Vincy Council prez: Not to tire in giving back

Laverne McDowald-Thompson, the president of the umbrella Vincentian group in the United States, Council of St. Vincent and the Grenadines Organizations, U.S.A., Inc. (COSAGO) has urged her compatriots not to get tired in giving back to the nation.

In addressing an Ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving in Brooklyn on Sunday, Oct. 22, marking the country's 38th year of political independence

from Great Britain, McDowald-Thompson noted that many nationals are always willing to give back, adding, "that is how it should be.

"We do things because of our genuine connection to our country," she said. "I encourage you not to get tired."

In alluding to 2 Thessalonians 3:13, McDowald-Thompson said: "And as for you, brothers and sisters, never tire of doing what is good."

She said she has "seen the

work of COSAGO members, and also of other organizations in the Diaspora.

"You are doing good," she said, adding: "Hebrews 13:16 reminds us not to neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

"Again, I witnessed you my Vincentian brothers and sisters demonstrated your act of kindness, your love and compassion for others, during the

BATTE FOR NEW CITZENS

War breaks out on citizenship program

A virtual war has broken out between several small Eastern Caribbean nations which allow foreigners to buy local citizenship and national passports for an agreed sum. In recent months, several of the participating countries have drastically reduced prices applicants from around the world pay to become local citizens.

Officials in some countries say that applications to some of the destinations offering the controversial Citizenship by Investment Programs (CIP) have slowed to a trickle so soft demand has led to a fall in prices as is the case for every other commodity or item.

Apart from cutting fees by half as in the case of St. Lucia, Dominica and Antigua most recently, some governments have also cut processing fees for applicants as well and have moved to allow the parents and children up to the age of 30 to be also included in the program- all in the name of making their own systems more marketable.

And despite fears from western nations that mobsters, international terrorists and applications with dubious backgrounds could slip through the processing and vetting system, governments say they are scrambling for development financing given drastic reductions of taxes coming in from free trade and a fall off of key commodity and agricultural exports to Europe and North America.

They also say that sugar, rice and banana exports to Europe have long since collapsed for Windward Islands and other nations, increased scrutiny by the west has

Prospect Lefferts street co-named for Grenadian educator

A street honor for a pioneer.

Family and friends of Brooklyn educator Lenore G. Briggs celebrated the street co-naming ceremony in her honor in Prospect Lefferts Gardens on Oct. 21. The northeast corner of Rutland Road and Rogers Avenue was conamed for the early childhood educator, who passed away in 2015. The grand recognition was a moment of pride for people who knew her and supported the work she did for the neighborhood, said one of her daughters.

"I'm so very proud and it just shows how she was totally unstoppable in her life — any obstacle she had, she was able to overcome and she's an inspiration that makes everyone so proud," said Meryl Thompson.

Briggs' six adult children, former students, past and current staff of the Lefferts Gardens Montessori school, which she founded in the 70s and Councilman Mathieu Eugene (D-Flatbush) attended the ceremony.

Thompson said her mother's dedication to community service earned her

various awards and certificates from elected officials including councilwoman Yvette D. Clarke, and former Borough president Howard Golden.

"It was very victorious to see her culminate into a street co-naming - she made many contributions to the community and she started from nothing," she said.

Briggs moved to the United States from Grenada in 1965 and worked several jobs before opening her own daycare out of her home on Rogers Avenue. Afterwards, she moved into a bigger space opening what is now the Lefferts Gardens Montessori School, which is run by her youngest son Anthony

Thompson said as the neighborhood changes all around them, the permanent sign now stands as a reminder to the community of who she was and what she brought to Prospect Lefferts Gardens.

"She was very kind and overall I think my mother was a person that didn't let anything get in the way of her dreams," said Thompson. "She was a humanitarian and she always wanted to be of help to someone."

Decline in tourist arrivals expected

The Barbados- based Caribbean Tourism Organization (CTO) is predicting a slowdown in the growth of tourist arrivals for the remainder of the year as the region comes to grip

The CTO chairman noted that during the first six months, the region recorded 16.6 million international tourist arrivals, some 800,000 more than in the first six months of 2016 of 2016.

As Vincentians in the Diaspora begin celebrating their 38th year of political independence from Great Britain, St. Vincent and the Grenadines Ambassador to the United Nations, I. Rhonda King, remembers "just a few" of the country's "recent blessings," urging her compatriots to join her in giving thanks in the process.

In addressing an Ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving on Sunday — at The Church of St. Mark's Episcopal in the Crown Heights section of Brooklyn, organized by the umbrella Vincentian group in the United States, Council of St. Vincent and the Grenadines Organizations, U.S.A., Inc., (COSAGO) - King said that, in a few days, Oct. 27, the nation will actually celebrate its 38th independence anni-

She said, while "it is often man's practice to focus on what is wrong, to lament what he lacks, to brood over the distance he has yet to go," the Holy Scriptures, however, "tell us in everything give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

The envoy listed the opening of the country's first international airport, the Argyle International Airport (AIA), on Feb.14, atop "just a few" of the multi-island state's "recent blessings."

She described AIA as "a beautiful, state of the art facility, arguably, now the most beautiful in the

Antigua

The Antigua and Barbuda government said a Chinese firm has been showing interest in setting up a new town on Barbuda, which was devastated by Hurricane Irma recently.

A government statement said the firm has expertise in energy and housing and had been invited to brief the Cabinet by Minister of Works and Housing Eustace Lake.

According to the statement, the firm has proposed to construct a complex of several high-rise apartment buildings that could



resist hurricane winds exceeding 200 mph.

It said the complex would include a supermarket, cleaners, a drug store, a restaurant, a cinema, clothing stores, a church, car parks and other amenities.

The statement said the team agreed to return with prices and has assured the government that it could arrange financing that is low cost and living spaces that would also be in the reach of families with limited means.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne who had initially declared Barbuda inhabitable following the passage of the Category 5 storm has said it needs in excess of US\$200 million to re-develop the island with a population of about 1,600 people.

For the first time in 300 years, there is no one living on the island of Barbuda.

Barbados

Barbados is looking at the medicinal properties of the marijuana plant.

Attorney General Adriel Braithwaite

said there were opportunities under the present legal regime to write to the head of the Drug Service for



permission or get a doctor to provide a prescription so the capsule or oil could be sourced.

He made the comments while speaking at the regional consultation on marijuana hosted by the National Council on Substance Abuse, in collaboration with the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Secretariat at the Ministry of Home Affairs.

He said the conversation should not be about legalizing marijuana, but about discussing the properties of the plant and how they can be exploited.

However, he noted that the Regional Commission on Marijuana had experienced some setbacks, some of which were financial and the other as a result of some countries not coming on hoard

The commission, he explained, was established to conduct a rigor-

ous enquiry into the social, economic, health and legal issues surrounding marijuana use in the Caribbean to determine whether there should be a change in the current drug classification of marijuana.

