TOUGH ROAD AHEAD

Recession stalks the Caribbean region

One by one, governments in the 15-nation Caribbean Community are beginning to complain about full blown or creeping economic recession brought on in part by weak international and commodity prices and foreign exchange shortages especially those which are dependent on oil and primary commodities such as bauxite and unrefined gold.

The latest to officially fall by the financial wayside is Trinidad whose economy is taking

a beating from more than a year of very weak international prices for oil and petroleum products, the longtime mainstay of its economy.

In the past week, Central Bank Governor Jwala Rambarran did what government and industry officials had hoped he would not have done without proper notice and preparation.

He simply dropped the recession bombshell on the nation, telling anyone who cared to listen that after nearly four con-

Banner year for Medgar **Evers College**

Officials say Brooklyn's predominantly Black Medgar Evers College is having a banner year, with more than \$12 million received in commitments towards faculty research and sponsored programs — an all-time record for the college.

According to Tara Regist-Tomlinson, director of Development and Alumni Relations, recent grants to the college include \$3,000,000 from the U.S. Department of Education, Predominately Black Institution Grant, to improve retention and graduation rate; and \$2,494,735 from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, National Workforce Diversity Pipeline Program, to assist promising high school students to pursue successful careers in the health profession.

Regist-Tomlinson said the college also received \$239,364 from the National Science Foundation, Research in Undergraduate Institution, to research on production of hydrocarbon fuel oil from brown

New York City Department of Youth and Community Development, Beacon and Cornerstone Community Centers, also provided \$4,973,468 for after-school enrichment activities for youths and basic skills training to adults in high-need communities in Brooklyn, Regist-Tomlinson said.

U.S. Congresswoman Yvette D. Clarke, who made the keynote address at the Medgar Ever College's Faculty Research and Sponsored Research Recognition Reception on Friday, lauded President Rudolph F. Crew, a former New York City public schools chancellor, and Provost and Senior Vice President Augustine Okereke, for their leadership.

Clarke, who represents the 9th Congressional District in Brooklyn, also congratulated the college's faculty and staff for writing the winning grants to improve retention and graduation rates.

She was also praised the college in assisting promising high school students to pursue successful careers in the health profession, to research on production of hydrocarbon fuel oil from brown grease, and to provide after-school enrichment activities for youths and basic skills training to adults in high-need communities in Brooklyn.

"This is \$1million more than the college took in for the entire previous academic year," Dr. Crew told the reception, adding, however, that "there's still a great deal more to do to build on the college's capacity to fulfill its mission."

Caribbean

The Caribbean in the last 10 years alone has achieved a 61 percent reduction in AIDS-related deaths, according to a report, titled "Focus on Location and Population: Fast track to end AIDS by 2030," which was released by UNAIDS recently. Dec. 1 marked World Aids Day.

The report said since 2000, new infections in the region declined by 50 percent and additionally, following the success of Cuba, several Caribbean countries have also been on track to be validated as having eliminated HIV transmission.

"All these gains are linked to improvements in HIV testing and treatment.

Based on the new World Health Organization guidelines for initiating patient on antiretroviral medi-



cines immediately after diagnosis, treatment coverage for the region is 44 percent for adults and 36 percent for children," states the report.

It also noted that strategic efforts were also required to reach those most vulnerable.

The report said in order to reduce dramatically new HIV infections and deaths due to AIDS renewed efforts must be put in place to eliminate stigma and discrimination.

It also identified five groups relevant to the Caribbean that required intense investments and efforts, which included adolescent girls and young women, gay men and other men who have sex with men, transgender people, sex workers and prisoners.

Barbados

Barbadians will have to pay more to use their cell phones come January 2016.

But Minister of Finance Chris Sinkler says that rather than having to pay a Bds\$0.03 (US\$0.015) per minute

tax on airtime, which was government's original plan, mobile phone users will see the hike in the form



of an increased Value Added Tax (VAT) rate on cell phone service- 22 percent, up from the usual 17.5 percent.

In an interview with Barbados Today, Sinkler explained the government had decided to go to the latter route, since the initial plan and would be too difficult and expensive for telecommunications providers to implement.

that the easiest and cleanest way to do this would be to do an increase on the VAT, because VAT is already charged with those services.

The measure is expected to raise between Bds\$15 million (US\$7.5) million and Bds \$16 million (US\$8 million) — about half what government would have raked in via the airtime tax route.

Guyana

Jamaica

The Ministry of Health is advising Jamaicans they should step up their mosquito prevention activities given that the Zika virus has entered the Caribbean region.

Chief Medical Officer Dr. Marion Bullock DuCasse says the ministry has received reports of a possible link of Zika virus infection to birth defects. The Pan American Health Organization is investigating the matter.

After the Zika virus outbreak, several babies in Brazil were found to have

microcephaly, which results in an abnormal growth of the brain and stunting of the growth of the head of



the fetus arising from infection in the first months of pregnancy.

"Pregnant women are among the high-risk group for severe symptoms of Zika virus. Children under five years old, the elderly and persons with chronic non-communicable diseases are also at greater risk. We therefore appeal to all Jamaicans, but especially those who fall in this group, to take precautions and prevent not being bitten by mosquitoes as best as possible." she said.

secutive quarters of economic decline that it was time for the

state of play.

An angry Finance Minister Colm Imbert publicly denounced the bank chief suggesting that nation to be aware of the real he was "discourteous" by not

informing him of his plans to announce that the twin-island republic with Tobago was officially in recession before he went public. He and the attorney general cited laws to back up claims that Rambarran is obliged to consult with the minister before taking such action.

But this did not change anything, especially the disquiet in the economy about what the near term future portends with oil trading last week at less than \$40 per barrel and with the island still struggling to convince itself that it has to diversify away oil and gas in order for it to have a stable future.

The Trinidad economy is the biggest in the bloc of nations from Suriname and Guyana on the South American mainland to the tourist islands the Eastern Caribbean to Belize in Central America. Rambarran also caused some disquiet by warning that the full blown effects will be felt early in 2016.

