Haitians risk arrest in Canada for a better life

While United States President Donald J. Trump is clamping down on illegal immigration, thousands of Haitians Status (TPS) in the United States are rushing to the border crossing in Champlain, upstate New York, willing to face arrest in their pursuit of a better life, according to reports here.

The popular stop near the border station at Lacolle, Quebec, Canada is quickly becom-

ing a path to a new life for immigrants — and something of a tourist attraction, reported the Miami Herald.

It said the migrant surge with Temporary Protected has overwhelmed Canadian officials who, after opening Olympic Stadium in Montreal to asylum seekers, recently reopened a shuttered hospital to accommodate the growing numbers, and deployed the military to construct a tent city near the official border crossing at St. Bernard-de-Lacolle.

The refugees have decided that getting arrested with an uncertain future in Canada is better than risking deportation under Trump, the Herald said.

Responding to the influx of refugees in his province, Quebec's Prime Minister Philippe Couillard told the Canadian press that "it's unfortunate" that asylum seekers have been led to believe that being admitted into Canada was "a done deal."

EYES ON CHINESE BUSINESS **Opposition upset at Chinese** colonialism in Jamaica

A Jamaican opposition legislator this week shone light on an issue many in the Caribbean often think about regarding the presence of super rich Chinese investors, some backed by their government back in Beijing, others flush with cash from the private sector, albeit of sometimes dubious origin.

Until the People's National Party (PNP) lost power to the Jamaican Labor Party (JLP) 18 months ago, Peter Bunting had functioned as the island's national security minister but in recent weeks he appears to have switched his role to that of a bell ringer about growing presence of Chinese companies in Jamaica and CARICOM. He hopes people would sit up and take note.

As far as he is concerned, governments like those in Jamaica are often too quick to hand tax and other concession to large and small Chinese firms, allowing them to compete in areas and sectors previously dominated by local firms. His argument that once these firms are lavished with

concessions, they immediately hold an advantage over local firms as the playing field is no longer level.

"They come into Jamaica, typically on the basis of concessionary financing for a government project and they get all sorts of duty free concessions and imported machinery and equipment and they get to buy local building inputs free of taxes," he argued. They then use these concessions and machinery and equipment to compete for private sector projects so they have an advantage over local contractors," he said, echoing years of points made by local firms.

In fact he argues, that just over 50 percent of Jamaica's booming construction sector has already been taken over by Chinese firms wither their duty free import concessions for machinery and other equipment.

But once Bunting's rantings were aired on social media and had received thousands of likes and supportive comments, both the Chinese government



Canarsie association advocates for ferry service

Lone advocate, Dorothy Lee, a Canarsie resident stood outside of the Rockaway Parkway Subway Station in Brooklyn, last Friday, Aug. 11, calling out to commuters to add their signatures to a petition, demanding City Council start a ferry service from the Canarsie Pier, with stops at Coney Island before docking passengers at Wall Street in Manhattan.

Lee, who moved to Canarsie four years ago, said she had already garnered upwards of 3000 signatures and is confident that the Canarsie Improvement Association, of which she is a member, would secure 5000 signatures to have the measure passed for ferry service from the Canarsie pier.

Canarise, which has a large concentration of Caribbean nationals,and is represented by Guyanese-born Sen. Roxanne Persaud in the 19th Senatorial District, needsan alternative mode of transportation said Lee, who noted that several elected officials and residents came out with their banners at a recent night-out meeting in the community, touting the ferry service.

"It is a joint effort of residents and elected officials who are seeking alternative service — bus, train and ferry, to Manhattan," said Lee, one of seven residents who started a Kennel Club, after waking their dogs in the park, and wanted to do more to improve the community, hence the Canarsie Improvement Association.

She said the group is doing an

Caribbean pols condemn violence in Charlottesville

Caribbean American legislators in Brooklyn on Sunday vehemently denounced the hate and violence that engulfed the City of Charlottesville, Va. the day before when white nationalists and counter-protesters clashed in what has been described as one of the bloodiest fights to date over the removal of Confederate monuments across the Southern United States.

Elaborating on a series of tweets that she made on Saturday, in the wake of the violence, US Congresswoman Yvette D. Clarke, the daughter of Jamaican immigrants, told the Caribbean Life late Sunday that she could not fathom "in the 17th year of the 21st Century to watch hatred and violence unleashed on peaceful protestors in a peaceful American city."

She said the hatred and violence ranked "among the lowest of the lows of Donald Trump's presidency.

