros – for the first time – paid time off, the ability to return to their home countries for visits and have their jobs protected, and guaranteed wage and benefit improvements.

But throughout New York State, the so-called "tip credit" threatens to continue to undermine progress that workers are making in the car wash industry.

The tip credit is a part of New York State minimum wage law that allows industry operators to pay car wash workers a different, lower minimum wage. In theory, workers' tips are supposed to make up the difference, and possibly more. And, if workers' tips don't raise the level of pay to at least the minimum wage, car wash employers are supposed to make up the difference in additional hourly wages.

In actual practice, it's a flawed system that enables wage theft and contributes to systemic underpayment of car wash workers – exactly what the car wash unionizing campaign and carwasheros have been fighting against. Investigations have shown that employers don't always make up the extra pay for workers when tips are short, and carwasheros don't always receive the tips customers presume they are getting. We shouldn't be giving unscrupulous employers additional incentives to underpay their workers.

Earlier this summer, workers at one Queens car wash won a \$130,000 settlement against an owner who was paying below minimum wage, withholding overtime pay, and committing other wage and hour violations. And that's just the latest settlement of many, including one that saw a New York carwash operator pay almost \$4 million in 2014. Wage theft is still rampant in the industry, and the tip credit helps create an environment where it happens.

The Cuomo Administration has done a good job prosecuting wage theft, and helping win justice for workers across New York. But we need to do more. We call upon the Governor and the state legislature to eliminate the car wash tip credit, and bring the base pay for all car wash workers in New York up to the minimum wage.

It's an important move that will show New York's commitment to fighting for worker rights, and protect worker pay.

## Sean Bell's fiancée speaks on gun violence in Brooklyn

Local artists expressed feelings about police violence at the "Fists Up, Guns Down" benefit show, at the Five Myles Gallery on Aug. 19.

About a 100 guests came to see young artists of color, tell stories about police brutality through dance, poetry, music, and visual art — expressing their pain and rage about the extra-judicial killings of black people. Nicole Paultre Bell, the fiancée of Sean Bell — an unarmed husband — to be killed by police on his wedding day in 2006 - attended the event to share her experience 10 years later and praised the artists.

"Everyone in this room is a soldier. The one thing

I have to say that pushes me forward is all proceeds to the Sean Bell family so being in a room with a group of folks like you," said Paultre Bell. "To know that there are soldiers out there who didn't have to be affected by the movement, but that they felt the movement just because of who they are."

Artists creatively spoke, sang, rapped, and danced their displeasure of police brutality, sharing the varying experiences that come as a result. Planners of the event invited Paultre Bell to the

event to allow guests to hear her story, said organizers.

"I feel like people heard about the story, but they didn't hear it from her personal point of view," said Alia Pierre,

artist and co-organizer of the event.

"Hearing it firsthand and seeing how strong she is really made them passionate about getting justice," said Pierre.

Pierre said the message she wanted to convev with the event was achieved, and hopes that guests who attended left with the drive to pursue social justice.

"A lot of people said that they left there feeling like they needed to do something," said Pierre. "We just wanted to give

Concluding the event, artists and guests marched along Franklin Avenue, arriving at Eastern Parkway, before ending in front of the Brooklyn Museum, holding signs reading 'Black Lives Matter' and 'Fists up, guns down.'

## UN admits it needs to do more after causing Haiti cholera epidemic

NEW YORK, Aug 18, 2016 (IPS) - Update: On Thursday, Aug. 18 the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit upheld the immunity of the UN from legal proceedings in the case of Georges et al v. United Nations et. al (the Haiti Cholera case) in accordance with the UN Charter and other international treaties.

Six years since UN peacekeepers brought cholera to Haiti, the United Nations has finally accepted a greater degree of responsibility for its role in causing the outbreak, which has claimed tens of thousands of lives, and affected hundreds of thousands more.

"The UN has become convinced that it needs to do much more regarding its own involvement in the initial outbreak and the suffering of those affected by cholera," Deputy Spokesperson for the UN Secretary-General, Farhan Hag said in a statement shared with IPS.

The UN is working "towards a significantly new set of UN

actions," details of which will the Bureau des Avocats Interbe released in the coming two months, said Hag.

"This is a groundbreaking first step towards justice," said Beatrice Lindstrom Esq., lawyer for victims of cholera in Haiti and staff attorney at the Institute for Justice and Democracy Haiti (IJDH) in response to the change in the UN's position.

However, she tempered her statement by saying that "the real test is in what comes next."

"The UN must follow this announcement with action, including issuing a public apology, establishing a plan to provide compensation to the victims who have lost so much, and ensuring that cholera is eliminated in Haiti through robust investment in water and sanitation infrastructure. We will keep fighting until it does."

"Promises will not stop cholera's killing or compensate for the damage to poor families in Haiti," she said.

As well as representing victims, IJDH, in partnership with nationaux (BAI) in Haiti, has spearheaded a global campaign calling on the UN for a just response, criticizing Ban Kimoon for a lack of decisive leadership on this issue which, it says, undermines the ethics of peacekeeping.

After years of denial and claims of immunity from the UN, the admission comes in the wake of new evidence, arising from an audit undertaken by the UN's internal watchdog, the Office of Internal Oversight Services (OIOS). It shows that the Stabilization Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH) has, as recently as 2015, been pouring inadequately-treated sewage into canals, among other negligent practices.