"Four consecutive quarters of decline in real GDP in 2015 means T&T is now officially in a recession. Lower energy prices also negatively impacted the domestic energy sector. This has already been reflected in job losses at some energy companies. The decision by Arcelor Mittal to idle its steel plant will not only affect energy output but also jobs," he said, giving an example of what the economy is experiencing.

The announcement came just a few weeks after the Surinamese Central Bank made similar predictions about the country whose economy is propped up by bauxite, gold and oil exports, all of which have been taking a beating in recent years.

The bank said recently that foreign exchange reserves have fallen from \$1B to a mere \$370M in the past year, noting that the future does not seem that promising. "Suriname is momentarily experiencing a genuine commodity shock," it said.

The country also recently devalued the Surinamese dollar sending up prices but offering hope to the export sector which will rake in millions when receipts come in and are exchanged for a higher rate in local dollars.

In neighboring Guyana, officials are playing up the near future prospects of a humongous oil and gas find off the Guyana coast by U.S. giant, Exxon Mobil in May even as gold and bauxite prices tank and the international markets for rice and sugar remain less than stellar.

Until 2015, GDP growth has been healthy but political turmoil linked to an inactive parliament for nearly a year and a budget that was presented at least five months later usual have not helped to stir confidence.

Apart from Jamaica, the three are among the larger economies in the trading group.

Trinidad's woes have also come with a healthy dose of foreign exchange unavailability problems. This is inspite of numerous interventions by the Central Bank, infusing millions into the economy only to see it disappear in a matter of days and the business community turning up cap in hand begging for millions more.

Minister Imbert says he will soon go to the 41-member parliament to ask it to raise government's borrowing capacity by an additional but staggering \$8B to pay off debts and fund development projects.

Still Governor Rambarran says that all the key players must come together to help turn around the situation or there will be gloom.

"We have no choice. We can and should work together to ensure we get the policies right for the country's recovery. We will all be double damned if spite, vindictiveness and ego keep us from working together to help our country," he suggested.



Caribbean hoteliers back CARICOM climate change position

The Caribbean Hotel and Tourism Association (CHTA) is calling on the global community to support the Caribbean Community's (CARICOM) position advocating for a cap on the world's temperature rise at 1.5 degrees Centigrade as part of their deliberations during the United Nations Climate Change Conference currently taking place in Paris.

In a letter to Dr. James Fletcher, chairman of CARICOM Task Force on Climate Change, CHTA Acting President Karolin Troubetzkoy strongly supported CARICOM's call for a binding agreement on climate change.

"Considering the significant research conducted to demonstrate trend lines and forecasted impact of climate change on the world's most vulnerable countries, CHTA fully supports the position being advanced by the CARICOM Task Force," Troubetzkoy said.

She said that many developed and newly industrialized countries are prepared to settle for a 2025 climate change of a two-degree increase, "which would negatively impact CARICOM countries and the broader Caribbean basin."

CHTA said research has pointed to

the devastating consequences for the Caribbean from a two-degree rise in temperature.

A report conducted by CARIBSave for CARICOM estimates that a two-degree

global temperature increase would result in a major displacement of coastal and urban population centers.

British cash for Caribbean projects

British Prime Minister David Cameron has announced a £5.6 million cash injection to help improve fishing, tourism and shipping in the Caribbean and other countries.

He recently made the announcement while unveiling a £26 million aid package to help tackle global warming ahead of a meeting of world leaders in Paris.

The British prime minister recently attended the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) in Malta.

The 25 "small island" Commonwealth recipients include Bermuda, Jamaica, the Maldives, the Seychelles, St. Lucia and Trinidad and Tobago.

The British PM said he wants the countries to be able to make the most of their maritime natural resources.

The cash will be used to manage fisheries, protect coastlines and tackle pollution, as well as extending disaster risk.

Renewing Struggling Schools

Cities and school districts across the country have tried a range of strategies to deal with the problems of poor children and strug-

gling schools. Under former Mayor Bloomberg, New York City relied on a "shutdown" strategy, eventually closing 150 schools, including some that the Bloomberg administration itself had created.

While Bloomberg's cheerleaders lauded his approach, the fact is that many of our schools – both older ones and those started during Bloomberg's tenure – continue to struggle.

In contrast, the de Blasio administration has listened to teachers and members of school communities. We know that it is difficult, but struggling schools can succeed – if provided the proper support and resources, and a team approach that brings all a school's stakeholders together.

The city's new Renewal program, created with input from stakeholders, is designed to focus on some of the neediest schools in the system. Early returns show that many of these schools have stabilized and in some cases are started on the road to improvement.

Students in these schools start out with deficits. Nearly 20 percent are English Language Learners and almost a quarter are classified as special education. Thousands live in shelters or are doubled up with relatives. Many are hungry, lack winter clothes, or have medical needs, including glasses and hearing aids. Many have parents who are unemployed or who work long hours at minimumwage jobs.

Teachers at these schools see these problems not as excuses, but as issues that need to be addressed to ensure that all kids have an equal opportunity to learn.

Renewal schools are being paired with non-profit agencies to deliver services like health care and counseling to students and their families. What's more, the nearly \$400 million the administration is investing in these schools over the next three years includes funds for hiring teachers, academic

coaches, social workers and other professionals, along with professional development for the staff on the skills necessary to work with children facing these challenges.

While in 2013-14 nearly one-third failed to meet targets for student achievement, the 2014-2015 School Quality Report shows that now 87 percent of the renewal schools are moving in the right direction, measured by better attendance, more family involvement and other criteria. As a group, they showed gains in both reading and math on state tests.

Many of these schools have a long way to go. Turning them around is difficult, particularly in the face of years of cutbacks and systemic indifference. These schools will require a multi-year strategic intervention built on sound education practice, including custom-tailored supports for each school's particular needs. With its Renewal program, New York City is taking on tough work that no one in the country has attempted before on this scale.

