PAHO Dominican-born director presents platform

The Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) said its Dominican-born director, Dr. Carissa F. Etienne, has presented her proposed platform for the next five years.

PAHO said the presentation, for the post of director of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau (PASB), took place on Friday during the Candidates' Forum, with member states, at PAHO headquarters in Washington, D.C.

PAHO member states will elect Dr. Etienne at the 29th Pan American Sanitary Conference here, from Sept. 25 – 29, 2017

She will assume another five-year term on Feb. 1, 2018, PAHO said. Etienne has been PASB director since Feb. 1, 2013.

According to the PAHO's Constitution, Etienne can be reelected for a second five-year term.

PAHO said her candidacy was the only one that was presented by member states.

The President of the PAHO Executive Committee, Ruben A. Nieto, of Argentina, moderated the forum on Friday, during which Etienne "presented her platform, her policy priorities and the financial and programmatic direction she proposed for the organization," according to PAHO.

PAHO said Etienne made a 30-minute oral presentation, which was followed by an hour question-and-answer session with member states, in accordance with the Rules Governing the Election of the Director.

Etienne was elected PAHO director by member states of the organization on Sept. 19, 2012 and began her five-year term on Feb. 1, 2013.

From March 2008 until Nov. 1, 2012, PAHO said Etienne served as assistant director-general for Health Systems and Services at the World Health Organization (WHO) in Geneva, Switzerland.

Prior to that, as assistant director of PAHO, from July 2003 to February 2008, she led five technical areas: Health Systems and Services; Technology, Health Care and Research; Health Surveillance and Disease Management; Family and Community Health; and Sustainable Development and Environmental Health.

During her tenures at WHO and PAHO, Etienne led the efforts to renew primary health care and to strengthen health systems, based on primary health care, promoting integration and improved functioning of health systems, according to PAHO.

PAHO said she has also spearheaded policy directions for reducing health inequalities and advancing health for all through universal coverage, people-centered care, the integration of health into broader public policies, and inclusive and participatory health leadership.

PAHO said the World Health Report 2010, "Health systems financing: the path to universal coverage, was produced under Etienne and WHO's deputy director-general.

"The report is recognized worldwide for providing an agenda for action by countries at all stages of development developing countries from School of Hygiene and Touries at all stages of development cine, University of London.

to move more quickly and in a sustainable manner towards universal coverage, while proposing ways in which the international community can better support efforts to achieve universal coverage and improve health outcomes," PAHO said.

It said Etienne has also led the WHO global agenda "to support universal access to safe and efficacious medical products and the development of a global code of practice for the international recruitment of health personnel."

PAHO said Etienne also chaired the International Health Partnership (IHP+) initiative, which seeks to commit partners to work together and put into practice international principles for effective aid and development cooperation in the health sector.

In her native Dominica, PAHO said Etienne began her career as a medical officer at the Princess Margaret Hospital, where she eventually became the chief medical officer.

She has also served in other high-level posts in Dominica, including coordinator of the National AIDS Program, disaster coordinator for the Ministry of Health, chair of the National Advisory Council for HIV/AIDS, and director of Primary Health Care Services, PAHO said.

It said Etienne received her medical degree (Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery — MBBS) from the University of the West Indies, at the Mona Campus in Jamaica, and her Master in Science (MSc) in Community Health in developing countries from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine University of London

Caribbean American ex-nurse and her hitman jailed for life

A Brooklyn Supreme Court judge on Thursday sentenced a Caribbean American former nurse and a hitman she hired to kill her Jamaican-born husband to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Justice Neil Firetog imposed the stiff sentence on Alisha Noel-Murray and Kirk Portious, both 29, of Brownsville, Brooklyn, following their convictions earlier this month to first-degree murder after a jury trial

Prosecutors said that Noel-Murray, the daughter of Guyanese-born Registered Nurse Pauline Noel and Grenadian-born construction worker Andrew Noel, hired Portious to kill her husband, Omar Murray, 37, after two previous failed assassination attempts on his life. Noel-Murray's estranged parents reside in Brooklyn.

Noel-Murray, who was fired as a registered nurse by the Visiting Nurse Services of New York (VNS), tried to cash out life insurance policies under her husband's name days after he was killed, prosecutors said.

"With their premeditated and callous actions, these two defendants forfeited their right to remain part of our society," said Acting Brooklyn District Attorney Puerto Rican-born Eric Gonzalez immediately after Justice Firetog imposed the sentence. "They planned and carried out the heinous and cruel execution of an innocent man for nothing more than pure greed."

According to trial testimony, on Feb. 24, 2013, at about 12:58 p.m., Omar Murray was shot three times and died inside his home, at 204 Lott Ave. in Brownsville.

Gonzalez said the investigation led police to Damien Lovell, 33, Noel-Murray's boyfriend, who told investigators that his girlfriend had asked him to find someone to kill her husband after her attempt to poison him had failed.

The first person shot at Omar Murray on Feb. 6, 2013, but missed, according to trial testimony.

Lovell then hired Portious and provided him with a US\$500 down payment and the gun, which he received from Noel-Murray, court evidence showed.

Caribbean

Six Caribbean countries recently participated the Caribbean Export Development Agency's AgroaIimentaria Fair — the Dominica Republic's largest and most important food and beverage food fair.

Companies from six Caribbean Community (CARICOM) countries took part in the event, funded by the 11th EDF Regional Private Sector Development Program and presented a range of products; Saints Brewery Company

Ltd. from Barbados; Pomeroon Oil Mill Inc. from Guyana; the St. Lucia Trade Promotions Agency (TEP), representing three



companies from St .Lucia; Coffee Solutions from Jamaica; Suriname Candied Fruits N.V; and the Trinidad and Tobago Fine Cocoa Company Ltd.