Experts believe cholera was introduced to Haiti in 2010 by peacekeepers from Nepal, when infected sewage leaked into the Arbonite River. The stabilization mission was part of efforts to help after the devastating earthquake in Haiti in 2010, which killed 220,000

Latest studies suggest 30,000 people have died from cholera in Haiti alone, and that over 2 million have survived the disease, far exceeding more oftenquoted statistics of 9202 deaths and 754,735 people affected.

There have been numerous calls, within the United States, the United Nations, and in the international community, for the UN to take responsibility for its alleged negligence in allowing Peacekeepers from Nepal carrying Cholera to bring it to Haiti where the disease was not previously endemic.

Nadia Dieudonné and Cynthia Karaha are cultural sisters, a complementary duo heart and soul of the dance troupe Feet of Rhythm (F.O.R.) kids who will represent the Haitian community in the annual West Indian Day Junior Carnival Parade. And, the troupe is the only all-Haitian children's group participating in it. Dieudonné is the artistic director, choreographer and dance teacher and Karaha is the troupe's co-director, manager and visual director.

Feet of Rhythm was founded in 1995, but it was 2001 when the children began to participate in children's carnival parade. The two founders persevere in recruiting dancers, providing dance lessons for their choreography and design the unusual parade costumes for the F.O.R. kids who dance the entire route.

This year's "Zopope" (puppets / dolls) theme is a creative departure from past years' traditional themes. "Our costumes are meant to look like dolls, and the movements for our performance mimic dolls, almost puppet-like," says Karaha.

There are four thematic sections: Tipope (little dolls), Kongo (wind-up dolls), Rara puppets (for ages 13-17) and Majonjon for boys.

"Forty children have signed up, but there is still time and room for plenty more," says Dieudonné who has been dancing and teaching dance for years. After her 2000 choreography collaboration with the Trinidadian mas camp Cage Productions, she decided to team up with Karaha for a Haitian children's presence in the Junior Carnival.

Designer of the troupe's costumes, Karaha has been designing clothes since she was a child in Haiti. Four seamstresses from the Haitian community start sewing at the beginning of the summer to complete the designs. To control costs, volunteers help the directors to add embellishments such as the headpieces. "And my mom Jeanne Dieudonne helps a lot with sewing and other production needs," says Dieudonné.


"Our costumes are \$125-\$150, more reasonable than a number of other groups. It would be great if we had financial support so that we could include more children who financially can't participate." Dieudonné adds, "We even have a Feet of Rhythm Go Fund Me link." Karaha muses, "I love what I'm doing and my dream is to have more than 100 kids."

Children take up to 10 classes, this year at Fit4Dance on Utica, to learn the steps, and equally as important, to get to know each other. "By parade time, they feel confident, know their routines and have made friends," the dance teacher observes.

As for the greatest joy? "It's the smiles on the children when they're in their make-up and costumes," beams Dieudonné. "They're filled with such pride, strutting down the street, so happy to be participating in something just for them."

Karaha adds, "On that day they're announcing to the world their cultural heritage and they're celebrating being Haitian. At the end of the parade, they've been transformed by pride."



finance the upgrading and expansion of existing hotels and restaurants.

The interest rate for such loans stands at three percent with a grace period of one year.

The government also said that the EC\$10 million loan facility being made available to farmers primarily to address their need for working capital, will also allow them access to capital for investment in facilities.

#### Guyana

The Guyana government said it would repay the National Insurance Scheme (NIS) an estimated Guy\$6.6 billion it lost as a result of the collapse of the Trinidad-based Colonial Life Insurance Company (CLICO) in 2009.

Finance Minister Winston Jordan told a news conference that Cabinet had agreed to the pay-out through non-

negotiable government debenture certificates over a 20-year-period at a fix interest rate of 1.5 percent on the principal sum of Guy\$4.8 billion.



He said the possibility of NIS recouping the money that was owed by CLICO was highly unlikely.

Jordan said NIS and its beneficiaries were suffering as a consequence and reminded the public of a 2009 Parliamentary resolution which had urged the government to do what it must to get back the money.

Payments are expected to begin in January 2017 and by the year 2027, calculations will show that the NIS will receive a total of Guy\$5.651 billion.

#### **Jamaica**

The Jamaica government says more than 250,000 workers will benefit from the first phase in the income tax thresh-

Finance Minister Audley Shaw is encouraging Jamaicans to spend the money responsibly.

He told the House of Representatives that the estimated 251,800 pay as you earn (PAYE) workers have benefit-



ted from the increase in the personal income tax threshold from \$592,800 to Ja\$1,000,272, which took effect on July 1, this year.

The government said the second phase takes effect on April 1, 2017 and will see the personal income tax threshold moving to JA\$1,500,096.

Shaw said this phase of the tax reform plan is a signal to the Jamaican people that the Andrew Holness government, which came into power last February promising tax cuts, wants to put more money into their pockets while expect-

ing, in return, higher levels of personal productivity at their workplace.

#### St. Vincent

Veteran diplomat, Ambassador Ellsworth John has been appointed St. Vincent and the Grenadines Ambassador to Cuba.

The announcement was made by Foreign Affairs Minister Sir Louis Straker, who said John, the island's second ambassador to the United States will replace Dexter Rose, who served in Havana for the past 11 years.

John previously served as the Ambassador to the Carib-

bean Community (CARICOM), is also a former ambassador to the Organization of American States (OAS) and head of the Regional Integration and Diaspora

John will take up his new assignment with immediate effect.

Other appointments announced were that of Howie Prince replacing Selman Waters, the consul general in New York, while Chief Education Officer, Lou-Ann Gilchrist will become the island's new ambassador to the United States.