Legal justice for servicemembers

The U.S. government emphatically states though the website of its Office of Personnel Management that "employees have a responsibility to report waste, fraud and abuse," and that the American "public is also invited to share such concerns." In order to ensure an efficient and honest government, there are programs in place to allow the people who work in the government to report, free from retaliation, when fraud, waste, or abuse occurs. Yet all too often when people decide to take the risk by reporting wrongdoing, they not only aren't protected, but are attacked by the very government whose interests they seek to protect.

The most recent example of this sad penchant involves recently retired Army officer Lt. Col. Jason Amerine, a highly decorated combat veteran. In late 2013 he was part of an exclusive cell operating out of the Pentagon charged with trying to gain the release of U.S. hostages in various parts of the world. Amerine saw firsthand the dysfunctional interagency squabbling that sabotaged efforts to win the freedom of some American hostages. He was so incensed by the failures of the agencies that he approached a member of Congress to report the matter. But in January of this year, one of the organizations of that dysfunctional team — the Federal Bureau of Investigations — sought to put Lt. Col. Amerine "in his place" by asking the Army to open an investigaThe inability

tion, stripping him of his security clearance and effectively silencing any further actions.

The inability of the multiple government agencies to work together might have been a contributing factor in the death of one hostage and caused the US to pay a significantly higher strategic price for the release of another. Amerine officially retired from the Army this month, without any charges filed and was awarded the Legion of Merit. While it is gratifying to see Amerine justly cleared of all allegations and winning back his personal honor, the question must be asked: what happened to the individuals in the FBI and CID who were responsible for retaliating against him? The personal hell whistleblowers suffer cannot be overstated.

In 2012 after returning from my second combat deployment to Afghanistan, like Amerine, I approached several members of the House and Senate to tell them the claims of our most senior civilian and military leaders that the war was going well were simply untrue. I also published an unclassified report exposing the truth. As a result I was treated like a pariah. Daily life became almost unbearable, as I was marginalized by superiors; even friends and coworkers feared to be seen talking to me. I can only imagine how much worse life was for people like Jason Amerine who were subjected to punitive and baseless investigations.

Changes must be made so that governmental agencies and officials are not able to wantonly make spurious accusations against men and women who blow the whistle on fraud, waste, or abuse in an effort to silence them. By making the whistleblowers pay a high personal prices, some in the government send a quiet message to others who may consider exposing wrongdoing: don't even think about saying anything because we'll make your life a living hell. Help may be on the way.

Working in conjunction with the Project On Government Oversight (POGO), Senator Barbara Boxer (D-CA) and Representative Jackie Speier (D-CA) introduced the "Legal Justice for Servicemembers Act," which seeks to redress some of the weaker points of existing whistleblower protection provisions. Some of the key features of this bill include permitting legal challenges to retaliatory investigations, establishing fair burdens of proof to establish retaliation, and giving the Inspector General the authority to issue

A common-sense deficit about guns

But for the deadly serious topic he was addressing, it would have been laughable listening to presidential contender Senator Marco Rubio's convoluted attempt at an explanation of why he and practically the entire Republican Senate caucus voted against the common-sense gun law reform Democrats again sought to get passed right after the San Bernardino massacre.

Rubio's mumbo-jumbo, that those measures aimed at some bare-bones tightening of laws governing firearms possession wouldn't have averted last week's mayhem, was of course just another lame offering on the gun issue from a gutless lawmaker. His competitor for the GOP nomination, predictably loathsome Senator Ted Cruz, reminded an audience that episodes like San Bernardino happen "only in gun-free zones," faithfully parroting the NRA line that the country needs more, not less, guns. When Rubio, Cruz and the rest of the GOP gun lobby apologists are comfortable balking at legislation that bans persons forbidden to fly from purchasing firearms, it speaks to a state of lunacy in high places in this country that should give all of us the jitters.

So the demented pair who have been identified as perpetrators of the most recent eruption of senseless violence would have been able to legally acquire most, if not all, of the weapons used. How does this begin to justify turning a blind eye to closing loopholes that give a free pass to the census of folk, whatever its size, who should absolutely not be allowed near firearms? Or not agreeing to expanded background checks so as to include "backdoor" routes for gun purchases that aren't now on the radar?

Most troubling is, now that the frequency of mass shootings has made it an element of social dysfunction demanding high national priority, the Republican stone wall obstructing this (limited) fix comprises individuals who apparently are unbothered by constant references now made to America's singularly unflattering standing in the world in its gunculture embrace. The clear message from advocates and

facilitators of this madness is that how they treat with firearms proliferation elsewhere in the civilized world is of no concern to the U.S. This flaunting of American hegemony and pooh-poohing of countervailing opinion from others in the international community is a phenomenon that's been known to make a big splash every so often.

We well remember when, with a buncj of neo-conservatives in firm grip of foreign policy direction in the George W. Bush administration and their sights unalterably set on invading Iraq, demonizing opponents of the hair-trigger hawkishness was all part of the administration's brainwash strategy. France came in for particular ridicule. And the mighty United Nations was all but cast aside by the Bush neocons as the premier international forum it is intended to

be. Inveterate proponents of open-ended gun use in this country are equally dismissive today of the views of foreigners aghast at an appetite in America for regression to a decidedly less civil order.

The horrific episode in California, followed by another cowardly Republican derailment of the latest gun law reform effort, moved the New York Times to billboard the continuing absurdity of Capitol Hill kowtowing to the gun industry in a manner the paper had not done in almost a century. The Times editorial board opted for a front-page editorial to characterize the inaction of lawmakers as "a moral outrage and a national disgrace.' And the paper wistfully asked: "What better time than during a presidential election to show, at long last, that our nation has retained its sense of decency?"