Guyana

The Guyana Ministry of Finance has collected approximately \$900 million in taxes from "activities connected to oil and gas" for the first half of 2017.

Finance Minister, Winston Jordan, told a press conference held at his Ministry in Georgetown that companies in the oil and gas industry have to pay withholding taxes, which is paid to the Guyana Revenue Authority (GRA).

He said it is a tax levied on income (interest and dividends) from securities owned by a non-resident.

Minister Jordan said these taxes are

in addition to the revenues that Guyana is expected to start collecting when oil production commences in 2020.



He said the government has a production-sharing agreement between Exxon and its partners and itself.

Jordan also revealed that Guyana will receive a royalty of two percent on gross earnings and benefit from 50 percent of the profits from the sale of petroleum, once production starts in 2020.

Jamaica

Jamaica has announced plans to reduce the importation of several agricultural products, including tomatoes, carrots, red peas, thyme and green gungo peas, in a bid to increase production of those commodities.

Minister in the Ministry of Industry

and Commerce, Agriculture and Fisheries, JC Hutchinson said that by next year, work will start to bring an



end to the importation of those food-

He said so far this year, farmers have produced 90 percent of the Irish potatoes consumed by Jamaicans, adding this crop, along with onions and Scotch Bonnet peppers, are in a pilot program for increased production.

St. Lucia

In the crucial days following the devastation of Hurricanes Irma and Maria, a team of more than 40 Venezuelan medics, paramedics and rescue specialists were able to lend their services to Dominica and deliver medicine, food, water and humanitarian aid from Venezuela, and other Caribbean islands.

The Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) Commission joined forces with the Embassy of Venezuela and the government of St. Lucia to provide a steady stream of relief supplies to affected OECS member states.

Using the Hewanorra International Airport in St. Lucia as the operational base for flights from Dominica, the Venezuela Air Force deployed four cargo planes and one helicopter to assist with the relief efforts.

A team of 13 doctors were able to work in Dominica across eight different communities and in 10 days, they were able to attend to 2,015 persons.

OECS Director General, Dr. Didacus

Jules, also expressed gratitude to the Venezuelan Embassy in St. Lucia for the timely support when the



OECS was at its most vulnerable.

St. Kitts

The St. Kitts and Nevis government recently launched a new fund for their world-renown Citizenship by Investment Program.

Following a series of high impact hurricanes that have caused significant damage in the Eastern Caribbean, the St. Kitts and Nevis Citizenship by Investment Unit has introduced temporary Hurricane Relief Fund — an

innovative response to allow the Federation greater protection against future natural disasters.



affected the once very lucrative offshore financial sector and annual hurricanes often force governments to find millions to rebuild battered infrastructure.

So officials from various programs have quietly done studies of each other's systems and have tweaked incentives to make theirs better than neighbors.

"The government was adamant that it was not going to reduce the investment amount as it was concerned about a race to the bottom," Antigua's cabinet said recently, referring to moves by neighbors to reduce prices to the lowest possible levels. "But what has happened is that we have done a study over the CIPs in the region and we have found that our processing fees are by far the highest over all five programs. We could have passed off the fact that we were a little more expensive because we had visa free access to Canada. With that not being the case now, we are actually working on a comprehensive strategy to determine the direction of the program," the Observer Newspaper reported.

Before the cuts in the past year, most destinations — St. Kitts, Antigua, Dominica, St. Lucia and St. Vincent were basically offering fees at \$200,000 plus processing fees of up to \$50,000. These are now down to \$100,000 and \$25,000 respectively, victim of a simmering price war, a slow down in demand and a reach out to potential applicants.

Antigua has become a bit less attractive to some applicants because the Canadians recently cancelled visa free travel there, questioning the island's vetting properly the applicants. Visa free travel to Canada and other places was one of its best selling points. But while Antigua cuts back rates to stay afloat, Dominica and Antigua's other neighbors are doing their best to market their programs. For example, both Grenada and Dominica boast on websites that a CIP citizen will have visa free access to nearly 120 countries. "This is one of the lowest programs in the world and it has been hugely popular because of this," Dominica's government suggest on the web.

The nine-nation Organization of Eastern Caribbean States of which all the countries are members, has already suggested that heads of governments come together and formulate a harmonized policy rather than allow for the open cut throat competition of recent months as the region could in the end undermine itself.

Caribbean unemployment rises

Two United Nations agencies say that urban unemployment will keep rising in Latin America and the Caribbean and is seen reaching 9.4 percent in 2017.

In releasing the newest edition of their joint publication, "Employment Situation in Latin America and the Caribbean," the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) and the International Labor Organization (ILO), said low economic growth experienced by regional countries in the last few years will continue affecting the region's labor market performance this year.

According to the latest estimates, the rate of regional urban unemployment could reach 9.4 percent on average this year, which represents a 0.5 percentage point increase from the 8.9 percent recorded in 2016.

One nation, overdosed!

"Our greatest glory is not in never failing, but in rising up every time we fail." - Ralph Waldo Emerson

"I hated every minute of training, but I said, 'Don't quit. Suffer now and live the rest of your life as a champion." -Muhammad Ali

Statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), show that 64,070 people died from drug overdoses in 2016. This represents a staggering 21 percent increase from the year before, and confirm that more Americans died from drug overdoses in 2016 than the number of American lives lost in the entirety to the Vietnam War-which totaled 58,200! Often unnoticed as a silent epidemic on account of the headline grabbing nature of its sensational rivals, drug related calamities cannot be swept under the rug any longer.

The opioid epidemic ravaging the United States is taking a grim and growing toll. Its horrible effects spares no family in America, rich or poor, black or white, and are not restricted by any boundaries. All of us are in this, together. Indeed, last year's 64,070 drug fatalities far outnumbered:

-The 35,092 motor vehicle deaths in 2015.

-AIDS-related deaths in the worst year of the AIDS crisis, when 50,628 people died in

-The peak year for homicides

in the U.S., when 24,703 people were murdered in 1991.

-Suicides, which have been rising in the U.S. for nearly 30 years and totaled 44,193 in

Approximately 75 percent of all drug overdose deaths are now caused by opioids, a class of drugs that includes prescription painkillers as well as heroin and potent synthetic versions, like fentanyl. Data also show that overdoses of synthetic drugs, such as fentanyl, which is 50 to 100 times stronger than the painkiller morphine, are driving the sharp increases in opioid overdose deaths.

A new report from the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF), an independent research organization that focuses on "critical issues in policing," puts those numbers into context. Statistics point to the fact that the opioid crisis is fueled by the drug industry and Congress's failure to do enough, as the epidemic continues to spiral out of control. The CDC identified 15.466 deaths from heroin overdoses in 2016, while 20,145 deaths were caused by fentanyl or other synthetic opioids.