#### St. Lucia

The St. Lucia National Trust (SLNT) has expressed concern over the decision of the authorities to include the Manko-

te Mangrove within the boundaries of the multimillion dollar "Pearl of the Caribbean" project with the High Kong-



based Desert Star Holdings (DSH).

Recently the Allan Chastanet administration in a statement indicated to have been alerted "to many comments, queries and concerns expressed views that have been circulating in the media since the July 29 announcement of the proposed US\$2.6 billion integrated project."

In its statement, the SLNT said it had taken note of the agreement for the major development labeled as "The Pearl of the Caribbean," in Vieux Fort, south of the capital Castries.

It said it has received several enquiries from diverse interests, including "from our members, on its views on the project, given both its scope and location, which encompass one of the most diverse and archaeologically and resource- rich areas of St. Lucia."

The SLNT is promising to engage the public and private sector "to gain further insights into its scope and potential economic, social and environmental impacts." The government said that it welcomes any questions and scrutiny over the project.



## **Scared stiff**

Youth get deadly lessons about guns

He takes a stand against gun violence by opening death's door.

Brookdale Hospital launched a scare tactic program to teach Brooklyn's at-risk youth some deadly lessons about guns. The brainchild of the program titled "It Starts Here," is Khari Edwards, head of the hospital's external affairs. After Edwards' son almost had a run-in with some armed robbers. he was inspired by Temple University's program called "Cradle to the Grave," which shows students the effects of gun violence. Inspired by that and wanting to take it a notch further, he decided to create a similar program with a much grimmer reality.

"We really put them on the other side of the glass behind a real body," said Edwards. "The value of life has been lost, so we're trying regain that value of life a little."

Edwards recalls starting the program after witnessing a large amount of cash being found on a victim of gun violence, saving the experience opened his eyes to the life young men are choosing.

"Young men, especially in our communities are not looking at tomorrow - they're looking at right now," said Edwards. "We want to show what gang violence does to the body and how hard it is to save a life."

'It Starts Here," relies on shock value to get across its point. Organizers get students from various schools

across Brooklyn to an auditorium and show them actual videos of gun violence victims recording themselves, and suddenly getting shot. Edwards believes showing young kids victims getting shot doing things they could easily find themselves doing to the victims.

"We use shock value of bullets flying," said Edwards. "Once you get the reality of it, and we tell them 'we don't want you here at all.' This is permanent - we don't want you on this side of the glass."

Brookdale's morgue receives about 225 gun victims a year — higher than any other hospital in Brooklyn according to Edwards. Many victims are teens and young adults, which Edwards believes is more effective than prison visits, because a dead body makes a bigger statement.

"You cannot get a conversation from a dead body," said Edwards. "And that's part of where I think the moral aptitude of these kids come out. You can't mimic that feeling — you scare yourself into that feeling."

Edwards hopes to get the attention of other hospitals and local community groups to show teens the consequences of gun violence.

"As long as I'm here I believe it's going to go on," said Edwards. "I don't have any ownership, over it. I would like to see similar programs adopted by other hospitals."





# BACK TO SCHOOL



Returning to school means keeping an eye open for head lice.

# **Back to class means** elevated risk of lice

illions of children will soon be heading back to the classroom. The return of school may elicit smiles from parents who have spent the entire summer trying to keep kids busy and out of trouble, but when kids start bringing home notices of head lice outbreaks, those wide grins may

Head lice can strike just about anyone anywhere, but it seems to proliferate in close quarters, like those of a typical classroom. Children who keep backpacks and belongings beside other students' items may unwittingly pick up lice and bring them home, where they can infect the child and other members of the family.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says lice are parasitic insects that can be found on people's heads and bodies. Lice feed on human blood. There are three types of lice that live on humans: head louse, body louse, and pubic "crab" louse. Only the body louse is known to spread disease.

Lice are wingless parasites that can only crawl to their host for feeding. They cannot jump or fly like fleas. By and large, lice are relatively harmless creatures, though they can be a nuisance. Lice bites are known to cause irritation and inflammation on the scalp. Persistent scratching may lead to infection. Lice do not signal that a person has bad hygiene, and a child who contracts lice should not be embarrassed. Lice are a common problem among students.

Lice are small and grayish-white in appearance, and they are usually no larger than a sesame seed. They can move fast, so usually lice infestation is identified by spotting the lice eggs,

which are called nits. These look like tiny, vellow or tan dots before they hatch. Lice lay nits on the hair shaft close to the scalp. This is the ideal temperature for keeping the eggs warm until they hatch. Many lice nymphs will feed on blood every day to grow into adult lice. However, a louse can survive up to two days off of the scalp. That means a person can "catch" lice from a hat or a piece of clothing if a louse climbed into the material.

Treating head lice means ridding the head of all nits and adult lice. A special comb is used to capture the tiny eggs. This can be a painstaking process, particularly for children with long hair. Topical insecticides in lotion and shampoo are used to kill the lice. However, these products may not penetrate the nits, so the topical solution may need to be applied several days later to kill any emerging lice.

The best way to combat lice is to emphasize prevention. Children should not share combs, brushes, scarves, hats, or other clothing. They also should avoid close physical contact with someone who has lice.

Should a child get lice, he or she should stay home from school and the nurse should be notified. Wash all obiects that the child has used and launder all clothes, towels, linens, and other items in hot water to kill any lice. Vacuum the home frequently to remove lice or fallen hairs with attached nits from upholstered furniture and rugs.