The odds obviously aren't too favorable that any sense of decency, by way of a bold, principled stand by Capitol Hill against gun industry bullies, is in the cards anytime soon. Not with Republican caucuses, both in the House and Senate,

that see nothing "indecent" about dancing to the NRA's every tune. Two former Republican presidents, Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush, in different ways, took notably strong stands against the gun lobby, and certainly in the case of Reagan, influenced the passage of key legislation. In 1994, the Brady bill that included the assault weapons ban, received Reagan's robust support and was passed, although it was allowed to die without fanfare and with no significant move made to expand it at its sunset 10 years later. Bush was prompted to publicly condemn the NRA in 1995 in his letter of resignation as a life member of the organization in the wake of typically incendiary NRA comment following the deadly Oklahoma City bombing.

Bully pulpit-wise, it's an altogether different scenario in 2015. Any appeals / overtures from the sitting president are guaranteed to have zero effect, either with the NRA or its Capitol Hill toadies.









BVI receives support to reduce family violence

The government of the British Virgin Islands (BVI) says it is receiving assistance in its efforts to reduce family violence from the United Nations organization dedicated to gender equality and the empowerment of women (UN Women).

The BVI said in a statement on Thursday that UN Women consultant Jacqueline Sealy-Burke facilitated a series of meetings with stakeholders from Nov. 29 to Dec. 1 on the effectiveness of the court-mandated Partnership for Peace Violence Intervention Program in its legal context.

Stakeholders also participated in work groups to discuss the "do's and don'ts" regarding reform on sexual offences, the statement said.

It said Sealey-Burke highlighted inadequacies in the handling of sexual offence cases in the region, and said law reform on its own is not adequate and must be accompanied by changes to the culture of the criminal justice system.

She said that the working group must also approach sexual offences from a systemic approach to effect needed change, according to the statement.

"Often, we approach black letter reform in hopes that it will change behaviors, and it won't," Sealey-Burke said. "You need to build on existing pro-

grams, training and judicial education to enhance law enforcement, prosecution and judicial officers' expertise in dealing with sexual offence cases.'

BVI Gender Affairs Coordinator, Lorolie Connor said that due to a growing concern in the levels of violence against women and girls, particularly in the Caribbean region, UN Women offered support to the Virgin Islands to begin the process of legislation reform, towards the development of a Sexual Offences Bill.

She said the Territory will also receive assistance in implementing principles of equality and non-discrimination in the Territory's justice system.

Connor said she looks forward to the work ahead in the development of the bill and the continued enhancement of the Partnership for Peace Program.

She said that although Part Seven of the Criminal Code addresses some forms of sexual offences, a comprehensive law is needed that addresses all sexual offences, especially when dealing with cases of incest, sexual exploitation of children in all forms and a broadened definition of rape.

The Partnership for Peace Violence Intervention Program is court mandated and is geared at decreasing men's violence against women, the statement

our neighbors had the fear of getting arrested for an unpaid summons lifted off their shoulders.

'We will continue to partner with other agencies, organizations and the community to enhance safety and fairness across our borough," he added.

The District Attorney said that a total of 60 firearms were turned in at the Gun Buyback event that took place on Saturday at the Lenox Road Baptist Church in East Flatbush, in partnership with the New York Police Department (NYPD).

Thompson said nearly all of the firearms were "street guns" - mostly revolvers and semi-automatic pistols that are often used to commit crimes.

He said they also included two rifles and three "zip guns" or homemade weapons that are sometimes used by gang members.

Thompson said no identification was required, and no questions were asked of those who chose to turn in the firearms in exchange for a US\$200 bank card for each gun.

some residents who attended the event

said that recent shootings, in their neighborhood and nationally, prompted them to get rid of guns they had at home, "which could have been stolen or used by a child."

"Others, like a construction worker who said he found a loaded gun inside a dumpster, brought weapons that could have easily ended up with criminals," Thompson said.

The Gun Buyback program is one piece of the district attorney's comprehensive approach to combat gun violence, which includes investigations of gun traffickers, targeting of individuals who are responsible for the majority of shootings through initiatives by the newly-created Crime Strategies Unit, and securing convictions and lengthy prison sentences in drug- and gang-related cases prosecuted by the Violent Criminal Enterprises Bureau.

Thompson said about 575 people also attended on Saturday his third Begin Again — a program designed to offer a solution to thousands of individuals who have an outstanding warrant because they failed to answer a summons for a low-level offense, like walking a dog without a leash or being in a park after closing.

"There are over one million open warrants citywide, and they carry a number of negative consequences, including subjecting the warrant holder to arrest at any time," Thomp-

Climate change will increase damage, losses in coastal communities

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Dec. 4 ,2015 (IPS) - Residents of Rocky Point, a sleepy fishing village on Jamaica's south coast, woke up one July morning this year to flooded streets and yards. The sea had washed some 200 metres inland, flooding drains and leaving knee-deep water on the streets and inside people's home, a result of high tides and windy conditions.

"I've been here for 43 years and I have never seen it like this," Sydney Thomas told the Jamaica Observer newspaper.

Over at the Hellshire Fishing Beach, a community several miles outside the capital city Kingston, fishermen watched as their beach disappeared over a matter of weeks.

The sea now lapped at the sides of buildings. Boats that once sat on the sand were bobbing in the surf along the edge of what remained of the white sand beach.

An the far end of the Hunts Bay basin, the inner-city community of Seaview Gardens sat at the edge of the mangrove swamp. For decades, residents there lived with overflowing sewage systems, the result of a backflow that is caused when seawater enters outflow pipes, flooding the network and pushing waste water back into homes and into the streets.

Flooding in coastal communities around Jamaica is nothing new but in recent years, what used to be unusual has become a frequent occurrence.



More than rum, a tale of slavery


Curl up to a tasty rum-based cocktail, feast on classic European bar bites with a Caribbean twist and indulge on a story of resilience and drive at the newly established Solomon & Kuff.