Additionally, a survey conducted by PERF of its member police chiefs earlier this year found half of the respondents reported an increase in fatal heroin overdoses in their jurisdiction in 2016 compared to 2015, and 45 percent reported an increase in drug overdose

Building a new hurricane resistant Caribbean

Having experienced two hurricanes category 5, having seen the devastation and been around to feel and understand the inconveniences, to just express it mildly; no water, no electricity or no telecommunication for an extended period. Lots of time though to think about what happened and who are suffering, and wondering about the future. Returning to what may be considered 'normal' is not an option but rather a mediocratic restauration. I have seen buildings that remained almost untouched. I have seen buildings without roofs, windows, or doors where residents sat in front of what once was their beloved home, and their complete damaged furniture and belongings in the yard or on the street in front of them. People not knowing what to do or what may be next. I have seen tremendous piles of sheet metal; pardon my rude English, but I now call it "shit" metal.

Hurricane preparedness including having bottled water, batteries, getting any lose items out of the way, etc. is a minimal precaution. What about buildings and construction? The Caribbean needs a hurricane building code.

doghouse, but I dare to say that the various individual Caribbean governments are incompetent to establish an appropriate code that focusses on building hurricane resistant structures. Even if one government would be able to do so, what about the 10 plus other

countries that have 10 plus different viewpoints? What about the political umbrella organizations handling it? If you ask me, I have my doubts. Did I say doghouse? Now, I may be thrown in front of the lions. Being skeptical or critical is one thing, coming up with a positive suggestion is a different thing. Okay then, here we go....

An independent Caribbean Research and Development Institute for Architecture and Construction should be founded. The institute should be supported by the insurance and the building industries. The activities of the institute should be carried out in cooperation with reputable international universities such as for instance the Technical University Delft, Netherlands, Technical University Zurich, Switzerland. No political involvement; an absolutely independent and impartial organization.

Why the insurance It may bring me in the industry? When it comes to big dollars and cents, whose profits suffered the most after the hurricanes? They should have a vested interest in any practical and realistic solution that reduces risks; after all, believe it or not, it is a risk adverse industry. Why the building / construction industry? They should be interested in developing materials and methods that resist any challenging situation. Their financial support and investment should pay off well for them in return. Why the international universities? That should not need much explanation. They are reputable and insurance, building / construction industries will trust them. Any government or political organization in the region would be foolish to doubt their credibility.

The institute should independently do its research and development to establish a building code for hurricane stealth and resisting construction. I even suggest it to have a wind tunnel available to test structure models in extreme high wind circumstances. In addition, the institute should be the preferred independent international organization that can certify whether design, construction or materials are appropriate. Therefore, it will have inspectors and adjusters. Again, no government or political involvement. The insurance industry from its side might determine that that any new commercial building that is not hurricane certified can only be insured at higher premiums, get limited coverage, or in the worst case it may not be considered at all for insurance coverage. The building suppliers could proudly show the certificate or seal of approval on their products. Come to think of it, investors in new projects may also applaud

Bull headlines Prospect Park 150 anniversary

Who would have imagined that in the media capital of the world a charging bull inside Prospect Park would elicit teams of reporters to converge on the Brooklyn landmark for a lead-story that made national television during the anniversary period of the century and a half monumental, historic, oasis.

Some might describe that assertion as fake news others might offer other definitions — horse, cow manure, or just plain "bull."

The latter would be correct.

Responders to sightings of an animal roaming through Prospect Park, Brooklyn recently, confirmed that it was no fake news that a bovine went buckwild inside the landmark, green space which two days later was to mark the 150th anniversary of its dedication and public presence in Kings County.

News crews in helicopters, trucks and along the grassy plains reported that a cow was on the loose. They remained lingering for hours as the determined animal eluded nets, police, and animal control professionals who wanted



to rein in the escaped, fourlegged cattle.

After initial reports they were informed it was not a cow but a raging bull that commanded their attention.

Like the stationary, bronze bull on Wall St. in Manhattan, the runaway attracted more media attention than the fact the 585-acre retreat had reached a milestone anniversary.

Seven million visitors annually peruse the grassy acreage, ride the carousel, enjoy the meadows and pond and more than a few find escape from the urban landscape savoring the calm and respite dominated by trees and birds that is situated between the neighborhoods of Park Slope, Prospect Lefferts Gardens, Ditmas Park and Windsor Terrace as well as Flatbush Avenue, Grand army Plaza and the Brooklyn Botanic Gardens.

The majestic space opened Oct. 19, 1867 and immediately emerged the first landscaped park in the United States.

Allegedly, James Stranahan believed that a park in Brooklyn "would become a favorite resort for all classes of our community, enabling thousands to enjoy pure air, with healthful exercise, at all seasons of the year..."

Wikipedia states the conservationist also believed that a public park would attract wealthy residents.

At that time the entire population of Brooklyn, America's third-largest city was only 266,000.

Now boasting a new splash pad and roller rink, a zoo, a nature conservancy, a Boathouse, housing a visitors center and the first urban Audubon Center, Brooklyn's only lake, covering 60 acres, the Prospect Park Bandshell which hosts

free outdoor concerts during the summer months, sports facilities including seven baseball fields in the Long Meadow, a tennis Center, basketball courts, baseball fields, soccer fields, bike paths and the New York Pétanque Club in the

Parade Ground, it is no wonder a two-horned animal sought freedom from a slaughterhouse by eluding police, animal control, crowds and his own fatality for more hours than imag-

deaths attributed to fentanyl during that time. Twenty-three percent reported an increase in fatal overdoses due to prescription opioid medications.

This is consistent with research suggesting that many people who become addicted to prescription painkillers often become victims to heroin or synthetic opioids when it becomes too difficult to obtain or too expensive to keep obtaining prescription pills.

"60 Minutes" and the Washington Post recently highlighted how an act of Congress helped fuel the epidemic of addiction in a joint investigation recently. Whistleblowers revealed how the Ensuring Patient Access and Effective Drug Enforcement Act of 2016, which was unanimously approved, derailed DEA efforts to crack down on suspect pharmacies that are distributing millions of pills in ravaged communities.

It is mandatory that law enforcement and other criminal justice agencies, public health departments, drug treatment

and social service providers, elected officials, and others, step up and coordinate their efforts to prevent new cases of opioid addiction, while providing addicted persons with medical and social services through the long and difficult process of getting free of the drug scourge.

This is a national crisis which must be addressed immediately!

to see a certification.

The mission of the institute is not to police or regulate, but rather be an undertaking to prevent and protect against hurricane damages of an extraordinary proportion that we have seen recently and which actually may return at any time in the future. It is not the aim to take authority away from local governments. Although, it could become a matter of lead, follow, or get out of the way of the institution. The wisest option for all would be to cooperate with this new credible organization all the way, and establishing and accepting a positive standard for all.


The institute will inform general audiences about how to protect their dwellings for hurricane impact. It can do so through publication of documentation, presentations on the media or at locally organized meetings. As you see, there are many benefits that come out of this solution.