"Americans who were doing nothing more than exercising their right to assemble against the hatred represented by the statue of Robert E. Lee in the city's Emancipation Park was nothing short of an atrocity, and Donald Trump owns it," said the Democratic Representative for the predominantly Caribbean 9th Congressional District in Brooklyn.

"What occurred in Charlottesville, Virginia, was an act of domestic terrorism committed by white supremacists whose despicable beliefs represent marched in his name.

the worst of American history," Clarke added. "These individuals share a fundamental commitment to the violent destruction of all of the gains we as a nation have made in the struggle for human rights and dignity."

From the Civil War to Jim Crow to the Civil Rights movement, she said "these hateful white supremacists have been focused on recruiting and indoctrinating white men who will focus their efforts on reversing the results of the Civil War, undermining the human and civil rights of African Americans, and other racial and religious minorities - indeed, all non-white Americans.

"Their protest was an attempt to defend statues honoring the shameful legacy of Robert E. Lee, who waged war on the United States to protect the evil institution of slavery," she said. "I will continue my fight to remove the name of this Confederate general, as well as that of Stonewall Jackson from the streets of Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, and eliminate this insult to the descendants of women and men who were held in bondage."

Clarke said she was bewildered when Trump initially blamed the violence Saturday on "both sides."

"Really?" she asked rhetorically. "At best, this was him being totally detached from reality and an honest misunderstanding of the real situation, or, at worst, a demonstration of solidarity with the white supremacists who marched in his name. "We have witnessed him advocating violence at his campaign rallies and have difficulty denouncing the endorsement of David Duke [a former imperial wizard of the white supremacist group, the Ku Klux Klan]," she said. "We have even most recently heard him advocate for police brutality right here in the state of New York.

"As we mourn the people who were killed and injured yesterday [Saturday] in Charlottesville, Virginia, we must stand shoulder-to-shoulder in opposition to hatred," Clarke urged. "Notwithstanding Donald Trump and his White House cohorts, this white supremacist mentality cannot and will not stand."

Speaking Saturday afternoon at the beginning of a veterans' event at his golf club in Bedminster, NJ, Trump condemned the bloody protests, blaming the "hatred, bigotry and violence on many sides."

That prompted Clarke to retweet: "Terrible. That man represents the worst of America.

"Your false equivalency, dog whistles are sad," she said, referring to Trump. "White supremacy is to blame."

New York State Assemblywoman Diana C. Richardson, the daughter of St. Martin and Aruban immigrants, told Caribbean Life that the "unsavory turn of events in Virginia unveiled a heightened time of racial and religious discrimination in the country," expressing "deep dismay" over Saturday's hatred and violence.

Grand Bahama also received a poor report with United States authorities claiming that violent crime there had increased and gangs were on the rise.


The report also noted that home invasions, thefts, and robberies are not contained to a specific part of Grand Bahama.

tance of good public health and how that is influenced by good healthy practices in their local environment.





Funds for infrastructural development in Belize

The Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) says it is providing a total US\$800,000 through technical cooperation grants of US\$400,000 each for the Strategic Program for Infrastructure Development and the Strategic Program for Integration Development for Mesoamerican Project member nations, including Belize.

The Washington, D.C.-based IDB said on Wednesday that other beneficiaries are Mexico, Belize, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panama and the Dominican Republic.

"The operation's goal is to contribute to the Mesoamerican region's logistics development through studies and action plans," the IDB said.

It said the project is aimed at generating regional transportation and logistics strategies; promoting regional investment plans; supporting the transformation of the Pacific Corridor (part of the Inter-American Network of Mesoamerican Roads running from Puebla, Mexico, to Panama City); and fostering the implementation of National Logistics Plans.

The IDB said assistance to the regional strategies will focus on three areas: intermodal transport, cargo logistics and urban mobility.

The Pacific Corridor component will fund an operational study and investment plans to identify and prioritize high-impact transport and logistics projects in the corridor countries, with special emphasis on the Northern Triangle nations — Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador, the IDB said.

It said support for the implementation of national logistics plans will benefit those countries, plus Nicaragua and the Dominican Republic.

Referring to the need to kickstart transportation projects that facilitate intraregional trade, the IDB's Manager of the Central America, Mexico, Panama, Haiti and the Dominican Republic Country Department, Gina Montiel, said: "Maximizing logistics performance and infrastructure investments in the region is still a key pending subject on the road to buttress Mesoamerica's and Central America's competitiveness.

"This support is aimed at offering planning and prioritization instruments for strategic transport and logistics infrastructure in order to boost up connectivity and improve logistics performance and border management in the region," she said.

and Prime Minister Andrew Holness were forced to respond formally.