This Harlem gastropub is providing more than just 70 different rums - representing various Caribbean, Central and South America countries. The story of rum's connection to the triangle trade and roots in the Caribbean is what restaurateur Karl Franz Williams wishes to put on the forefront.

According to Williams, "I have a way for telling the rum story and I thought this was an opportunity to talk about a spirit that is connected to my culture and is absolutely delicious with a great story to tell."

This story is interwoven directly into the foundation of Solomon & Kuff. Williams named his restaurant after Venture Smith's sons Solomon and Cuff. Smith was a slave who was bought for four barrels of rum and who later bought his freedom and the freedom of his family. The restaurateur said there is a motivation to preserve and celebrate that legacy of drive presented by Venture Smith, while taking a minor liberty in switching the first letter of Cuff's name to a K.

"As a black, Caribbean person and knowing the history of rum it was impossible for me to have a rum bar and not

tell some of that story," he explained. "It starts with rum, drive, entrepreneurship, and the spirit. He had two sons and their names were Solomon and Cuff, the idea is continuing the legacy of what he did."

That same drive and entrepreneurial spirit is present in Williams, a Yale University graduate, Brooklyn native and

of Vincentian descent.

This is not his first rodeo in opening a restaurant and bar; he first opened Society Coffee in 2005 which closed in 2011. While still operating Society Coffee, Williams opened 67 Orange Street in 2008 — a cocktail bar known for its masterly crafted drinks.

"When I met some mixolo-

gists and cocktail professionals who were showing that the journey was just as important, I fell in love with that and immersed myself," he said.

His vision is greatly aided by a team who has been integral in doing the research, tasting, and adding to the growing list of rums. In particular, Nick Iattoni — who is director of oper-

ations, alongside his business partner Julie Grunberger, and Dierdra Goban who designed the space.

"It's impossible to do something like this without a great team," he said.

Solomon & Kuff officially opens its doors Dec. 11, located on 12 Avenue between 133 and 134 streets in Harlem.



Making the case for Caribbean fishers

PARIS, Dec. 6, 2015 (IPS) Horace Walters has made the 6,903km journey from his native St. Lucia to Paris to deliver a simple, yet urgent message to the international community.

Walters, who has been involved in fishing for more than 40 years, said coastal communities, fishers, and fish farmers are already profoundly affected by climate change. He pointed to rising sea levels and acid oceans among the impacts of climate change.

"We need the international organisations and the (rich) countries to put their money where they have done a lot of damage. The damage is not done by us. We have not been able to have that kind of impact on the environment like the developed world has had so we want them to be mindful and we want them to understand that we need support," Walters told IPS.

"We need money to build new sea defences, new protection areas; it's going to take us money to buy new boats and bigger boats. We need help."

In the CARICOM region, the local population is highly dependent on fish for economic and social development. This resource also contributes significantly to food security, poverty alleviation, employment, foreign exchange earnings, development and stability of rural and coastal communities, culture, recreation and tourism.

The subsector provides direct employment for more than 120,000 fishers and indirect employment opportunities for thousands of others — particularly women — in processing, marketing, boatbuilding, net-making and other support services.

'We want to ensure that there is recognition of the negative impacts of climate and extreme weather con-

change on our fishing industry; that our people need to continue to sustainably use the resources and based on the science we have not been overexploiting out resources,' Walters, who is the president St. Lucia Fisher Folk Cooperative Society, said.

"We have to be mindful that our people want to eat good protein and fish is a source of the best protein."

Dr. Asha Singh, who heads the Ocean Governance Unit in the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) told IPS: "We derive about 55 per cent of our protein needs from the marine environment. Fisheries is an important sector for us. However we have not had success in promoting that into viable economic activity. It's still a very small percentage on our GDP (Gross Domestic Product) chart."

Walters said sea level rise

ditions have resulted in the destruction of expensive infrastructure like landing sites, locker rooms and ramps.

"The haul-up areas are going to have to be re-established, redeveloped and some of our people are beginning to understand what it will cost because there is a cost when you lose all of your facilities. A lot of facilities have been built, landing ramps, fishing boat enclosures and with the sea level rise we anticipate that we might not be able to use them economic losses.







Book launch of 'Gypsy in the Moonlight'


"Gypsy in the Moonlight," a novel set in Trinidad and Tobago during World War II, written by Lawrence Waldron, will be formally launched Tuesday evening Dec. 15 at the Brooklyn Public Library branch at 22 Linden Blvd., Brooklyn. The launch, scheduled for 6 –7:45 pm, will be hosted by the Caribbean Awareness Committee and the Trinidad and Tobago Folk Arts Institute, in collaboration with the Caribbean Literary and Cultural Center.

The book is, as described by the author, "a historical novel that combines the wry wit, urban commentary and gender anxieties of the uniquely modern and surprisingly compatible mediums of calypso and noir."

A New York resident and émigré from Trinidad and Tobago, author Waldron teaches Caribbean Art at City College of CUNY. "Gypsy in the Moonlight" provided Waldron with an opportunity to lean heavily on abundant research and extensive writing and lecturing he has done on Trinidadian cultural traditions, including calypso.

Dubbed "a calypso mystery," the novel uses the presence of American servicemen stationed at the naval base in Chaguaramas, Trinidad from 1942 and the resulting so-called "social invasion" that impacted Trinidadian society, to weave its tale of mischief and eventually, murder. Reflecting the tenor of the times, the calypso art form, as an important forum for topical commentary, boldly addressed the dramatic change in social mores occasioned by the American military presence, no individual composition doing so more famously than Lord Invader's classic "Rum and Coca Cola."

Positive advance comments about "Gypsy in the Moonlight" include the following: "a fine, powerfully evoca-

tive literary work that confronts the dark shadows of the Yankee presence in Trinidad during the 1940s" (Roger Toussaint, former president of the Transport Workers Union Local 100); "it beams light on the often condescending presence of American military personnel stationed in Trinidad" (Duff Mitchell, Trinidad and Tobago Folk Arts Institute); "It is easily one of the best novels set in the Caribbean in the last 50 years" (W.R. Holder, educator).