Deputy Executive Director at Caribbean Export Escipion Oliveria said the participation of CARICOM at Agroalimentaria for the first time is a significant development contribution towards the increase of regional trade.

Bahamas

The new Bahamas government is seeking outside help from the governments of United Kingdom and Singapore for drafting anti-corruption legislation that would result in the seizure of assets of corrupt public officials.

Speaking at the end of the budget debate in parliament recently, Prime Minister Dr. Hubert Minnis said Transparency International and other agen-

cies have documented the degree to which corrupt practices stymied economic growth and development.



He said investors should not have the cost of doing business increased by certain officials look-

ing for something.

The prime minister said the foreign governments would be asked to assist with the overhaul of anti-corruption legislation and the strengthening of anti-corrupt best practices.

Dr. Minnis said the consultants will be thorough and will include discussions on the issue of technology and other oversight mechanisms to stem corruption among all officials, including political leaders, public officers and those with business before the government.

Barbados

The Barbados National Union of Public Workers (NUPW) said it will take industrial action if the government does not reverse the tax increases which were recently announced by Finance Minister Chris Sinkler.

Sinkler has described the threat as "ill -advised and unfortunate" at this time.

The Finance Minister told the online publication Barbados TODAY that he does not believe the union's leadership "is obvious to the fact that the alternatives to the measures which we introduced, including an increase in the National Social Responsibility (NSRL), will be more hurtful to public officers than what is proposed".

In delivering the country's 2017 budget last month the Finance Minister increased the NSRL to 10 percent from

two percent, introduced a two percent tax on all foreign exchange transactions and increased excise duty on fuels.



Sinkler said there are persons in Barbados who argue that the government should reduce the size of the public service saying that it would mean that the government should send home thousands of public servants from the service.

NUWP president Kanni McDowell said that the industrial action could come in the form of a go slow, sickout, work to rule of all forms and that the government has until July to meet the union's demands.

Cayman Islands

Britain's Foreign and Common-

wealth Office (FCO) has appointed Anwar Bokth Choudhury as the next governor of the Cayman Islands.

Choudhury, 58, who is currently based in Peru as Britain's ambassador, will take up his appointment in March 2018, a



release from the FCO said.

The next governor was born in Bangladesh and is Muslim. He served in the Royal Air Force (RAF) before joining the Ministry of Defense and was headhunted to the FCO ranks from the Cabinet office.

Choudhury joined the Foreign Office in 2003 and became high commissioner to his native Bangladesh in 2004, where he was injured in a bomb attack that year at the Hazrat Shahjalal shrine in a terrorist attack.

In 2008 he served as director of International Institutions responsible for multilateral policy.

He replaces outgoing governor, Helen Kilpatrick, who is expected to leave the Cayman Islands early next year.

Jamaica

Jamaica's trade and investment promotions agency, Jamaica Promotions Corporation (JMPRO), said they will lead 18 companies on an export promotion mission to Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago and The Bahamas.

In a release, JMPRO said that this

move was part of a strategy to develop Jamaican exporters and increase export to regional markets dubbed "The Caribbean Market Mission" and forms part of their export development program (Export Max).

It began on June 18 in Barbados and ended on June 30, in The Bahamas.

The mission, according to JAM-PRO will give companies the oppor-

tunity to promote Brand Jamaica in the regional and increase outlets, and have key discussions with pri-



vate and public sector partners to garner market intelligence.

The Caribbean Market Mission will support Export Max's goal of increasing overall exports for the participating companies by 50 percent.

Export Max 11 is a three-year initiative geared towards providing focused capacity building and market penetration support for export, the release said.

St. Vincent

St. Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves recently met with Cuban President Raul Castro during a working visit to the island.

During the meeting the two leaders spoke about the progress in bilateral relations and welcomed the recent commemoration of the 25th anniversary of

Gonzalez said the gunman was promised a total of US\$3,500. He said Noel-Murray had taken out nearly US\$900,000 in life insurance on her husband before the murder and attempted to cash out the policies within days of his death.

Lovell had previously pleaded guilty to second-degree murder for a promised sentence of 15 years to life in prison, Gonzalez said.

"I thought she loved my brother," said Andrew Knight, the brother of Omar Murray, about Noel-Murray at Thursday's presentencing hearing.

Noel-Murray had made her own attempt to kill her husband in October 2012 by poisoning his dinner after she found out he cheated on her with a prostitute, according to the New York Daily News.

When that plan failed, she engaged in an affair with Lovell and confided in him to solicit someone

to kill Omar Murray, the

paper said.

Lovell testified in

Brooklyn Supreme Court

against Noel-Murray and Kirk Portious in exchange for 15 years to life in prison.

A jury had taken only three hours to convict Noel-Murray of firstdegree murder.

Portious was found guilty by a separate jury for pumping three bullets into Murray's body at 204 Lott Ave., "as Noel-Murray coldly hid in an upstairs bedroom with

her 10-month-old baby," the Daily News said.

"The man who murdered your husband is sitting right there and, this whole trial, she acted like it was nothing; she showed no remorse, no emotion," Knight told the pre-sentencing hearing on Thursday.

Noel-Murray told Lovell that she was the beneficiary of three separate life insurance policies out on her husband, and she needed him dead to cash in and clear up her finances, according to the Daily News.

"She didn't care about Omar, only herself, he was a US\$900,000 check," said Assistant District Attorney Emily Dean to Justice Firetog.

Prosecutors said, during trial, that Noel-Murray was not initially linked to her husband's murder for over a year, during which time she remarried.