The Chinese Embassy complained in a statement that Bunting's remarks could put Chinese nationals at risk and expose them to racial profiling.

"We believe these claims could encourage a backlash and create an unsafe environment for Chinese nationals working in Jamaica," the mission said, contending that "concessions offered by the Jamaican government are not limited to Chinese companies but are made available to other foreign investors. Our aim is not to colonize Jamaica but to always find areas of cooperation and mutual benefit that will improve the lives of both our people," the mission said.

For his part, PM Holness said authorities are sensitive about the growing debate about the Chinese presence in Jamaica and would act responsibly. He gave no details, but appeared to acknowledge the deep and growing concern about an unlevel playing field.

"The government is very sensitive to what has been happening. I want to reassure the people of Jamaica that the government of Jamaica will always act in

the best interest of the people of Jamaica," pointing to the fact that relations go back to 1972.

"We have to be receptive to investments not just from China. Jamaica wants to see a diversified portfolio of investors coming into this country. We want investors from all over to come here and invest. We want people to choose Jamaica to invest. We want people to choose to make their homes in Jamaica, and so the government of Jamaica has, not just with my government, but with the previous government and the government that I was a part of before that, developed a strategic relationship and partnership with the government of China."

He and other officials stressed that, despite the warm reception and treatment refugees have received, there is an immigration process, adding that arriving migrants will have to demonstrate why they should not be returned to their home countries, according to the Herald.

"We have the notion here people are being told, 'Go to Canada, it's welcoming. Just walk right in, the streets are paved gold and get a job," said Paul Clarke, the executive director of Action Réfugiés Montréal, which works with refugees seeking asylum in Canada.

"But it's not like that," he added. "People have to make a refugee claim. They have to state why they are being persecuted or fear persecution in their home country for their race, religion.

"The statistics in Canada for the last couple of years show that only 50 percent of Haitians meet that test," Clarke continued. "Only 50 percent are accepted as refugees in Canada. But we kind of get the sense that's not what's being told in the States."

While the wave of Haitians crossing into Canada has been fueled by fears that the United States will send them back to Haiti early next year, when Haiti's TPS is set to end, the community has been bombarded with misleading and false messages on WhatsApp, social media and Creole-language radio saying that Canada is offering free residency, the Herald said.

The paper said that, in one message, a man claiming to be an attorney says the Canadian Consul in the United States is inviting "and even encourages all Haitians with or without TPS to apply for Canadian residency."

More than 6,500 asylum-seekers have crossed into Quebec province since the beginning of the year, and most estimates say about half are Haitians, according to the Herald.

"Right now, the question is how can the governments, the municipal, the provincial government of Quebec and federal in Ottawa manage this?" said Donald Cuccioletta, a historian and senior research associate at the Université du Québec à Montréal's Raoul Dandurand Center for Strategic and Diplomatic Studies. "It's approaching a crisis. How do we handle these people once they come across?"

The steady stream of Haitian migrants began in May when the Trump administration announced it was granting Haitians living in the United States only six months extension on their TPS — awarded after the 2010 earthquake that devastated Haiti — which would mean the status would end in January, the Herald said.

In July, when the 180-day countdown for January began, the flow of people picked up again, it said.

Donald Trump, Kim Jong-Un need to find a diplomatic off-ramp

WASHINGTON DC, Aug 9 2017 (IPS) - Just six months into the administration of President Donald Trump, the war of words and nuclear threats between the United States and North Korea have escalated, and a peaceful resolution to the escalating crisis is more difficult than ever to achieve.

Both leaders need to immediately work to descalate the situation and direct their diplomats to engage in an adult conversation designed to resolve tensions

On Jan. 1, North Korea's authoritarian ruler Kim Jong Un vowed to "continue to build up" his country's nuclear forces "as long as the United States and its vassal forces keep on [sic] nuclear threat and blackmail." Kim also warned that North Korea was making preparations to flight-test a prototype intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM). Two days later. Trump could not resist laying down a "red line" on Twitter, saying, "It won't happen."

Pyongyang has responded to the U.S. statements and military exercises on North Korea's doorstep with its own, even more bellicose rhetoric. Following press reports that a U.S. carrier strike group was being sent toward the Korean peninsula. North Korea's deputy ambassador to the United Nations warned April

17 that "a thermonuclear war may break out at any moment" and that his country is "ready to react to any mode of war desired by the United States."

After an inter-agency review, Trump and his team announced a policy of "maximum pressure and engagement" to try to get North Korea to abandon its nuclear ambitions and its ballistic missile program. So far, the approach has been all "pressure" and no "engagement," with U.S. officials calling for North Korea to agree to take concrete steps to show its commitment to the denuclearization of the Korean peninsula.