But there is more. The lucky island that will be selected as the location of choice, may now have landed an institute of higher learning that is internationally accredited, affiliated and respected. Which means new employment in the non-academic segments of the institution on location. It may mean conferences to be held on the island and an opportunity to develop unique science tourism. For young people in the region, it may be an option to study an alternative academic direction that they don't have to go abroad for. Because it is Caribbean related, it may be an opportunity for them to find well paid employment in the region afterwards or even set up their own specialized business. The hurricane damage has proven that it all makes sense.

As criticizing as I may have been in the beginning, at least I have provided a positive suggestion. Not telling anyone what to do. I know what I would do. For all others, just consider it to be food for thought.

and Nevis, Les Khan, was recently in Dubai to launch the new to immigration agents.

Under the Hurricane Relief Fund model, which is in place until March 2018, a family for four can be granted citizenship of St. Kitts and Nevis for US\$150,000.

Prospective applicants can be granted citizenship within a guaranteed 60-day period.

Trinidad

Prime Minister Dr. Keith Rowley has warned citizens to stop hoarding United States dollars because the government is not going to devalue the Trinidad and Tobago currency.

He said those hoarding foreign currency waiting for a devaluation were hoping to get enriched and were doing so at the expense of the wider national community.

And on that basis, he said, the government has not chosen that option. Rowley said there has been a "very strong lobby" for the Trinidad and Tobago dollar to be devalued but there are different sides to that

"One is a genuine belief that if we devalue the currency in one fell swoop at whatever level they say devalue



it to, we will get more TT dollars or some TT dollars and that will solve our problems," Rowley said.

He said the argument has another side, which the government must be looking at and the other side is this, "when you devalue the currency there is knock on into increased costs and increased inflation and who are the ones who face that most and the worst, the poorest of the poor.'

Rowley called on citizens who are earning foreign exchange and "leaving money outside" to be patriotic and bring it back home.

Headmistress calls for the return of moral values

Despite students of the 170-year-old St. Rose's High School in Georgetown, Guyana continue to excel in their academic pursuits, headmistress of three years, Mrs. Paula Hamilton, said moral values are seriously lacking in the school, and are calling on parents to play a greater role, so that students remain disciplined in the schoolhouse.

"If parents become more involved, and we get adults onboard with us, then children would get back to the days of high standards of behavior, and moral values, that would guide them to a richer way of learning," said Hamilton.

The headmistress made these comments exclusively to

Hamilton applauded Minister Hughes, an alumnus, as well as overseas alumni associations in New York and Toronto, for the outstanding support to improve the academic lives of students, but noted, students, must maintain not only high level of academics, but high standards, and attitudes to retain the esteem, required of them



Brooklyn Monument Marks Milestone Anniversary - On Campaign Visit Mayor Misses Mention

Commuters of MTA's number 2,3, 4

and 5 trains who enter and exit the Grand Army Plaza train station may be elusive to the history in their midst, particularly the Oct. 21 commemoration of the 125-year-old unveiling of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Arch.

Commonplace to residents and visitors who frequent the area, the distinguishing landmark is perhaps the most visible dedication to a fighting force that formed the Union troops during the Civil War.

Historians estimate that as many as 750,000 Americans died during the war.

So grand was the unveiling on Oct. 21, 1892, President Grover Cleveland attended the ceremony to pay tribute to military men despite the fact the war had ended more than 30 years earlier.

At the time a Brooklyn newspaper — The Brooklyn Daily Eagle — reported that thousands of people attended the unveiling event that included remarks by Mayor Boody and several officials and religious figures.

In one of the addresses, Rev. Father McCarty said, "May these memorials remind succeeding generations of the awful price we paid in the lives of the chivalry of our country for the maintenance of the union. May they be a warning that will keep the monster of rebellion from lifting again its cursed head. May our blessed land never again drink the blood of its people. May our family of powerful states become constantly more united not only by the iron hands of business interests, but by the more enduring ties of love and loyalty."

Standing tall at an elevation of 80 feet, a marker at the intersection of Flatbush Avenue and Eastern Parkway, in the median on Flatbush reads: "To the Defenders of the Union, 1861-1865."

Caribbean struggles for business after the storms

Two hurricanes and ignorance about the region's geography has Caribbean tourism officials and governments working overtime to get the message into countries of potential visitors that the islands comprise many destinations untouched by storms.

Caribbean Tourism Organization Chairperson Joy Jibrilu sounded more than a bit frustrated at the grouping's recent conference when she referred to the fact that many tourism operators worldwide don't know that the CTO's 28-member countries are physically separate jurisdictions and not all were affected by the passage of storms this year.

In the face of reports that some travel agents and airline operators are advising potential tourists against visiting the Caribbean in the wake of Hurricanes Irma and Maria, she said the region is, "challenged to consider ways to tell the world that most of the Caribbean remains open for business".

Continuing she pointed out, "there will still be a need to keep reminding the world that the distance between Barbados and Belize is more than six times as great as Toronto to Montreal and that New York to Chicago is only half as far as the Bahamas to Grenada."

She added, "Guyana to Cuba is twice as far as London to Rome and that Dominica and

the Dominican Republic are more than three times further away from each other than New York to Washington DC".

Jibrilu's comments at the State of the Tourism Conference in Grenada earlier this month underlined the dilemma of Caribbean tourism hosts who market across a some 1.063 square miles of sea an item that is essentially the same product with subtle differences reflecting culture and nuances in geographical outlay of indi-

vidual territories.

Such information is not passed on to, neither is it easily digestible for, tourists who just want sea, Sun, sand, nightlife and the host of relaxing activities that come in the Caribbean atmosphere package attrac-

The region therefore now finds itself in a rush to enlighten those who facilitate the travel of visitors to this tourist zone by showing that while the storms ravaged some territories

including Barbuda, Dominica, Sint Maarten, Turks and Caicos Islands, the United States and British Virgin Islands, and Puerto Rico, a majority of the Caribbean destinations remain

Should the regional information machinery be unable to quickly get the enlightening information to tour operators, and potential tourists themselves, the Caribbean will have to live with the prospect of a sharp downturn in tourism, a

bread and butter industry of the region.

For its 2017 outlook CTO predicted increases of 2.5 and 3.5 percent in long-stay arrivals and increases of between 1.5 percent and 2.5 percent in cruise passenger arrivals.

But Jibrilu said in Grenada, "with the passage of Hurricanes Irma and Maria, the growth rate will slow down in the remaining quarters of the

"Hence, the expected growth rate of tourist arrivals will range between 1.0 percent and 2.0 percent in 2017, with the 2018 performance expected to be similar."

She revealed that for the 2017 period leading up to June at which point the hurricane season officially began, "the region recorded 16.6 million international tourist arrivals, some 800 thousand more than in the first six months of 2016.

Jibrilu continued, "it is estimated that cruise passenger arrivals to the Caribbean region had reached 15.3 million, 4.0 percent more than in the corresponding period of 2016. This performance represented the largest number of cruise passengers in the region at this time of year."

With tourism playing a dominant role in Caribbean economies, a plunge from these first half 2017 encouraging growth figures could spell disaster for many economies in the region.