Back to school season reintroduces kids and their parents to lice. Parents and their kids can take certain preventive measures to greatly reduce youngsters' risks of coming down with lice.

# A worthy call to action in 'Writings on the Wall'

The fix won't be quick.


It never is. There's no magic wand to change the things that've been on your mind lately: social issues, inequality, poverty, politics, apathy, violence. Those ills didn't arrive quick and they won't leave quick but, says Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, they can be repaired. In his new book "Writings on the Wall" (with Raymond Obstfeld), he explains...

When people ask Abdul-Jabbar what he might've become, had he not played NBA basketball, his answer often surprises them: he would've been a history teacher. History fascinates him — especially in the way it reflects racism, religious intolerance, and gender issues. In history, as in current events, the truth is sometimes bent.

Take, for instance, politics, which is on everyone's mind. We rail and complain about issues and promises broken and we like to think it's all out of our hands. The truth is that we are the problem: we grow complacent about things we don't want, acting "like children when it comes to politics" and hoping the government will "take care of us," rather than taking steps to fix the system ourselves.

White people may deny that racism exists, says Abdul-Jabbar, while Black people know that it does. Racism didn't stop with the election of the nation's first Black president. It doesn't end with melting-pot cultural appropriation. It actually comes in two forms, he says, and education is the first step in dealing with it, not eliminating it, because racism is always going to be around.

On religion, we should never lose sight of the fact that this "country was founded by religious outcasts running for their lives from persecution for their beliefs." When it comes to equality for women, we must embrace the true meaning of "feminist" and adhere to what we tell pollsters when it comes to gender. We need to look at the media and how to maximize its potential, and we must take better care of our near quick.

"We cannot afford to just wring out hands and depend on the kindness of strangers," Abdul-Jabbar says. "We have to bring about change on our own."

Remember when your grade school teacher told you to put on your thinking cap? You'll need it again as you're reading "Writings on the Wall."

Authors Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Raymond Obstfeld don't just examine issues that are on the minds of every American. They turn them over and blow them apart, looking for solutions that can be accomplished and chiding us gently for not already working. That makes for a thought-demanding, intellectually heavy book but it's also a worthy call to action; you may also be delighted to see that Abdul-Jabbar doesn't miss a chance to add a touch of the personal here, which includes quietly unexpected humor.

Readers with the right mindset will find this book to be informative and entertaining but be prepared to take your time to get the most from it. There aren't a lot of pages inside "Writings on the Wall," but what's here is deep and wide and nowhere

# Signs and symptoms of prostate cancer

rostate cancer is a For example, the five-year disease that forms in the tissues of the prostate, a gland in the male reproductive system that is found below the bladder and in front of the rectum. According to the Canadian Cancer Society, prostate cancer is the most common cancer among Canadian men (excluding nonmelanoma skin cancers), while the National Cancer Institute estimates that nearly 30,000 American men will lose their lives to prostate cancer in 2014, and roughly 15 percent of American men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer at some point in their life.

Despite its status as a potentially deadly disease, prostate cancer can be beaten. In fact, the NCI notes that the five-year survival rate for men diagnosed with prostate cancer between 2004 and 2010 was 98.9 percent, proving that a prostate cancer diagnosis is not a death sentence. Like many types of cancer, prostate cancer is most effectively treated when dissurvival rate for patients diagnosed with localized prostate cancer, which describes cancer that is found only in the part of the body where it started, between 2004 and 2010 was 100 percent.

Men are often their own best friends when it comes to fighting prostate cancer. Men over 50 should speak to their physicians about routine prostate cancer screenings. which include the prostatespecific antigen test or the digital rectal examination. Such screenings can help detect prostate cancer early and dramatically improve a man's prognosis. In addition to screenings, men can learn the signs and symptoms of prostate cancer to further improve their chances of surviving a diagnosis.


#### Early signs of prostate cancer

Prostate cancer does not always show signs or symptoms in its early stages, and that's because it tends to be slowcovered in its early stages. growing. A sign of prostate cancer refers to something that a physician or healthcare professional can observe and recognize, while a symptom is something that only the person experiencing it can feel. It's important men recognize that certain symptoms associated with prostate cancer may be caused by other conditions and that the presence of these symptoms does not mean a man has prostate cancer. However, it's equally important that men who notice symptoms associated with prostate cancer bring them to the attention of their physicians immediately.

Changes in bladder habits are among the most common symptoms of prostate cancer, and these symptoms tend to be early indicators of the disease. These changes may include a frequent need to urinate, especially at night; an intense need to urinate; difficulty in starting or stopping the flow of urine; inability to urinate; weak and/or interrupted urine stream; and burning or pain during urination.

# The prostate test controversy



Some people still believe that prostate specific antigen tests are a good choice in prostate cancer detection. Others say they can lead to false positives and unnecessary surgery.

naccurate results and less than fool-proof detection has lead many health professionals to eschew prostate specific antigen tests as an indicator of prostate cancer. A draft recommendation from the U.S. government said tests should no longer be part of routine screening for men.

Why? According to the U.S. Preventative Services Task Force, evidence indicates there is little, if any, reduction of prostate cancer-related deaths from the tests. Further research has indicated that tests actually may turn a man's life upside down by unnecessary stress and surgery for false-positive readings. But there are proponents of the test that say it is still vital in early detection of prostate cancer and enables men to get treatment earlier

A prostate-specific antigen test measures a protein in the blood, which has a tendency to spike when prostate cancer is present. People who support the test say that it is one of the best practices for male health screenings and that fatalities have dropped 40 percent due to prostate cancer since these tests were introduced 20 years ago.