In response, North Korean has accelerated its pace of ballistic missile tests. including flight tests of missiles in July with ICBM capabilities. The UN Security Council unanimously adopted Aug. 5 the toughest UN Security Council sanctions yet imposed on North Korea. The Korean Central News Agency lashed out Aug. 8, warning that it will mobilize all its resources to take "physical action" in retaliation in response to the UN actions.

Trump, in turn, said Tuesday "North Korea best not make any more threats to the United States. They will be met with fire and fury like the world has never seen."

Trump's attempt to play the role of nuclear "madman" is as dangerous, foolish, and counterproductive as North Korea's frequent hyperbolic threats against the United States.

Trump's latest statement is a blatant threat of nuclear force that will not compel Kim to shift course. In fact, repeated threats of U.S. military force only give credibility to the North Korean propaganda line that nuclear weapons are necessary to deter U.S. aggression, and it may lead Kim to try to accelerate his nuclear program.

That should not come as a surprise. Since the beginning of the nuclear age, U.S. "atomic diplomacy" has consistently failed to achieve results. The historical record shows that U.S. nuclear threats during the Korean War and later against China and the Soviet Union, as well as Nixon's "madman" strategy against North Vietnam, failed to bend adversaries to U.S. goals.

With respect to North Korea in particular, the threat of pre-emptive U.S. military action is not cred-

Organizers of the West Indian American Day Carnival Association announced that on Aug. 17 they plan to launch the 50th anniversary of Caribbean Carnival Week by making three big announcements.

The date coincides with the 130th anniversary of the birth of Marcus Mosiah Garvey — Jamaica's first national hero — who proposed a mantra of three-fold oneness when he decided his motto to be — "One God, One Aim, One Destiny."

Slated for Brooklyn Children's Museum, the event will promote seven days of celebration from Aug. 31 to Sept. 4 when a grand culmination annually rallies colorful display and assembly along Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway for a Labor Day Parade.

At press time the details of the triple treat were still a mystery however, a source hinted that the announcement would be significant and emphasized "it will be big."

Two days later on Aug. 19 the nationalist also known as the Black Moses will be regaled by the Jamaica Progressive League in the Bronx from 11 am during



a free, fun-filled celebration.

According to a release from the JPP, Garvey's life-long contribution to his people will be amplified and celebrated by the theme and reminder he uttered more than a century ago when he said "Look for me in the whirlwind."

"In death I shall be a terror to the foes of Negro liberty. Look for me in the whirlwind or the song of the storm; look for me all around you," Marcus M. Garvey said.

The nostalgic reference will mark the presence of the prophetic Pan-African advocate at Marcus Garvey Square (Williams Bridge) White Plains Road between East 212 St. & Magenta St. For more information, call 718-994-5496.

Marcus Mosiah Garvey was born Aug. 17, 1887 in Jamaica. He was a publisher, journalist, entrepreneur, crusader for Black nationalism and founder of the Universal Negro Improvement Association.

According to Worldisafrica. wordpress.com, Garvey is best remembered as a champion of the "Back-To-Africa" movement, which was interpreted as encouraging people of African ancestry to return to their ancestral homeland.

It is that movement that is also credited with mobilizing a segment of the Jamaican population to unite as Rastafarians.

Garvey said he wanted those of African ancestry to "redeem" Africa and for the European colonial powers to leave it.

Although Garvey was raised Methodist, he converted to worship as a Roman Catholic.

For him, Africa was the ancestral home and spiritual base for all people of African descent.

His political goal was to reclaim Africa back from European domination and build a

free and United Black Africa.

ible, in large part because the risks are extremely high.

North Korea has the capacity to devastate the metropolis of Seoul, with its 10 million inhabitants, by launching a massive artillery barrage and hundreds of conventionally armed, short-range ballistic missiles. Moreover, if hostilities begin, there is the prospect that North Korea could use some of its remaining nuclear weapons, which could kill millions in South Korea and Japan.

U.S. intelligence sources believe North Korea has already developed a warhead design small enough and light enough for delivery by an ICBM. North Korea's may have a supply of fissile material for up to 25 nuclear weapons, but its fissile production capacity is likely growing and it may be ready to conduct its sixth nuclear test explosion, which would further advance ability to develop a reliable missiledeliverable warhead.