Leading the list of the top distractions behind the wheel are mobile phones. Phones now do more than just place calls, and drivers often cannot pull away from their phones, even when driving. According to the California Department of Motor Vehicles, studies have shown that driving performance is lowered and the level of distraction is higher for drivers who are heavily engaged in cell

phone conversations. The use of a hands-free device does not lower distraction levels. The percentage of vehicle crashes and near-crashes attributed to dialing is nearly identical to the number associated with talking or listening.

Perhaps they're checking out a house in a new neighborhood or thought they saw someone they knew on the street corner. Eating

Try to eat meals before getting in the car. For those who must snack while en route, take a moment to pull over at a rest area and spend 10 minutes snacking there before resuming the trip.



They're fighting gentrification with culture.

An East New York cultural organization is taking a stand to preserve its culture in their rapidly revitalized neighborhood with community and family-oriented programming. ARTs East New York (AENY) is hosting musical and engaging events for residents to commune and converse about relevant issues because the neighborhood can greatly benefit from these activities, said one of the organizers.

"We really think it's important to give the community all the information they need to access and all the benefits that come with cultural planning,' said Vicki Capote, director of development and communica-

In a partnership with the New York Community Trust, the group proposed a town hall series to discuss a range of topics relevant to the neighborhood.

"With their help we're able to have four series of topics that include education, how the cultural plan is going to

impact the area, how change arts education in school, and this is all geared towards how to empower the parents," she

The ongoing series, which has another meeting scheduled for Oct. 26, brings about two or three panelists discussing how the community can sustain a sense of cultural activities with all the introduction of new development. It is moderated by BRIC TV host Brian Vines.

"Our next one will be talking about social and economic impact, and it is directly one of our core initiatives in plan," said Capote. "Basically we're going to talk about how to use art and cultural activities, discuss the land use and growth, and how East New York can benefit," said Capote.

Like most of the borough, the neighborhood is seeing a considerable number of new changes, said Capote.

"Over the last couple of months there have been many buildings going up. Everywhere there's a lot of construction," she said.

third Sunday featuring jazz artists and culinary offerings. The introduction of it is one of the many examples of the work AENY is developing for their neighbors.

"What's cool about the jazz brunch is that it actually came out of response from the community," said Capote. "We have a Saturday music and arts program for the youth but we

heard from our community that they wanted more programming and we are trying to navigate to make programs accessible to everyone."

And it keeps that community very much involved as local influencers are brought in to share their skill sets in the kitch-

"There are so many local chefs in the community and

each brunch features a local chef in East New York to showcase a dish to the guests," said Capote. $\,$

Both series will end in December and will conclude with a celebratory party.

She says the organization aims at prioritizing the needs of the community and will adapt to what people require from them, even if housing was not

Garifuna culture was forged

when slave ships carrying captured Africans wrecked off of St. Vincent in the 1600s. The survivors swam ashore, mixed with the indigenous Arawak population and created a unique culture that continues. Exiled in 1796 to the island of Roatan off of Honduras by the British, survivors went on to establish villages along the Central American coast.

In 2001, UNESCO officially proclaimed the language, dance, and music of the Garifuna people of Central America as a "Masterpiece of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity."

The set began with the Umalali women holding hands as they delivered a traditional a cappella Abueymahani song before the drumming, and one-by-one the instruments of The Collective joined in.

The first half of the concert consisted of songs from the well-known Garifuna albums. The women performed several call and response numbers.

Brooklyn clergy appeal for aid

By Alexandra Simon

Members of Brooklyn clergy and local elected officials called on the city and federal government to assist them in bringing aid and more attention for the U.S. Virgin Islands in Crown Heights on Oct. 25. Some members of the clergy feel that the reaction from the state was insufficient, said a reverend.

What we are looking for here today is to put pressure on the city, on the state, to deliver the manpower and supplies, and to deliver even funds where funds are needed," said Rev. Daryl G. Bloodsaw.

'Two hurricanes in a span of a week and a half, devastated all three islands and what we're calling on the city to do is to respond in a like manner as we have with other places such as Houston and Puerto Rico."

Earlier this month, the U.S. Virgin Islands and other parts of the Caribbean were hit by Hurricanes Irma and Maria. The catastrophic disaster ravaged most of the infrastructure and power grid on the territory's three islands leaving residents in a vulnerable state of need.

Bloodsaw said that there was an imbalance in the response to U.S. territories in the region, when there was an urgent need for both.

"We're not standing here to say we Caribbean.

shouldn't do anything for Puerto Rico because truthfully they have seen some response but there is a dire need for greater response," he added. "What we can't do is focus solely on Puerto Rico and not do anything about what's going on St. Thomas, St. John, and St. Croix — these are U.S. citizens.'

With electricity expected to be fully restored until March of next year, the government should do more to assist and do more for the islands. Pastor Gilford Monrose from Mount Zion Church of God, who organized the call to action, said immediate attention is needed.

"Two of the hospitals have been totally destroyed. In the island of St. Croix, eight out of 12 schools are destroyed, and St. John is totally without electricity, and on St. Thomas only 30 percent have electricity and this is day 43," said Monrose. "We're asking for compassion, and we're asking not to be overlooked the way we are. We are Americans and we don't want to be treated as second class Americans but we believe New York state and city have the resources to help.'

State Sen. Jess Hamilton (D-Brownsville) and Assemblywoman Diana Richardson (D-Crown Heights) who also attended the event appealed for support from the city and residents to help the

Staying socially active after 50 can benefit the brain and even reduce a person's risk of dementia.

No, memory loss is not an automatic side effect of aging

immune to random bouts of memory loss. While misplaced car keys or forgetting items on your grocery list are nothing to get worked up over, many men and women over 50 do start to worry about memory lapses, especially when they start to occur with more frequency than they might have just a few years ago. But while memory loss might be quickly associated with aging, increased forgetfulness is not an inevitable side effect of getting older, a fact that those at or approaching retirement age should find comforting.

When considering the relationship between memory and aging, it's important that men and women recognize the distinction between memory lapses and dementia, as the two are not one and the same. As a person ages, his or her hippocampus, the region of the brain involved in the formation and retrieval of memories, often deteriorates. This can affect how long it takes to learn and recall information. But just because this process is slower does not mean it's a warning sign of dementia, which is the loss of certain mental functions, including memory. Though taking longer to recall information can be frustrating, many people still retain their ability to recall information. In addition, while dementia brought on by condi-

o one, regardless of age, is tions such as Alzheimer's disease or Parkinson's disease is untreatable, there are things men and women can do to strengthen their memories and reduce their momentary lapses in memory.