"She continues to maintain her innocence," said Wynton Sharpe, Noel-Murray's defense attorney.



country as a recipient of smuggled arms and ammunition but he was quick to point out that "we have seen an increase in the movement of arms. We have seen an increase in money laundering and just basic criminal activity," Chastanet said. "I think we have to take an interest in what's happening. From a security perspective we are very concerned about the deterioration of things in Venezuela because it has impacted us from a security perspective," he said.

Chastanet's remarks at the summit, came a day after authorities in Trinidad complained bitterly about a near \$20M illegal gun trade operation mostly through the smuggling of hand and long guns through jet skis for the tourism sector and by way of containers which are not flagged or searched by customs and security officials.

The information was passed onto legislators at a joint select committee of parliament this week and even the police appeared to have been surprised by the announcement that guns are smuggled through containers and jet skis entering Trinidad.

Customs Chief Glenn Singh told the committee that the perception that the lower classes are the ones smuggling guns into the twin island

with Tobago is not correct.

"It is not the small people who bring in weapons. It is the rich people you should be having your eyes on," he said, noting up to 40 percent of the containers which enter the country do so without inspections. These are not brought in by the poorer classes.

The announcement has startled the police administration. Senior Superintendent Leroy Brebnor said that importers will do dry runs and once they determine that the containers will get safe passage into the country would load them up with illegal items the next time.

ber heads of government and foreign ministers to discuss regional and bilateral issues of mutual interest," the department said.

"He will also meet with CARICOM Chairman and Prime Minister of Grenada Keith Mitchell to discuss stronger coordination between the United States and the Caribbean Community," it added.

In keeping with a mandate from the US-Caribbean Strategic Engagement Act, or HR 4939, which became Public Law 114-29, after being signed last year by former United States President Barack H. Obama, the United States last month released a "Multi-Year Strategy for Engagement with the Caribbean."

The United States Department of State said it has, in coordination with the US Agency for International Development (USAID), submitted the strategy to the United States Congress "that establishes a framework for enhancing the security and prosperity of the United States and its Caribbean partners.

"Considered the 'third border' of the United States, the Caribbean is a vital part of our efforts to counter organized crime and illicit trafficking, support democracy throughout the Western hemisphere, strengthen energy security, and create jobs

through increased trade and investment," said the State Department in a media note.

"A secure and stable Caribbean contributes to a safer and more prosperous United States by securing the United States border, protecting United States citizens abroad, and increasing opportunities for United States exports," it added.

"The United States will continue to work with the Caribbean region to support commitments in the multi-year strategy; encourage private sector-led growth and job creation; reduce energy costs through diversification, regulatory reform, and public-private partnerships; and maximize partnerships in health and education for more sustainable growth and development in the Western Hemisphere," the State Department said.

It said the United States Congress mandated this Caribbean strategy "underscores US interest in enhanced relations with the governments of the Caribbean, the Caribbean Diaspora, the private sector and civil society."

The strategy states that the Caribbean region is the United States' "'third border', characterized by common interests and societal ties that yield daily, tangible benefits for United States citizens."

Across the U.S., Workers are Choosing a Union Voice

t our union, the RWDSU, we are seeing workers across the U.S. demand the respect and fair treatment all workers deserve. They are doing it by choosing a union voice, and they are doing it because now more than ever, workers need a union in their corner so they can build better lives for themselves and their families.

In the South, where it is more difficult to be a union activist than anywhere else in the U.S., the RWDSU Mid-South Council recently celebrated reaching the remarkable milestone of 10,000 members, doubling their size in five years. The Mid-South Council just won union recognition and a first contract for workers at four Piggly Wiggly grocery stores in Alabama. And in Georgia, the RWDSU Southeast Council is celebrating a win for over 100 workers at a Nestle Foods distribution center.

In New England, where the RWDSU represents hundreds of workers at Coca-Cola and Pepsi bottling plants, the union has won strong new contracts. And at Guitar Center stores in New York, Las Vegas, Chicago and Boston, workers are about to hold a ratification vote for their first union contract, which the dedicated worker activists there have for years fought for.

No workplace is too big or too small for union representation, and there are no industries where workers can't improve their jobs by joining a union. The RWDSU has welcomed workers at poultry plants and retail stores. And, the RWDSU represents workers in New York's medical marijuana industry, as well as adult toy stores in New York City including Babeland, and thanks to their win at the end of June, Pleasure Chest.

The dedication of union workers to winning a voice, the strong contracts they are proving they can negotiate, and the diverse field of industries represented shows that workers can win, even at a time when the playing field is stacked squarely against them and bosses will do whatever they can to keep unions out.

Workers are proving that they don't have to settle for lack of respect at work, and for an economy that sees workers fighting for scraps while the rich just get richer. Working people have had enough of being told they should just be happy to have a job, and that the wealth at the top will somehow magically trickle down to them if they just go along with low pay, poor benefits, and bosses that won't listen to them or address their problems. They are fighting back against anti-union propaganda and intimidation. They

are fighting back against professional unionbusters who spread lies and misinformation, and try to scare workers away from changing their jobs for the better. Workers are joining together and winning together, and the RWDSU stands with all of them.

and the flood water is receding very slowly because of persistent rain.



Several roofs of houses were blown

away or damaged, while farmers lost millions in agricultural crops and live-stock.

The government has established a TT \$25 million fund to assist those who are in dire need of financial help to replace stoves, fridges and other household items which were damaged by the flood.