•Install a folding shelf on a hinge, and use that shelf to do your wrapping. Fold the shelf up when it is not needed and secure it with a latch at the top. •Hang hooks to store tape and scissors. Attach the scissors to the hook with a string so they won't go missing.

•A basket tucked nearby can house bows and ribbons so that they are easily stored until needed.

Having the wrapping station so accessible also allows you to take inventory of supplies and restock when necessary.

CARICOM's Climate Change Task Force also pointed to the land mass losses in the region's 20 member CARI-

It pointed to a rise in sea levels that would result in about 1,300 square kilometers of land area being lost.

This would be equivalent to the combined areas of Antigua and Barbuda, Anguilla, Barbados and St. Vincent and the Grenadines, CHTA said.

It said that when one extends the impact to 15 additional Caribbean Basin states that are not part of CARI-COM, including Cuba and the Dominican Republic, the regional impact is far

"Based upon these estimations, the social-economic consequences to the Caribbean would be catastrophic," said CHTA, adding that the consequences to the region's economies would be "severe, affecting employment levels, government revenue and diverting precious limited resources by states that are already facing vulnerable debt to GDP (gross domestic product) ratios, to infrastructure and mitigation efforts."

CHTA said that it supports the position being advanced by the CARICOM Task Force, which calls for a binding agreement by the world's nations, recognizing the special circumstances of the Caribbean and Small Island Developing States (SIDS), mitigating the impact of climate change by adopting measures that are aimed at restricting a rise in global temperature below 1.5 degrees Centigrade above pre-industrial levels, and providing technical and financial resources supporting research and mitigation measures to counter losses.

Troubetzkoy said CHTA is "working on several fronts to create a more sustainable tourism industry."

With the support of the Inter-American Development Bank, she said detailed energy efficiency audits have been conducted on over 150 regional hotels.

Troubetzkoy said many of the region's hotels have put energy efficiency measures in-place, and that the industry has advanced training, policies and incentives that support greater efficiencies and lower carbon footprints.

Additionally, she said CHTA and many of the region's national hotel and tourism associations have developed and promoted readiness and response plans to minimize the impact from weather-related disasters.

A commercial revolution in Bed-Stuy

Business is booming in Bedford-Stuyvesant, its commercial heart beating along Fulton Street on a retail sprawl the size of eight football fields.

Trendy boutiques, national chain stores, and long-standing mom-and-pops bustle along Fulton between Troy and Classon Avenues, and on Nostrand Avenue from Halsey Street to Atlantic Avenue. It's a shopping depot for residents, a magnet for new transplants, and a point of discovery for tourists seeking a special souvenir — whether an exotic African curio or a sumptuous memory of a soul-food dinner savored in a cozy restaurant.

Bedford-Stuyvesant's renaissance is the story of a social and demographic revolution. Crime is down, young professionals are moving in, local entrepreneurs are opening businesses, a Neo-Grec townhouse on Hancock Street sold for \$2,950,000 in September, and a community group is fasttracking the renaissance to improve commercial and residential life.

"You can feel the change because people are taking a strong interest in this part of Bed-Stuy for the great opportunities that exist here," says Michael Lambert, executive director of the six-year-old Bed-Stuy Gateway Business Improvement District that manages the commercial corridor and collaborates on such improvement projects as the \$20 million Nostrand Avenue reconstruction between Atlantic and Flushing avenues, and the \$22 million Fulton Streetscape Beautification project with new plazas, sidewalks, trees, benches, illumination, and bike racks to enhance visual appeal.

Lambert takes his job seriously. When contractors working on the Nostrand Avenue project left for the day with the sidewalk ripped open between Fulton and Halsey streets posing an imminent danger to merchants and patrons —

he fired off phone calls and emails to city pooh-bahs until the problem was fixed within 24 hours.

"That way businesses could engage safely with their customers again," he says.

The Bed-Stuy Gateway Business Improvement District serves close to 400 commercial enterprises, and is among the 72 such private-public partnerships with the New York City Department of Small Business Services helping to revitalize neighborhoods and spur economic development across the city through \$100 million invested in programs and services.

- It attracted Edible Arrangements, Walgreens Pharmacy, and Planet Fitness to the
- Its "cleaning ambassadors" — grimebusters in lime green being a portal to other parts of rights, unemployment, pover-

uniforms — power wash and pick up after the more than 27,000 daily visitors, virtually around the clock.

- Its public safety and environmental control team is out on the street monitoring cameras placed throughout the district.
- Its marketing experts help merchants promote their businesses through links to their websites from the group's online merchant directory, annual holiday advertisements in local newspapers, and other outreach.
- It introduces local youngsters to the workplace with paid and unpaid internships.

The "gateway" in its name is also strategic.

"The founders saw this stretch of Fulton Street as the borough and Manhattan," says Lambert, who assumed his position three years ago and has seen a dozen new businesses come aboard, elevating the profile of the surrounding neighborhood — an architectural splendor containing one of the largest collections of largely untouched Victorianstyle buildings in the country, with nearly 9,000 structures built before 1900 by some esti-

Bedford-Stuvvesant named for the Duke of Bedford and early settler Peter Stuyvesant — is a living catalog of the working-class experience. Diverse ethnic groups, including Jews, Italians, Irish, Caribbeans, and southeast Asians, have called it home, and its torturous battle with civil

ty, crime, and hope is etched on its handsome buildings and scrappy sidewalks that scream empowering quotes from Martin Luther King, Jr. and Malcolm X.