Trump and his advisers need to attack, and curb the impulse to threaten military war on the action, which only increases the risk of likely grow.

catastrophic miscalculation. A saner and more effective approach is to work with China to tighten the sanctions pressure and simultaneously open a new diplomatic channel designed to defuse tensions and to halt and eventually reverse North Korea's increasingly dangerous nuclear and missile programs.

Better enforcement of UN sanctions designed to hinder North Korea's weapons procurement, financing, and key sources of foreign trade and revenue is very important. Such measures can help increase the leverage necessary for a diplomatic solution. But it is naive that sanctions pressure and bellicose U.S. threats of nuclear attack can force North Korea to change course.

Unless there is a diplomatic strategy to reduce tensions and to halt further nuclear and long-range ballistic missile tests in exchange for measures that ease North Korea's fear of military attack, Pyongyang's nuclear strike capabilities will increase, with a longer range and less vulnerable to attack, and the risk of a catastrophic war on the Korean peninsula will likely grow.

outreach in churches, malls, and public places to campaign for the ferry service.



"That sign up there means a lot because it's the name of a good person, my son," he said.


Holder Jr. who migrated to the United States from Guyana at a young age, followed in the footsteps of his dad and granddad, who both served in the Guyana Police Force.

Harris, who was accompanied by Minister of State with responsibility for Health, Senator Wendy Phipps, said that they met with several donor agencies including the Clinton Foundation and the Clinton Global imitative officials "to see how we could procure further assistance and support for the CARICOM region as a whole to advance the development of healthcare."



QC Alumni NY aids Georgetown students in math

Elevating the math skills of students, one summer session at a time, Queens College Alumni Association New York, completed its second QC Math Institute for more than 40 students from six schools, to help the youth develop their adeptness towards STEM accomplishment.

The enrichment course was geared towards high school students already performing at a higher level in math, but who needed to be challenged in their critical thinking, said President of the QC Alumni Association New York, Karen Wharton, who facilitated the program with Dean of the School of Science and Health Technology at Medgar Evers College, Dr. Terrance Blackman and other alumni.

Wharton, a Boston University educated engineer, told this publication at the QC campus, recently, that the institute was

set up to engage high school students in mathematical sciences, not regularly covered in the High School curricula, and to motivate the students to excel in the subject.

"We want to give kids options. They are not limited to being lawyers and doctors, they could make a contribution in other careers said Wharton, noting, that students at the 4th Form level would have already decided what career path they wanted to take.

Wharton said she feels a connection to her alma mater and is always excited to return to inspire students, and to provide them with access to learning.

"I was privileged to get a sound education while growing up in Guyana, and fortunate to have attended one of the most resource schools. This is why I am obligated to reach back and help students who may not have the same opportunity I had," added Wharton.

Fifty percent of the students were drawn from Queens College, while others came from Bishops High, St. Stanislaus College, Christ Church Secondary, St. George's High School, and Tutorial High, based on their academic excellence. Wharton, a software engineer, said she encourages girls to surround themselves with people who will inspire them to pursue whatever career path the choose — after she was somewhat questioned about choosing a career that is male dominated.

"Aim higher, and follow your dreams. People who march to their own drum are leaders," she told the students.

"I want people to come in and enjoy the family dynamic of a small business, and actually being able to have a point person by knowing who their groomers are — I want people to know how we treat pets and members of their family and





Guyana's model green town reflects ambitious national plan

BARTICA, Guyana, Aug. 3, 2017 (IPS) — At the head of Guyana's Essequibo River, 50 miles inland from the Atlantic Ocean, you will find the town of Bartica. Considered the gateway to Guyana's interior, the town has a population of about 15,000 and is the launching point for people who work in the forests mining gold and diamonds.

Under a new project, Bartica is to benefit from the installation of a 20Kwp grid connected Solar Photovoltaic (PV) system at the 3-Mile Secondary School along with the installation of energy efficient lighting, as well as light-emitting diode (LED) street lighting.

The Ministry of the Presidency (MotP), through the Office of Climate Change, in collaboration with the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), launched the Japan-Caribbean Climate Change Partnership (J-CCCP) in Bartica earlier this month.

The partnership, which is being funded by the government of Japan to the tune of 15 million dollars, supports countries in advancing the process of improving energy security planning for adaptation to climate change.

Head of the Office of Climate Change within the Ministry of the Presidency Janelle Christian said the partnership comes at an opportune time as it helps to advance the vision of President David Granger for Bartica to be developed as a model 'green' town.

"The J-CCCP project and the support that Guyana has been benefiting from and continues to benefit from is set within the framework of the 'Green' State Development Strategy (GSDS)... The pilot initiative that will be implemented in Bartica is a direct response to the President's pronouncement on Bartica becoming the first model 'green' town," she said.