Respect our cosmopolitan republic

I had a cursory look at part of the Anthony Bourdain documentary two days ago. I did see the part which triggered the latest verbal attacks on the Syrian / Lebanese communities in our nation. There was nothing in that part which offended me. After seeing some stir on my Facebook page, I went searching for that part. I again looked at it. I saw a family happy to show off its food. Happy to say how much they had achieved. Happy to show how far they had come. Happy to show that they had brought some Middle Eastern magic and cultural richness to these tropical islands. There was some socio-economic analysis, but nothing injurious; for me this episode, perhaps too innocently, exuded pride in roots, in accomplishment, in civic and economic importance.

Why did such a family moment, a Syrian / Lebanese moment in the sun, go wrong? The pathology is in the public response. The response paints an unflattering portrait of some responders. Something disturbed them, and it cannot just be that video.

If, as some say, that Syrians are responsible for drugs and gunrunning, why have not the alleged guilty parties been arrested? Must a Syrian daughter arrest a Syrian father and haul him into the police precinct? I myself have been hauled, not less than six or seven times, into police precincts, jail cells, brought to

court, roughed up, for the horrible crimes of right action, right advocacy in our economic history. Okay, no problem. But why have not these alleged criminals been brought to court? Who is responsible for this? The Syrians?

Or, as I have been told, the Syrians are oppressing "we." Really? Big man like you, and the Syrians oppressing you? No Syrian can oppress you brother, unless you share in, consent to, this alleged oppression. You, who have come from a history of colonial oppression, are allowing a minority ethnic group oppress you? Why such lack of robustness? Are you yet a mewling and puking indenture? Catch yourself!

Or, the Syrians "control" all the big business. Really? Is this true? Every immigrant group which has come to these shores have brought their own economic habits, terms, skills, types of trade. Without exception. Taino, Arahuacan, Spanish, African, French, Dutch, Irish, British, East Indian, Chinese, Venezuelan, Syrian, Grenadian, St. Vincentian and Chinese again. If you fail to use your historical economic bootstrings to pull yourself up, must you blame another group in the cosmos for this?

Or, that the Syrians don't mix with we. Really? Let us assume that this is so. In this cosmic dance, everyone must be free to decide if or not to attend, when to dance or

Who was the greatest cricketer — Bradman or Sir Garfield Sobers?

To understand what cricket supremacy means in a global context to the average Caribbean man, is best summarized by the former Prime Minister of Jamaica, Michael Manley, "The West Indies are Third World countries, but we belong and are in the first World of Cricket." Cricket is not only a religion in the Caribbean, but it best defines the region in any context. Regional political integration has followed cricket as a unifying and defining

In a deeper psychological and historical context, a West Indian cricketer's artistry and flamboyance is the product of the post-colonial era, where the psyche is the celebration and liberation from that bondage. His glorious successes lifted a marginalized people from their daily burdens, and took them to flights of pride over their achievements, living in the ecstatic comfort of the superlatives that always followed-helping them overcome their daily burdens.

Cricket is simply the lifeblood of the Caribbean, and its greatest adhesive force. C.L.R. James, the renowned cricket scholar, in his work "Cricket in West Indian Culture," at, p 119 aptly noted, "From its beginning to this day cricket in the West Indies has expressed with astonishing fidelity the social relations of the islands." In his seminal work, "Beyond a Boundary," James puts cricket in Cricket has always been more than a game in Trinidad.

perspective when he wrote, "Cricket is first and fore-most a dramatic spectacle. It belongs with the theatre, ballet, opera and the dance."

As kids, we were inspired to become famous and reach the pinnacle of cricketing fame like Sir Garfield Sobers, Sir Learie Constantine, George Headley, Sir Frank Worrell, Rohan Kanhai and other West Indian icons so revered around the cricketing world. They are the very embodiment of the West Indian dream, and the fruit of its labor. One of the great lessons we learnt as aspiring cricketers was to walk when you knew you were out without waiting for the umpire's signal and to acknowledge a good performance from the opposing side.

In fact, sportsmanship was as intrinsic a part of a cricketer's development as his ability to flick the ball off the legs, late cut or hook a bouncer off the eyebrows. The latter was a necessity in those days because our paraphernalia consisted only of a sculptured coconut tree branch or carved piece of wood for a bat and a cork ball for a ball, much in the traditions of the great West Indian players listed above. There were no helmets or pads, you had to play off the legs or get crippled.

As Samuel Selvon chroni-

cles in his book, "The Cricket Match," Ways of Sunlight, p. 162, a dry mango seed often substituted for a ball, and a pitch oil tin for a wicket. Yet, what cricket meant for us as kids is best summarized by Nobel Laureate Sir V. S. Naipaul, in The Middle Passage, p. 44, "Cricket has always been more than a game in Trinidad. In a society which demanded no skills and offered no rewards to merit. cricket was the only activity which permitted a man to grow to his full stature and to be measured against international standards... The cricketer was our only hero-figure."

This question as to who is the greatest cricketer has spurred great debate when Wisden's so-called panel of experts chose Sir Don Bradman over Sir Garry Sobers as the cricketer of the last century, and, a fortiori, the greatest cricketer. Hopefully, this article will put the issue to rest. Sir Garfield Sobers was the greatest cricketer, as distinct from being the greatest batsman, which honor belongs to Bradman and others. Sobers was the greatest cricketer of this and any other century, and by parity of reasoning, that he was the greatest cricketer that has ever lived, or the greatest the world has ever seen.

The son of a merchant seaman from the small island of Barbados, he was only five when his father died at sea in January 1942, after his ship was torpe-

'Jamaica' takes center stage in Harlem

Once again, Jamaica is in the spotlight.

This time shining the light on the Caribbean island / nation is the Harlem Repertory Theater with a 60th anniversary staging of the musical that launched the iconic actress Lena Horne into Broadway stardom.

In 1957, the legendary star of stage, screen and recordings starred in Y.E Yip Harburg and Fred Saidy's "Jamaica" and the rest is history.