> Start playing games. Games that test the mind have long been believed to benefit the brain, though some remain skeptical about the true impact of brain games. However, a University of Iowa study funded by the National Institute on Aging found that brain games may in fact pay numerous and longterm dividends. In the study, 681 healthy volunteers over the age of 40 were divided into four groups. One group played computerized crossword puzzles, and three other groups played a brain training video game from Posit Science designed specifically to enhance the speed and accuracy of visual processing. The volunteers showed less decline in visual processing as well as in other tests that measured concentration, memory, and the ability to shift quickly between tasks, and the benefits from the training games lasted as long as seven years after training. Brain games are now more accessible than ever before, as players can access such games on their smartphones, tablets, ereaders, and computers. And in addition to being effective, the games also provide entertainment value.

Alter your routine. Many working professionals recognize that each day tends to have its mundane moments. The brain can grow accustomed to these moments, which tend to be a routine part of the day. But altering your daily routine can jar the brain awake, forcing it to focus during those times that had become mundane but now present new challenges. Something as simple as alternating driving routes to work from day to day or preparing some new, vet healthy. breakfast each morning can help the brain stay alert and sharp.

Become a social butterfly. Maintaining a social life as you age is a great way to keep in touch with friends and family. But there's another reason to continue to be socially engaged. A 2008 study spearheaded by the clinical trials administrative director at Southern California Kaiser Permanente Medical Group and published in the American Journal of Public Health found that older women who maintained large social networks were 26 percent less likely to develop dementia than women with smaller social networks. In addition, those who had daily contact with friends and family cut their risk of dementia by nearly half. The study also noted that regular social interaction can delay or possibly even prevent cognitive impairment.

Cognitive decline another reason to quit smoking

mokers have scores of reasons to give up the habit. In addition to contributing to cardiovascular disease, lung cancer, and other lung ailments, cancers elsewhere in the body, wrinkled skin, and diseases of the eyes, nose and mouth, smoking may also contribute to cognitive decline.

There's growing evidence suggesting that using cigarettes can affect the brain in negative ways, including causing cognitive decline as early as age 45. According to the study "Impact of Smoking on Cognitive Decline in Early Old Age," led by Severine Sabia, as published in the journal Archives of General Psychiatry, smoking is a possible risk factor for dementia, although the impact smoking has on the brain may have been underestimated in elderly populations because of the general shorter life span of smokers.

Study participants were given a battery of tests in memory, vocabulary, and executive function that included reasoning and fluency, and a global cognitive score. Both men and women participated (5,099 men and 2,137 women, with a mean age of 56), and smoking history was recorded over the 10-year assessment period. An analysis revealed that a cognitive decline occurred in all tests except vocabulary among all participants, but mostly in men. However, faster cognitive decline was observed among current smokers compared with those who had never smoked. The size of the effect associated with smoking was similar to that of 10 years

Findings are similar to other research being done on the topic of smoking and its impact on the brain. The Alzheimer's Society states that smoking is bad for the heart, lungs, and vascular system — including the blood vessels that feed oxygen and nutrients to the brain. Recent research has shown that smoking is a significant risk factor for vascular dementia and Alzheimer's disease, with smokers twice as likely to develop the disease as nonsmokers.

The Mayo Clinic defines vascular dementia as problems with reasoning, planning, judgement, memory, and other thought processes caused by brain damage from impaired blood flow to the brain. Factors that increase the risk for vascular dementia are high cholesterol and smoking.

Dementia can be brought on by stroke, whether it's a large stroke or a series of mini-strokes. WebMD says vascular dementia can occur over time as "silent" strokes build up - something that seems to occur more readily in smokers and those with cardiovascular disease.

Symptoms of cognitive decline that may result from smoking and vascular dementia can include:

- ·Problems with short-term memory
- · Wandering or getting lost
- ·Trouble managing money
- ·Difficulty planning or following through on activi-
- ·Loss of bladder or bowel control
- •Delusions or hallucinations
- ·Inappropriate emotions
- ·Impaired coordination or balance

More research is needed with regard to the association between smoking and cognitive decline related to dementia. If research continues to prove a correlation, greater warning may be issued about smoking and its effect on parts of the body beyond the heart and lungs. Even at this early junction, current research suggests yet another reason to quit lighting up.

How to reduce your Alzheimer's risk

lzheimer's disease affects millions of people across the globe. In the United States alone, the Alzheimer's Association estimates one in eight older men and women has the disease, which is the sixth-leading cause of death in the country.

Few families have not been affected by Alzheimer's disease, and many relatives of those with the disease fully understand the role family history can play. Research into the disease is ongoing, and it's already yielded valuable information that may help reduce the prevalence of this devastating disease in the years to come.

One byproduct of researchers' efforts is the discovery that it may be possible to prevent or delay the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease through the implementation of a combination of healthy lifestyle choices. The following are a few healthy habits that may help men and women reduce their risk for Alzheimer's.

Exercise regularly

A study conducted by Scottish researchers and published in the journal Neurology in 2012 touted exercise as the most effective way for adults to protect their brains from Alzheimer's disease. Researchers examined roughly 700 70-year-old participants, all of whom were born in 1936, who were asked to report their levels of physical activity. Each participant then received an MRI at age 73. Those tests revealed that the participants who

were more physically active showed less brain shrinkage and fewer white matter lesions, both of which are indicators of Alzheimer's disease.

In addition, the Alzheimer's Research & Prevention Foundation reports that physical exercise reduces a person's risk of developing Alzheimer's by 50 percent and can even slow further deterioration in those who have already begun to develop the cognitive problems associated with Alzheimer's. Researchers continue to study the relationship between physical activity and the development of Alzheimer's diseases, but the evidence is mounting that regular exercise, regardless of a person's age, is a great way to reduce risk for Alzheimer's.

Eat healthy

What you put into your body may also reduce your risk for Alzheimer's disease. The brain operates at its best when it is fueled with a healthy diet that includes fresh fruit and vegetables, healthy fats, and lean protein. A heart-healthy diet is also brain-healthy, and researchers have found a potential link between heart disease and Alzheimer's disease. Researcher Larry Sparks of the Sun Health Research Institute in Arizona and formerly of the Kentucky medical examiner's office studied brain tissues with a goal of finding early signs of Alzheimer's disease. He discovered that those who had the telltale plaques of Alzheimer's disease also had heart disease, suggesting heart

disease may be a forerunner of brain diseases like Alzheimer's.

The Alzheimer's Association feels this link between the two will only grow stronger in the years to come, suggesting that a heart-healthy diet that reduces a person's risk of heart disease may also reduce the risk for Alzheimer's down the road. Stimulate yourself mentally

Mental stimulation can help the brain stay sharp, and men and women who find ways to stay mentally stimulated can reduce their risk of developing Alzheimer's. Embrace activities that require communication and interaction with others, and find time for additional tasks that can stimulate your brain. These may include studying a foreign language, reading, trying your hand at mentally stimulating puzzles such as crosswords or Sudoku, and other activities that emphasize organization. Such activities are essentially workouts for your brain that can help it stay sharp as you age.

Remain socially active

Staying socially active into older adulthood is important for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is that research has indicated the brain functions better when men and women are not isolated from others. Memory and cognition are stronger when people remain socially active and engaged in their society, so retirees should look for ways to revive their social lives as a means to protecting their brains from the onset of Alzheimer's or dementia.