Opponents say the tests often deliver flawed results. This has frequently led to over treatment, stress and anxiety. Furthermore, the longer so sure about a test's test may indicate cancer, or efficacy.

it could be detecting something much more benign, like an infection or recent sexual intercourse. Also, a positive test reading can require a biopsy that takes place through the rectum, which can lead to a number of uncomfortable side effects.

One of the biggest arguments against tests is that they don't really lower a man's risk. Prostate cancer is a slow-growing cancer for many men, which may not actually impair a man's health in his natural lifetime, especially since prostate cancer is largely a disease of men in their 60s and older.

The American Cancer Society has not taken sides on the matter. The Canadian Cancer Society has said that the test cannot diagnose cancer. If your tests are high, more tests are usually needed to determine if you have prostate cancer. They also say some types of prostate cancer grow slowly, may never cause problems, and don't need to be treated. Finding this type of cancer may lead to unnecessary treatment that can have side effects.

Whether to undergo a test or not is largely the decision for a man and his doctor. Some believe it to be invaluable in the fight against cancer, while others are no

# Risk factors for prostate cancer

n the United States, one in six men who live in cities north of 40 degrees can expect to be diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Those elevated incidence rates could be a byproduct of an aging population, as age is a significant risk factor for prostate cancer. According the Prostate Cancer Foundation, one in 10,000 men under age 40 will be diagnosed with prostate cancer. That figure skyrockets to one in 38 for men between the ages of 40 to 59, and one in 15 for men in their 60s.

Though age is perhaps the most significant risk factor, it's not the only thing that increases a man's risk for prostate cancer. In fact, there are a host of factors in addition to age that increase a man's risk for prostate cancer, which the Canadian Cancer Society says will claim the lives of more than 4,000 Canadian men

One such risk factor is where a man lives. Men who live in rural China, for instance, have a relatively low risk of developing prostate cancer during their lifetime. That risk is only two percent if a man stays in rural China his entire life. But that risk increases significantly if a Chinese man moves to the West, where a man in the United States has a 17 percent chance of developing prostate cancer.

And not only does which country a man lives in play a role, but also the location of his home within that country's borders can elevate the risk. Men latitude (north of Philadelphia, Pa.; Columbus, Ohio; and Provo, Utah) have the highest risk of dving from prostate cancer, and researchers feel this is because men who live in such cities get less sunlight during the winter months and therefore less vitamin D.

Race is another risk factor for prostate cancer. Asian men have the lowest risk of developing prostate cancer, while African-American men are 60 percent more likely to develop the disease than Caucasian men. The PCF notes that African-American men are also 2.5 times more likely to die from the disease, which highlights the importance that African-American men must place on screenings.

Family history also plays a role in a man's risk for developing prostate cancer. Men whose fathers or brothers have had prostate cancer are twice as likely to develop the disease. Their risk increases even more if their fathers or brothers were diagnosed with the cancer before reaching the age of 55 or if they had three or more family members who were diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Many men are aware of the importance of prostate cancer screenings. However, few might know that certain factors significantly increase their risk for being diagnosed with this potentially deadly disease. More information about prostate cancer is available at www.pcf.org.



### Dr. Alan P. Goldman: Treating And Relieving Arthritis Pain

There are a lot of people suffering with joint pain and arthritis, says *Dr. Alan P. Goldman*, a specialist in rheumatology (130 Brighton Beach Avenue, 718-946-7557), and they often believe that there is little that can be done to alleviate their pain.

They are wrong. There are many options available, Dr. Goldman says; the key is finding a physician who is knowledgeable in those treatment modalities.

As a rheumatologist, Dr. Goldman specializes in the treatment of arthritis; one of only a handful practicing in Brooklyn.

Rheumatoid arthritis is an inflammatory illness that causes joints to swell. Symptoms include morning stiffness and swelling, often in the hands, elbows, or wrists, he says. Perhaps because there are so few rheumatologists in the borough, when people experience these symptoms, they often "see a surgeon first," says Dr. Goldman. But this often doesn't make much sense, he explains.

"When you have stomach pains, you don't go to a surgeon before seeing a gastroenterologist," he explains. "When you have chest pains, you don't see a surgeon before seeing a cardiologist."

A surgeon is the expert to see when surgery is needed, he notes, and of course Dr. Goldman refers patients to surgeons when necessary. Still, Dr. Goldman believes that the majority of people who suffer with arthritis can be treated without surgery. Patients receive these treatments once every few months, and people who previously couldn't move well find that the "benefits are tremendous," he says. Those whose symptoms are less severe may find relief with pills or injections. This method has been used successfully for many years, says Dr. Goldman. And, "It still works."

When patients see Dr. Goldman they are assured of receiving expert evaluations. Dr. Goldman's office offers x-rays, and a number of in-office treatment procedures. Should patients need physical therapy, arrangements can be made for this, as well.

Dr. Goldman also recommends that people age 60 or older come in to be checked for osteoporosis. People who are thin or who smoke are especially at risk, he notes.

# Crown Heights uprising trivialized to festival

It's been 25 years since the Caribbean combined Jewish Brooklyn community of Crown Heights erupted with rage after two Guyanese seven-year-olds were struck and fatally injured by Lubavitcher Yosef Lifsch whose station-wagon veered onto the sidewalk hitting the youths.

The tragic accident caused the death of the young Gavin Cato.