The GSDS provides a framework for national development plans and policies for climate action.

Christian said that the implementation of the J-CCCP supports the government's commitment to transitioning to the use of 100 percent renewable energy in public institutions by 2025.

"These initiatives have to

date, through budgetary support and also resources that we have been able to leverage through our development partners, already started taking effect," she said.

"The project here in Bartica is not unique to Bartica but it is part of that national programme where we would've already seen through the leadership of the Guyana Energy Agency (GEA) some schools being installed with photovoltaic system (PVs).

Messiah International Mas is 'Bejeweled' for Labor Day

With its focus on the Roman Empire's relationship with "certain gemstones," the Brooklynbased Messiah International Mas Band will be "Bejeweled" in this year's Labor Day production.

"This year, we are portraying traditional historical mas," said co-band leader Trinidadian Chevon Messiah, also known as DJ Twist, in a Caribbean Life interview. "Roman themes have traditionally dominated traditional Trinidad and Tobago carnival. Throughout history, gems have always held special meanings and had special powers."

Messiah, who is also a soca artiste, said his sister, Lucericia Messiah, is the other band leader, adding that the band is dedicated to "the preservation of Trinidad and Tobago mas and culture.

"We are devoted to the revitalization of old time carnival mas and the promotion of the arts associated with the carnival tradition," he said.

Messiah said "Bejeweled" comprises two sections: "Sapphire" and "Ruby."

He noted that sapphires did not come into use until the Roman Empire.

"Since ancient times, the Blue Sapphire represented a promise of honesty, loyalty, purity and trust," Messiah said. "It was also purported to protect one from dishonesty, fraud, terror, poverty, and even stupidity and ill temper.

"The ancients also believed that sapphires could help them predict the future," he added. "This year, we wanted a new beginning with trust and loyalty, and the sapphire represents our continuing vision."

Messiah said rubies did not come into use until the Roman Empire emerged around 300 BC (Before Christ).

"Ruby represents love, passion, courage and emotion," he said. "This gem is the king of all gems. It was believed that wearing a fine red Ruby bestowed good fortune on its owner.

"Rubies have been the prized possession of emperors and kings throughout the ages," Messiah said. "Rubies often ignite passion, as it helps people move in life. This year, we wanted energy and vitality in our band, and rubies help get things moving."

Messiah also said that the Queen — Black Diamond is "the hardest gemstone and one of the most valued.

"The black diamond represents strength and courage," he said. "The diamond is said to increase the power of other gems. Thus, it enhances the ruby and sapphire."

Messiah said "Bejeweled" comprises 50 masqueraders in each mixed section (male and female).

With masqueraders of "all nationalities," he said: "We hope to do well in the small band category.

"We have performed well since 2013," he said, adding, "we always enter into the small band competition.

'Caribbean Sickness' takes over Antoine International

Claiming that "Caribbean Sickness" is too prevalent, Trinidadian Kenneth Antoine says that it is befitting that he so names this year's Labor Day production.

"Wherever you go — all over the Caribbean — everybody gets this Caribbean thing in them, this fever," said Antoine, band leader and producer of Antoine International, in a Caribbean Life interview. "That's why I call it a sickness. It's an epidemic."

Antoine, who founded Antoine International in 1991, said "Caribbean Sickness" comprises 14 sections, including Archangel, Coppertone, Ice White, Royalty, Serenity, Women and Men of the Red Land (Indian), Sun Gods, Oriental Magic, Heat, Caribbean Paradise and Running Rainbow. The remaining sections are produced outside the camp, Antoine said.

He said all but five sections are females. The male sections are: Serenity, Men of the Red Land, Coppertone and Sun Gods (with one outside section).

Antoine averages 30-35 masqueraders per section for an overall 275-300.

"We're from all over," he said about the nationalities of the masqueraders. "We have no specific country, but the majority will be Trinidadians. We cater for Americans right back to the whole Caribbean. We have three whites already registered and one Chinese."

Antoine, who has been participating in mas production for more than 30 years, said he hopes to place in the top three places in the Adult Mas category in the West Indian American Day Carnival Parade.

'We hope to at least win something," he said, adding that Antoine Interna-

tional has competed "very good" over the years.

"We won small bands a couple of times and won medium band three times," he said. "We've never won large band, because we've never been in the category. For the first time this year, we're going up (competing) in the large band (category)."

"lots of fun," adding: "Because the band is all inclusive, you get food and drinks. We take care of our masqueraders.'

Masqueraders will sway to the pulsating beat of DJ Sound City, Antoine said.