It's also a veritable Who's Who:

- Late Rep. Shirley Chisholm [1924-2005] was born here to a factory worker and a seamstress, becoming the first African-American woman to serve in Congress and earning a reputation for breaking down barriers while tirelessly advocating for the most vulnerable in our communities as the "people's politician." President Obama posthumously granted Chisholm the Presidential Medal of Freedom last month — the highest national civilian honor — to coincide with what would have been her 91st birthday.
- Jewish immigrants Morris and Rose Michtom invented the Teddy bear above their tiny candy store at 404 Tompkins Ave. between Hancock Street and Jefferson Avenue in 1902.
- Singer Lena Horne was born at 661 Lafayette Ave.
- Jackie Robinson Park on Reid Avenue between Chauncev and Marion streets honors Major League Baseball's first African-American player.
- Freed slave James Weeks established one of the nation's first free-black communities in nearby Weeksville.

Today's diverse and eclectic mix of residents and businesses - among them families, artists, entrepreneurs, community advocates, and service and arts organizations — are as culturally committed, housed in historic brownstones and living harmoniously for the most part in a neighborhood that has been sliced and diced more than a Thanksgiving tur-

Mary H. Monomi opened her book on Bedford-Stuyvesant in 1973 with the question, "Why would anyone want to live there?" These days she might wonder, "Why are so many people flocking there?"

A local baker sweetens the revival

Good lookin' Bedford-Stuyvesant is cookin' up an economic storm, thanks to innovative entrepreneurs such as boutique baker Myriam Nicolas.

The small business owner opened Brooklyn Baby Cakes on Nostrand Avenue between Macon and Halsey streets in 2012, a decade after buying a home in the brownstone community — then a blighted blip on the radar, despite being a short train ride away from downtown Manhattan.

"If you moved to Bedford-Styuvesant you were some sort of a pioneer," she says. "It was a neighborhood people were sceptical about."

Nicolas and her husband were early visionaries who looked past the crime.

"We weren't focused on what was happening around the corner," she says. "At the end of the day these were beautiful homes, and we just focused on

Her bakery — a warm, childfriendly place where people can come in, sit down, relax, and



enjoy a fresh-baked dessert and a cup of coffee — is the icing on the cake. Nicolas had virtually no baking experience when she began concocting cupcakes and treats for family and friends in an experiment that became a passion. Her sweets were so scrumptious that they persuaded her to open a bakery, which the Bed-Stuy Gateway **Business Improvement District** launched to the community with a mixcer.

"The support was nice," says Nicolas, whose business is a hit with tourists flocking to the

local bed-and-breakfasts for an affordable stay in a fast-growing community in the city's fastest growing borough.

Her cake creations are all baked on-site, with a different flavor featured each month -November was pumpkin and December is eggnog. The menu bursts with signature velvet cupcakes and luscious specialties such as Hummingbird, a spiced medley with crushed pineapple, bananas, and walnuts topped with vanilla frosting. Maple Pecan, a maple buttercream dainty crafted with



candied pecans, cinnamon, and Madagascar bourbon, is among the ambrosial seasonals drawing customers back for more.

Once-forsaken Bedford-Styuvesant is leaping into the commercial big leagues and small businesses are refueling it with local dollars. Community resi-

dents, notes Nicolas, can walk out of their homes, walk down the street, and shop without having to get in their car or hop on a train, in a break with the past.

"New and exciting things are definitely happening here," she

"We were determined not to rent another storefront, as we found it challenging for our business to be profitable while at the mercy of a landlord," says Melendez, who worshipped at the local Bridge Street African Methodist Episcopal Church and was familiar with the deep-rooted community.

Her ebbs and flows have mirrored Bedford-Stuyvesant's - both have blossomed after upping their games.

"The floral industry in particular has undergone a lot of



changes with the onset of the internet," she says. "We have had to embrace these changes, and find a way for our flower shop to thrive and stand out from all the bigger players on the web."

Melendez's eye-pleasing website offers deals of the day, multi-occasion floral arrangements, gift baskets crafted by experts with a passion for posies, and free online deliv-

The Bed-Stuy Gateway Business Improvement District has helped her business grow.

"With a business district we are able to command more attention from the city agencies to improve our basic services, such as sanitation," says Melendez. "It is also instrumental in promoting marketing strategies which would be rather expensive and difficult to complete by individual busi-

A business and social revival has buoyed the economic triumph.

"The upsurge is due in part to the general improvements made by city and state, newer residents moving in, and the attractiveness of living in Brooklyn," she says.

The spirit of the small business owner is another vital component, and the couple has led area students in flower plantings at Marcy Plaza, donated food and flowers to shelters and church groups,



and created a scholarship essay contest for teens about environmental sustainability.



Brooklyn College to house Haitian Studies Institute

By Alley Olivier

The road to establishing a Haitian Studies Institute housed at Brooklyn College is approaching a successful close.

Nearly two years in the works, the proposal to establish the academic-focused institute is being finalized.

Assistant Vice President of Brooklyn College's Communications and Marketing Office, Jason Carey, said he is excited and hopeful that the proposal will receive the final sign-off in the spring.

"We're anticipating that the proposal will go through and be approved in the spring. I think it's aggressive but we're very hopeful that will happen," Carey said.

Choosing Brooklyn College as the home base for this institute was an easy one. Brooklyn is home to the largest Caribbean population in New York, Haitians in particular.

The university's own population reflects a large Haitian base at both the student and faculty levels, which helped in the conversations pushing the idea to fruition.

"The conversation has started and stalled but more recently started to gain a lot of traction in the field of Haitian studies in particular from our perspective, the Brooklyn College perspective because of the large Haitian population in Brooklyn," Carey explained.

in Brooklyn," Carey explained.

Like the Dominican Studies Institute, the Haitian Studies Institute will be academic-focused and operate as a hub for research. The hope is that the institute will encourage research at the international level, inviting scholars worldwide to meet, discuss, and find support.

"Like other institutes, it's an academic-focused institute in particular the study of Haiti and Haitian people in the diaspora. I think the primary goal is for the institute to establish itself as a leading research center at an international level, which is really important," Carey said.

Above all else, the institute is hopeful to achieve research that is useful at an academic level and shows the impact different cultures and people have in the diaspora.