Compounded with that little Angela Cato his cousin who he was playing with on Aug. 19, 1991 was left pinned under a car for longer than any seven-year-old should ever have to endure.

With no assistance from the Jewish community and alleged unwillingness from a Hassidic ambulance corps nearby, Carmel Cato, Gavin's father and family members and a mostly Caribbean and African-American assembly of Crown eights residents struggled to lift the car from her fragile body.

Yankel Rosenbaum an Australian rabbinical student paid the ultimate price. Afterwards, he suffered the wrath of angry protesters and was stabbed and killed in what was described as "revenge killing."



### **Inside Life**

It was during the mayoral rule of David N. Dinkins, the first Black to hold the position. And as far as Sonny Carson, a community activist was concerned the trailblazer regularly exhibited partiality to the Jewish community.

On Aug. 19, 1991 after the tragic car accident Carson and a group of youths took matters into their own hands. They converged outside the police precinct, marched throughout the neighborhood and for three days protested against the alleged favoritism.

Mayor Dinkins seemed cautious throughout but his NYPD Commissioner Lee P. Brown responded with force. What seemed like an entire regiment secured a perimeter of the community. Street soldiers did not seem intimidated by the blue wall of arsenal. Their numbers swelled and nights became a threatening shadow

with intensified protests and even stone-throwing.

Initially, the group marched back and forth from the intersection of the traffic infringement at president St. to the 71st Precinct.

Prosecutor Rudolf Giuliani led members of the NYPD to protest against Dinkins' apprehension by staging a demonstration at City Hall and as history shows, later that year, he handily won his bid to lead the city.

That recurring, three-day procession did not sit well with Jewish leaders and a confrontation ensued.

Although a mass showing of media houses reported on the disruption, it seemed as if the Black press was targeted for confrontation.

Reporting for the New York Amsterdam News, the largest Black outlet, yours truly and Christopher Griffith, a native of

Trinidad & Tobago, a photographer were also arrested.

How some members of the NYPD behaved is still a blemish on their reputation.

I was in the midst of reporting on the St. John's Rape Trial, a case that involved white, male, college students who allegedly drugged a native Jamaican coed after taking her

to a frat house where she was allegedly sexually assaulted.

Rev. Herbert Daughtry, pastor of the House of the Lord Pentecostal Church made an appearance at the Queens courtroom on Aug. 20 and after that day's proceedings I asked if he would mind taking me to the President St. scenario.

# Faithful remake of Oscar-winning classic

It takes a lot of chutzpah to remake the Hollywood epic that won the most Academy Awards in history. But that's just what we have in "Ben-Hur," a fairlyfaithful version of the 1959 classic starring Charlton Heston.

The films are based on "Ben-Hur: A Tale of the Christ," a novel published in 1880 which guickly surpassed Uncle Tom's Cabin as the best-selling American novel to date. The book's author, Lew Wallace, was a Civil War General who had led Union soldiers at the battle of Shiloh.

His inspirational tale of

redemption's success was credited to the fact that its timely themes of family, freedom and patriotism helped unify a citizenry torn asunder by years of war and then Reconstruction. Its compassionate tone particularly appealed to Southerners, because of its sympathetic treatment of slave owners, encouraging resolution via reconciliation

rather than revenge.

Directed by Timur Bekmambetov (Abraham Lincoln: Vampire Hunter), this incarnation of "Ben-Hur" stars Jack Huston as the title character, although the supposed star is easily overshadowed by the film's narrator, Morgan Freeman, who enjoys a very expanded role as Ilderiim, a wealthy Nubian sheik.

The story is set in Jerusalem in the time of Christ (Rodrigo Santoro). As the film unfolds, we find Prince Judah Ben-Hur living in the lap of luxury with his mother (Ayelet Zurer), sister Tirzah (Sofia Black D'Elia) and adopted brother Messala Severus (Toby Kebbell), an orphan taken in as a child by the altruistic noble clan. Judah also has a love

interest, Esther (Nazanin Boniadi), though her lowly slave status makes their marriage unlikely.

The plot thickens when the fully-grown Messala, by then a Roman soldier, unfairly fingers the Ben-Hur family for an act of treason perpetrated by Gestas (Moises Arias), one of the thieves crucified on Calvary alongside Jesus. Next thing you know, the family is separated and sold into slavery, and Judah ends up in chains, rowing in the galley of a warship.

Eventually, he gains his freedom, and starts searching for Esther, his sister and mother. Along the way, he finds religion and is afforded an opportunity to even the score with Massala in a chariot race at the Circus Maximus. In this regard, he's lucky to have wily old Ilderim in his corner, the best darn horse whisperer / charioteer trainer this side of the Tiber.

Distracting CGI mob scenes and heavy-handed sermonizing aside, "Ben-Hur 2016" is nevertheless a very entertaining variation on the original that's well-worth the investment.

The feature game between Team Haiti and Team Guyana was all that was expected of two very good teams which have never lifted the Caribbean Cup. The last time these teams met in the playoff arena was 2013 when Team Guyana won the third place playoff 4-2.

When the referee's whistle sounded for the kickoff, Team Haiti was one man short yet Team Guyana failed to capitalize. The Guyanese players are such a joy to watch when they are playing well that it is so unfortunate that they are not more disciplined in their approach to the tournament.

The first break came in the 27th minute when Kevin Beaton knocked a ball over the line from close in to send the Golden Jaguars on their way.

Eight minutes later as the rain started to drizzle, Les Grenadiers were in shock

when Travis Grant bundled home the ball from close in to double the Guyana lead.