The mas camp is located at 245 East, 34th St., between Church and Snyder He said masqueraders can expect avenues in East Flatbush, Brooklyn.



Whatever it was, it wasn't your fault. You didn't do it — you weren't even around when it happened. You don't know who to blame. Maybe it was your dog, your mom, or maybe, as in the new book by Dorothea Taylor, illustrated by Charly Palmer, "There's a Dragon in My Closet.'

The little boy was sure of lots of things: he had a soft, warm bed to sleep in. He had a dog he played with every day. His daddy loved him, his mother took care of him. And there was a dragon in his closet.

No, seriously! It was "a kind and gentle dragon" but it was mischievous - which, of course, the boy got blamed for. But he wasn't the cause of the mess in his room or the broken flower pot or the muddy footprints on the floor. It was the dragon's fault. The boy didn't do any of those things. He was innocent and he tried to make his parents believe him, but they didn't.

The dragon ate an entire jar of cookies - for real! The dragon wiggled behind the bathroom door and made the boy spit toothpaste - honest! The dragon brought soup for the boy when he was sick... didn't he? And that dollar when the boy lost his tooth — that had to be the dragon's work, right?

Then one day, the boy's mom got tired of listening to stories of a dragon in the closet. She told the boy they'd "get to the bottom of this" and she dragged him up the stairs to his bedroom, where she opened the closet to find a bouncing ball. Then a shoe. A few toy odds and ends. A pair of pants draped over a bar in the closet. A boot, a bat, and a belt. Together, maybe, possibly, if you squinted, it might look something like a dragon, kinda-sorta, a little bit.

It was all in his head, said the boy's mother. There was no dragon in the closet. And she went downstairs, but not before the boy saw...

Much as I loved the idea behind "There's a Dragon in My Closet" and its wonderful theme of imagination, there was one thing that I wondered: will kids understand it enough?

With a catchy rhyme that starts out fun, author Dorothea Taylor tells the story of a boy and his dragon. Quite frankly, the story stays at a level of "fun" well enough, but some of the language seemed more adult-like than childish. Kids may not completely comprehend the story because of it, and that may be a distraction for an out-loud reader.

But never mind — come for the imagination, and stay for the artwork by Charly Palmer. I can't say enough about that part of this book: it's colorful, in sweeping-blendy tones and bold marks. Just — wow.

Keep your eyes on the little boys' t-shirts, by the way. You'll be charmed, and so will your three-to-six-year-old. He'll love "There's a Dragon in My Closet," and who could blame him?

Crop Over not so usual

Barbados wrapped up another Crop Over festival with organisers beaming at the success to which the island has become accustomed, but what people are now left to grapple with is one souring incident of gun violence and death.

On the evening of Kadooment Day, the flagship event that attracts thousands of local and overseas costumed revelers a gunman, or gunmen, opened fire killing the apparently intended victim but in the process wounding another six persons.

Some 14 others suffered injuries received in the rush to get out of the line of fire on Spring Garden where the festival culminated with a massive street party on Aug. 07.

Caribbean carnival celebrates 50th grand parade

Eleven masquerade bands, more than 10,000 costumed revelers, thousands of other revelers and over a million people converged on Toronto's Lakeshore Boulevard last Saturday for the city's 50th grand Caribbean carnival.

"The atmosphere of today's milestone parade was as colorful as ever," reported the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC). "The day started with a few rain showers, and a few feathers got wet, but spirits weren't dampened."


Ingram and his Toronto friend, Ricardo Smith, danced beside him.

"When you're walking down Lakeshore Boulevard and performing in front of the judges, it's a great feeling," she said.


Tanysha Castello, a carnival veteran, said she brought her mother along this year so she could get her first taste of the event.

more than its fair share of gunrelated violence and deaths, none expected it to spill into this showcase event that annually attracts droves of international celebrities and other persons from across the world seeking a fun, rum, sun and an all-round good time.

The disbelief that enveloped Barbadians was perhaps best represented by Prime Minister Freundel's statement at a Crop Over after-party two days later when he ignored the incident in his recap of the 2017 two months of festivities.

He spoke of Monday's Grand Kadooment as a time, "when we saw a blaze of colour, form and movement along the streets of Barbados culminating at the Spring Garden Highway.

"In all of this we can pat deal with ourselves on the shoulders effectively.

because we conducted ourselves with impressive dignity, and with sobriety put up the best face of Barbados."

"Barbadians have been served a menu of very impressive events, all of which have been substantially and resoundingly patronized by Barbadians here and by visitors to this country from our Diaspora, and the tourists who treat Barbados as their second home."