Alzheimer's disease remains an enigma in many ways. But ongoing research continues to show that men and women can take measures to actively prevent or delay the onset of Alzheimer's disease and improve their quality of life as a result.

Exercise and Alzheimer's

A study in the journal Neurology suggests that working out is the most effective way to protect the brain from Alzheimer's disease.

Researchers studied roughly 700 participants from Scotland, all of whom were born in 1936. Each participant reported their levels of leisure and physical activity at age 70, rating their physical activity on a scale from moving only to perform household chores to participating in heavy exercise or competitive sport several times per week. Participants were also asked to rate how often they engaged in social or intellectual activities.

At age 73, participants received an MRI to measure certain biomarkers in their brains. Those who participated in more physical activity showed less brain shrinkage and fewer white matter lesions, both of which can be signs of Alzheimer's disease. And while social and intellectual activities can be beneficial in preventing Alzheimer's disease, the study found that social and intellectual engagement weren't as helpful to the brain as physical exercise.


The types of physical exercise most beneficial to the brain are still being studied, though information presented at the 2012 Alzheimer's Association's International Conference suggested that strength training is perhaps the most effective form of exercise.

Understanding dementia a key to compassionate care

lzheimer's disease is one of the more prominent forms of dementia, but there are many additional types of dementia that also can cause both physical and cognitive alterations. Understanding the complexity of dementia can be beneficial to both dementia sufferers and their caregivers.

Dementia is a general term used to define a decline in mental ability severe enough that it can interfere with daily life, offers the Alzheimer's Association. Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia.

Dementia is not a disease but a term used to describe a wide range of symptoms. The words "senility" and "dementia" often are incorrectly used interchangeably. However, serious mental decline is not a normal part of aging.

Dementia presents itself through various symptoms, and memory loss alone is not enough to lead to a dementia diagnosis. Dementia can affect thinking and social abilities, but the Mayo Clinic notes that some dementias may be reversible. The following are some common symptoms of dementia:

- •Trouble communicating or finding words.
- •Difficulty completing complex tasks.
- Challenges with planning and organization.
- Episodes of confusion and disorientation.
- •Memory loss, which is often noticed by a third party.
- •Personality changes that can include agitation, anxiety, inappropriate behavior and even hallucinations.

Apart from Alzheimer's disease, which is a progressive disorder most common in people age 65 and older, there are other types of dementia. The second most common is called "vascular dementia." This results from damage to vessels that supply blood to the brain. This damage can be the result of stroke, smoking, and other blood vessel conditions. Brain imaging can often detect blood vessel problems implicated in vascular dementia.

Dementia with Lewy bodies, or

DLB, is another dementia that laymen may mistake for Alzheimer's disease. The Alzheimer's Association notes that people with DLB often have not only memory loss and cognitive problems common in Alzheimer's, but they also display initial or early symptoms such as sleep disturbances, well-formed visual hallucinations, slowness, gait imbalance or other Parkinsonian movement features, which can lead to misdiagnosis.

If physicians suspect dementia was caused by various factors, a person may be diagnosed with mixed dementia.

Unfortunately, there are no cures for progressive dementias that are linked to plaque tangles in the brain and changes in the way the brain processes the protein alpha-synuclein. Patience and various medications may be needed to help those with dementia live fuller lives. Cholinesterase inhibitors are mainstays in dementia treatment. These medications prevent the breakdown of acetylcholine, a chemical messenger important for learning and

memory. Acetylcholine supports communication among nerve cells by keeping acetylcholine levels high. Physical therapy and cognitive therapy may be used in conjunction with medication to assist those with various dementias.

The early warning signs of Alzheimer's disease

most common form of dementia. It is a progressive, degenerative disorder that attacks neurons and essentially robs people of their memory and language skills. Although there is no cure for Alzheimer's, there are therapies that can slow its neurological impact. Recognizing the early warning signs of Alzheimer's can encourage people to begin treatments that can stave off some of the more debilitating symptoms of this disease.

Though it's most common among the elderly, Alzheimer's is not a normal part of aging. The Mayo Clinic says that the reasons behind the inception and progression of Alzheimer's disease are largely unknown. It is believed damage starts a decade or more before problems become evident. Abnormal deposits of proteins begin to form the amyloid plaques and tau tangles throughout the brain, and these formations are the hallmarks of the disease. Oncehealthy neurons gradually begin to lose their efficiency and miliar tasks: Those with Al-

lzheimer's disease is the ability to function and communicate with one another. As more neurons die, entire areas of the brain shrink. The hippocampus, which is the area of the brain essential in forming memories, may soon become compromised.

Millions of people in North America are estimated to have Alzheimer's disease and many others will be diagnosed. The following are the most common early signs and symptoms of the disease:

Memory loss: According to the Alzheimer's Organization, early memory loss can include forgetting important dates or repeatedly asking for the same information. Forgetting recently learned information and having to rely increasingly on memory aids is another potential indicator of Alzheimer's.

Declining cognition: Impaired reasoning or judgment, trouble finding the right words, and visual and spatial issues also may be early indicators of Alzheimer's.

Difficulty completing fa-

zheimer's sometimes have trouble driving to a familiar location or remembering the rules to a favorite game. People who were once good with numbers may now have difficulty balancing their checkbooks, while those who love to cook may have trouble following recipes.

Time confusion: Another indicator of Alzheimer's disease is losing track of time.

One may have trouble understanding something that isn't happening in the present. Alzheimer's sufferers often forget where they are and how they got there.

Misplacing items: Everyone loses something at a point in time, but those with Alzheimer's may put items in unusual places. They may sometimes accuse others of stealing when they cannot retrace their

Decreased judgment: Decision-making abilities may be compromised. A person with Alzheimer's may take unnecessary risks or give away sums of money.

Mood changes: People with Alzheimer's may suffer from confusion, suspicious feelings, depression and anxiety. A person may upset easily or become anxious outside of his or her comfort zones.

Age and family history of Alzheimer's disease are the biggest risk factors. The likelihood of developing Alzheimer's doubles about every five years after age 65, says the Alzheimer's Organization. In addition, those with a parent, child or sibling who have developed Alzheimer's are more likely to develop the disease than people with no such family history.

A physical and neurological exam, which may include blood tests and brain imaging, will be used to diagnose Alzheimer's disease. Individuals can learn more by making appointments with their doctors.

Cognitive ability is better among bilingual

eniors who are bilingual and have spoken two or more languages since their youth may have cognitive advantages over adults who have only spoken one language their entire

A new study headed by Brian Gold, a neuroscientist at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine, which was published in the journal Neuroscience, found that bilingualism leads to heightened mental skills. In the study, participants were divided into three groups: bilingual seniors, monolingual seniors, and younger adults. Each group was instructed to sort colors and shapes in a series of simple cognitive exercises. The researchers used a brain imaging technique to compare how well the subjects switched between mental tasks. The results indicated there were different patterns of brain activity among the groups when the tasks were being completed.