As half time approached, the camel's back appeared broken when Clive Nobrega and Gregory Richardson scored goals three and four for the Golden Jaguars.

The half time break was just what the doctor ordered for Les Grenadiers as they came out like a house on fire in the second half. Just after the break, Jean Gary Rubin stepped up to take a free kick just outside the box on the left side of the field. His curling kick found the head of Kevin Morency to pull one back for Haiti.

This seemed to infuse life into the Haitians as they lifted their game and played with reckless abandon and skill. And just as suddenly Team Guyana was on their heels and seemed a bit tentative in defense. The legendary fast bowler said the best choice should have been Trinidadian all-rounder Kieron Pollard, whose captaincy of the Barbados Tridents has received widespread praise.

# **Bolt's hat-trick**

Jamaica Prime Minister Andrew Holness has hailed the achievements of the country's athletes at the Rio Olympics in Brazil last week.

Holness praised Usain's Bolt historic hat-trick of Olympic 100 meters titles saying that Jamaica is fortunate to have a son who inspires so many and ensures that Jamaica continues to be the sprint capital of the world.

Bolt also captured his third consecutive Olympic 200 title.

"Bolt has etched his name as the greatest sprinter the world has ever seen," Holness said in a statement.

Rio Olympics 2016 in Brazil was Jamaica's sprint machine, superstar Usain Bolt last Olympics as he has admitted that age has caught up with him and he will stop running the 200m.

He will not run in the 2020 Olympics in Japan.

Bolt revealed that he will only run the 100m in next year's World Championships in London. Bolt, who holds the world records in both events has won the past four 200m races in the worlds, said doing the double gets "rougher" as he gets older.

The Jamaican sprinter won three gold medals at the Rio Olympics and has not lost a major 200m final since he won in Beijing in 2008.

At the Rio Olympics he won gold in the Men's 100m, Men's 200m and Men's 4x100 relay.

Elaine Thompson, who claimed two Olympic titles (Gold) in the 100 and 200 meters and two-time defending champion, Shelly Ann-Fraser, who missed out on becoming the first women to clinch a hat-trick of titles in the 100-meter when she finished with bronze, deserved special praise, the prime minister said.

# Socacize brings a Caribbean style to exercising

Forget the gym and get fit for carnival to soca music.

A dance workout that combines soca music and exercise, better known as socacize, gets participants physically active to a sound they know best. That is the concept for the high-andlow aerobic workout instructed to Caribbean music. With the Labor Day parade approaching, dance instructors want you to get ready for carnival and encourage more healthconscious attitudes in the Caribbean community.

"Initially when we started we kind of used to fuse Caribbean dances and a workout," said Simone Warner, a Brooklynbased socacize instructor. "A lot of Caribbean people don't like to workout, so we fused them together to make people work out and prepare for carnival."

Socacize shares a few things in common to the popular Latin music-inspired workout called Zumba. But mostly,

there are specific differences between Zumba and socacize, according to Warner.

"It's similar — but socacize strictly and only uses Caribbean-based music," said Warner. "Zumba used to be Latin-based, but now they use everything — every style of

Socacize is offered in classes and keeps students fit with a one-hour workout divided into different sections. Warner says the classes are typical workout moves and popular Caribbean dance rhythms.

"There are four different dances — the bacchanal warmup, cardio soca jam, whine and tone, and groovy stretch," said Warner. And there is even a bootcamp session for more intense exercising. "Socacize is fun and it's different. In each session you never know what you might get."

By mixing the soca dance styles and common exercises, just one class offers a full body workout. The bacchanal warmup is a slow-paced stretch session, the cardio soca jam a soca-only workout to fastpaced songs. Then the final parts — the whine and tone, a toning focused session to which incorporates reggae and

which finishes off the workout to slow Caribbean music, such as calvpso.

"Everything is worked out," said Warner. "With the whine and tone, it's abdominal, and with the cardio jam — it's everything. It burns calories all over body and then you stretch everything you just worked out."


Socacize was founded in Canada in 2011 by Ayanna Lee-Rivears, a Trinidadian dancer and instructor. The dance studio and class has locations in Canada and instructors all over the world to teach socacize soca, and the groovy stretch classes in the United States

and the Caribbean.

Warner says that socacize classes offer an environment that is so interactive and supportive, that many friendships have been formed.

"At the end of the day, my clients have turned into friends — that's something I like about socacize," said Warner. "I have friends who have been with me since the beginning because while we work out we build strong relationships."





The Labor Day Parade will kick off on Mon. Sept. 5 along Utica Avenue and Eastern Parkway, from 8 am to 6 pm. Marchers will walk along Schenectady Avenue and Eastern Parkway to Grand Army

Failure to comply with the rules below may result in your removal from the parade, fines or prosecution.

- Band leaders must organize their respective band, be at the parade starting point by 9 am, keep order in the band along the parade route, ensure only costumed masqueraders enter the reviewing area for judg-
- Trucks or floats must have proper registration and must pass highway inspection to enter the parade.
- No one artist or performer is permitted to ride on top of the truck cabs.
- Bands without a permit from WIADCA will not be allowed to participate in the parade.
- Only paid band revellers and properly identified band security and personnel are allowed in costumed bands.
- Band leaders should be prepared to present their permit to the police or any authorized member of WIADCA upon request.
- Band leaders must ensure the safety of their band members by providing at least 10 marshals band. No exceptions!

per 100 masqueraders on the parade route.