The musical opened on Broadway at the Imperial Theatre on Oct. 31, 1957 and closed on April 11, 1959 after 558 performances.

The cast included Ricardo Montalban as Koli and Horne as Savannah, Ossie Davis as Cicero, and Josephine Premice as Ginger.

Every principal actor was nominated for a Tony award the following year but Davis took home the coveted trophy for his best Performance by a Featured Actor in a Musical.

Alvin Ailey was the principal dancer.

In honor of that historic theatrical debut the musi-



cal, "Jamaica" returns to New York City, this time to The Tato Laviera Theatre, 240 East 123rd St. in Harlem.

"Jamaica" takes its audience on a journey to Pigeon Island off the coast of Jamaica, following an ambitious island girl named Savannah who dreams of finding true love and escaping to New York City.

'The production examines how an isolated island community navigates the perils of love, family and relationships while they confront the increasing pressures of American commercialism, class struggles and racism."

Harburg a playwright and lyricist wrote the now landmark production when he was a victim of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's purge of liberals, Communist sympathizers and anti-political rhetoric.


cussions from elected officials at the highest level of government, many creative talents were forced to work underground, temper their expressions or submit to making the ultimate sacrifice by leaving the country.

not dance, what tune to dance to or what not. This is the essence of cosmopolitanism. Freedom to engage, participate, on one's own terms. No one should be forced, or ransomed, or induced to conform to some vague idea of "we" or "mixing." In any event, geography, economics, and the marketplace demands engagement; the cosmopolitan canvas is never fully painted.

Ours is a cosmopolitan Republic. And let us wave the flag of cosmopolitanism which history has so honorifically bestowed on us. It is vile, oppressive and shameful to be loading off on a minority national or ethnic group; this group, like all other groups, should be cher-

ished, loved, protected, celebrated like we celebrate the achievements of our young brothers or sisters. We should be happy to see the obvious pride exuded in the video, a family so eager to show off their accomplishments, with harmless pomp and exuberance.

Any attack that is based on race or ethnicity is bound to be inaccurate and deceptive: since race and ethnicity are superficial categorizing markers. It is only natural that minority groups, universally, practice vibrant forms self-affirmation, stake out their roles, as it were. Perhaps the family was so eager and happy to show off to the American because they feel under-appreciated or scorned by its own compatriots. Our own majority ethnic groups have failed to bring us to a sustainable, affordable, non-violent and rational post-colonial future; this is the real problem; so let us each deal with that cocoa in the sun!

doed by a German U-boat. Sobers' rise from his ensuing hardship to greatness, to his sobriquet "King Cricket," is a monumental inspiration for many to follow, and his genius has bequeathed an indelible memory wherever cricket is played. He was born with an extra finger in each hand, which he removed himself, a harbinger that the Good Lord had overflowed that extra talent into him, demonstrated by him playing golf, soccer and basketball for Barbados, and making his first class and Test debuts in cricket at the age of 16 and 17 respectively.

He was a one-man cricket team, the dream of any captain. His versatility with the ball enabled him to bowl left-arm orthodox and wrist spin and fast-medium pace, including bowling bouncers. The completeness of his versatile skills and talents bestrode the cricketing world like a colossus, and like the proverbial Napoleon on the battlefields of cricket, he conquered all before him, excelling in every conceivable department of the game-except wicket keeping. Oh, if only Sir Garry, and players like Kanhai, Hall, Lara, Richards, Headley and others were available to proudly don West Indian flannels... West Indian pride will soar once again.

Uniquely gifted, he was blessed with supreme athleticism, panther reflexes, eagle eyesight and the heart of a lion. He was a peerless exemplar of cricketing brilliance, endowed with an alliance of such natural gifts of talent and genius, that cricket may never see his like again. He was the cricketer's cricketer, whose phenomenal genius hardly brooked human limits. It was legendary, both in quality and quantity. Sobers has set the standards by which other cricketers are measured, and like Muhammad Ali in boxing, Michael Jordan in basketball and Pele in soccer, Sobers is similarly unrivalled in the world of cricket.

Sir Neville Cardus, that doyen of cricket scribes, gave the appropriate imprimatur to his all round genius in Wisden, 1967, p. 38, when he wrote: "Garfield St. Aubyn Sobers...the most renowned name of any cricketer since Bradman's high noon. He is, in fact, even more famous than Bradman ever was; for he was accomplished in every department of the game, and has exhibited his genius in all climes and conditions... We can safely agree that no player has proven versatility of skill as convincingly as Sobers has done, effortlessly, and after the manner born."

In fact, Sobers is to cricket what Shakespeare is to literature,

Michelangelo to art and Mozart to music. His only perceivable Achilles heel was as a captain, a consideration which can be excluded in the present context of argument. Sir Donald Bradman, who saw his 254 against Australia for a World XI in Melbourne in 1971-72, reckoned that it was the best innings he had ever seen on Australian soil. Sir Clyde Walcott said, "Sir Gary is remembered not only for his remarkable trail of statistical records, but for the quality of his cricket and the way he enjoyed the game." E.W. Swanton reminded us that "the true measure of his influence must take account of his sportsmanship and an unselfishness that were never questioned, an example second to none." John Arlott described Sobers as "the finest all-round player in the history of cricket."

C.L.R. James reiterated that, "A man of genius is what he is, he cannot be something else and remain a man of genius." Michael Manley once said this of Sobers, "Sobers was destined, in typically Caribbean fashion, to shine like some great star alone in the firmament of his own genius." Let Sobers have the last word. In his book, The Changing Face of Cricket, he commends C.L.R. James' words to all readers everywhere, as if answering those who chose him second best, "What do they know of cricket, who only cricket know?"