The patterns showed that bilingual seniors were able to switch between tasks and activate their brains in a manner closer to the younger subjects. They didn't have to expend much effort, and they out-performed their

peers who were monolingual. The researchers surmised the bilingual seniors were using their brains more efficiently.

Other studies have shown bilingualism pays even more dividends, including improved cognitive function in those suffering from Alzheimer's disease.







Docu festival returns to NYC



Jazz duo set to perform Afro-French Caribbean music

A jazz duo is set to perform the styles of Afro-French Caribbean music at the Jazz Standard in Manhattan Oct. 26-29. Cuban-American jazz saxophonist Yosvany Terry and French jazz pianist Baptiste Trotignon will perform compositions from their joint album "Ancestral Memories.'

The musicians recently released the project last month exploring the musical styles from parts of the Caribbean and New Orleans, and incorporated that into their album. The guest to discover those techniques challenged their small budget, but technology facilitated the task allowing them to fully absorb their respective music history, said

"We used everything available on the Internet to research because we couldn't travel to every single country," he said. "We spent a lot of time looking at material and there's so much that we learned from all of these incredible regions."

The pair researched music predominantly from Haiti, Guadeloupe, Martinique, and New Orleans as the source of inspiration. Terry says they wanted to bring forth these particular styles of music to a wider audience and peak interest on how they influenced jazz.

'These sounds have been infectious all over the world and I do believe that the musical contributions and sounds of the Antilles have incredible mobility," he said.

"And there's a big presence of that in places like New York because of the Diaspora, so it was simple for us to bring that to the forefront."

At the show, Terry and Trotignon will perform several of those sounds with a drummer and bassist for two sets. The two discovered an approach that is going to introduce Afro-French Caribbean types of music in jazz.

"We invite people to listen to all of the repertoires we put together and created for this," said Terry. "We set out to research those traditions to get inspiration to create this, and the most the important part was to find way to play these new findings to new modern jazz guartet."

Trotignon himself is not personally connected to the music like Terry is. But as a Frenchman he is exposed to Caribbean music styles such as zouk music. And Terry, who

credits this project to his Haitian ancestry, was immersed in the culture by his Haitian grandmother.

"Even though Baptiste is not from that part of the world, he had the unique opportunity to get used to the rhythms, harmonies, and melodies of the Caribbean," said Terry. "He's been a really curious composer and that's a gift for any composer. This was a great chance for him to learn and dig more into that part of history he was not familiar with."

Terry says jazz and Caribbean music lovers are going to appreciate the efforts they put into the compositions they perform, and will be pleased at how they integrate it into their sets.

"I think they will enjoy being surprised with the repertoires that is French and inspired by musical traditions, but didn't try to replicate or imitate these musical traditions."

"Documentary storytellers help us make sense of the tumultuous times we're living in with artistry, humor and inspiring characters," says festival programming director Basil Tsiokos.

"This year's DOC NYC lineup gives audiences fresh insight into high profile figures and shines a light on lesser-known individuals who leave a big impression."

The festival is divided into sections that include thematic sections on activism, music, crime, science and technology, unconventional families, animals, on artists, on filmmaking as well as short films - 85 in total.

The films that focus on Black and Brown individuals or environs include: "12th and Clairmount" (about Detroit), "Father's Kingdom" (an African-American spiritual leader), Maynard (Atlanta's first black mayor in 1973), Shot in the Dark (basketball team in Chicago's West Side), Cuba and the Cameraman (40 years shooting in Cuba), "Sammy Davis Jr.: "I've Gotta

Be Me," "Baltimore Rising" (the city after Freddy' Grey's death), "Sighted Eyes/Feeling Heart" (playwright Lorraine Hansberry), and "Streetlight Harmonies" (music and histories of Doo Wop and a cappella).

"Antonio Lopez 1970: Sex Fashion & Disco" (fashion illustrator was Puerto Rican), "Still Waters" (alternative education and gentrification in Bushwick), and "Behind the Curtain: Todrick Hall (American Idol personality), "The Iron Triangle" (urban renewal of Willets Point), and "This is Congo" (sides of DRC's fractious war), are among the other films that focus on people of or places of color.

On Nov. 9, Greg Barker's "The Final Year" opens the festival. With incredible access, the film offers a look at the last year of President Obama's administration particularly highlighting the shaping of United States foreign policy.

Along with Obama, the film focuses on the operating principles and the work of Secretary of State John Kerry, U.N. Ambassador Samantha Power and speechwriter Ben Rhodes (whose title was Deputy National Security Advisor for Strategic Communications). The film is a touching historical document on an administration with heart, whose absence is felt deeply.

Nun struggles with vows in coming-of-age drama

Cathleen Harris (Margaret Qualley) was being raised in rural Tennessee in the Fifties when she started exhibiting an interest in God at an early age. That fixation was a little disconcerting to her single mom (Julianne Nicholson), an avowed atheist.

With Cathleen's absentee father (Chris Zylka) rarely around, she only had the Catholic school her daughter attended to blame for cultivating the obsessive interest in religion. By the time she was a teenager, her faith had grown so strong that she wanted to become a nun. And, over her

mother's objections, she followed the calling and entered the convent at 15.

She donned a habit, placed the honorific "Sister" in front of Cathleen and dropped her surname entirely. But it would still take years of training before she would be allowed to take her final vows. First, she had to prove herself worthy during her postulance, the tough probationary period testing a novice's commitment to silence, poverty, obedience and chastity.

At least Cathleen wasn't alone at the convent. She befriended a number of equally-pious females there who were also contemplating ascetic lives as wives of Christ. However, the

whole lot of them were always at the beck and call of Reverend Mother (Melissa Leo), a sadistic taskmaster who delighted in torturing them, as if that were the best way of weeding out the uncertain.

That is the point of departure of Novitiate, an introspective coming-of-age drama written and directed by Margaret

Betts (The Carrier). The compelling character portrait borders on the claustrophobic in its effort to plumb the depths of Cathleen's tortured soul as she debates whether or not she's meant to enter the order.

The picture's plot thickens in the mid-Sixties after Pope John XXIII issues a series of 16 historic proclamations. Besides calling for Sunday mass to henceforth be said in native languages instead of Latin, he lowered the standing of sisters to that of any lay believer.

Stripped of their status, 90,000 nuns soon renounced their vows and returned to private life. But what effect would this have on someone just embarking on her career, like Cathleen?

Reminiscent in different ways of "Doubt" (2008), "The Exorcist" (1973), "The Passion of the Christ" (2004) and "Paradise: Faith" (2012), "Novitiate" is nevertheless a novel adventure offering a plausible look at the internal angst of a female weighing whether or not she's meant to be a nun. Sisterhood as a divinely inspired, yet very intimate and solitary path!





Christen Press and Julie Ertz also scored as the national team built a 4-0 first-half lead. Lynn Williams


and Allie Long added goals in the second half.