The country's leader did however appear to pull his head out of the sand some days later when he commented on the overall situation of violent crime, which has seen so far 22 mostly gun-related deaths, including the one at Kadooment Day.

"We have to do some repair work if we are to be able to deal with this problem more effectively.

film. One of those projects is the city-based web series and acclaimed show, "We Are New York, which he enjoyed being a part of.

"I just finished that series, and it's an award winning show, and it was a wonderful experience — I loved it," said Santoni.

The show follows the stories of recent immigrants to the city, and in the series he plays a Mexican immigrant who is a language teacher. Leaving Puerto Rico in 2010 to get into acting, the role is somewhat relatable to what Santoni experience to explore a new life, he said.

"I came to New York city with a lot of dreams and I knew it would be very different, but I decided to take the risk because my passion was greater than anything else," said Santoni.

He came to the United States with a goal and even with some doubts from family, he stood by his aspirations and followed them.

"When I told my mother and father that I was coming back, I already knew that I wasn't and

I made that decision," he said. "Being an actor — it's difficult for parents to accept a career like that because it is hard and there's not always stability, but you really have to be passionate and work-focused."

Now the actor also has two films that are set to come out later this year and in 2018. One of them is "Turned Out," which he filmed with wellknown Indian filmmaker Ritu Singh Pande. The other is "Carmen," an independent drama that is expected to be released next month. In the film Santoni plays a former actor who is homeless with a set of troubles. He says the way the movie tackles nuanced experiences people who are down and out encounter is what drew him to it.

"The movie presents homelessness in different ways," he said. "My character is not the typical homeless guy — it's the one you see when he's hanging out or with women and you wouldn't know if he's homeless," said Santoni.

He also adds that the movie is a metaphor for what many people are experiencing living in a city such as New York.

Demonic doll haunts yet another house

"Annabelle: Creation" is the fourth film in a horror franchise that previously featured The Conjuring 1 and 2 as well as Annabelle. Because this prequel is set in 1952, well before the events which transpired in the others, one need not be familiar with those pictures to thoroughly enjoy this one, provided you like having the bejesus scared out of you.

The stand-alone screamfest trades in all the staples of your generic haunted house adventure, ranging from a spooky disembodied voice singing a cappella, to involuntary levitation,

to a victim leaving nail marks in the floor as she's dragged down a darkened hall by a mysterious force. The movie was directed by David F. Sandberg, the Swedish wunderkind who made an impressive debut just last year with the low-budget thriller "Lights Out." As the film unfolds, we find dollmaker Samuel Mullins (Anthony LaPaglia) and his reclusive, bed-ridden wife, Esther (Miranda Otto), passing their days in a ramshackle, Victorian mansion sitting on a mountaintop in the middle of nowhere. They're ostensibly still shaken

by the loss of their daughter Bee (Samara Lee) who was hit by a car over a decade ago.

That might explain why the inconsolable couple has decided to share their humble abode with a half-dozen orphans. The homeless girls are being chaperoned by Sister Charlotte (Stephanie Sigman), a Godfearing guardian grateful to get a roof over their heads.

The waifs are pretty much given free rein of the place, except for a direct order from Mr. Mullins to steer clear of Bee's bedroom. But that injunction proves too tempting for Janice (Talitha Bateman), a curious kid suffering from polio.

Of course, she ventures inside and unwittingly unleashes a host of demonic forces doing the bidding of Annabelle, a doll Samuel had originally made for his dearly-departed daughter. It isn't long thereafter that all hell begins to breaks loose.

Director Sandberg proves particularly adept at ratcheting up the tension. In fact, the spine-tingling flick delivers innumerable heart-stopping moments along the way, though they come more from jolting sounds and abrupt edits than from investment in the simplistically-drawn characters.

Ask if they'll sell you a ticket for half a seat, since you'll never bother to sit back during this edge-of-your-seat thriller."

Trinidad captures gold

Trinidad and Tobago men's 4x400metre relay team captured gold in the final event at the 2017 IAAF World Championships in London, England on Sunday evening.

The quartet of Jarrin Solomon, Jareem Richards, Machael Cedeno and Lalonde Gordon shocked the world as they beat the Americans and Britons into second and third respectively with the fastest time in the event this year of 2:58.12.

The USA clocked 2:58.61 seconds for the silver medal and Britain recorded 2: 59.00 seconds for the bronze.

Their victory marked the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago a 4x400 team had earned a gold medal.

The feat followed Richard's bronze medal three days before in the 200 Continued on Page 42