De Blasio's admin hails new MWBE state legislation

Mayor of New York City, Bill de Blasio, has long seen small businesses in the city as an opportunity for economic growth for persons who will make themselves eligible through the City's entrepreneurship programs. Thus the new piece of state legislation passed by New York State Senators and the State Assembly Members in late June to expand funding to the MWBE program, was encouraging news to the team at the New York City Small Business Services and more so to the Minorities / Women Business Entrepreneur (MWBE) office.

The bill, passed by a margin of 63 to 0 in the Senate, and 115 to 15 in the State Assembly, awaits the signature of New York's Governor, Andrew Cuomo. The piece of legislation would increase discretionary funding for MWBE certified members in the City. The legislation is seen as a leeway for more minorities and women to obtain more cash flow for their businesses. The Bill de Blasio administration. through its Senior Director for

the MWBE, Jonnel Doris, said that over 5,000 small businesses are already registered with the MWBE and asked that more small businesses in the City become certified through the program and maximized on the possibilities of how their businesses can grow through the MWBE program. The MWBE senior director explained that loans are available to assist these small business owners who face challenges in their operational finances.

The legislation is welcoming news to the administration also because as noted by Doris, the MWBE is working towards a 30 percent increase in its membership and with an expanded program to improve on the available funding for its members as well as prospective members. The MWBE hopes this will help increase in membership to a 9,000 registered. Doris announced also that there was an increase in contract agreements, an increase from eight percent to 14 percent in the program. "This is a milestone for small businesses in New York City," said Doris. "Such resources to business

Using mobile phones

Leading the list of the top distractions behind the wheel are mobile phones. Phones now do more than just place calls, and drivers often cannot pull away from their phones, even when driving. Funding climate resilience benefits all nations

By Kenton X. Chance KINGSTOWN, St. Vincent, July 4, 2017 (IPS) — A leading climate change mitigation and adaptation activist and former climate negotiator in the Caribbean says that the United States could protect its economic and political interest by helping the region to go green.

Further, James Fletcher, a former Minister of Sustainable Development, Energy, Science and Technology in St. Lucia, says that US President Donald Trump's emphasis on the coal industry is an attempt to increase jobs that no longer exist, while ignoring numerous opportunities in renewable energy.

On June 1, Trump announced that he would withdraw the United States from the global climate change deal reached in Paris in 2015, saying that the non-binding accord imposes draconian financial and economic burdens on the United States.

The US President was referring to the Green Climate Fund, for which advanced economies have formally agreed to jointly mobilise 100 billion dollars per year by 2020, from a variety of

sources, to address the pressing mitigation and adaptation needs of developing countries.

Fletcher, who was the 15-member Caribbean Community's lead negotiator for the Paris accord, told St. Vincent and the Grenadines' Minister of Sustainable Development, Camillo Gonsalves' "Firm Mediation" podcast, that Trump is wrong.

"Those are voluntary contributions, so it isn't something that any country is mandated to do," he said of the voluntary contribution to the GCF, known as Intended Nationally Determined Contributions (INDCs).

Former US President Barack Obama had pledged 3 billion dollars to the GCF and delivered 1 billion before leaving office.

"Now, it's up to President Trump to decide whether he wants to honour that obligation, adjust it — we know he won't increase it," Fletcher said, noting that there is nothing compelling the United States to contribute any amount to the GCF.

'It's just 100 billion that we hope to raise," Fletcher empha-

Contributions are precisely what they say they are: contributions. They are not commitments. No country is being held legally liable... You are not even allowed to name and shame. It is a kind of gentleman's agreement that we all say yes we agree to do this, we all agree that there will be no backsliding so that we will increase ambition over time and I believe that's one of the reasons that so many countries found it safe enough to join the Paris Agreement, because they knew there were no legal sanctions if they backed off on the agreement.

"So, to speak of the NDC as basically something that is putting an economic noose around the neck of the United States of America is anything but," Fletcher said.

He said that the growth of the energy sector in the United States is in renewable energy.

"And if President Trump understood that sector a little bit better, he would understand that that is where he needs to be focusing his attention and not on a coal industry that really does not have any future, from an employment-generation perspective, for the United States."



U.S. Congress lays out initiative fostering more diplomacy with the Caribbean

By Alexandra Simon

Since becoming a law late last year, the United States-Caribbean Strategic Engagement Act (H.R. 4939) — a bill passed by congress to increase U.S. diplomacy efforts with the Caribbean and their leaders recently publicized their initiative. As a mandate of the bill, officials with the State Department produced a multiyear strategy laying out a plan to increase engagement, safety, and the livelihood between the governments. The effort to reach the action plan was in collaboration with several groups, said the director of Caribbean Affairs at the State Department.

"We consulted a number people from the Diaspora and in the process of developing that strategy, we engaged with the Diaspora to seek their advice on policy," said Brad

Freden.

Officials met with groups such as the CARICOM caucus and co-sponsors of the bill, as well as other Caribbean-centric groups and organizations based in the islands or in the United States to devise the act. The key points of the bill include six elements: diplomacy, education, energy, health, prosperity, and security.

And many of these points will be towards increasing economic cooperation, particularly in the private sector, investment and trade, counterterrorism, dealing with other violent acts, and energy and diversification, according to Freden.

He said that the efforts to carry out this law will be a continued joint effort between the U.S. and Caribbean govern-

Trinidad and Tobago is especially an area of concern in

regards to security recently, due to nationals leaving to join terrorist militant group, ISIS.