"I think it's really about making sure what the research institute does is relevant, useful at an academic level and elevates the seriousness of study at CUNY for this particular school and in a general way to really take a focused academic look at the impact of a particular culture and people," he said.



NYC program allows seniors to freeze rents

Rising costs and perpetual inflationary increases in living expenses affect almost everyone. However, Americans reliant on a fixed income are often a silent majority quietly struggling to stay above the fray.

Reports of elders resorting to eating pet foods, many more losing their dwellings and having to live in shelters or suffer the stigma of being called homeless has become a recurring story and far less a news item.

In order to provide assistance to qualified elders, The Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption (SCRIE, also known as the NYC Rent Freeze Program) freezes the rent for headof-household seniors 62 and older who live in rent-regulated apartments.

On Dec. 11 at the Park Slope Library, 431 Sixth Ave. at 9th St., The Good Neighbors of Park Slope will host a community outreach event.

Beginning at 11 am, the informative session aimed at anyone over 62 years of age will enlighten NYC residents who may qualify for the NYC rent Freeze Program aka SCRIE.

Pertinent information will be readily available to interested individuals and representatives will be present to lend assistance to applicants in need of help.

Tribute to the patron saint of the poor and dying

Mother Teresa (Juliet Stevenson) was born Anjezë Gonxhe Bojaxhiu in Kosovo on Aug. 26, 1910. At the age of 12, she already expressed an interest in becoming a nun in order to minister to the poor in Calcutta.

A half-dozen years later, she abandoned Albania for Ireland to enter the convent of the Sisters of Loreto. After completing her novitiate in Darjeeling near the Himalayan mountains, she took her vows in 1931 and began her career as a teacher at a Catholic high school for girls.

However, her original call-

ing continue to nag at Teresa, so she soon prevailed upon her Mother Superior (Mahabanoo Mody-Kotwal) for permission to relocate to Calcutta. That would depend upon a special dispensation from the Vatican, because of her prior promise to remain cloistered in a monastery and to not move among the masses of the great unwashed.

Eventually, Teresa was not only allowed to leave the Sisters of Loreto but to found her own order in Calcutta, the Missionaries of Charity. Over the ensuing decades, its ranks

would swell to 4,000 with convents in 100 countries.

Written and directed by William Riead, "The Letters" is a reverential biopic paying homage to the pious patron saint of the poor, sick and dying. The movie's title is based on her half-century long exchange of intimate missives with her confidant and spiritual adviser, Father Celeste van Exem (Max von Sydow)

Despite the accolades and fanfare the high-profile icon ultimately attracted, the production's aspires to drive home the point that this humble servant of the Lord never let herself be distracted from her appointed rounds. "I am just a pencil in God's hand," she explained. Nevertheless, she would be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979, and canonized posthumously by Pope John Paul II in 2003.

day's "Caribbean Christmas Feeling" concert, can expect to find lots of sorrel, ginger beer, black cake, ham, homemade bread and cocoa tea, on sale.

It is historically noteworthy that Quake USA is definitively the longest continuously performing Caribbean-American folk group in the Diaspora.

"Motivated by nostalgia and a desire to ensure the preservation of expressive Caribbean culture — music, song, dance, drama and poetry — in the Diaspora, some of the original members of SIY who had migrated to the USA, decided to launch this important organization, Quake USA, in 1989," says co-director Christine Grant, who is also one of the founding members of the original SIY.

Many believe that this registered, non-profit group, based in Brooklyn, NYC, is the embodiment of a dream of the upliftment of the youth of the Caribbean and Diaspora, the author of this article has observed.

"It is with great pride and enjoyment that Quake USA has

been showcasing Grenadian and Caribbean culture in all of its expressive forms," says co-director Cheryl Vincent, aka Cheryl V, a founding member of SIY, who has since become an independent recording artiste with four albums to her credit.

Looking ahead

"Quake USA is considering ways to increase its visibility and to further advance its significant and historical mandate with respect to preserving and showcasing Caribbean culture, to ensure the inter-generational and Diasporal transfer of Caribbean cultural heritage," adds Cheryl V.

"Historically, Quake USA is perceived by many as always being ready to add some extra 'spice' to events — religious services and formal ceremonies," says Burgess "Quako" McPhie, a panist, songwriter and original member of SIY, who has independently recorded 10 CD albums and five singles.

"The tremendous contributions that the original Spice Island Youthquake and Quake USA, the offspring of the

ry series through connecting with artists within his community. According to Louissant, "There's a really big community of Haitian artists of my generation and younger doing really interesting things."

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) _ The Portland Timbers had a plan to attack early in their first MLS Cup appearance. They didn't expect it to work to perfection so quickly.

Diego Valeri scored 27 seconds after the opening whistle for the

fastest goal in MLS Cup history to stun the Columbus Crew and thier home fans.

A second goal in the seventh minute by Rodney Wallace provided all the scoring the Timbers needed to beat the Crew 2-1 on Sunday for their first league title.

The first goal came when Columbus midfielder Wil Trapp sent a back pass to goalkeeper Steve Clark, who tried to move the ball from his right foot to the left for a clearance. But Clark didn't see Valeri closing and the midfielder poked the ball away

Narine's international suspension will also be recognized and enforced by all National Cricket Federations within domestic cricket events played in their own jurisdiction, save that, with the consent of the WICB he may be able to play in domestic cricket events played under the auspices of the WICB.

Under ICC regulations, Narine can ask for a re-assessment once he has modified his action.

This is the second time Narine has been reported for a suspect bowling action. The development is a massive blow not only for Narine, but for West Indies, especially with the Twenty20 World Cup set to be played in India from March 11 to April 3, 2016.



In some instances, ads initially advertise calls to a local number, but then direct callers to a second number starting with one of the paid exchanges. "Consumers must also question the legitimacy of vague classifieds because they too could be a scam. Before responding to an ad, consumers should verify the source of all information & always be wary about sending money or signing a contract with an