- Persons accompanying floats may not stop and walk in the opposite direction of the bands.
- Band leaders must take responsibility to ensure that promotional items or otherwise should not be thrown from the truck (e.g. T-shirts, CDs etc.).
- Band leaders must restrict the participation of non-masqueraders.
- Artist trucks, advertising trucks, and T-shirt bands are excluded from registration by WIADCA.
- All bands will be visited by WIADCA officials and NYPD before final registration.
- NYPD will provide escorts to Parkway to registered bands only!
- Loud music cannot be played on streets on the way back to Mas Camps!
- Please use public transportation. All subways and buses in Brooklvn will connect to the parade area. Vehicles are discouraged, as there is no parking in the area.
- There will be a zero tolerance policy for nudity and indecent exposure. No strings, no thongs, no full body paint, no c-cup (under-pants) no wires (lower body) however, wire bras up to d-cups are permitted. Bands will be disqualified and escorted off the parade route for nudity, indecent behavior and exposure by any individual, in or out of any

- · Absolutely no alcoholduring their participation ic beverages to be sold or carried on parade route.
  - Spectators are not permitted to enter Parkway route. No crossing on Eastern Parkway until there is a gap in the procession of floats and bands. Pedestrian crossing may be allowed at Nostrand, Bedford and Franklin avenues, when the flow of the parade allows. Adults must be vigilant of small children at all times.
  - All non-costumed persons in any band must move completely out of the bands before Classon Avenue. Only costumed members may be on stage for judging
  - All spectators and non-costumed persons must stay behind police barricades at all times!
  - WIADCA reserves the right to use the names, images, and mas designs of the competitors to advertise and promote the future parade. WIAD-CA reserves the right to record, film, videotape, broadcast, and to transmit via internet the proceedings and performances of the parade. Acknowledgement of images and mas designs will be made related to the band.
  - WIADCA will not be responsible for any injuries caused by parade vehicles off the parkway after the parade.
  - Each band will be provided a specimen of the Acceptable Insurance Certificate for all trucks and floats that will be participating Labor Day Parade

- All vehicles taking part in the parade must be insured separately with the policy naming WIAD-CA as co-insured and the City of New York.
- Insurance coverage can be purchased at any insurance firm; however certificates insurance must be exact replicas of the specimen provided.
- · Upon submission of insurance certificates, WIADCA reserves the right to verify coverage with their own insurance company.
- Floats and all other vehicles must have WIAD-CA permits, registration and (one) day insurance stickers to enter parade route. New York State Highway Police will be conducting thorough inspections of all vehicles before entry on parade route. Inquire ASAP at WIADCA's Office at 323 Rogers Ave. or call (718) 467-1797.
- Trucks and floats with corporate advertising that are not registered with WIADCA will not be allowed to enter parade route.
- Vehicles are to display only the banners which have been approved and authorized by WIADCA.
- Band leaders are allowed a maximum of two vehicles and no more than one food truck on the Parkway, and no more than 15 adults on that truck during the parade.
- · Band leaders and drivers must not allow anyone to ride on the side of their trucks or floats. Band leaders will be held responsible for any injuries caused by such action.
- Please be mindful of vour neighbors! Do not block traffic! Do not park in people's driveways! Do not block bands on parade route! Do not jump in others' Mas Bands.
- All operators and drivers must have valid license to present to highway inspectors.
- All vehicles must have valid inspection stickers.
- Operator and driver should have proof of valid insurance.
- Brake lights and taillights must be clearly visible at all times.
  - Brake lights shall be





- The coupling device (if applicable) must be in proper working order.
- All floats and trucks must have wheel guards on rear wheels.
- Tires should be in good condition.
- Vehicle load (speakers) must be safely secured.
- No object shall extend past the front, back or sides of the vehicle.
- WIADCA and NYPD advise utilizing 18-wheeler, low-bed trailers.
- No flammable liquid may be carried or stored on floats or trailers.
- protective coverings the length of trailer to cover wheels (front to back).
- · Sound trucks-floats must install mirrors that eliminate blind spots around the vehicle.
- Only persons affiliated with the music are permitted on any float or sound truck.
- No person may board a moving sound truck, float or other parade vehi-
- No person may distribute promotional items from floats or trailers that are either moving or stationary on route.
- No one is allowed to "throw" gifts to spectators at any time or place! Anyone doing so will be fined by NYPD.
- Children under 16 years old are not permitted on floats.
- Safety marshals must be easily identified by wearing distinctive cloth-
- · All bands must have an adequate number of marshals for band size.
- Supply vehicles must maintain a safe distance between themselves and the parade float.

is strictly prohibited on trailers and parade route.

- All music trucks must have guards on all wheels, properly secured and have constructed railings that do not obstruct the driver's view.
- · Load height: nothing higher than 13.6 feet from street level will be allowed. No exceptions.
- To facilitate turning corners, hinged covers are to be built where cab wheels join flatbed trailer.
- All truck-cabs must be properly cordoned-off for safety reasons.
- Railings built around • Floats must have truck-trays must be strong and secured with specifications as per NYPD and highway police.
  - · For safety and security reasons only persons relating to music and performances will be allowed on trucks by NYPD.
  - Anyone needing help, contact NYPD personnel wearing blue jackets or white shirts.
  - Competitors appearing before the judges in the King-Queen Individual Competitions must wear the costume or be carrying the costume. The costume must be at least 10 feet wide and seven feet high, and can be supported by at least two wheels.
  - The person registered to take part in the competition must be the person carrying the costume. Any change of competitor must be brought to the attention of the Mas Committee chairperson and the judges prior to judg-