"Somewhere around 100 people from Trinidad and Tobago went to Syria to join ISIS, and that doesn't sound like a lot but that's the biggest number in the western hemisphere," said Freden. "The government of Trinidad and Tobago takes this very seriously and we will work with them to provide assistance to countering violence, and reaching out to Muslim community there to ensure that they feel included in society to ensure that they don't become radicalized.'

But most of the countries in the Caribbean are prioritized and will seek to benefit from the law as it pertains to their criminal justice systems and national security, added Freden.


He adds that the exposure of jonkuunu's traditions to non-Caribbean people helps keep the custom in the spotlight for future generations.

Carribbean food festival celebrates all the islands

Curry on down to Canarsie!

A new food festival in Canarsie aims to showcase the wide variety of Caribbean cuisine, featuring culinary favorites from more than a dozen different islands. The organizer of the New York City Caribbean Food Festival, happening on July 15 at PacPlex, said that she wants the event to do away with stereotypes and preconceived notions of what the region's cuisine is like.

"I want people to appreciate and enjoy the different dishes that the Caribbean has to offer because we are not just all about pineapples and coconut," said Deborah L. Burchell. "Once you say Caribbean, they're thinking palm trees — but we are more than that."

Burchell, an event planner, came up with the idea after noticing a lack of West Indian representation at other city food events. Most festivals featured only a few from select cultures, she said. The event is being co-sponsored by Caribbean Life newspaper and PacPlex.

"Every time I go to a festival there may be only one Caribbean vendor and it's a lot about jerk but nothing for the entire Caribbean to come together," she said. "It's either Haiti, Trinidad and Tobago, [or] Jamaica."

For her festival, Burchell has recruited chefs serving food from Belize, Jamaica, Haiti, Guyana, Puerto Rico, Trinidad and Tobago, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, and a few other spots. She had originally hoped to include representatives of all 26 Caribbean countries, but the size of the venue and some economic concerns encouraged her to scale down, she said — though future events might have more.

"I wanted a lot of vendors at first but if we have a lot of vendors they won't make a profit, and we want our vendors to be happy. Because we want this to be an annual festival," she said.

Each admission ticket will allow guests to sample dishes from five different vendors, and those with VIP tickets will also get a sit-down, four-course meal and alcoholic beverages, according to Burchell.

The diverse offerings on the menu will let eaters a chance to experience trendy plates influenced by stateside favorites.

"We have a nice Caribbean modernized menu and it's not going be a typical curry — we are having something more modern," said Burchell. "It's going to be a fusion and a mix of American and original Caribbean."







"Jabari Jumps" by Gaia the diving board looked tiny or flipping head over feet, but there was only one way to get to the top to do it.


And so Jabari did...

Although some seniors dread the conversation about leaving home and moving to a retirement community, there are many advantages, including improved safety, transportation, and the chance to make new friends.

When is the correct time to leave 'home?'

ew people like to admit their age is affecting them. However, as we age, certain abilities become compromised, and it may no longer be practical for aging men and women to remain in their homes, or at least live there alone.

Comfortably living alone may be a signal to an older adult that he or she still has independence. Taking away a driver's license or suggesting a move may cause feelings of animosity. But at some point in time, friends or family members of an aging man or woman might need to broach the topic of moving to an assisted living facility. Such a discussion can be difficult, but having some evidence that a change is necessary may make the news easier to process. Sometimes the older adult may have already made the decision that a move is necessary, which will make the process even easier.

Moving should never be a kneejerk reaction unless there is a sudden medical emergency that necessitates fast action. Under normal circumstances, moving should be a gradual process that begins even before a parent, grandparent, or other relative really needs to change residences. Here are some steps to keep in mind:

Make sure to develop a strong relationship with your loved one. This relationship should be consistent and keep you in frequent contact so you can best assess his or her living situation.

Talk things over with other siblings or relatives to see if others feel the same way you do. Perhaps they have a different point of view.

If there are problems at home, make your case by pointing them out. Show the elder adult how day-today life has grown more difficult, and how certain burdens may be lifted by changing living situations.

Indicate that access to health care and a safe environment are some of the key benefits of moving to a senior community. Point out other benefits, such as companionship with similarly aged people, activities, transportation, and the presence of a maintenance staff to ensure nothing falls into disrepair.

Do your research and have the names and amenities of different residences available to discuss. Request brochures from senior communities and offer to make trips to view the homes together with your senior

Consider other options. If the idea of a "home" is not what your loved one has in mind, discuss the option of moving in with a relative and whether it would be a more comfortable situation.

You may need a mediator or help with finding the right fit for a loved one. Consider hiring a geriatric care manager to help you organize your thoughts and priorities regarding a senior living transition. These individuals provide services that include helping families locate appropriate housing and other care services for their loved ones.

Not every senior needs to leave home, but the topic should be broached if assistance with day-to-day activities is needed.

Getting wanderers home safely

Program working to prevent tragedies

f you're a regular reader of my column, you know how much attention I give to the topic of wandering and for good reason. Statistically, we know that wandering affects up to 67 percent of those living with Alzheimer's, but anyone can wander at any time, placing themselves in dangerous or even life-threatening situa-

Fortunately, New York City dementia caregivers have access to a life-saving program: CaringKind's MedicAlert NYC Wanderer's Safety Program, which operates in partnership with the police department's Missing Persons Unit. MedicAlert NYC assists in the safe and timely return of individuals who wander, either in the city or across county and state lines. Today, more than 26,000 New Yorkers are registered in the program.

Here's how it works: After registration, the person with dementia receives a bracelet or necklace engraved with an ID number and 24-seven tollfree, emergency contact number. The MedicAlert system stores the individual's personal information and health records, including the name and contact information for the primary caregiver. When a caregiver reports an incident of wandering either to the MedicAlert team at CaringKind or to the police, we can activate missing person announcements, which include photos and identifying details. The information is also sent to local hospitals, Port Authority, shelters, and morgues. If the family agrees, the media is contacted. These actions ensure that word gets out quickly and broadly throughout the entire metropolitan area.

While the person is missing, CaringKind's MedicAlert 24-hour Emergency Response team maintains communication between all the agencies and keeps the family informed, ensuring that no time is lost or no information is overlooked.

When the individual is found, often by law enforcement or emergency responders, a call is made to the toll-free number on the ID bracelet, alerting the MedicAlert team, who communi-


cates with the family and authorities to ensure that the individual is safely returned home. The medical information stored in the MedicAlert record allows doctors to quickly provide appropriate treatment and medication if needed

The program goes one step further by giving caregivers an option to purchase their own corresponding MedicAlert ID bracelet or necklace. This identifies them as a dementia caregiver and, should anything happen to them, police, hospitals, and other authorities will immediately know that there is someone with Alzheimer's or dementia who needs care or assistance.

The numbers speak for themselves: 98 percent of the New Yorkers enrolled in the program who wandered were returned home safely.

MedicAlert NYC adds a level of protection to prevent a wandering event from ending tragically, making the already tough job of caregiving a little easier.



State's nursing home bed-hold policy is reduced

Nursing home residents often require temporary admission to a hospital to treat a chronic condition, an illness, or medicine readjustment. A recent study estimates that a quarter of all home residents will require hospital care every year. Yet, most residents and their families are not aware of the nursing home readmission policy. Many assume the resident will be readmitted and return to the same bed. This is not always the case.

Federal regulations require all skilled nursing facilities receiving Medicare and Medicaid to provide a returning resident the next available bed in a semi-private room, not necessarily the original bed. States may modify these regulations as long as they do not offer lesser services.

New York State has been one of the more generous states with regard to bedholds. New York guaranteed a resident could return to her original bed if she is hospitalized no more than 14 days in any 12-month period. This applied to all residents receiving Medicaid and occupying a bed in a semi-private room. The facility must still provide her with the next available bed after the 14-day period, but not necessarily the original bed.

But New York's liberal bedhold policy has changed as of April 1. Nursing homes must still guarantee the first available bed in a semi-private room, but not necessarily in the same room or on the same floor. The state affirms that by eliminating this policy it can significantly reduce Medicaid costs. A family may still reserve a bed, but only if they pay privately.

This change is due to a New

York State amendment to the Public Health Law that eliminates Medicaid's bed-hold reimbursement. New York's Department of Health maintains this amendment will reduce Medicaid expenses by \$22 million per year. Prior to April 2017, New York nursing homes were reimbursed 50 percent of the Medicaid daily rate for 14


days as long as the nursing facility maintained a 95 percent occupancy rate.

Some states still retain policies that reserve nursing home beds for a designated number of days.

Minnesota has a bed-hold policy of 18 days, Washington State will reserve a bed for 20 days, and Connecticut for 15 days. Other states have determined the expense for a bed-hold is too costly. Maryland, Alabama, Indiana, and Oklahoma have no bed-hold days. These states will still hold a bed if a family or friend privately pays for it. The average bed-hold cost is between \$300 and \$350 per day.

New York still offers generous bed-holds for "therapeutic leave," or a non-medical, overnight visit to a friend or family. Medicaid pays the nursing facility 95 percent of the Medicaid rate provided to that resident for up to 10 days within any 12-month period.

The average length of time for therapeutic leave among state programs is about 18 days

per year. North Carolina offers the most permissive policy, paying for 60 days of therapeutic leave per year. Some states have different rules with regards to leaving the facility for consecutive days. For instance, Hawaii allows Medicaid eligible residents a total of 12 days for therapeutic leave per year, but the leave cannot be for more the utive days. Will I need glasses after cataract surgery?

By the year 2030, there will be 70 million Americans over the age of 65. At least one out of every three Americans will have some sort of eve problem. Cataracts are one of the most common problems facing Americans, but fortunately surgery can usually restore vision. With modern-day cataract surgery many patients can experience improved vision almost immediately. Today, patients don't only want improved vision, but also less dependency on glasses for driving, computer work and reading. There are new implants which for the right patient can lessen the necessity for glasses and can also correct astigmatism.

Every patient planning to undergo cataract surgery should have the following discussion with their ophthalmologist:

1) How strongly do they want to not use glasses.

2) What are their hobbies?

Patients who need crisp distance glasses for example in order to play tennis are not necessarily good candidates for the new multifocal implants. If the patient is still working, what kind of job do they hold and what vision requirements do they have?

3) Do they drive?

4) Do they use glasses for reading

The new multifocal implants which make patients less dependent on glasses are not necessarily the best option for every patient. A thorough discussion with your ophthalmologist is a must so that patients have realistic expectations about their vision after cataract surgery

Infused with light, a wall of windows overlooks the city looking south. The New York Times calls this building the "fraternal twin" of the Whitney Museum of Arts—similarly located near the Hudson River (five express subway stops downtown), also designed by architect Renzo Piano.



CWI determines the grade of contract on a points system stemming from players' performances over a 12-month period and on this basis, players were aware of the performances required in order to stake their claim for higher grade contracts.

The CWI president said that seasoned players need to translate that experience into performance instead of hoping for a high level retainer based on their length of time in international cricket.

Grade A is the highest level contract on offer and is worth US\$150,000 with Grade B valued at US\$125,000 and Grade C, US\$100,000.

Opener Kraigg Brathwaite, who averages 35 from 37 Tests, is currently the only player on a Grade A contract with Test and ODI captain Jason Holder on Grade B.


